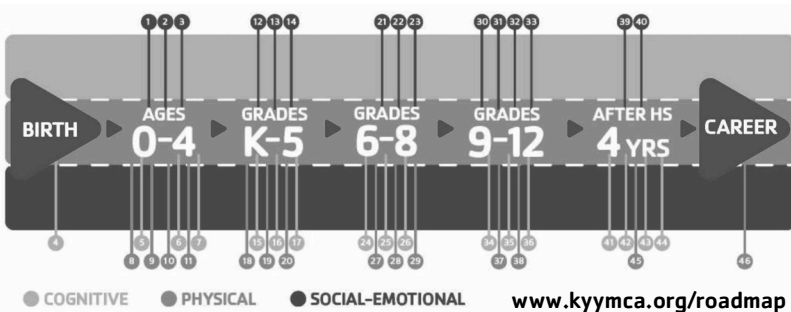

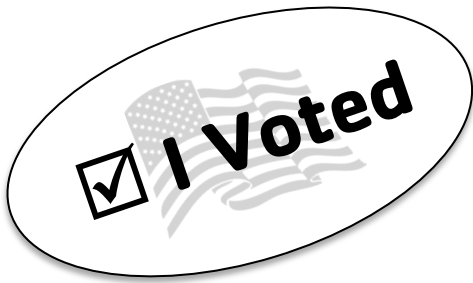

CONFERENCE STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
4. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
5. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
6. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
7. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
8. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
9. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
10. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
11. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
12. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
13. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
14. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. If state or federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify parent/guardian and law enforcement and participant will be sent home. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

ROOMING POLICY

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates

-- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized* parental consent (*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

REFUND POLICY

I understand that all fees are non-refundable. In the case of extenuating circumstances, a portion of the payment may be refunded by action of the Executive Director based upon written request from the student or parent.

PARTICIPANT DRESS CODE

KYA is a professional development experience. While at KYA, students are expected to abide by the following dress code. Conference name badges are part of this dress code and must be worn for all conference functions. Anyone not in compliance with the dress code may be asked to change clothes. Advisors will be notified of any violations. Kentucky YMCA staff reserves the right to consider removal of Delegation of Excellence from any delegation with three (3) or more reported dress code violations. ****Dress code will be enforced by delegation advisors.****

First night: Business Casual; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Second day: Business Professional

Second night: Casual

Third morning: Casual; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Business Casual

- Collared shirt (tucked in)
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders
NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)
- Blazer, business jacket, and tie optional
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Trousers such as khakis or dress pants **NO JEANS, LEGGINGS, or FITNESS PANTS**
- Practical dress shoes and socks **NO casual footwear (Uggs, Chuck Taylors, Toms, flip flops, etc.)**

Business Professional

- Blazer, sport coat, or suit jacket
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders
NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)
- Collared dress shirt (tucked in)
- Tie or bow tie
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Dress slacks or suit pants **NO Jeans, leggings or fitness pants**
- Business pantsuit
- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Practical dress shoes and socks **NO casual footwear (Uggs, Toms, Chuck Taylors, flip flops, etc.)**

The following are items of attire are not appropriate for all delegates at ALL TIMES (including Business and Casual dress):

- Tops that are: backless, sheer/transparent, low-cut, midriff-bearing, do not cover shoulders
- Skirts shorter than bend of knee (front and back)
- Shorts shorter than finger-tip length (front and back only)
- Hats
- Visible undergarments
- Bare feet
- Any clothing with inappropriate language or imagery, derogatory of any ethnic, religious, or social group
- Any clothing otherwise deemed inappropriate by the Kentucky YMCA Staff

**BE A BETTER DEBATER!!!
READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:**

- **ALWAYS ADDRESS THE CHAIR!** “Harry Potter, Hogwarts Gryffindor, Sir/Madam Chair.”
- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
 - READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON'T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, “When will this bill go into effect?” and “How much will this bill cost?” are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
 - Don't ask questions that begin with “WHY...?” Those are almost *always* debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE**
 - Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
 - Give a speech for or against the bill
 - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
 - If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say, **“Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or ‘series of questions’)?”**
 - If you would like to SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION, you should also say, “And I reserve my right to speak (or ‘yield my time’) afterward.”
 - If you would like to YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.
 - EX: “Hermione Granger, Hogwarts, Sir Chair. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin.”

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.

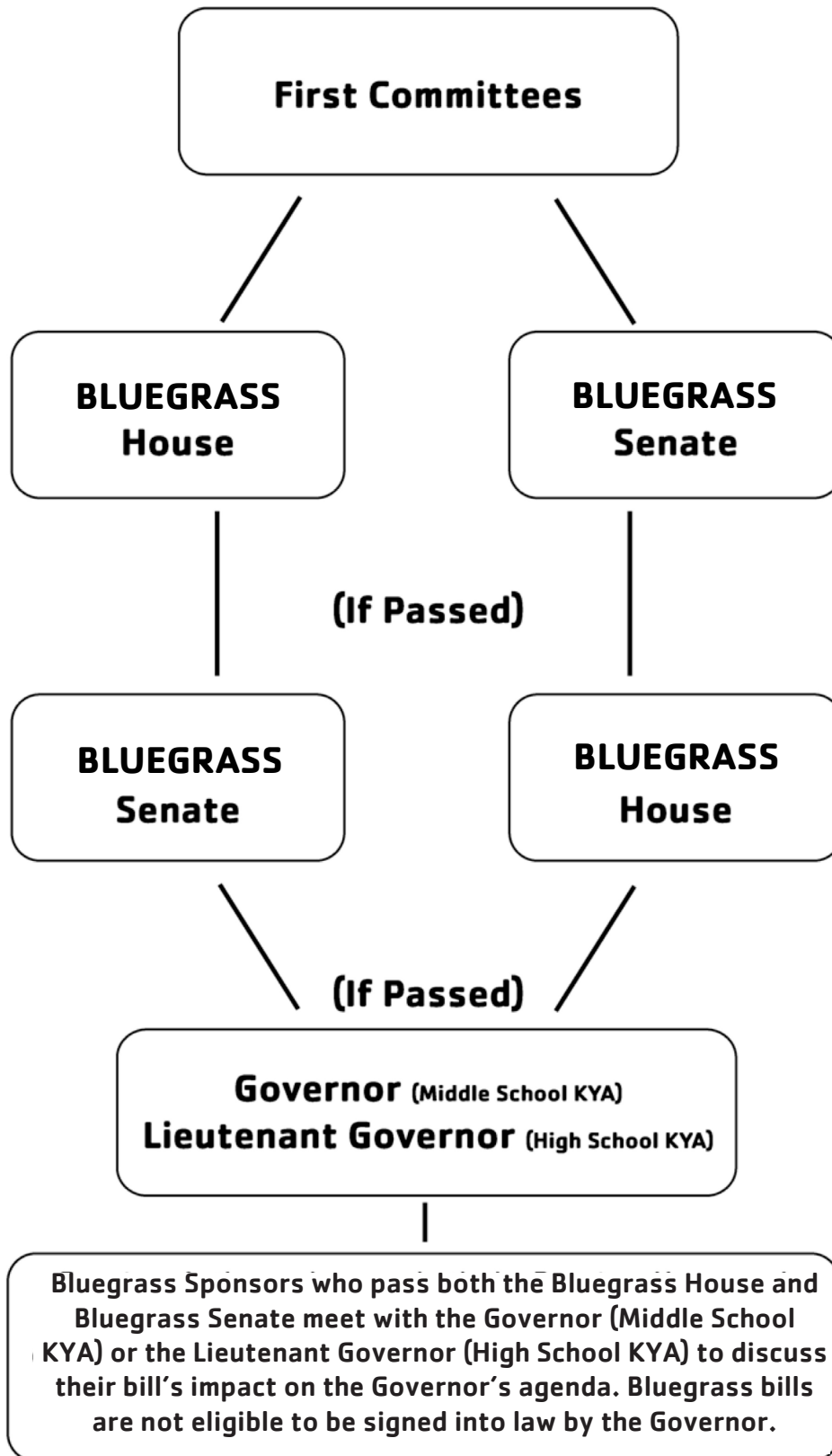

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

4

5 Section 1: Everyday 655,642 students attend public schools in the state of Kentucky. There are 9,855
6 school buses on the road in our Commonwealth each day, with hundreds of thousands of children riding
7 to and from school. Hundreds of thousands of miles are traveled by these children day in and day out.
8 With the only safety and security mandated is the trust and training of the 10,000 school bus drivers
9 employed in the state. We need another way to make sure our kids are safe.

10

11 Section 2: This piece of legislation is designed to help protect the children on public school buses in our
12 state. Global Positioning Systems (GPS) are a part of our world. From navigation systems to cell
13 phones, GPS is used in several different formats. Vehicle monitoring is one aspect of GPS that is being
14 used by hundreds of companies worldwide. GPS tracking can monitor vehicle location, speed, braking,
15 acceleration, SOS systems and create more driver efficiency. All public school buses need to be fitted
16 with GPS tracking devices for all of these same reasons. Thousands of families place their students on
17 these buses each day and trust the driver to get them there safely. With these devices school systems
18 can monitor in real time that our kids are safe. Also with GPS software parents could monitor where
19 kids are and when they are to be picked up or dropped off.

20


21 Section 3: This bill will require school systems to purchase Global Positioning Systems to be retrofitted
22 on all older buses and to be installed on all those newly purchased. Additional funding will be needed to
23 make these purchases. Funds could be used from school system transportation funds, and we feel that
24 this could be recouped in the long run from monitoring driver driving habits and developing them to be
25 more efficient.

26

27 Section 4: Schools systems who fail to comply will have all buses not equipped with GPS systems pulled
28 from service until fitted with GPS systems and a \$1,000 fine will be assessed per bus.

