Virtual Code of Conduct

It is important that our participants and guests feel welcomed and safe in our programs. This code of conduct embodies the spirit of the Y, and is intended to help everyone feel comfortable and thrive. As a YMCA participant or guest, we ask you to agree to follow this code of conduct which is rooted in our core values.

These requirements also serve as an extension and supplement to any codes of conduct students and participants must abide by for in-person programming.

1. Appropriate Video Call Etiquette:
 - When registering/signing-in for any video call or meeting, please use your **First & Last Name** (not a random username), as well as your **School** in parentheses (for KUNA, please include **COUNTRY instead of School**).
Example: Curious George (Monkey Acad.). This helps us to ensure the privacy of our meetings.
 - Please find a quiet area and call in at the scheduled meeting time so that you can be fully present in the virtual experience. We ask that all participants have their video function on their device if possible so we can see and hear you.
 - Please do your best to keep background noise or distractions to a minimum. Mute yourself when you are not speaking.
 - Please do not take your phone or computer to the bathroom.
 - Photos and videos of others without the expressed consent is prohibited.
2. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time.
3. Appropriate attire: Appropriate attire must be worn at all times. Clothing with vulgar language, obscene gestures, racial slurs, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program is not allowed. Appropriate tops and bottoms should be worn.
4. Appropriate language: Vulgar language, including swearing, name-calling or shouting/yelling at others is prohibited. When communicating in the chat box, please do not send links or information that is not aligned with our YMCA core values.
5. Appropriate Interactions: Participants shall demonstrate respectful, responsible, caring, and honest conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA virtual interactions. This includes but is not limited to: social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected. *Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.*
6. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
7. Creating a welcoming environment: Respect others' cultures and personal way of being. We strive to create a safe emotional and physical space. We encourage participants to honor diversity in all dimensions and respect opinions or perspectives. The Kentucky YMCA stands up against all forms of bullying, discrimination and racism.
8. Appropriate conduct: Any other conduct of an inappropriate, threatening or offensive nature will be investigated/evaluated by YMCA staff. Participants that do not abide by this agreement may be prohibited from participating in future virtual events or in-person activities.
9. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. This includes, but is not limited to: romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.

10. Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs: The use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs (including e-cigs/ tobacco-like products) is not permitted in or outside of ALL virtual calls. Participants that show, obtain, see in the background, make references to or use during the virtual calls will be removed from meeting and removed from future virtual and in-person events. Law enforcement may be involved if necessary.

If a participant or guest feels uncomfortable in confronting someone directly about offensive behavior or other issues that are in violation of this code of conduct, we ask that you please report the behavior or issue to Kentucky YMCA staff.

To create and maintain a space that embodies our core values, the Y is serious about being clear regarding activities that are not allowed. If you violate this code of conduct, consequences can include termination of program privileges, being removed from all virtual programming, and involving appropriate legal authority. The YMCA reserves the right to make situational decisions based on our policies, mission, and values.

