KENTUCKY YMCA YOUTH ASSOCIATION Virtual Code of Conduct

It is important that our participants and guests feel welcomed and safe in our programs. This code of conduct embodies the spirit of the Y, and is intended to help everyone feel comfortable and thrive. As a YMCA participant or guest, we ask you to agree to follow this code of conduct which is rooted in our core values.

These requirements also serve as an extension and supplement to any codes of conduct students and participants must abide by for in-person programming.

- 1. Appropriate Video Call Etiquette:
 - When registering/signing-in for any video call or meeting, please use your **First & Last Name** (not a random username), as well as your **School** in parentheses (for KUNA, please include **COUNTRY instead of School**).
 - **Example:** Curious George (Monkey Acad.). This helps us to ensure the privacy of our meetings.
 - Please find a quiet area and call in at the scheduled meeting time so that you can be fully present in the virtual experience. We ask that all participants have their video function on their device if possible so we can see and hear you.
 - Please do your best to keep background noise or distractions to a minimum. Mute yourself when you are not speaking.
 - Please do not take your phone or computer to the bathroom.
 - Photos and videos of others without the expressed consent is prohibited.
- 2. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time.
- 3. Appropriate attire: Appropriate attire must be worn at all times. Clothing with vulgar language, obscene gestures, racial slurs, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program is not allowed. Appropriate tops and bottoms should be worn.
- 4. Appropriate language: Vulgar language, including swearing, name-calling or shouting/yelling at others is prohibited. When communicating in the chat box, please do not send links or information that is not aligned with our YMCA core values.
- 5. Appropriate Interactions: Participants shall demonstrate respectful, responsible, caring, and honest conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA virtual interactions. This includes but is not limited to: social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected. *Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.*
- 6. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
- 7. Creating a welcoming environment: Respect others' cultures and personal way of being. We strive to create a safe emotional and physical space. We encourage participants to honor diversity in all dimensions and respect opinions or perspectives. The Kentucky YMCA stands up against all forms of bullying, discrimination and racism.
- 8. Appropriate conduct: Any other conduct of an inappropriate, threatening or offensive nature will be investigated/evaluated by YMCA staff. Participants that do not abide by this agreement may be prohibited from participating in future virtual events or in-person activities.
- 9. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. This includes, but is not limited to: romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.

10. Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs: The use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs (including e-cigs/ tobacco-like products) is not permitted in or outside of ALL virtual calls. Participants that show, obtain, see in the background, make references to or use during the virtual calls will be removed from meeting and removed from future virtual and in-person events. Law enforcement may be involved if necessary.

If a participant or guest feels uncomfortable in confronting someone directly about offensive behavior or other issues that are in violation of this code of conduct, we ask that you please report the behavior or issue to Kentucky YMCA staff.

To create and maintain a space that embodies our core values, the Y is serious about being clear regarding activities that are not allowed. If you violate this code of conduct, consequences can include termination of program privileges, being removed from all virtual programming, and involving appropriate legal authority. The YMCA reserves the right to make situational decisions based on our policies, mission, and values.



ADJOURN	A MOTION to close a meeting.
BILL	A proposed law presented for approval by the Assembly.
BILL TITLE	The subject of the BILL.
CAUCUS	A meeting of a group or party, generally to make a decision on behalf of their group.
CHAIR	The Chairperson or Presiding Officer.
DIVISION (OF THE ASSEMBLY)	A MOTION to force a standing vote; generally invoked when a voice vote is unclear.
DOCKET	A list of BILLS to be presented.
MAJORITY VOTE	More than half of the votes cast.
MOTION	To introduce a proposal for consideration by the CHAIR.
PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.
REPRESENTATIVE	A member of the House.
ROLL CALL	Calling the names of all members to determine their presence.
SECOND	A personal approval of a motion, generally making it subject to debate.
SENATOR	A member of the Senate.
STATE OF THE COMMONWEALTH ADDRESS	Made by the Governor and containing a review of the general condition of the state and his/her recommendations to the Assembly.
TABLE	A MOTION to defer action on a BILL.
TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY	The majority vote is at least double the minority vote.
VETO	Privilege of the Governor to reject passed legislation.
YIELD	To relinquish time to another Representative or Senator

BE A BETTER DEBATER!!! READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:

• TECHNICAL QUESTIONS

- READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON'T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, "When will this bill go into effect?" and "How much will this bill cost?" are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
- Don't ask questions that begin with "WHY...?" Those are almost *always* debatable.

• WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE

- Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
 - Give a speech for or against the bill
 - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
- o If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized,

say, "Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or `series of questions')?" o If you would like to <u>SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION</u>, you should

- If you would like to <u>SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION</u>, you should also say, "And I reserve my right to speak (or 'yield my time') afterward."
- If you would like to <u>YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING</u>, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.

