An act to provide training for hotel and transportation employees on the signs of human trafficking

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## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Human trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery in which victims are exploited for the
purpose of commercial sex, labor, or a combination of both. This can be accomplished by means of
force, fraud, or coercion. From December of 2007 to February of 2015, there have been 1,437 cases
of trafficking in hotels and motels alone. Just this year, up to June 30, 2016, there have been 42
human trafficking cases reported in Kentucky. Although that is roughly 2/3 of what was reported last
year, it is 127% of what was reported in 2012.

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12 Section 2: This act would require all hotel staff on all levels and all transportation officials in charge of 13 driving public transport vehicles in the state of Kentucky to be trained on what human trafficking is and 14 the signs of human trafficking. The managers of the hotels and the management staff in charge of 15 public transportation would hold a session once a year (and upon hiring, as part of regular training) 16 showing videos from http://www.rescueandrestoreky.org/, a website which includes five training videos 17 sponsored by Kentucky government officials working with "Rescue and Restore KY" to train officials on 18 the signs of human trafficking. After the staff has completed the training, they should know a general 19 overview of knowledge on trafficking, trauma linked with trafficking, laws in Kentucky already in place 20 about trafficking, services offered, and the exploitation that surrounds human trafficking victims. 21

Section 3: This act would require all hotel and transportation officials in the state of Kentucky to participate in annual sessions to train them on the signs of human trafficking. One who chooses not to comply with the request shall be put on the corresponding step of corrective action related to the violation of the training per company policy. Progressive discipline will ensue up to termination if the employee does not comply with the policy. As for the entirety of the corporation complying, a government official would routinely follow up with the program status. If a corporation fails to comply, a fine of \$2,000,000 will be charged.

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Section 4: This bill would have no cost due to its online accessibility. All resources would be availablethrough the funding of Rescue and Restore KY.

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33 Section 5: This bill, if passed, will go into effect in January of 2018 in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