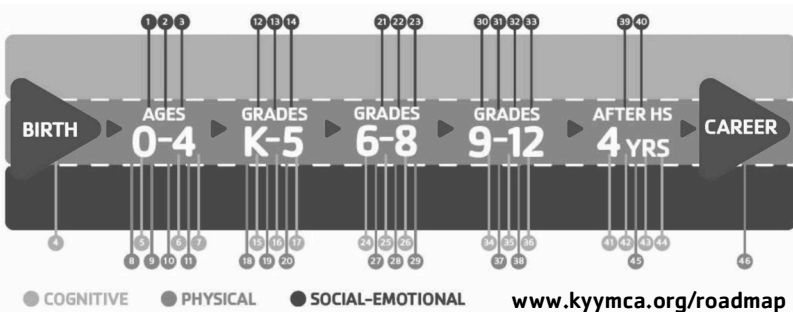

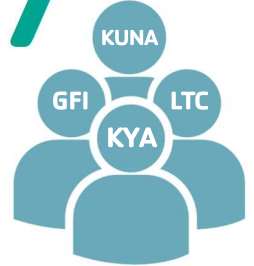

GLOSSARY OF TERMS USED AT THE ASSEMBLY

ADJOURN	A MOTION to close a meeting.
BILL	A proposed law presented for approval by the Assembly.
BILL TITLE	The subject of the BILL.
CAUCUS	A meeting of a group or party, generally to make a decision on behalf of their group.
CHAIR	The Chairperson or Presiding Officer.
DIVISION (OF THE ASSEMBLY)	A MOTION to force a standing vote; generally invoked when a voice vote is unclear.
DOCKET	A list of BILLS to be presented.
MAJORITY VOTE	More than half of the votes cast.
MOTION	To introduce a proposal for consideration by the CHAIR.
PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.
REPRESENTATIVE	A member of the House.
ROLL CALL	Calling the names of all members to determine their presence.
SECOND	A personal approval of a motion, generally making it subject to debate.
SENATOR	A member of the Senate.
STATE OF THE COMMONWEALTH ADDRESS	Made by the Governor and containing a review of the general condition of the state and his/her recommendations to the Assembly.
TABLE	A MOTION to defer action on a BILL.
TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY	The majority vote is at least double the minority vote.
VETO	Privilege of the Governor to reject passed legislation.
YIELD	To relinquish time to another Representative or Senator

BE A BETTER DEBATER!!!
READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:

- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
 - READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON'T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, "When will this bill go into effect?" and "How much will this bill cost?" are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
 - Don't ask questions that begin with "WHY...?" Those are almost *always* debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE**
 - Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
 - Give a speech for or against the bill
 - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
 - If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say, "**Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or `series of questions')?**"
 - If you would like to SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION, you should also say, "And I reserve my right to speak (or `yield my time') afterward."
 - If you would like to YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.
 - EX: "Hermione Granger, Hogwarts I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin."