• EX: "Hermione Granger, Hogwarts I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin."



1	An Act Relating to Relating to Animal Welfare in Kentucky.
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: Despite having the numerous animals that Kentucky harbors, surprisingly, Kentucky is amongst
6	the weakest in animal protection laws. Kentucky is known for their animals, specifically their horses. That is
7	why this is so important. This bill would increase the severity of legal consequences related to animal abuse
8	conviction.
9	
10	Section 2: Kentucky is ranked the #47th worst state in relation to animal abuse cases and punishments.
11	Illinois is ranked #1. If Kentucky adopted even just a few of the systems or punishments prompted by Illinois.
12	We could not only move up in the ranking, but in our peace and justice system entirely. A study by the
13	Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty found that animal abusers are five times more likely to
14	also harm humans. Getting these people their necessary help, or jail time, could save animals and humans
15 16	alike.
10 17	Section 3: It doesn't necessarily take a large sum of money to put a law or bill into the books, but it does
18	take a fee of money to enforce that law or bill. I feel the state could pull off the more severe punishment for
19	animal neglect and general levels of abuse if the law enforcement had more specific areas of the topic to
20	target. I believe that most of the change would take place in the level of the severity of crimes and the
21	sentences for the abusers.
22	
23	Section 4: The impact this would have on shelters and animal rescues in general would be very rewarding.
24	The amount of animals that have been adopted recently, especially due to the pandemic, has skyrocketed.
25	The rehoming of the abused animals would raise our rank, as well as treating the abusers with the
26	punishment or treatment that is necessary.

28	Section 5: This bill will go into effect on April 1, 2021

1	An Act Relating To Increasing The Amount of Guidance Counselors in Kentucky Public Schools
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: With the increased need for mental health resources in schools, Kentucky public schools are in
6	desperate need of more guidance counselors. Guidance counselors assist students through various events in
7	their lives, whether personal or academic. They are there for students on their worst days.
8	
9	Section 2: The recommended ratio of guidance counselors to students is 1 guidance counselor for every 250
10	students, but it is not required that Kentucky public schools meet this ratio. Therefore, many Kentucky
11	schools lack the proper amount of guidance counselors, and students suffer as a result. This also hurts
12	guidance counselors in understaffed schools because they become overworked.
13	
14	Section 3: The creation of this bill will require all Kentucky public schools to maintain the proper ratio of
15	guidance counselors to students. For every 250 students, there should be one full-time guidance counselor
16	in the school.
17	
18	Section 4: This bill will be funded by an increase in the Kentucky tobacco sales tax of an additional \$0.10 per
19	pack of cigarettes.
20	
21	Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2021–2022 school year.

6	school nurse that's medically trained and certified on campus within school hours.

8	Section 2: There is already a 2-day inspection required by law every four years to make sure that schools are

10	evaluates schools on a regular basis. When this inspection takes place, the inspectors will check to make

1 2	An Act Relating To Bio Coal Use in the State of Kentucky
2 3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	be it enacted by the fouth Assembly of the commonwealth of Kentucky
5 6	Section 1: In eastern Kentucky land and air are contaminated by mountaintop removal. Studies show that humans are harmed by exposure to dust and many toxins released into the air and water from surface mining. People
7	living near the mining have cancer rates of 14.4% and 9.4% for other people in Appalachia. Rates of children born
8	with birth defects was 42% higher in areas near mountaintop removal mining.
9	
10	Section 2: Regulation of valley fills associated with mountaintop removal mining is primarily under the authority of
11	two federal statutes, the Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act (SMCRA, 30 U.S.C. I1201) and the Clean
12	Water Act (CWA, 33 U.S.C. I1252), and involves several federal and state agencies. Also, a few states have
13	completely outlawed it, while some, like Kentucky, believe it is still legal.
14	
15	Section 3: Other states have created laws to help resolve this issue such as state legislators in Georgia
16	introducing a bill that outlawed the use of mountaintop removal mining. North Carolina did it a year before. Also,
17	Maryland has been taking a stand and recently had a hearing about it, and a bill should be passed soon.
18	Tennessee has taken it a step further, and has passed a bill that seeks to prevent mountaintop removal from
19	expanding beyond the borders of Appalachia into the Cumberland region.
20	
21	Section 4: Our bill would increase the use of bio coal. Bio coal is made from biowaste- like wheat or straw. It
22	works just like normal coal, except there is no chemical waste being released into nature. Bio coal is a carbon-
23	neutral fuel that can replace fossil coal in industrial processes. It is produced within the process of Biogreen
24	pyrolysis and carbonization of raw biomass performed within controlled temperature and residence time
25	conditions. Our bill states that at least 50% of coal produced in Kentucky will be replaced with bio coal.
26	
27	Section 5: At a price of \$230 per metric ton, this project will generate approximately \$2.2 million in revenue to
28	Vega each year. The torrefied bio-coal will be manufactured at the company's facility in Allandale, then shipped in
29	containers by rail to the Port of Savannah. It is about 6 cents per pound. Even though it is a lot more expensive
30	than normal coal, it will save many lives and will ensure safe drinking water for countless more. Research found
31	that many sponsors are willing to pay for this project to help make Kentucky a better place. Also, even though it
32	may not be the best option, raising the taxes by 1% will pay for this yearly.