29

30 Section 5: This bill will take effect beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

1 An act to prohibit any child under the age of 14 to use a personal trampoline.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Trampolines are popular among kids and adults, but they're dangerous. From 2002 to
6 2011, trampoline injuries contributed to more than one million emergency room visits in the United
7 States. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) suggests trampolines should never be used unless
8 athletes are being supervised in training for a sport like diving or gymnastics. Small children are 14
9 times more likely to get hurt on trampolines than bigger children. A 2012 AAP report notes that
10 botched somersaults and flips are often the cause of cervical spine injuries with permanent injury.
11 Nets around trampolines only give parents and children a false sense of security. Among the injuries
12 that trampolines cause is broken arms and legs, concussions, lacerations, abdominal injuries, and even
13 paralysis. Parents must say NO to allowing their young children on personal trampolines.


14
15 Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to reduce the amount of injuries to children, 14 and under.
16 Ratification of this bill would protect young children from unnecessary injuries that can be life-
17 changing such as paralysis. By doing this, injuries from trampoline use will be dramatically decreased.
18 Also, this will prevent young children, who, because their decision-making skills are still developing,
19 from potential harm due to trampoline use. We must say NO to children under 14 on personal
20 trampolines.

21
22 Section 3: This bill will be enforced by law enforcement. Hospitals and/or doctors' offices will file
23 accident reports as necessary. Parents/guardians will be held liable for injuries to children under 14
24 that have resulted from trampoline use on their personal property.

25
26 Section 4: If personal injury to a child is reported and liability has been established, the punishments
27 will be as follows:

- 28 • 1st Offense: A fine of \$1000 and mandated removal of the trampoline from premises.
- 29 • 2nd Offense: A fine of \$5000 and a 60 day probation period.
- 30 • 3rd Offense: Arrest

31
32 Section 5: This bill will take effect June 2017.

1 An act to require more frequent random drug tests in schools

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Be it hereby enacted by the annual youth legislature of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, this
6 act proposes that Kentucky changes its requirements for randomized drug testing. Currently, in the
7 state of Kentucky drug tests are not required in most Kentucky schools.

8
9 Section 2: This bill will require more drug tests in the state of Kentucky, not only for students who
10 participate in extracurricular activities, but for all students. This will include grades 6-12.


11
12 Section 3: This will decrease the rate of students involved with drugs, It will also, ensure the health and
13 state of mind of students involved with illegal and over used drugs.

14
15 Section 4: With the passage of this bill, all students will be required to have one random drug tests per
16 semester. The most accurate and affective type of test would be the Oral Fluid drug test. This would
17 allow more privacy, accuracy, and takes the shortest amount of time.

18
19 Section 5: If students are found positive within the schools drug tests this bill will notify the parents,
20 and offer rehabilitation and drug counseling. If the parents do not comply within 5 days CPS will be
21 notified.

22
23 Section 6: Each drug test will costs an estimated \$12.00 per person. The money for this bill will come
24 from each individual school's Title I funding.

25
26 Section 7: This bill will go into effect beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

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An act to require heroin safe havens in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This is a bill to require all heroin addicts to go to a safe injection site, where a doctor will control heroin injections daily or weekly depending on their addiction status. The addicts will be slowly weened off the heroin until they do not feel the need to use heroin anymore and are functioning correctly without it. This will prevent the likelihood of overdosing.

Section 2: This bill will help all heroin addicts in Kentucky to not overdose. This will lead to less deaths caused by heroin overdose.

Section 3: The cost to add a safe needle injection site into every hospital and to add one doctor to help and supervise the needle injection site would be \$156,000 (the average salary of a doctor) and \$0.34 per needle. Current urgent care centers already purchase the following supplies, they will just need to add quantity for the safe injection site:

Section 4: The following are the consequences for the heroin users not going to their daily/weekly appointments:

- First Offense: \$20 fine
- Second Offense: \$40 fine
- Third Offense: \$80 fine
- Fourth Offense: Jail for 190 days


Section 5: The Kentucky health department will enforce this bill.

Section 6: The money for the new injection sites will come from raising taxes by 1%, from 6% to 7%.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect by January 2018.

15 Section 3: Each individual facility will be responsible for the cost and installation of the sink and water
16 lines which is estimated at \$1,050.00. Each facility that does not provide a visible sink will receive a 20
17 point deduction on their and safety violation at their employment as a consequence.

19 Section 4: This bill will be enforced by The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services.
20
21 Section 5: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

13 Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky State Police and the Kentucky Court of Justice.

15 Section 5: The penalty for violating this law will be a \$10,000 fine and 5-10 years imprisonment.
16

17 Section 6: Fines collected will go to Kentucky orphanages and adoption centers.
18

19 Section 7: This will go into effect March 25, 2017.

16 Section 5: If manufacturers do not follow these guidelines, they will be penalized as follows:
17 • First offense: \$1,000 fine
18 • Second offense: \$10,000 fine
19 • Third offense: manufacturing license revoked for 5 months.

21 Section 6: This will be enforced by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet.
22
23 Section 7: This bill will go into effect on July 1st, 2017 to give manufacturers time to finalize details.

5 Section 1: This bill would require all owners of non-commercial diesel vehicles to purchase a diesel
6 stamp in order to purchase diesel fuel. This stamp would be issued yearly by the Department of Motor
7 Vehicles and can be renewed for 7 years.

8


9 Section 2: The aim of the bill is to reduce the ill effects on air quality in Kentucky by phasing out all
10 non-commercial diesel vehicles in the 7 year time period. The stamp would recognize diesel owners
11 and require them to show the stamp to receive diesel fuel until a later date when they could switch to
12 another form of automobile engine or car.

13

14 Section 3: The bill would be enforced by the Department of Motor Vehicles and funds from the stamps
15 will be used to form a replacement pool for eligible diesel owners to use at the end of the 7 years
16 towards another non-diesel vehicle.

18 Section 4: This bill will go into effect on April 1, 2017

1 An act to allow families to petition the court for a temporary gun restraining order for family member
2 in danger.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: This bill would allow family members or law enforcement officers to ask the court to issue a
7 temporary emergency gun violence restraining order (TGRO) to people who pose an immediate danger
8 to themselves or others.
9

10 Section 2: If the defendant cannot afford an attorney, a public defender will be provided at no charge.
11 Evidence from the family or officers shall be reviewed by a state licensed mental health physician and
12 the court. Judgment shall be determined based upon evidence only. Evidence could include items such
13 as suicidal expressions, terroristic threatening, stalking, social media postings, you tube videos, or
14 voice recordings.
15


16 Section 3: If the defendant is found to be an immediate threat to himself or others, all firearms shall be
17 removed for a period of six months. Search warrants will allow search and seizure for officers to
18 obtain firearms. Local law enforcement would maintain possession of the firearms during the TGRO
19 period. The court will immediately report the TGRO to local law enforcement and the state gun
20 universal background check division.
21

22 Section 4: After a period of six months, the mental health physician and the court will reconsider the
23 status of the defendant. If cleared of concerns, all firearms will be returned immediately. If still
24 considered a threat, the TGRO will go another six months when it will be reviewed again. Any time a
25 defendant is cleared, the court will immediately report the TGRO to local law enforcement and the state
26 gun universal background check division. All weapons would be returned at that time.
27

28 Section 5: This bill would make it a Class B misdemeanor to file a request for a TGRO against someone
29 knowing the information in the request to be false or with the intent to harass the defendant. Class B
30 misdemeanors are subject to a \$250 fine and 90 days in jail.
31

32 Section 6: There is no funding required for this bill. The district courts of Kentucky will enforce this bill.
33

34 Section 7: This bill would go into effect upon passing.

1 An act to create an opioid addiction rehabilitation program

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: In 2015, 1,248 people died of an opioid overdose. In 2014, overdose deaths rose 8%. This act is
6 intended to give people the tools to reduce relapse by rehabilitation instead of imprisonment.

7
8 Section 2: A person charged with a first offense shall be evaluated by a state certified drug counselor. The
9 counselor will file the report with the court, the defendant, and his defense attorney.

10
11 Section 3: If the state certified drug counselor's report indicates drug rehabilitation will be beneficial to the
12 defendant, then the court shall grant it.

13
14 Section 4: First, rehabilitation must consist of an in-house rehabilitation. After completion of the in-house
15 rehabilitation program, the defendant must comply with all recommended after care. The defendant and/or
16 attorney must file a 30 day status report with the court.


17
18 Section 5: Second, if the defendant successfully completes the rehabilitation program, the defendant shall be
19 subject to the following terms and conditions for a period of 5 years: A. not commit any further offenses;
20 B. be subject to random drug screens at their cost; C. remain employed to the best of their ability; D. avoid
21 persons of bad character; E. complete 90 Narcotics Anonymous meetings within 90 days after completion of
22 the in-house rehabilitation; and F. regularly attend NA meetings thereafter.

23
24 Section 6: The defendant's first first offense shall not be on his criminal history while in the rehabilitation
25 program. If the defendant successfully completes the program, he shall not be charged with the criminal
26 offense of possession of opioids first offense. The defendant's criminal history will be free of this charge as
27 if it never occurred.

28
29 Section 7: The defendant will have to pay a fee of \$1,000.00 over the 5 year period to offset the cost of the
30 program. The balance shall be paid by his insurance if available. This bill shall be further funded by a two
31 dollar increase in court costs for all drug related offenses.

32
33 Section 8: If a defendant violates the program, he shall be granted a second opportunity in the program. If a
34 defendant fails to complete all requirements a second time, he shall then be subject to the penalties under
35 the Kentucky law. The penalty for the first offense possession of opioids is 1-5 years in a state penitentiary.

36
37 Section 9: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

1 An act to mandate state funding for the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program
2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4

5 Section 1: All children in abuse cases are appointed a CASA worker as their representative voice to
6 serve them in court. Although it is a state law (KRS 620.500), there is no state funding for the
7 program. The volunteers are people who complete training through the CASA program. They are also
8 supervised by CASA officials. Volunteers are then appointed (by a judge) to represent the best interests
9 of abused and neglected children in court.