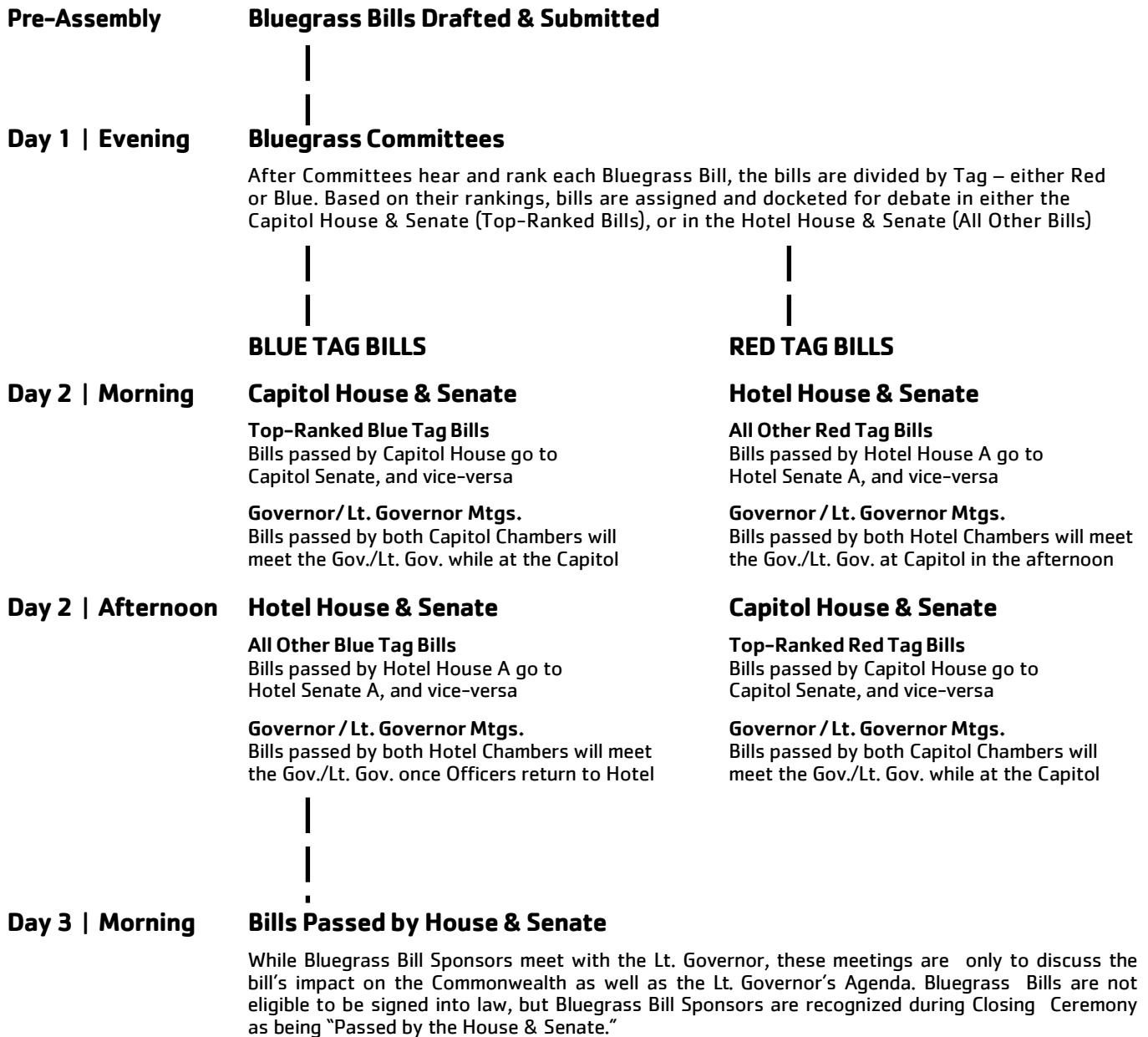

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1 An Act Relating to Providing Additional Funding for Food Service in Kentucky Schools

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4
5 Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 157 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: A state-
6 level grant will be created to provide additional funding for food service in schools.

7
8 Section 2: This money should be used for expanding the reach of the food service program,
9 providing funding for the transportation of the food to students, and improving the quality of the
10 school-provided meals. These are the approved uses of these funds. If the money from this grant
11 is abused or used inappropriately, the funding from this grant will be withdrawn from the schools
12 in the district.

13
14 Section 3: Public schools that fall in the category of 65% or above of students qualifying for free
15 and reduced lunch will receive this funding. The schools to first receive this money will be the
16 schools with the largest population, the schools that cover the largest geographical range, and
17 the schools with the least funding already put towards their food service.

18
19 Section 4: To get funding for this grant, we will be utilizing the National School Lunch Program
20 (NSLP), the School Breakfast Program, and the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP). Each
21 school will receive no more than 5% of their current food service budget in additional funding.

23 Section 5: This bill will go into effect 90 days after it is put into law.

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1 An Act Relating to mandatory CPR licensing for all school staff in the state of Kentucky
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: This bill proposes all school staff in Kentucky to be licensed in CPR.
6
7 Section 2: Specific members on school staff are required to be certified in CPR in 11 states. All in
8 school staff are required to have a mandatory CPR license in 7 states. According to the American
9 Heart Association, approximately 100,000 to 200,000 lives could be saved each year if CPR were
10 performed early enough. Regarding these statistics we strongly believe that all school staff across
11 the state of Kentucky should be certified in CPR.
12
13 Section 3: The classes would be taught by certified CPR teachers at a nearby facility. Taking the
14 class would be regarded as PD hours and can be documented as such. These classes would teach
15 school staff how to perform CPR one on one, with rescue breaths and hands only CPR. They will
16 also be taught how to perform CPR as a part of a two person rescue team.
17
18 Section 4: CPR classes cost \$25 - \$50 each. This money will be provided by the school's Board of
19 Education (BOE).
20
21 Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Education will ensure that this course is added to teaching
22 requirements.
23
24 Section 6: This bill will go into effect during the 2021-2022 school year.

6 Section 1: This bill will require that all students take a class to learn life skills needed such as
7 balancing checks, paying a mortgage, budgeting, tax filing, and the process of insurance. Students
8 will also learn basic skills such as interpersonal skills, communication skills, healthy relationships,
9 critical thinking, and self control.

11 Section 2: According to, money.usnews.com, each year many seniors in high school graduate and
12 proceed to different colleges and jobs on their own. Usually, when they graduate high school, they
13 do not know how to balance money, or how a financial system works. Many young adults struggle
14 with these things due to them never being taught. With this class being implemented, it would help
15 prepare a successful path for these students to thrive in the future.

17 Section 3: There will be no cost to implement this bill.

19 Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the County’s School District and the superintendent.

