An act to prohibit tobacco use in public schools in the state of Kentucky.

## Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

4 5 Section 1: This act proposes that all public schools in Kentucky be 100% tobacco free. In 2011, the 6 percentage of youth in grades 9–12 who smoke cigarettes was 24.1% in our state. The range across 7 44 states was 5.9% to 24.1%. We ranked 44th among 44 states. In 2013, Kentucky had the highest 8 age-adjusted lung cancer incident rates in both men and women. The percentage of youth who used 9 smokeless tobacco was 16.9% in 2011. The range across 40 states was 3.5% to 16.9%. We ranked 40th among 40 states. The percentage of youth who smoked cigars was 17.5% in 2011. The range 10 11 across 37 states was 5.0% to 18.3%. Kentucky ranked 35th among 37 states. The percentage of 12 youth who currently use tobacco (i.e., cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, and/or cigars) is 31.9%. The 13 range across 36 states was 7.8% to 31.9%. Kentucky ranked 36th among 36 states. Studies show that 14 vouth spend approximately 1/3 time in school environments. Tobacco free school polices can reduce 15 youth smoking by 30%. This bill won't solve tobacco addiction, but it can help people think twice about 16 picking a tobacco product.

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Section 2: This act encompasses entire school properties (includes vehicles on school grounds), before
and after school events/activities, and any other school sponsored trips or activities, 24 hours, 7 days
a week, and 365 days a year. An administrative figure(s) will enforce this policy

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Section 3: This bill would affect all students, staff, and visitors at all times. School administrators and
 resource officers, when applicable, would enforce this bill throughout the school day and at
 extracurricular events.

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26 Section 4: Schools would be required to update their policies to incorporate this change, detailing 27 specific procedures for handling offenses. School site-based decision making councils would be

- 28 responsible for revising school policies to include consequences for violation of this act.
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30 Section 5: This act, upon passage, would go into effect in the 2017-2018 school year.