10

11 Section 2: CASA volunteer defined: must be at least 21 years of age, of good moral character, and
12 successfully complete screening. Training is approximately 30 hours of class work and court
13 observation. Ongoing training is offered through seminars. CASA volunteers also take an oath of
14 confidentiality.

15

16 Section 3: With state funding, even more CASA volunteers will continue to attend all court hearings and
17 submit written reports. Volunteers are required to submit at least one report every six months. All
18 documentation and observations are reported back to the judge for determining the best interest of
19 the child.

20


21 Section 4: Currently, over 700 unpaid volunteers monitor and visit well over 3,000 children as often as
22 necessary to observe whether needs are being met and if court orders are being followed. CASA
23 volunteers are also responsible for reporting incidents of abuse or neglect to authorities. Expenses for
24 CASA volunteers go for items such as transportation and office materials to maintain files on the
25 children for whom they are responsible. The current system will work more efficiently and quickly with
26 some financial support.

27


28 Section 5: This bill will be funded by adding a two dollar fee to court costs in cases such as Assault 4th
29 Degree, Domestic Violence, Unlawful Transaction with a Minor, or any other criminal charge where a
30 child is a victim.

31

32 Section 6: This bill will go into effect on July 1, 2017.

- 1 An act to require a yearly drug screening test for all recipients of government welfare.
2
- 3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
- 5 Section 1: According to WKYT, a news station out of Lexington, Kentucky; more than 900,000 citizens
6 in Kentucky receive some sort of welfare assistance. This bill would require all recipients of government
7 welfare to complete a drug screening test yearly in ordered to maintain their eligibility for welfare
8 benefits.
9
- 10 Section 2: If at any time a recipient of government welfare fails their yearly drug screening, they will
11 immediately be denied benefits. For benefits to be reinstated, these recipients who fail must
12 successfully pass two consecutive drug screeners during a six month span.
13
- 14 Section 3: According to the Jennie Stuart Medical Center Occupational Health Clinic, a local drug testing
15 facility in Hopkinsville, a basic 5 panel drug screening test costs \$80.00. This test checks for cocaine,
16 opiates, methamphetamine, phencyclidine (PCP), and tetrahydrocannabinol (THC or marijuana). Initially,
17 this money could come out the recipient’s welfare benefits, but eventually this money will be paid out
18 of the savings established through the non-payment of benefits to those who fail their testing. The
19 subsequent tests that will need to be taken and passed during the six month period following the
20 denial of benefits in order to regain those benefits, will be completed at cost to the recipients.
21
- 22 Section 4: The state of Kentucky will enforce this law through the current welfare department in
23 conjunction with local health departments and drug testing facilities.
24
- 25 Section 5: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

2 national primary, general or special election

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5


6 Section 1: Voter identification laws have been enacted by thirty-two states in order to protect the
7 integrity of their elections. Currently Kentucky’s voter ID law requires proof of identity using a driver’s
8 license, social security card, or a credit card (or simply be known by the poll worker, I believe). A
9 January 12, 2014 National Review article recounts an experiment by New York city’s Department of
10 Investigations that showed how easy it was to commit voter fraud. Undercover Agents identifying
11 themselves falsely were allowed to vote ninety-seven percent of the instances. In order to further
12 protect the elections in Kentucky, voters should be required to show a photo ID prior to voting.
13

14 Section 2: Voters shall be required to present one of the following photo IDs when voting: Kentucky
15 driver’s license or non-driver ID card, passport or other ID issued by the U.S. government, tribal ID, or
16 student ID from an accredited Kentucky high school, college, university, or technical school. However, if
17 the voter does not have an ID, they may complete an affidavit of personal identification.

18 Section 3: Any voter unable to present proof of citizenship through the use of any of the government
19 issued forms of identification or by affidavit shall not be allowed to cast a ballot in any local, state or
20 national primary, general or special election.
21

22 Section 4: There is no cost to implement this bill.
23

24 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on February 28, 2017.

8 service member for their duty. Purchasing a standard size American flag will be \$25.
9

10 Section 2: There are currently there are 1.2 million enlisted men and women serving around the world
11 in active duty. Since 2013, five soldier from Kentucky have been killed in action by deadly force.
12

13 Section 3: For veterans wishing to have a flag pole installed may utilize the same program but with a
14 discounted price. They will receive assistance of \$100 towards the installation if they contact the
15 Department of Veterans Affairs.

1 An act to require all mobile home parks with 20 or more units to provide a storm shelter area.
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: According to the National Severe Storm Center, mobile home residents are 10 to 20 times
6 more likely to die in tornadoes than those in residential homes. This bill will require all mobile home
7 parks with 20 or more units to provide a storm shelter area. This will increase the safety of residents
8 in mobile home parks when storms strike.
9
10 Section 2: This bill will be enforced by the KY Department of Health. It will be added to their regular
11 routines for regulating if mobile home parks meet code.
12
13 Section 3: The funding of this bill will come from the mobile home park owners.
14
15 Section 4: Mobile home parks will have one year to comply with the regulations. Parks that do not
16 comply will be given a \$500 fine every six months that compliance is not met.
17
18 Section 5: This bill will go into effect 1 year after passage.

1 An act to restrict ALL cell phone use while operating a motor vehicle.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Using cell phones while driving is very dangerous. According to the Center for Disease
6 Control and Prevention, over 8 people are killed and 1,161 injured in crashes that are reported to
7 involve a distracted driver every day. Distracted driving is driving while doing another activity that
8 takes your attention away from driving. Distracted driving can increase the chance of a motor vehicle
9 crash. At 55 miles per hour (mph), a vehicle is traveling at about 80 feet per second. Drivers could
10 easily be involved in an accident by not looking at the road for just the five seconds that it takes to dial
11 a number, read a text, or check Facebook. While driving at 55 mph, the average text takes your eyes
12 off of the road for the length of a football field. Distracted driving puts other drivers, passengers, and
13 everyone on the roadways in danger. Currently, there is no handheld cell phone prohibition for drivers
14 in Kentucky except that novice drivers under the age of 18 are restricted from using their cell phone at
15 all while driving. This includes using a handheld device or a hands-free device. All KY drivers are
16 forbidden from texting while driving. The law does not outlaw adults over the age of 18 from making
17 calls on their cell phones while driving.

18
19 Section 2: This bill would restrict ALL cell phone use while operating a motor vehicle. Citizens would be
20 made aware of changes to driving laws through press releases, public service announcements, driver's
21 permit manuals, and public posters.


22
23 Section 3: Funding for this bill will be minimal with the only costs being the advertisement campaign to
24 create public awareness in the beginning. Funding will come directly from money collected for violations
25 of cell phone use and supplemented by the Department of Motor Vehicles not to exceed 50% of costs.

26
27 Section 4: The law enforcement of Kentucky will enforce this law. People who fail to abide by this law
28 will be punished by the following:

- 29 • First Offense – Warning by police
30 • Second Offense – Citizen will be given a \$50 fine, along with court fees.
31 • Third Offense – Citizen will be given a \$100 fine, along with court fees.

32 If additional offenses occur, the citizen could face jail time decided by the court.

33
34 Section 5: This bill will go into effect three months after passage so that citizens will have time to find
35 out about the bill and its penalties.

1 An act to establish a Syringe Exchange Programs (SEP) at every Health Department in Kentucky.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4
5 Section 1: According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), Kentucky has the highest rate of
6 Hepatitis C in the nation and a quickly rising rate of HIV. This law would establish anonymous free
7 needle exchange programs in every health department in our state.

8
9 Section 2: Participants will be given 70 free needles and can exchange and dispose properly any used
10 needles for new ones. Those exchanging needles will have access to resources for drug abuse
11 treatment if they want.

12
13 Section 3: Clean needles cost .97 cents each, meaning any one person using this program year round
14 will only cost our government about \$815 a year per participant. This is miniscule compared to
15 \$80,000 a year it takes to treat a person with Hepatitis C/HIV annually. Syringe exchange programs
16 across the country have been very effective and cost efficient. It is estimated that for every \$1
17 invested into the Harm Reduction Syringe Exchange Program, up to \$7 will be saved in prevention of
18 HIV treatment costs alone.

19
20 Section 4: Health Departments undergo an annual audit; during their evaluations they will be checked
21 to see if they have a Syringe Exchange Program (SEP). If there is no program present at the Health
22 Department they will be changed \$1,000 per infraction.

23
24 Section 5: This bill will go into effect June 1st, 2017. Giving Health Departments 6 months to acquire
25 the necessary resources to execute this act.

1 An act to notify crime victims and their families upon their perpetrator's release

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4
5 Section 1: Currently, the state of Kentucky does not have a victims' rights amendment in its
6 constitution. Commonly called Marsy's Law, this law will inform victims and their families that the
7 perpetrator (person who committed the crime) is out of jail or prison. In 18 states there is not a law to
8 protect victims and their families.

9
10 Section 2: "Marsy's Law was named after a beautiful, vibrant University of California Santa Barbara
11 student, who was stalked and killed by her ex-boyfriend in 1983. Only a week after Marsy was
12 murdered, Marsy's mother, walked into a grocery store after visiting her daughter's grave and was
13 confronted by the accused murderer. She had no idea that he had been released on bail."

14
15 Section 3: To ensure this does not happen in Kentucky, a victims' right amendment is needed and
16 absolutely necessary.

17
18 Section 4: When passed, this law will go into effect January 1, 2017.

An act to require front and rear license plates.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: To ensure the safety and justice of all Kentucky residents, all drivers will be required to have two license plates, one in the front, one in the rear of the vehicle.