1 An Act Relating To Mandating American Sign Language in KY High Schools
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to expand opportunities and create more diversity in the lives
6 of public school students. Currently, the state of Kentucky recognizes American Sign Language
7 (ASL) as a World Language per KRS 164.4785 and the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE)
8 officially recognizes ASL credits as an elective in high school. As our state grows, the need is
9 growing to educate students in ASL. The growing popularity of ASL as witnessed with Virginia
10 Moore in Governor Andy Beshear's press conferences, has brought to Kentucky's attention that
11 ASL is necessary.
12
13 Section 2: With this legislation, we want to make ASL a mandatory offering in our public schools.
14 This course will also count as a World Language credit. Students will be able to learn another
15 language while connecting with others in their community. This bill gives our state the opportunity
16 to communicate with more diverse populations and be more inclusive of others.
17
18 Section 3: It is not mandatory for private schools to include ASL because private schools are not
19 under the jurisdiction of KDE, but it is strongly encouraged, seeing as our community is changing
20 as a whole.
21
22 Section 4: KDE has published the standards concerning the teaching of ASL on their website.
23 These standards are guidelines to instruction.
24
25 Section 5: Upon passage, this bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2022 school year, so
26 that school districts can be prepared.

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An Act Relating To Red Flag Legislation

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: A red flag law temporarily restricts the use of guns to those who are deemed unfit to own a fire arm. If a student, teacher, parent, or friend reports that a weapon has become dangerous to themselves or others that person would temporarily be restricted.


Section 2: It would take three or more credible pieces of evidence to be considered for review by trial. Pieces of evidence would have to prove to be a danger to others. Police would investigate the subject for past records. The person who accused the subject would be in the courtroom with the subject.

Section 3: Upon a judge's decision a red flag would be put on the person's record. Once the red flag is established they would temporarily have all fire arms that they own taken from them. They would also be unable to purchase a fire arm. Amount of restricted time would be established by the judge. Amount of restricted time would range from three to six months .

Section 4: Person would be put on trial again after restricted time is finished. The second time the person could get the red flag lifted and receive their weapons back or serve another period of restricted time. This cycle would repeat until the subject is deemed fit.

Section 5: The judge would also have the option to put the person into therapy by a court ordered therapist. To be paid for by the Kentucky Department of Occupational Therapy.

Section 6: Bill would go into effect immediately after being signed into law.

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An Act Relating To Health and P.E. Courses in Schools

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This Act establishes that:

- a) Schools shall require more physical education credits and health credits as a graduation requirement for their student body.
- b) Schools will provide a more effective Health and P.E. curriculum to their students which successfully sets them up to live healthy adult lives.
- c) Health and P.E. courses are an important part of preparing Kentucky's youth for adulthood.
- d) Schools will work to decrease the childhood obesity rate among 10-17 year olds.
- e) Schools will expect a higher level of physical health and fitness among its students.


Section 2: Currently the Commonwealth of Kentucky requires that students receive one-half credit in Health and one-half credit in P.E. Both Health and P.E. requirements respectively shall be increased to one whole credit as a graduation requirement for students.

Section 3: New P.E. and Health class curriculums will give students:

- a) The ability to make educated and healthy choices concerning the foods, drinks, and drugs they consume based on science and the advice of pediatric health organizations.
- b) The ability to build fitness plans that are sustainable, personal, and reasonable.
- c) The ability to develop healthy habits throughout their lifetime.
- d) The ability to increase their own level of physical fitness.
- e) The skills to manage their general mental health and time.

Section 4: These graduation requirements will be imposed on students entering grade nine (9) on or after the first day of the 2021-2022 school year.

Section 5: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

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An Act Relating To Legalizing the Business of Bail Bondsmens

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: This act calls upon the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to legalize the business of bail bonds companies.

Section 2: According to KRS 431.510, a bail bondsman is "any person, partnership, or corporation engaged for profit in the business of furnishing bail, making bonds, or entering into undertakings, as surety, for the appearance of persons charged with any criminal offense or violation of law or ordinance punishable by fine, imprisonment, or death, before any of the courts of this state, or securing the payment of fines imposed and of costs assessed by such courts upon final disposition thereof, and the business of a bail bondsman shall be limited to the acts, transactions, and undertakings described in this subsection and to no other."

Section 3: The following KRS section is repealed: 431.510- Plan for the implementation of State assessment and accountability system.


Section 4: Any person(s) wishing to create a bail bonds company must go through extensive background checks and be well versed in the law regarding crimes and their severities. Any bail bonds company is hereby subjected to both scheduled and unscheduled financial inspections conducted by the State.

Section 5: Any bail bonds company found to be engaged in financial malpractice will be subject to a fine of \$10,000 for the first two offenses and a fine of \$100,000 for any additional offenses. All fines will be collected by the State.

