10	Kentucky, and one person dies from suicide about every eleven hours in our state. According to a study by

12	twenty children suffer from anxiety or depression. Finally, a study constructed by the Los Angeles Times
13	shows that 59% of mass shootings are carried out by people who have been diagnosed with a mental
14	illness or demonstrated serious signs of mental illness prior to the attack.

16	Section 3: The school systems can often times put extra work on students, and students can become
17	overwhelmed. As an effect of this strenuous work, students' mental health is constantly deteriorating.
18	Since school and personal lives combined have a very negative effect on mental health, students

19	(20) years of age, during the first ninety (90) days of employment, shall be increased by eighty cents
20 21	(\$0.80) per hour every year until reaching nine dollars and five cents (\$9.05) per hour, after which it will increase as specified in Section 5. Additionally, the student minimum wage shall be increased by one dollar
22	and four cents (\$1.04) each year until reaching twelve dollars and forty cents (\$12.40), after which it will

25	Section 4: One year following the enactment of this bill, employers may reach the above requirements by

13	Section 3: This bill will be funded using a portion of the profits from the Kentucky Lottery. Proceeds from
14	the Kentucky Lottery are meant to go towards Kentucky education. However, an average of \$28 million, or
15	23.5% of the total funds supposed to be going towards education, is being used by other state programs.
16	This bill would use that money to fund additional health care benefits for Kentucky coal miners.
17	
18	Section 4: At this point in time, many coal miners, both retired and continuing to work, are suffering from
19	illnesses and health problems related to the harsh conditions of coal mines. Due to the inaccessibility of
20	healthcare for these workers, we are proposing the usage of free healthcare to resolve the struggle with
21	treatment costs.
22	
23	Section 5: A recent study has concluded that more than ten percent of coal miners with twenty-five or
71	more years of experience have contracted the black lung. Furthermore, the average life expectancy for a

24 more years of experience have contracted the black lung. Furthermore, the average life expectancy for a 25 coal miner with fifteen years of experience is only forty-nine to fifty-eight years of age. This goes to show

that affordable healthcare and an upgraded pension provided by the Kentucky Lottery is urgently needed to

An Act Relating To Legalization of Sports Gambling.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 2: Local elections shall dictate the legalization of sports gaming in their area 2-01. The legislative body of a region can make a special election to determine if a county will allow the legalization of sports gambling.

Section 3: Taxes and collection 3-01. Any licensed sportsbook will pay a ten (10) percent tax on all revenue and income in the Commonwealth of Kentucky 3-02. Any licensed sportsbook must submit the tax on all income and a report by the 15th of the month. 3-03. 85 percent (85%) of the tax referred to in Section 4, Title 02 must be paid to the pension fund of state workers.

Section 4: Kentucky Sports Gaming Commision- Creation, Licensing. 4-01. A Kentucky Sports Gaming Commission is created with nine (9) members. 4-02. The governor shall appoint four (4) members to this commission. These members will serve four(4) year terms each. 4-03. The speaker of the house of representatives shall appoint three (3) members to this commission. These members will serve four year terms. 4-04. The speaker of the Senate must also appoint two (2) members. These members will serve 4 year terms. 4-05. The commission must prevent cheating and tax fraud in the sports gaming industry in Kentucky. The commission must also make sure any and all laws are upheld to the fullest extent, and be honest in all dealings. 4-06. A member of the commission may be impeached by a 2/3 majority vote by the congress, and confirmation by the governor of the commonwealth of Kentucky. 4-10. The Commission shall hold its main offices in Frankfort. 4-07. The commission or any of its agents have the right to inspect a sportsbook at any time. If a licensed sportsbook fails to comply, the license may be taken away. 4-08. The licensed sportsbooks must also have any additional information requested by the commission ahead of time. 4-09. All bets and wagers made by bettors with a licensed sportsbook must be kept on record by both the bettor and the sportsbook. 4-10. All sportsbooks must have the appropriate amounts of cash on hand to pay out all bets. 4-11. In the event that a licensed sportsbook does not pay the required amount to a bettor, the sportsbook's license shall be revoked, and all taxes shall be paid immediately. The government will then force the owner of the sportsbook to pay the bettor.

Section 5: Persons authorized to wager on sporting events 5-01. To bet on sporting events in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, one must be twenty-one years of age. 5-02. Any convicted felon still on parole may not gamble on sporting events in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. 5-03. Any coach or player of a team may not bet on sporting events. 5-04. All sportsbooks may allow the bettors to place bets on the following: Professional Sporting Events Collegiate Sporting Events

Section 6: Persons allowed to run a sportsbook in the Commonwealth of Kentucky 6-01. Any person without a proper license running a sportsbook shall be guilty of a class A misdemeanor.