Section 2: According to a recent study by the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI), it was found that states that require vehicles to have two license plates save valuable time and resources in the areas of law enforcement, tolling, parking and homeland security. While law enforcement and safety is always a number one concern for our citizens, ensuring payment of tolls will soon become extremely important in our state with the completion of The Ohio River Bridges Project in downtown Louisville. The tolls will pay for the project and bring revenue to our state. On the new bridge system, it will be easier to read front license plates to catch people not paying to cross.


Section 3: The cost of this bill will only add \$10 additional dollars per driver to register a license plate. A regular issue license plate in Kentucky is currently \$21. If you purchase a specialty plate, it is also only \$10 additional dollars.

Section 4: If you do not follow the law, you will face a fine of up to \$200 dollars. As this price is almost the same across the country.

Section 5: This bill will be enforced on July 1, 2017.

1 An act on the Preservation of Green Space

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Green space is being reduced around urban areas in our Commonwealth as the population of
6 these areas continues to grow. Currently there is no legislation at the state level to protect the green
7 space in our Commonwealth. The employment provide by agriculture and farming, as well as the horse
8 industry, makes protecting this green space vital to Kentucky's economic development.

9
10 Section 2: The Preservation of Green Space (PoGS) agency shall be established to protect urban green
11 space and agricultural lands throughout the Commonwealth. The governor shall appoint twelve (12)
12 members of this agency, which must include:


- 13
14
- 15 • At least one representative from each congressional district.
 - 16 • A representative from the horse industry.
 - 17 • A representative from the Chamber of Commerce.
 - 18 • A representative from an environmental conservation non-profit organization.
 - 19 • A representative from the agricultural industry.

20 PoGS shall identify and choose which land should be protected throughout the Commonwealth. They
21 shall also create a system that will review and approve requests to use protected green space for
22 development and zoning purposes. If a private or governmental organization wishes to develop in land
23 designated protected by this agency, that organization must obtain approval from PoGS.

24
25 Section 3: PoGS's mission shall be to identify and protect areas for natural environment, allowing them
26 to flourish in areas that need protection from the destruction of our growing cities. This will provide
27 land for future generations to enjoy as well as protect the industries which provide Kentuckians jobs
28 and tax revenue.

29
30 Section 4: PoGS shall establish its own system of application and approval, including appropriate fees,
31 fines, and punishments as it deems necessary in accordance with existing laws. Such fees and fines will
32 be used to pay administrative costs.

33
34 Section 5: This bill shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

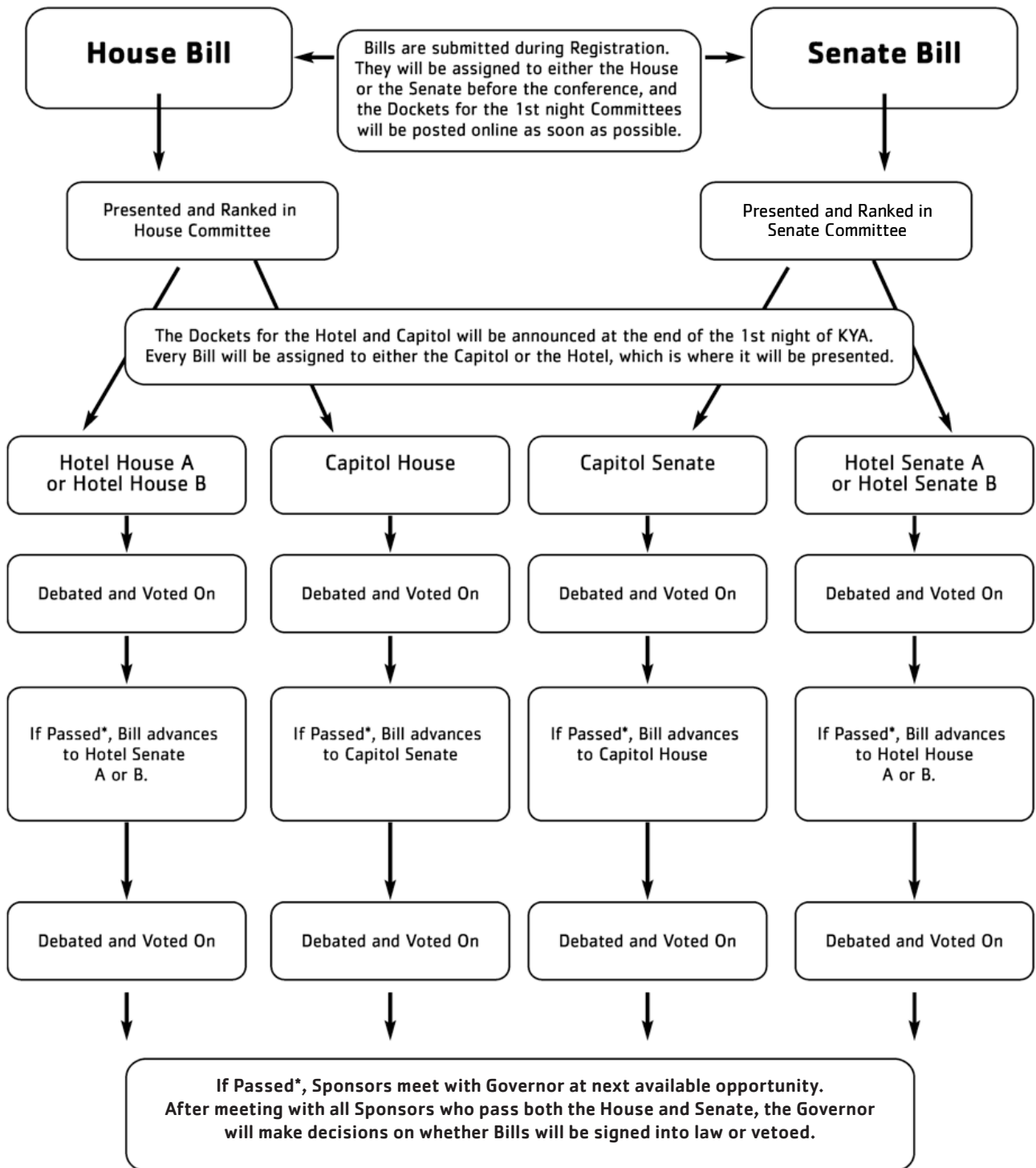
1 An act to require all state college athletes to pass a drug test before they can be involved in their
2 school's sports team.
3
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5
6 Section 1: Many state college athletes are involved with excessive amounts of drug activities that are
7 putting themselves, their teammates, their schools, and others into dangerous situations. The problem
8 goes past occasional recreation use and is causing bad decisions to be made on and off the playing
9 fields and courts.
10
11 Section 2: The excessive use of drugs and getting college students kicked off of teams, losing
12 scholarships, and sometimes even expelled from college.
13
14 Section 3: The bad decisions and negative behaviors can also extend to long-term health problems and
15 mood changes as well. The repercussions of the drug use can even cause extra social, family, and job
16 problems.
17
18 Section 4: If a problem is discovered, the student can be directed to the school's outreach services
19 there on the campus for treatment.
20
21 Section 5: If an athlete fails the drug test once, they will be put on probation and will retest. A second
22 failed test will band the student from that sport for 18 months.
23
24 Section 6: The bill will be enforced through he Kentucky Department of Health and supported by the
25 school's Athlete Department Chairman. Testing will be done during try-out time of each sport (the
26 beginning of each new sports season). Athletes will pay for the testing and that fee will be limited to a
27 \$30 maximum if it is not covered by personal health insurance. Coaches and schools will be required to
28 forward compliance reports to the Sports Commissioner's Office.

1 An act to require all teachers and school personnel to be trained and certified to administer CPR, AED,
2 first aid and medications.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5


6 Section 1: The schools of the Commonwealth of Kentucky encounter thousands of situations per day
7 where a child, staff member, or faculty member come in need of first aid through life saving services.
8 Sometimes the difference in life and death is the administration of medication or techniques
9 administered to keep a person safe. Many schools have school nurses or medical personnel on staff for
10 these situations, but in rural parts of the state and in smaller schools across the Commonwealth, these
11 staff members are rare. In situations such as school sponsored trips, clubs, and extracurricular
12 activities these people may not be present.
13

14 Section 2: This piece of legislation is designed to make those situations non-existent. Our bill requires
15 all teachers and school system personnel to be trained and certified to administer CPR, AED, first aid,
16 and medications. This way the children of the Commonwealth are always in the care of someone that is
17 not only looking out for their education, but also prepared to act in case of a health emergency.
18

19 Section 3: This bill will require school systems to pay for personnel to be educated as instructors to
20 train and certify other school personnel throughout each school system. Costs of this instructor
21 training vary, but to become a certified trainer through the American Red Cross is \$500 per instructor.
22 All other trainings would given through the individual systems with the instructors provided.
23

24 Section 4: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year.
25

26 Section 5: Failure to train all personnel will result in a \$250 fine for each school employee not trained
27 and certified.