Section 6: The bail bondsman can supply no more than 85% of the bail in either cash or property.

Section 7: Bail bondsman companies may use any legal means necessary to make sure the defendant that is out on bail arrives at their legal trial. However, if the defendant does not show up at their trial, the bondsman will not be reimbursed by the State for their lo

Section 8: This Act takes effect March 1, 2021.

6 know for how long and how fast. This results in extra injuries or even deaths. If all High School
7 students were able to preform CPR, that would help save lives in the commonwealth and beyond.

9 Section 2: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 156 TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

11 (1) All students will need to be certified at the time of graduation.
- 12
13 (2) Students will be certified in a after school setting, or in a required health class.
- 14
15 (3) Students can be certified in other means but must be verified by the school district.
- 16
17 (4) It is the job of the school district to set up times with volunteers from the Red Cross,
18 AHA or other reputable source. These other sources must be approved by the SBDM (Sight
19 Based Decision Making Council) and then by the school board.

21 Section 3: Any Statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

Governor's Bill Signing Announcement

After meeting with the Sponsors of all Commonwealth Bills that passed the House & Senate, as well as consulting with the Cabinet and the Budget Committee, the Governor will announce (after Fun Time on second night) which Commonwealth Bills are being signed into law.

If your bill passed the House and Senate but was not announced, then has been vetoed by the Governor (Note: there are NO vetoes at MS KYA – all Commonwealth Bills passed by the House and Senate are signed into law). A full list of vetoes will be posted by the Y-Desk. Bill Sponsors wishing to challenge a veto can sign-up for the Veto Override Session at the Y-Desk.




Day 3 | Morning


Veto Override Session | HS KYA Only

At HS KYA, prior to the start of Closing Ceremony, any Bill Sponsors who wish to challenge the Governor's veto will be given the opportunity to do so during the Veto Override Session.


Bills on the Override Session docket required a 2/3-majority vote of the Assembly to be heard. If the vote is successful, the Governor and Bill Sponsors each get 1 min. to speak. Bill Sponsors can yield part of their time to Lobbyists, and the Governor can yield to a Cabinet Member or the Attorney General. A final simple majority vote is required to override the veto and enact the bill into law.

23 Section 6: When engaging in sexual activity, the psychological, economical, and physical impact school-age
24 pregnancy, abortion, and adoption has on parents and children.

26 Section 7: Every student enrolled within a public high school in Kentucky will be required to partake in this
27 curriculum every year enrolled. It is not permissible for students, parents, or legal guardians to have the
28 student unenrolled from the delivery of the curr

30 Section 8: Certified health educators must attend a training to review the curriculum requirements prior to
31 the 2021-22 academic year,
32
33 Section 9: There is, appropriated to the Department of Education from the General Fund, \$4,106,080,500
34 in fiscal year 2021-22 for the purposes of training and carrying out this curriculum.

5 Section 1: Every year when kids graduate from high school they are never sure on how to
6 complete taxes, pay bills, and other responsibilities for everyday life. When tested on financial
7 concepts, only 17% of respondents ages 18 to 34 demonstrated basic financial literacy according
8 to FINRA Foundation's 2018 National Financial Capability Study.
9
10 Section 2: Students in the 9th-12th grade will take a course In-person or online and will be
11 required to take a one semester-long class about simple life skills needed for everyday life. This
12 will be required in order to graduate. The State Board of Education would create the curriculum
13 for this class.

15 Section 3: The cost will depend on the size of the school or availability of other people on staff to
16 teach this class.

18 Section 4: The school districts will enforce this. For the first offense it will be a \$500 fine. It will

2 school students.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


5
6 Section 1: A concussion is a form of mild traumatic brain injury that occurs after a blow to the
7 head, often associated with sports. More than 5% of high school athletes are concussed each year
8 while participating in contact sports. A concussion can result in headaches, trouble concentrating,
9 memory problems, depression, sleep disturbances, and sensitivity to light and sounds. Both the
10 physical and cognitive symptoms impact a students ability to focus, concentrate, learn, memorize,
11 and process information. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), the experience of
12 learning and engaging in academic activities that require concentration can actually cause a
13 student?s concussion symptoms to reappear or worsen ultimately taking the brain longer to heal.

