An act to Require Drug Testing for Government Assistance Recipients Convicted of a Drug Charge

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: All individuals that have been convicted of any drug use or drug-related charge must report for a series of drug tests to determine continued eligibility for government assistance.

Section 2: For the purpose of this bill, government assistance includes Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), known as Kentucky Transitional Assistance Program (K-TAP) in Kentucky.

Section 3: The mandatory test will be in the form of a urine test. All drug tests will be administered at The Department for Community-Based Services, which have local branches throughout Kentucky counties.

Section 4: The hours for these branches will now be extended from 8:00 AM - 4:30 PM to 8:00 AM -6:00 PM Monday through Friday.

Section 5: Failure to pass a drug test will result in immediate loss of K-TAP and SNAP benefits. Individuals that fail the drug test will be referred to The Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy: Operation UNITE toll free treatment referral line. Individuals can have their benefits reinstated thirty days after a failed drug test upon successfully passing another drug test.

Section 6: Once an individual has passed a drug test for six consecutive months, they will be tested only once every other month. Once an individual passes the series of drug tests for a period of 12 months, they will be tested every six months. The tests continue as long as they are enrolled in government assistance.

Section 7: Funding will come from the annual budget of The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, which is 480 million dollars total.

Section 8: The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services will oversee the implementation, enforcement, and regulation of this bill.

Section 9: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.