1 An act to require mandatory urinalysis drug testing for all individuals living in a home where a newborn
2 baby will reside.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


5
6 Section 1: In our world today the use of narcotics is running rampant. From urban centers such as
7 Louisville and Lexington to rural towns like Pikeville and Paintsville, the problem is spiraling out of
8 control. Many things are being done in an effort to stop the problem. Agencies all over the state and
9 country are trying to cope with the problem and its affects on our society. We feel one area is being
10 overlooked and is slipping through the cracks. We know that much is being done about children and
11 babies born to mothers and fathers that are drug abusers. But one area that we are not protecting is
12 when babies are sent home to households where a drug abuser resides. The days of the nuclear family
13 are over. We have hundreds of combinations of people living together in households today: moms,
14 dads, brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, grandparents, boyfriends and girlfriends. Babies that are coming
15 home into these households need to be protected from possible issues caused by drug abuse.
16

17 Section 2: The news has been flooded with incidents of neglect, abuse, and even deaths of infants due
18 to drug related situations and by occupants of a household other than a child's mother or father. This
19 bill is designed to protect those children. Parents of a child will be required to declare all members
20 living in a household to a family services worker at the hospital. Before that child can be released from
21 the hospital, all members of the household must consent to a drug urinalysis test.
22

23 Section 3: The appropriation of money to cover the cost of the drug urinalysis test will be placed on
24 the cost of medical bills provided by the hospital to be covered by the parents of the baby.
25

26 Section 4: If a member of the household is found to test positive for narcotics, the babies' information
27 will be turned in to the local Cabinet for Health and Family Services. Then the residence will be
28 inspected by a social worker and deemed safe for the baby to come home . They will also be subject to
29 random inspections by the Cabinet for Health and Family Services. If a member of the family refuses to
30 be tested, the baby will be automatically placed in protective custody of the Cabinet for Health and
31 Family Services, until the test is completed or the member is removed from the home.
32

33 Section 5: This bill will go into effect one year from the signing date.

1 An act to reform the Kentucky scoring guide and accountability system

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: Currently, the K-PREP (Kentucky Performance Rating for Educational Progress) has many
6 grading scales that are flawed. Those flaws are in the GAP delivery plan, novice reduction, and the
7 school ranking systems. These flaws can take a school's score down tremendously because of
8 generalization and over complicated factoring. With the passage of this bill these two factors will be
9 taken out of the grading system.

10

11 Section 2: Currently, GAP includes minority classes such as: African American, Hispanic, and Native
12 American. This puts minority classes in a lower ranking education. This is hurting the diverse population
13 in the Commonwealth. This bill will remove the minority classes from GAP and make it only disability
14 students.

16 Section 3: Novice reduction is a system that makes a school decrease their novices from the previous
17 year by 10%, in the system if a school does not meet the 10% no points will be given to the school for
18 that particular category. This makes it more difficult for students to grow from low scores. This bill will
19 state that as long as the school improves on their scoring they will receive the full amount of points for
20 your novice scores.

21

22 Section 4: The schools ranking system can lower a schools score, within this system only 30% of
23 schools in the Commonwealth can be proficient. There are four rankings for schools, needs
24 improvement, proficient, distinguish, and school of distinction. This bill will replace the current
25 percentile system with a set score ranking. In this replacement if a school would to score 60 or below,
26 they would be considered a needs improvement school, 61-70 would be a proficient ranking, 71-75
27 would be a distinguished school, and 76 or above would be considered a school of distinction.

29 Section 5: This bill will go into effect the 2017-2018 school year

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: A non-kill shelter is an animal shelter that doesn't euthanize animals if they are left in the
6 shelter too long without being adopted. For the purposes of this section, "Euthanize" means the
7 intentional ending of a life from a drug administered by a professional, also known as "put down."


8
9 Section 2: This act will take about six months and cost \$1,000,000 per new non-kill shelter. To
10 change a shelter to a non-kill shelter, it will cost about \$500,000 and not take any time.

11
12 Section 3: This bill benefits Kentucky because it makes more non-kill animal shelters, causing there to
13 be less animals killed in animal shelters.

14
15 Section 4: The consequences for shelters that preform uncalled for euthanization are as follows:

- 16 • First Offense: \$1,000 fine for the shelter and they have to change to a non-kill shelter
17 • Second Offense: \$5,000 fine and they have to change to a non-kill shelter
18 • Third Offense: Animal shelter gets shut down

19
20 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

7 will decide whether they pass or fail their current grade or will need summer school. People with I.E.Ps
8 and 504s will get modifications to/during their test.
9

10 Section 2: Currently in Kentucky 3rd-8th grade take k-prep. Our test would replace the criterion
11 portion of k-prep test, but instead it would be based on percentage not a norm reference test. The test
12 would still remain on paper. It will be decided whether students pass, have to go to summer school, or
13 fail the grade. You can only be held back on year per grade. The day this bill will be enacted will be on
14 June 18th, 2018.
15

16 Section 3: The school district will pay for summer school, therefore causing another 1% tax raise of
17 state tax. This will cover the cost of the program and for people to work summer school.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: In an effort to help physicians and pharmacists collaborate to provide informed treatment
6 decision for drug abusers, the Commonwealth of Kentucky must implement a system to footnote
7 convicted drug addictions within the Kentucky All Scheduled Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER)
8 system.


9
10 Section 2: Physicians and pharmacists utilize KASPER to monitor controlled substance prescription
11 within a specified range of time. Within the system drugs are classified as Schedule I, II, III, IV, and V.

- 12
- 13 • Schedule I: High Abuse Potential Drugs (Included are all "street drugs" without redeemable
14 medical implementation or legality. Examples: heroin, ecstasy, marijuana...etc.)
 - 15 • Schedule II: High Abuse Potential Drugs (Acceptable medical use. Examples: dilaudid, codeine,
16 fentanyl, morphine, adderall...etc.)
 - 17 • Schedule III: Mild to Moderate Abuse Potential Drugs (Acceptable medical use. Possibility for
18 addiction. Examples: steroids, low-dose codeine, hydrocodone, all other opioid based drugs.
 - 19 • Schedule IV: Low Abuse Potential Drugs (Acceptable medical use. Limited addiction potential.
20 Examples: anti-anxiety medications, benzodiazepines, sedatives, sleeping aides...etc.)
 - 21 • Schedule V: Low Abuse Potential Drugs (Acceptable medical use. Very limited addiction
22 potential. Examples: aspirin, low-dose aspirin, other drugs consisting of limited quantities of
23 narcotics or stimulant drugs used in treating coughs, diarrhea, and pain.
24

25 Section 3: Implementation will be administered by the registrar through the office of the county court
26 clerk who is responsible for all paperwork and records in a court decision. After convictions, the
27 registrar associated with that particular district or state court will process the information for
28 pharmacists and physicians to view in the KASPER system to appropriately address the medical
29 situation of drug abusers.
30

31 Section 4: The cost is minimal as the operation of the KASPER system already allows for flagging of
32 substance abuse and the only update is to already existing systems within the judicial system. Training
33 will be administered to those footnoting convictions into the KASPER system and will be funded by
34 professional development money already allotted to the individual county court houses.
35

36 Section 5: This bill will be effective July 1st, 2017.

20 Section 4: If the school is not notified within the designated window, responsibility falls upon the

5 Section 1: Obesity now affects 1 in 6 children and adolescents in the United States. Some health
6 issues associated with obesity include heart disease, diabetes, high blood pressure, stroke, and some
7 forms of cancer. One of the causes of child and teen obesity is the lack of physical activity (including
8 many schools’ decisions to cut P.E.).
9


10 Section 2: Every student in grades 6-12 will participate in moderate to vigorous activity during 3 out
11 of 5 school days. The school council will develop the wellness plan with available staff and resources.
12 School principals will be responsible for implementing the plan.

14 Section 3: Federal, state, and local funding will not be needed for this bill. Each school will provide
15 physical activity with the space and materials they already have as determined by their school council.

17 Section 4: Schools not developing and implementing a wellness program that incorporates physical

9 help provide medical care during medical emergencies that teachers are not qualified with. In order to
10 be qualified to provide care, the nurse must be certified. There is need for a school nurse because 19.7
11 million students miss school each year due to asthma, according to the Kentucky cabinet for Health and
12 Family Services. According to kidshealth.org, 2 million students miss school every year due to allergic

15 Section 3: The money to fund the nurse at each school will come from the Kentucky Board of Education.

1 An act to Redirect Funding from Narcan to Epipen Development

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: It has come to our attention that many people with allergies that could result in deadly
6 anaphylactic reactions find that the cost of the Epipens that prevent said reactions from escalating to
7 lethal levels. We find that the annual development towards Narcan drugs is not creating as much
8 benefit as directing money towards creating Epipen affordability for all who need it. Those who need
9 Narcan have typically made bad life choices that lead to their position while those who need Epipens
10 can be hurt simply by someone accidentally adding trace amounts of various substances to food to be
11 consumed by said person, or be exposed to an animal that may cause an allergic reaction. Our
12 objective is to make Epipens more affordable for those who may need them in emergency
13 circumstances.

14
15 Section 2: It is abundantly clear that reduction of Epipen costs cannot be done without money. It is for
16 this purpose that the funding necessary for the Epipen price reduction is to be deducted from capital
17 used to pay for the Narcan used to revive those dying from drug overdose. Many people have recently
18 died just because they couldn't get the Epipens they needed to save their lives. An estimated 900
19 people in Kentucky die annually due to anaphylactic shock. In 2015, 1,248 people died from drug
20 overdose. These people will have to be paid for in hospitals and other rehabilitation centers and are
21 probably more likely to be less useful to society than those who died from anaphylactic shock.
22 Additionally, giving Narcan to those who have overdosed can cause them to become addicted to
23 Narcan which can create a negative feedback loop of never-ending addiction. Austin Boggs, a teenager
24 who recently died in anaphylactic shock, had so much potential for improving our society in the biggest
25 and smallest ways. Due to not having an Epipen at his disposal readily, he passed away and was not
26 able to further our society.

27
28 Section 3: As a final, clear, statement, here is the law to be enacted:
29 The government of The Commonwealth of Kentucky will take capital from their annual funding for
30 Narcan drugs that are used to save the lives of those who overdose in narcotic drugs and devote that
31 funding to providing all of those who have allergies that can prove fatal with the Epipens they need to
32 save their lives. These Epipens should be replaced with new ones following an anaphylactic shock
33 incident or the expiration.

8 Section 2: As of 2011, 29% of adult Kentuckians smoke cigarettes, the highest amount of any state.

9 Currently, a pack of cigarettes cost \$4.96 in Kentucky. In Utah, the states with the lowest percentage

10 of smokers, a pack of cigarettes costs \$6.89.