14
15 Section 2: The KHSAA requires that any athlete who exhibits signs or behaviors consistent with a
16 concussion shall be immediately removed from the sport and shall not return to play until cleared
17 by a health official. Each public school district currently employs coaches and trainers who are
18 required by KRS 160.445 to be qualified in the diagnosis and treatment of concussions and their
19 symptoms. A 6-step protocol is mandatory to return to practice and normal game play with no
20 mention of concussion protocol pertaining to the classroom.

21
22 Section 3: Under this bill, upon diagnosis and during recovery, students will be given a lighter
23 workload predetermined by the school district, and will be exempt from tests in the classroom.
24 Students must be cleared by a medical professional and showcase a lack of concussion symptoms
25 before resuming full instruction. Currently, California, Massachusetts, Illinois and 11 other U.S.
26 states have mandated return-to-learn policies on student-athlete concussions.

27
28 Section 4: If teachers and/or school officials fail to abide by these statutes, they will receive up to
29 three warnings. After the third warning, the district school board can take action as they see fit.
30 This bill will not require any funding, as trained officials are already employed by each public
31 school district.

32
33 Section 5: This bill will be enacted at the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year and sports
34 seasons.

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1 An Act Relating To Eliminate Required Convictions for Termination of Parental Rights in Cases of Pregnancy
2 by Rape

3
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


5
6 Section 1: Kentucky currently does not require criminal convictions to terminate one’s parental
7 rights if suspected of neglect, child abuse, nor multiple felonies of drug offenses, but do in cases
8 of rape. This allows unconvicted sex offenders of domestic violence, date rape, etc., to have
9 parental rights over their victim’s child. Rape victims should not have to be put through additional
10 and unnecessary trauma of their rapist having parental rights over their child/children. By
11 enforcing clear and convincing evidence instead of a non-specified burden of proof and required
12 conviction, these women and their children can be relieved of such distress and the rapist would
13 have an undeserved control taken away from them. This is already allowed in 30 states across
14 America, but Kentucky is not of those states.

15
16 Section 2: Passage of this bill will allow women who are impregnated by a rapist who goes
17 unconvicted of the felony, to not be forced to add the rapist’s name to the birth certificate,
18 disclose personal information to the rapist, co-parent with the offender and live near the
19 offender. Upon passage, this bill will allow the parental rights to be removed from the rapist in the
20 state of Kentucky as long as there is clear and convincing evidence that the pregnancy occurred
21 from the alleged assault. The assault should be reported to the Rape Hotline, the Cabinet for Child
22 and Family Services, and/or the Children’s Advocacy Center.


23
24 Section 3: Upon passage of this bill, victims of rape will not have to fight against their perpetrator
25 for parental rights of their child born of rape. Support for the victims can be found through the
26 Kentucky government program, Children’s Advocacy Center.

27
28 Section 4: This bill would cost nothing to implement.

29
30 Section 5: This legislation would go into effect after 90 days upon passage.

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An Act Relating To the Use of Body Cameras by Police Officers

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A new section of KRS Chapter 15 is created to read as follows:

- 1) All police officers on dispatch shall be equipped with an operating body camera.
- 2) Absent exigent circumstances, each police officer shall activate their body camera no later than five minutes prior to dispatch and shall not deactivate their body camera earlier than five minutes after execution.
- 3) Deactivation, misuse, or obstruction of the usage of a body camera shall be considered an obstruction of justice and result in the charge of a class A misdemeanor, which is punishable by 90 days to 12 months in jail and a fine of up to \$500.

Section 2: A new section of KRS Chapter 15 is created to read as follows:

- 1) Police officers may not review or alter body camera footage after an incident.
- 2) Reviewing or altering body camera footage shall result in the charge of a class D felony, which is punishable by 1 to 4 years of imprisonment and a fine of up to \$10,000.


Section 3: KRS bill 61.168 is amended to read as follows: “. . . (6) A public agency may not disclose body camera footage unless it depicts:

- a) An incident which is the subject of a formal complaint, in which case the unedited video and audio recording must be released to the public.
- b) An incident results in death or bodily harm, in which case the unedited audio and video recording shall be available upon the request of the victim’s legal representation or family.”

Section 4: As used in this Act, “body camera” means a video-recording device that is worn on the body of a police officer.

Section 5: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

Section 6: This Act takes effect January 1, 2021.

5 Section 1: Only patients with cancer or a terminal illness would be able to legally obtain opioid
6 prescriptions in our Commonwealth.