Section 7: Licenses and Employees 7-01. Any person or business applying for a license shall apply on a form in accordance with the commission and the info the commission deems necessary. 7-02. Any person applying for a license may not have a criminal record. 7-03. A license by the Kentucky Sports Gaming Commission will allow an owner to operate a sportsbook, remote kiosk, or offer interactive sports wagering.

Section 8: Penalties for breaking these laws. 8-01. Any wagers placed may be deemed as an enforceable contract. 8-02. Any sportsbook found guilty of not paying the legal amount of taxes, allowing the breaking of any of the laws set forth in this act, or not being transparent with the commission is liable to losing the license to allow for sportsbook operations. 8-03. Any bettor found guilty of breaking any laws set forth in this act shall be found guilty of a Class B misdemeanor. 8-04. Any bettor found guilty of cheating shall be guilty of a Class B misdemeanor.

Section 9: Conclusion. 9-01. This act shall take effect on July 1, 2020 if enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The gambling commission shall be an extension of the secretary of state's office. Any act contradicting this bill shall be repealed if enacted.

19	sentence or if they will receive a lighter one with chemical castration and parole. After the lighter sentence

21	continue every 12 weeks. The injections must be done when visiting their parole officer. Once off of parole,
22	if that is part of their sentencing, the injections must continue with their parole officer unless appealed to

25 26	Section 4: An offender must (1) be at least 21 years of age, (2) undergo psychological and psychiatric
26 77	evaluations, and if elected, counseling, and (3) be on parole when injections start.
27 28	Section 5: An offender can be found in violation of parole if (1) they fail to cooperate in treatment
28	program, or (2) takes any steroid or other drug to counteract the Depo Provera treatment, along with other
30	normal violations. If parole is violated, normal procedures for parole violations will proceed. On parole

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: This bill would prohibit state-licensed mental health professionals from engaging in efforts to change
6	the sexual orientation or gender identity of a young person under 18 years of age.
7	
8	Section 2: This would ban all forms of conversion therapy, not only physical "treatments." The practice of
9	aversive conditioning or any kind of behavioral, cognitive, psychoanalytic practices that try to change or
10	reduce same-sex attraction or alter a person's gender identity will be prohibited on anyone under 18 years
11	of age.
12	
13	Section 3: It will not require any federal or state funding to implement this new law.
14	
15	Section 4: The consequence that a mental health professional continuing to practice conversion therapy on
16	minors would vary depending on severity of the case and the amount of times the offence has been
17	committed.

1	An Act Relating To The Funding of Canine Units and Drug Programs

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: This bill will raise money for the Kentucky State Police departments to purchase, train, and care for more
6	dogs in the canine units. The money made from this bill will also go to helping reconstruct drug programs in middle
7 8	and high schools.
° 9	Section 2: Money for these programs will be raised through state government programs and grants, such
10	as Kentucky Center for School Safety, Kentucky First Responder Grants, The National Police Dogs
11	Foundation, and matching grants.
12	
13	Section 3: Drug programs that will be redone may include, but aren't limited to, Operation UNITE, D.A.R.E,
14	and CHOICE. Money raised may also be used to start new drug and alcohol awareness and prevention
15	programs.

17	Section 4: To ensure that 100% of the money from school-related grants is used to fund drug prevention
18	and awareness programs the money will be put into a separate account that is only accessible by the
19	school board. The money will be split equally among the 172 school districts.

21 22	Section 5: Police stations across the state have to spend over \$9,000 on importing dogs for canine units with an additional \$12,000 to \$15,000 on training for dogs and handlers. Seeing as canines are

26	Section 6: To ensure that 100% of the money from canine unit related grants is used to fund canine units,

1	An Act Relating To Regulating Grading Scales in Public Schools.
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: Currently the grading scale in Kentucky's public school system varies from district to district throughout
6	the state. Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarships (KEES) is based upon grade point average. With varying
7	grading scales, some students are not given equal opportunities to be awarded KEES money.
8	
9	Section 2: Public school grading scales will be regulated as follows (1) 100% to 90% is considered an A (2)
10	89% to 80% is considered a B (3) 79%-70% is considered a C (4) 69% to 60% is considered a D (5) 59-0%
11	is considered an F.
12	
13	Section 3: With this grading scale set in place it allows students across the state of Kentucky equal
14	chances at earning KEES money. This will "level the playing field" for all high school students in Kentucky so
15	all students can equivalently earn KEES money.
16	
17	Section 4: Kentucky Department of Education officials will be responsible for monitoring and enforcing the
18	grading scale across the state to ensure that all districts are in compliance. If a school does not comply
19	with the regulations the school board and superintendent positions will be called into question.
20	

2021 Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.