11

12 Section 3: There are more than 480,000 reported tobacco related deaths annually in the United States

13 as of 2014. This bill would help prevent this by making it more difficult to buy cigarettes.

14

15 Section 4: Consequences for not following this new law:

- 16 • 1st Offense: Warning
- 17 • 2nd Offense: \$1,000 fine
- 18 • 3rd Offense: 15 day store suspension
- 19 • 4th Offense: Store is closed

20

21 Section 5: This bill will not require any funding for the Commonwealth of Kentucky but will actually gain

22 revenue for the state that can be used in other programs or initiatives.

24 Section 6: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Revenue.

5 Section 1: The purpose of the bill is to impose a 160% tax on all non-rehabilitative nicotine delivery
6 systems sold in all counties of Kentucky.

7

8 Section 2: With smoking being one of the largest causes of preventable death in Kentucky, it is
9 imperative that tobacco users are encouraged to stop. A large tax on cigarettes (and other tobacco
10 products) would most likely lower the number of people who smoke or otherwise consume nicotine in
11 Kentucky

12

13 Section 3: The bill would take little, if any, government funding.

14

15 Section 4: If stores that sell non-rehabilitative tobacco products do not comply with the new tax, they
16 will be fined \$1000 dollars and their tobacco licenses will be suspended for 6 months. Upon the second
17 offense, the store will be fined \$5000 dollars and their tobacco licenses will be suspended for 12
18 months. Upon the third offense, the store will be fined \$15000 dollars and their tobacco license will be
19 suspended indefinitely.

20


21 Section 5: All money collected will be used to fund anti-tobacco campaigns.

22


23 Section 6: The bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Revenue.

24

25 Section 7: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

14 ethical to allow pregnant women and the spouses of pregnant women paid leave but not those
15 unfortunate souls who have contracted cancer.

17 Section 5: It will be the responsibility of the victim to take the accused to court.
18
19 Section 6: This law will be taken seriously and the accuser may sue for loss wages and an additional
20 \$10,000.

1 An act to require all teachers to be CPR and First Aid certified.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Concerned that cardiac arrest is one of the leading causes of death in America, and
6 Kentucky, and that out of the 326,000 cases of cardiac arrest each year in America, and the 4,000 in
7 Kentucky, 90% are fatal; Alarmed that not all teachers in Kentucky are CPR (cardiopulmonary
8 resuscitation) certified; Aware that if by-stander CPR is administered, the chances of survival increase
9 2-3 times.


10
11 Section 2: Calls upon all school districts of Kentucky to partner with organizations, such as the
12 American Red Cross, and the American Heart Association to certify teachers in CPR and First Aid. This
13 action would take the extra precaution to save lives in the classroom. In addition to this, if an issue
14 were to arise in a public or private domain, their knowledge could be used to save a life or administer
15 first aid treatment.

16
17 Section 3: Funding for this bill would be little to no cost as some CPR training can typically be found
18 free of charge through organizations such as the American Red Cross and the American Heart
19 Association. A school district can choose to designate individuals to become certified instructors. The
20 instructor course is an 10-20 hour course designed for the lay person who would like to teach the
21 American Heart Association Heartsaver CPR/AED, CPR for Schools, and CPR for Family and Friends
22 courses. Course requirements: complete an AHA Heatsaver CPR/AED course scoring a 90%, complete
23 the skills practical station, and get a letter of recommendation from your CPR Instructor. Cost includes:
24 textbooks, written and practical exams, and Instructor course completion card. The average cost per
25 instructor course is \$375.00.

26
27 Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the school district's superintendent. Noncompliance will have 3
28 offenses:

- 29
- 30 • 1st offense: The individual teacher will be addressed/warned privately
 - 31 • 2nd offense: The individual teacher will be face a monetary fine of \$250
 - 32 • 3rd offense: The individual teacher will face unpaid suspension until they meet the certification requirements.

33
34 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017. Teachers will have until August 1, 2017 to
35 obtain their certification. The district shall provide a minimum of three opportunities for certification.
36 Teachers will be able to count this training toward the required 24 hours of yearly Professional
37 Development.

1 An act to create the "Kentucky Animal Abuser Registration Act"

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Defined: "Abuser" or "animal abuser" is a person who has been convicted in Kentucky of
6 committing an act of animal abuse or neglect.

7
8 Section 2: The Kentucky Department of Criminal Investigations (DCI) shall post a publicly accessible list
9 on its web site of any person convicted of an animal abuse or neglect offense.

10
11 Section 3: The list shall include photograph taken during arrest, date of birth, full legal name, and
12 address.

13
14 Section 4: The list shall not include SSN, driver license number, or other federal identification.

15
16 Section 5: The court shall forward a copy of the judgment (along with information in Section Three) to
17 the DCI within sixty days of the guilty verdict.

18
19 **Section 6: Convictions**

- 20 • First conviction: person shall remain on registry for two years.
- 21 • Second conviction: person shall remain on registry for five years.
- 22 • Third conviction: permanent placement on the registry


23
24 Section 7: Anyone on the registry will not be permitted to adopt from any shelter or humane society.

25
26 Section 8: The registry shall be updated every 30 days.

27
28 Section 9: The DCI shall ensure that the registry shall display the following (or similar) words
29 "Based on information submitted to law enforcement by the court, a person whose name appears in
30 this registry has been convicted of a crime of animal abuse or neglect. However, information on the
31 registry may not be complete."

32
33 Section 10: This bill shall be enforced by the Department of Criminal Investigations.

34
35 Section 11: This bill will be enacted immediately upon its passing.

1 An act to create the "Kentucky Child Abuser Registration Act"

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: The Kentucky Child Abuser Registry will be for those convicted of Criminal Child Abuse in the
6 First and/or Second Degree, both are felonies in the Commonwealth.

7
8 "Criminal Child Abuse in the First Degree," a Class C felony, is defined as intentionally doing any of
9 the following to a person under 18 or who is physically or mentally helpless or permitting another
10 to do so when the defendant has custody of the child:

- 11 • Causing serious physical injury.
12 • Placing a child in a situation that may cause serious physical injury or torturing.
13 • Cruelly confining or punishing.

14
15 "Criminal Child Abuse in the Second Degree," a Class D felony, is the same as the First Degree
16 except the abuse is done "wantonly" meaning the defendant was aware of a serious and
17 unnecessary risk that something may occur and knowingly disregarded the dangers. Anyone
18 convicted of either of these offenses must register.


19
20 Section 2: The registry will contain the abuser's name, date of birth, photo and current address.
21 Abusers must remain on the registry for 20 years, which is the same duration as the Kentucky Sex
22 Offender Registry. Abusers must update their profile within 24 hours if they move.

23
24 Section 3: For years 2010 through 2014, an average of 16,718 children each year were involved in
25 cases in which abuse/neglect were substantiated. During that time, an average of 44 cases were near
26 fatal and an average of 26 of those children were involved in prior cases of abuse/neglect.

27
28 Section 4: The costs of maintaining the Kentucky Child Abuser Registry will be funded by a \$200 fee
29 assessed to the abuser upon conviction.

30
31 Section 5: The website will be managed by the Kentucky Department of Criminal Investigations (DCI)

32
33 Section 6: This bill will commence July 1, 2017.

1 An act to pay KEES money to all graduating students who meet the academic requirements for payout
2 regardless of citizenship status.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: Currently, students who attend and graduate from a state-certified Kentucky high school
7 may earn KEES (Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship) money for college. A high school student
8 (grade 9-12) earns a KEES base amount for a GPA of 2.50 or higher. The amount ranges from \$125 to
9 \$500. Students who earn at least one base GPA award are eligible for an ACT bonus award based on
10 the highest ACT/SAT composite score. A student must score a minimum of 15 on ACT or 830 on SAT
11 or on a national or statewide exam. The amount rages from \$36 to \$500. KEES is fully funded by net
12 lottery sales proceeds.
13


14 Section 2: Proposal WOULD ALLOW refugees, persons, granted asylum, students with SSNs resulting
15 from DACA, or individuals with non-immigrant visas such as work visas or student visas IF they
16 attended and graduated from a Kentucky high school AND met the KEES merit requirements.
17

18 Section 3: To currently receive KEES money, a student must:
19 • Be a citizen, (national or permanent) resident of the United States, be a Kentucky resident, be
20 enrolled in a Kentucky high school for at least one hundred forty (140) days of the minimum
21 school term while meeting the KEES curriculum requirements.
22 • Not be a convicted felon.
23 • Have a yearly GPA of 2.50 or higher.
24

25 Section 4: To currently meet the citizenship requirement for KEES, a student must be a:
26 1. U.S Citizen – citizen of the 50 states and the District of Columbia;
27 2. U.S. National – citizen of Puerto Rico, US Virgin Islands, Guam, and Northern Mariana Islands,
28 or Native of America Samoa and Swain’s Island;
29 3. U.S Permanent Resident: A non-citizen who is legally permitted to live and work in the US
30 permanently. Note:It does not include refugees, persons granted asylum, student with SSN
31 resulting from DACA, or individual with non-immigrant visa such as work visas or student visas.
32

33 Section 5: This bill would be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Education.
34

35 Section 6: This bill would be enacted July 1, 2017.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

7 entrance to schools to increase safety of students. Kentucky public schools are required to have a

11 Section 2: Public Schools shall be required to have a video surveillance camera in each occupied
12 classroom. It will be unlawful to use a classroom without a video surveillance camera.

14 Section 3: The cost will be approximately \$175,500.00 for all of Kentucky schools.

15

16 Section 4: The school district will be fined a total of \$100.00 if found using a classroom without a
17 video surveillance camera, enforced by Kentucky Department of Education.

19 Section 5: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: This bill will increase the safety of Kentuckians in dangerous situations. As of right now, the
6 only way to contact 911 is by calling them directly. However, in some situations, someone may be
7 unable to call 911, so texting would be another option.