8 Section 2: Doctors may only prescribe opioids to patients with cancer or a terminal illness.

9
10 Section 3: For all other illnesses which opioids were previously prescribed, opioid alternatives
11 should be prescribed, such as acetaminophen, anesthetics, and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory
12 drugs.

13
14 Section 4: Doctors found in violation of this act will receive a \$5,000 fine upon first offense. A
15 second offense will result in a loss of license to practice medicine

16
17 Section 5: Enacting this bill would cost no money, and would likely save our Commonwealth a
18 sufficient amount of money on combating the opioid epidemic.

20 Section 6: This bill would be added to KRS section 218A.020

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1 An Act Relating To Prohibiting Solitary Confinement in Juvenile Facilities

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4
5 Section 1: This bill will prohibit the use of solitary confinement as punishment for youth inmates
6 in state juvenile detentions and correctional facilities. Solitary confinement can lead to physical
7 and psychological health problems. In youths, the conditions of solitary confinement can cause
8 long term developmental harm. The effects of prolonged social isolation can hinder the person
9 successfully reentering society. Solitary confinement is often used as a discipline for those who
10 violate rules or express violence yet there is no evidence that it improves behavior.

11
12 Section 2: DEPARTMENT OF JUVENILE JUSTICE POLICY AND PROCEDURES, NO. 3 18.3(IV)(H) (Dec.
13 5, 2014) repealed and read as follows: "Disciplinary confinement may be imposed for up to 5 days
14 for a major rule violation, following a disciplinary review hearing." This bill will repeal it and reads
15 as follows, "Any minor currently incarcerated in a Juvenile detention facility or Youth development
16 center will not be subjected to disciplinary confinement that includes social isolation for prolonged
17 period of time".

18
19 Section 3: This bill will not require any additional funding.

20
21 Section 4: Juvenile detention centers and Youth Development centers will be responsible for
22 implementing this law.

23
24 Section 5: This Act will go into effect ninety days following the passage.

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An act to staff resource officers in public schools.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: This bill would put in place a system of Kentucky State Police Officers in Kentucky Public Schools to serve as school resource officers.

Section 2: This bill would make a law that for every 600 students enrolled in a school, there is to be at least one resource officer present on school campus beginning 1 hour before, during school, and 1 hour after.


Section 3: The bill will be funded by unclaimed Kentucky Lottery money. School resource officers would be paid an additional \$2,000 to their base income salary provided by the Kentucky State Police Department.

Section 4: Schools in violation of this bill will be given 20 school days (four weeks) notice before facing consequences.


Section 5: The consequence of not hiring/having a school resource officer(s) present on campus at all times would be paying a fine of \$3,000 per school week after the four-week grace period.

Section 6: A substitute officer would be temporarily provided in the absence of the officer(s) during the school day.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2022.

1 An Act Relating To Make Rape by Deception Illegal in the State of Kentucky

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Rape by deception in this bill is defined as lying about or withholding information
6 involving one’s sexual, personal, professional, medical, or religious life for the purpose of gaining
7 consent for sex. Consent in this bill is defined as someone willingly, knowingly, and actively
8 agreeing to the terms of the act. The current Lack of Consent Law in KRS Chapter 510 will be
9 enforced and considered when deciding if the victim consented.

10
11 Section 2: According to RAINN.org (Rape, Abuse, & Incest National Network), every 73 seconds an
12 American is sexually assaulted. Nationally, sexual violence has fallen by more than half (63%)
13 since 1993 because new laws have been put in place making types of rape, violence, assaults, and
14 more illegal. In a paper written by Jed Rubenfeld, a professor at Yale’s school of law, he mentions
15 that previous rape laws are meant to protect body autonomy, but are failing to do so when body
16 autonomy is protecting consent from force and fraud. This bill will make it where there will also be
17 consequences for those who take part in rape by deception like many other illegal types of sexual
18 assaults and protect the general public’s right to body autonomy.

19
20 Section 3: At least 3 other states, including California, Indiana, and Iowa, have a law against rape
21 by deception. California’s Penal Code 261 PC defines what they see as rape as “using force,
22 threats of force, or fraud as a means of having non-consensual sexual intercourse with another
23 person.”

24
25 Section 4: This bill will be enforced the same as all other statutes concerning rape in Kentucky. It
26 is recommended that it is legally considered 1st degree rape, but ultimately it will be up to the
27 Kentucky courts.

28
29 Section 5: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2021