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: To own a gun in Kentucky, you have to be 21 and older, provide a state ID, and have an instant
6	background check confirmed by the firearm dealer. Despite these requirements, over 1,700 people are killed
7	and 3,200 are injured each year due to gun violence in Kentucky. Almost 30 children (ages 0–11) die from
8	gun violence each year. Kentucky is ranked with the 15th highest death rate in the US due to gun violence.
9	Despite the increase in gun violence over the past 10 years, laws have remained the same. Kentuckians are

12	Section 2: This bill is requiring that prior to all gun purchases, each consumer must complete a 1-hour
13	training course. NRA certified firearms instructors training courses are acceptable. Waivers will be applicable



5	Section 1: An Epinephrine Auto Injector, such as EpiPen or Auvi-Q, is currently not required to be provided
6	by schools in the state of Kentucky. Thousands of these auto injectors are wasted each year along with a
7 8	fraction of hard working Kentuckians income, when parents have to supply an auto injector with their student. This is wasting menoy and auto injectors all over the state, there needs to be a solution to this

11	Section 2: Epinephrine auto injectors are expensive, however they are life saving devices. This bill will require

1	An Act Relating To Hiring Unemployed Veterans in Kentucky
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: There are an estimated 284,000 veterans in the United States who are unemployed. In 2019, the
6	overall United States unemployment rate was 3.6%. In September 2020, the unemployment rate for United
7	States veterans was 6.8%.
8	
9	Section 2: This bill would give Kentucky businesses tax incentives to hire unemployed veterans. These tax
10	incentives would be applied only to the Kentucky Corporation Income and Limited Liability Entity Tax. For
11	every unemployed veteran hired by a company of over 20 workers, there will be a 0.5% reduction in the
12	state taxes for that business. For every unemployed veteran hired by a company of 20 workers or less, there
13	will be a 1% reduction in the state taxes for that business. The maximum amount of a tax decrease for any
14	business would be 10%.
15	
16	Section 3: This bill does not require any additional funding to implement.
17	
18	Section 4: This bill would go into effect January 1, 2021. For every veteran hired, he or she must be
19	employed by the business for at least 3 consecutive months in order for the tax benefit to apply. The
20	veteran must also work at least 30 hours per week, excluding weeks with official holidays, paid time off, sick
21	days, or otherwise approved time off. After the minimum 3 months of employment, the additional tax

6	students have been extremely stressed with online school, but they haven't had anyone to talk to relieve
7	their stress and anxiety. School counselors are not mandated for grades K-8 or 9–12, In Kentucky. There are
8	only 442 school counselors with Kentucky's population being about 4 million people.

10	Section 2: We think that every student should have the ability to obtain resources to help them with their
11	mental state. If students don't get this extra help, their success rate can grow lower, and it can be more
12	difficult to focus in school. A handful of people are attending online school during this pandemic. Everyday,
13	students have to go through stress from technical difficulties, to even not being able to socialize with their
14	friends throughout the day. A lot of kids don't have access to therapists. Whether it's financial issues, or
15	parental restrictions. We need to have therapists available always, even for kids who are doing virtual school.
16	
17	Section 3: Research shows that a higher percentage of students with mental health issues due to online
18	school and covid 19 are trying to receive help. A lot of them don't have the resources to obtain the help they
19 20	need. For our bill, we would like to have more school counselors, who are trained, to help deal with student's mental health.
20 21	
22	Section 4: We think it is a good idea to require money to come out of the state budget for school services.
22	Our bill will be funded in two ways. First of all, counselors make around 50,000 dollars per year on average.
24	We would like to split the paycheck between the school, and taxes. The school board will each pay 25,000
25	dollars, (over time) to counselors. This will occur over time meaning their pay rate per day will contribute to
26	this final cost of 25,000. With there being 129 school districts, and 685,167 students in Kentucky, the

5	Section 1: Students in Kentucky are at risk of seeing inappropriate ads and inappropriate emails. Student's
6	private information can possibly be exposed if there isn't the right protection. The purpose of this bill is to
7	ensure that students remain safe online while on a school issued device. This applies to all technology that
8	students get from school such as chrome books/iPads. This keeps students from looking at inappropriate