8
9 Section 2: With this bill, in an act of emergency, someone would be able to communicate with 911
10 officials through text to notify the authorities in a dangerous situation. It would also help make
11 communications more clear. This will offer Kentuckians another option to contact 911 using a cellular
12 device. It will ensure the safety of people in Kentucky, because in certain situations they might not be

16 Section 3: To protect the people in Kentucky, we will tax people's monthly phone bills to enable 911

19 Section 4: The phone bill company will charge a 3% tax monthly and that would be sent to the state to
20 pay for this technology.

22 Section 5: We need this because in certain situations it may be the only way to communicate with 911
23 authorities. This will be a way to protect Kentuckians if they are in a life or death situation.

1 An act to revise section 54 of the Kentucky Constitution - a medical liability reform.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4
5 Section 1: Section 54 of the Kentucky Constitution states that there is no limit on the amount of
6 money that an individual can sue for towards a physician or hospital for medical malpractice. Our bill
7 would change that. By amending it, this would allow limits (caps) on the amount of money a person can
8 seek for damages. There would also be a committee that would be added to review cases as part of
9 that amendment.

10
11 Section 2: Our bill will help Kentuckians because it will help create a better working environment for
12 many physicians. Many physicians in Kentucky pay an enormous amount of money for medical
13 malpractice insurance. This forces many of these great doctors to leave Kentucky and find employment
14 elsewhere. Our changes will create better care for citizens by bringing in more doctors who seek lower
15 rates of medical malpractice insurance.


16
17 Section 3: The limit that someone could pursue for damages, in a medical malpractice case, shall not
18 exceed one million dollars. There will be a two year time limit in which the plaintiff (person injured) can
19 pursue damages against the physician. Before a case comes before a jury, a committee, of medical
20 experts, will convene to study the validity of the claim. These experts will be knowledge in the same
21 field as the defendant. If this committee deems the case valid, it will then go on to the court system. If
22 the committee deems it invalid, it will be dismissed.

23
24 Section 4: The only cost of this bill will be the salaries of licensed physicians whose job shall be to
25 review cases of medical malpractice. Their wages shall be paid for by defendants that seek a review to
26 prevent further loss in court. Wages shall be \$200 an hour for reviewing cases of medical malpractice.
27 If possible, the physician(s) shall pay the majority of the fee.

28
29 Section 5: If this bill is signed, it shall take effect on July 1st, 2017.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: This bill is to require public schools receiving Kentucky state funding to allow transgender
6 students to use the restroom of the gender they identify as.
7
8 Section 2: Transgender students are people who were assigned a sex that isn't true to who they are.
9 With this law, these students must fill a form out, provided by the school, stating they are transgender.
10
11 Section 3: Similar to social security numbers, the ID number of the student would indicate that they are
12 transgender. For example, if their ID starts with a 3, then they are a transgender student. This will be
13 implemented, so no transgender student can receive punishment from an unfamiliar teacher.
14
15 Section 4: This bill will cost no extra money for the school, as there is no purchasing needed. The only
16 materials needed would be the actual application form, which could be online, and free.
17
18 Section 5: Any violation to this bill will result in the following penalties for the school:
19 • Offense 1: Notice to School and 30 day warning
20 • Offense 2: School must have a hearing in front of Board of Education
21 • Offense 3: Principal is suspended for 1 month
22 • Offense 4: Principal and other opposing teachers are fired
23
24 Section 6: This law will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Education
25
26 Section 7: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the closest upcoming school year.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Require Kentucky Departments of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to share information collected for
6 the purpose of obtaining a license/permit to drive or be issued a state identification card with the
7 Kentucky State Board of Elections (KSBE) for the purposes of registering people to vote.

8
9 Section 2: When the citizen becomes an eligible age to vote, the KSBE should file the necessary
10 paperwork to allow them to vote.

- 11 • Subsection 1: The eligible age will be 17 if they turn 18 on or before the general election date.

12
13 Section 3: The KSBE will be required to mail party affiliation cards to the newly registered people.

- 14 • Subsection 1: These cards will contain a checklist of Republican, Democrat, Unaffiliated, or
15 Independent.
16 • Subsection 2: The mailed card shall contain a self-addressed stamped envelope for purposes of
17 returning the party affiliation cards.


18
19 Section 4: The KSBE will file these new registration cards within one month to the Secretary of State
20 office.

21
22 Section 5: Voters will be able to opt out of the filing of the voter registration by opting out at the time
23 of data collection at the KSBE or by submitting a request to the County Board of Elections to be
24 removed them from the registration rolls no later than a month before the general election.


25
26 Section 6: Biannually, the DMV will notify the KSBE to update your voter registration whenever you
27 change addresses, or change your name with the DMV.

- 28 • Subsection 1: These updates will occur one month prior to the primary election and one month
29 prior to the general election.

30
31 Section 7: Online voter registration will be available to those who do not have a state issued ID or for
32 people who need to change party affiliation, or other voter matters.

7 their heirs being taxed such an amount that would prohibit them from inheriting what they rightfully

10 Section 2: All other bills/acts pertaining to inheritance tax will be repealed.
11
12 Section 3: This bill will not cost the state any money because the owners who have died have already
13 paid taxes on their property.
14
15 Section 4: This bill will go into effect December 31, 2017. Heirs who have paid inheritance tax before
16 the date of December 31, 2017, will not be refunded.

1 An act to diminish the wage gap between men and women.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4
5 Section 1: The median annual pay for women who work full time is less than the median yearly pay for
6 men who do the same. The women of Kentucky are paid 80 cents for every dollar paid to men. Some
7 may think this isn't much, but it amounts to an annual wage gap of \$8,499. More than 216,806 family
8 households in Kentucky are headed by women. Almost 38% of these families have incomes that fall
9 below the poverty level, that's 81,806 families. Diminishing this wage gap for mothers would provide
10 much-needed income to provide for their households.

11
12 Section 2: This bill would require all employers to pay women and men equal wages for equal work. If a
13 woman is doing the same job as a man, then she should be compensated likewise.

14
15 Section 3: Employers will be required to pay their employees based on the work that they perform and
16 not according to their gender. Funding for this bill will not be necessary. Employees will be
17 compensated accordingly by their employers.

18
19 Section 4: Any employer failing to adhere to this law will be subject to a fine of up to 2 times the
20 discrepancy in outstanding pay. For example, if it is reported that an employer has been paying a
21 female less than her male counterpart for an extended amount of time, then the employer faces a
22 penalty of paying what he owes in back pay, only doubled. All proceeds will be awarded to the victim
23 with the employer being responsible for all legal fees.

24
25 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on June 30, 2017.

1 An act to establish American Sign Language as a high school foreign language elective.
2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4


5 Section 1: One in three Kentuckians from ages 18-64 are deaf or have hearing disabilities. This is
6 shocking, considering that only 12% of the population knows sign language, excluding those who use it
7 as their natural language. One of the main causes for this is that most Kentuckians say they have no
8 access to the materials and knowledge required to learn. Many surrounding states, such as Ohio, have
9 American Sign Language (ASL) in their high schools as foreign language electives with an average of
10 1,682,627 students enrolled in the class yearly.
11

12 Section 2: This bill would require the hiring of a teacher with basic to advanced knowledge of ASL. The
13 American Sign Language Teacher's Association is a group of certified ASL instructors across the nation,
14 and a member of this organization would be the best choice for the job. If unable to hire a member, a
15 teacher could take classes in American Sign Language, or one who already knows sign language could
16 be hired. Students will be able to schedule the class and earn the same amount of credit as other
17 foreign language classes offered at the school.
18

19 Section 3: Room must be made in the school's budget for another teacher's salary. If the money is
20 unavailable or lacking, various fund raisers and cost-effective, school-wide changes can be made to
21 make up the funds. Schools could also apply for federal grants or ask for donations from the Kentucky
22 Commission on the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (KCDHH) or other similar organizations.
23

24 Section 4: This bill would be enforced by the school district's superintendent.
25

26 Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year, to allow schools
27 to acquire the funds needed for the teacher's salary.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: This bill could save many lives. A person's eyesight declines naturally as we age. Efficient
6 eyesight is imperative to safety while driving any type of vehicle. Many people over the age of 65 has
7 poor vision and too often ignores the signs that they need to update their glasses.

8
9 Section 2: The statistics clarifies that over 36 million Americans over the age of 60 has a driver's
10 license. In the 2013 tally, nearly 6,000 drivers in that age range were killed, and several thousands
11 were also injured.

12
13 Section 3: Many drivers of this age group suffer from vision, reflexes, and emotional problems that
14 seriously affect the ability to drive safely.


15
16 Section 4: This testing will provide a safety net to catch potential problems and allow them to be
17 rectified and/or place necessary limits on drivers in order to protect them and our communities at
18 large.

19
20 Section 5: The drivers will complete the written test (paper or computer). The license renewal will be
21 based upon the driver's new test score. Failed tests may be retaken after the 60 days.

22
23 Section 6: If necessary, the driver will be responsible for providing his/her own eyeglasses, either out-
24 of-pocket or by the use of available insurance and Medicare plans.

25
26 Section 6: This bill will be managed by the local Driver's and Motor-vehicles Offices that already exist,
27 therefore, no additional taxes will be need for funded.

29 Section 7: This bill will take effect July 1st, 2017.

8 orphaned to live in an environment that is familiar and comfortable to them rather than being required
9 to go to a foster home.

11 Section 2: This bill will require minimal funding. This will help reduce the amount of money the state
12 government spends on paying foster parents care

13
14 Section 3: This bill will allow the minor's choice of where to live into consideration. The minor's choice
15 will then be assessed to see if the friend or relative would provide a suitable environment to live in. If
16 the minor's choice(s) are deemed to be unsuitable then they will be placed in foster care.

17
18 Section 4: The local social service system will make sure this law is carried out and will help determine
19 the child's situation case by case.

21 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2017.

3
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5
6 Section 1: This bill will provide ways we could acquire money for tourism advertising. Currently the
7 State government has comprised a Tourism, Arts, and Heritage Cabinet comprised of multiple agencies
8 to improve the quality of life for Kentuckians by creating jobs and creating wealth. When comparing
9 budget data, from the 2014 to 2015 statistics, the Tourism, Arts, and Heritage Cabinet saw an
10 increase in funds by almost 6 percent. Currently the proposed budget for the 2017-2018 budget only
11 has about a 2% increase for the cabinet. This bill aims to increase the 2019 budget to a 5% increase
12 when compared to the 2018 budget and set forth a plan to encourage Kentucky destination to
13 advertise through the state cabinet.

14
15 Section 2: With this increase in funds over coming years, the Cabinet could spend this money toward
16 advertising sites or major tourist destination that this group sees fit; such as: Mammoth Cave, Churchill
17 downs, Noah's Ark, many casinos, and other sites including future destinations. Possible areas to
18 advertise in are magazines, newspapers, brochures, websites, social media sites, or any other areas
19 that the association sees fit. Neighboring states for advertising could also be a target as well; states
20 such as Ohio, Indiana, Tennessee, Virginia, Missouri, West Virginia and many more. Billboards for the
21 attractions in neighboring states could bring in out of state tourist funds to boost Kentucky's economy.
22 Tourism and travel industry contributed around \$13 billion to Kentucky's economy in 2014.

23
24 Section 3: To improve the quality and quantity of advertisements, the Cabinet with its budget would
25 fund 50% of all Cabinet approved advertisements for companies and destinations that could attract
26 tourists to Kentucky. The Kentucky based destination will have to complete a form and present their
27 plan before the cabinet before funds will be provided to help fund the advertisement.

28
29 Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 15, 2017.

1 An act to require all regions of Kentucky to have one recycling facility for every county whose
2 population exceeds 20,000.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


5
6 Section 1: This bill will require every county whose population exceeds 20,000 to build/maintain a
7 suitable, and well cleaned recycling center. This bill would affect 58 out of 120 counties in Kentucky.
8 This bill will also offer every home in these counties have a recycling bin, that if they choose they can
9 use, and is easy to access. Research shows when homes have recycling bins, they are 29% more likely
10 to recycle according to the national recycling center. We will gain profit back from the money we used
11 to fund the recycling center. It is up to the county officials to decide if pick up will be an option or not
12 for the bins.

13
14 Section 2: We will allot each county 4 years to plan the following tasks: decide on if a new center will
15 be built or refurbished, how they are going to pay for it, and to have the recycling center up and
16 running. There will also be mandatory checks on each recycling center every 6 months based on the
17 existing OSHA and Department of Waste Management standards. 1 representative from the
18 Department of Waste Management will be assigned to each inter-region and will give mandatory 6
19 months checks.

20
21 Section 3: Across the United States, recycling centers create 1.1 million jobs, and make \$236 billion
22 dollars in gross annual sales and 37 billion dollars and annual payrolls. The money created by the
23 operation of the recycling center can help the counties pay for repairs, updates, and materials such as
24 recycling bins. When the recycling center goes into effect, the city should expect to see natural
25 resources and energy saved. Business can also benefit from the materials collected. Last year alone,
26 recycling bottles and cans saved enough energy to power up to 522,000 homes in California when a
27 recycling center was implied.

28
29 Section 4: Every county that does not follow these guidelines will get the following punishments after
30 the 4 year deadline: a \$500 fine per resident of the county, accounted for in the latest census, have
31 another 4 years to complete the requirements or the same fine will be held as before and the will be
32 fined to the county government. If the Recycling center is not completed, the county will department of
33 Waste Management for Kentucky will visit the county and help set a plan for the recycling center that
34 must be followed.

35
36 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

1 An act to require the state of Kentucky to impose restrictions on owning and operating a drone.

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: Kentucky is one of the 24 states in the United States that do not have restrictions on the
6 purchase and use of drones. The purpose of this bill is to protect the privacy and safety of all citizens.

7

8 Section 2: As of now, there are no age requirements on owning or operating a drone. This bill would
9 require all consumers/operators of drones to be at least 18 years of age or older. The consumer must
10 also have a photo I.D. Also, if drones are purchased within the state of Kentucky, merchants must keep
11 written record of all drone purchases.

12

13 Section 3: Consumers of drone, who are at least 18 or older, must fly their drone on personal property,
14 or on designated public property. Drones that are flown either on personal or public property must not
15 go above 10,000 feet, or be flown onto someone else's property.

20 Section 4: There will be no cost to enact this drone. Extra vigilance of law enforcement would be
21 required. This bill would take effect on January 1st, 2017.

1 An act to establish the Kentucky Student Technology Accessibility Program.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: More than half of low income families in Kentucky do not have access to Wi-Fi service at
6 home. In addition to this, children from low-income households are four times more likely to be without
7 home internet access than their middle or upper-income peers. These children are being denied equal
8 access to knowledge and education due to the lack of internet support. With about 74% of schools in
9 Kentucky utilizing technology, this poses a problem for many students in the Commonwealth.

10
11 Section 2: The Kentucky Department of Education shall establish the Kentucky Student Technology
12 Accessibility Program (K-STAP). This program will allow local school boards to elect to participate in
13 any of the following opportunities:

- 14
15 1. Installation of Wi-Fi hot spots on buses for students with lengthy bus commutes.
16 2. Parking in rural communities of buses with high-range Wi-Fi routers installed, giving access to
17 areas where wireless internet service where it is not otherwise easily accessible.
18 3. Distribution of cellular Wi-Fi adapters to students that do not have internet access at home.
19

20 School boards who choose to participate in K-STAP shall provide an implementation plan for approval
21 to the Kentucky Department of Education prior to the allocation of funds in support of this program.
22

23 Section 3: K-STAP addresses the concerns outlined in Section 1 by allowing low-income Kentucky
24 households to have access to Wi-Fi and, in turn, the educational opportunities that come with it. This
25 will allow these students to work on online homework and research. Wi-Fi on the busses will allow
26 students to work on assignments that require internet access. This will permit students to finish
27 assignments and complete school work in a timely manner. The program also provides opportunities for
28 teachers to be more creative with their lesson planning and appeal to different learning styles.
29

30 Section 4: The program will be funded by assessing a small tax on cellular phone bills not to exceed 10
31 cents per phone line. Funds raised from this tax will be used to support local school districts in
32 acquiring equipment and wireless internet services.
33

34 Section 5: The school board may decide the punishment or fines for loss, theft, and destruction of
35 equipment. The school board's existing protocols for internet access shall be enforced on these
36 devices.
37

38 Section 6: This bill will take effect the 2018-19 school year.

SECOND FLOOR – JUDICIAL BRANCH

- 13 From the top of the steps on the second floor, observe the view of the nave, or **Main corridor**.
This spectacular space is over 300 feet long. It is lined with 36 huge, one piece columns made of Vermont granite. Note the colorful art skylights and grand staircase.
- 14 Also from here you can see the murals in the lunettes on either end of the nave. Painted by Gilbert White, the murals depict moments in the early history of Kentucky.
- 15 The one over the East wing is a representation of Daniel Boone's first view of the Bluegrass region, or "beautiful level of Kentucky," in 1769.
- 16 The mural to the West shows Boone and Richard Henderson concluding the Treaty of Watauga in 1775 which allowed the Transylvania Company to purchase much of the land that is Kentucky from the Cherokee Indians.
- 17 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices,** and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.
- 18 Perhaps the most elegant room in the Capitol, the state reception room was intended as a place for special events and as the reception area for the governor's office, originally next door. Inspired by grand salons in European palaces, the room was restored in 1995 to its original grandeur. The placement of the mirrors on either end of the room creates the illusion of an infinite view, like that in the Hall of Mirrors of the Palace of Versailles in France.
- 19 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices,** and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.



THIRD FLOOR – LEGISLATIVE FLOOR

- 19 **Senate chamber** (on the West end of the building). You may enter the Senate if the chamber is not in use.
Raised galleries allow the public to view the Senate's deliberations during legislative sessions. There are desks for thirty-eight senators, who also have individual offices in the Capitol Annex.
Please proceed to the other end of the third floor - the East end.
- 20 **House of Representatives.** You may enter the House chamber if it is not in use.
The House of Representatives, like the Senate, also includes spectator galleries and desks for members. However, with 100 members, the size of the House requires some additional features. Votes are recorded electronically and displayed on panels on either side of the Speaker's desk. Each member of the General Assembly has a desktop computer.

The Legislative Branch of Kentucky State Government:
Like most states, Kentucky has a bicameral legislature - that is one with two components. The "lower" and larger body is the House of Representatives; the "upper," smaller body is the Senate. The Speaker of the House presides over that chamber, and the President of the Senate chairs deliberations there. Other legislative officials include the House and Senate majority and minority leaders. Together, the House and Senate are known as the Kentucky General Assembly. The General Assembly meets in regular session for sixty working days in even years, and for thirty working days in odd years. The governor of Kentucky can call Special Sessions to address specific issues. Legislative chambers and offices occupy the third floor of the Capitol.

At times the Capitol may be under repairs to ensure that it remains a proud symbol of Kentucky. Portions of the building may be closed to tours. Please accept our apology for any inconvenience.

Why is Kentucky called a "Commonwealth"?

In this country, "commonwealth" is another word for "state". The term implies a commitment to the "commonweal," or common good of the people. Several states (Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Virginia, in addition to Kentucky) call themselves commonwealths. Since Kentucky was formed from Virginia, our state's founders decided to use the term too.

Capitol vs. Capital.

A capitol is a building used as a headquarters of a government. A capitol houses legislative chambers and may also have courtrooms and government offices. A capital is a city that is the seat of government of a state or nation. This building is a capitol. Frankfort is a capital.
