Section 1: This act would allow children in the foster program to be adopted after 5 years if the biological parents are unfit. Many foster families look at the children they foster as part of their own family and want to adopt them, but because biological parents won't sign the papers they can't. Many biological parents never get better and their kids are forced to keep floating from family to family in the foster system until they are 18. After they turn 18, they are left out on their own and expected to fend for themselves with no stable family to rely on. These kids can fall into the wrong crowd and result to bad things because they have no stability or help from a family.

Section 2: Over 7600 children are currently in the foster system in Kentucky. Only about 1800 have a goal of adoption as of now. With this bill these numbers could drastically change. More families would look to adoption resulting in a better home life for all these kids. People thrive off stability and being in the know.

Section 3: This bill will not need any additional funding. This act will be enforced by local family courts within the state as well as social services. This bill will be put into effect as soon as it is passed.

An Act Relating To Prescribing E-Cigarettes

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: An act relating to e-cigarettes (e-cigs) in today's society. It's easier than ever for a teen to have access to e-cigs. The e-cig's original purpose was to help cigarette smokers quit smoking. Now, the e-cigs have turned into an addiction themselves. E-cigs are not only a problem among teens, but also for adults. Instead of using the e-cig to slow down on smoking, they have become an epidemic amongst society.

Section 2: Our solution is to start prescribing ecigs and remove them from the everyday market. By prescribing e-cigs, we are preventing easy access to people like teens who use these for a recreational purpose. Just like we carry around IDs, e-cig patients will be issued a card that verifies their prescription for their e-cigarette. The e-cig recipients will pick up their e-cigs from a pharmacy, just as they would a prescribed medication.

Section 3: Feasibility- We can remove e-cigs from the vast majority of Kentucky's population and the everyday market with little to no problem. Once this law is enacted, e-cigs can easily be relocated to the pharmacy.

Section 4: Under KRS 218A.040, e-cigs will be considered a Schedule I substance because they have a high potential for abuse and no accepted medical use for treatment. The illegal possession of an e-cig will be treated just like the possession of unprescribed narcotics. This will result in criminal possession of a controlled substance by law enforcement.

Section 5: This law will go into effect January 1st, 2020. This allows time for the current distributors of ecigs to dissolve partnerships with the e-cig companies, and allow time for medical ID cards to be distributed.

Measuring Essential Ingredients for Success - Ensuring essential learning occurs in the Commonwealth's schools.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: 158.6451 Legislative declaration on goals for Commonwealth's Schools -- Model curriculum framework. (1) The General Assembly finds, declares, and establishes that: (a) Schools shall expect a high level of achievement of all students. (b) Schools shall develop their students' ability to: Use basic communication and mathematics skills for purposes and situations they will encounter throughout their lives; Apply core concepts and principles from mathematics, the sciences, the arts, the humanities, social studies, and practical living studies to situations they will encounter throughout their lives; Become self-sufficient individuals of good character exhibiting the qualities of altruism, citizenship, courtesy, hard work, honesty, human worth, justice, knowledge, patriotism, respect, responsibility, and self discipline; Become responsible members of a family, work group, or community, including demonstrating effectiveness in community service; Think and solve problems in school situations and in a variety of situations they will encounter in life; Connect and integrate experiences and new knowledge from all subject matter fields with what they have previously learned and build on past learning experiences to acquire new information through various media sources; and Express their creative talents and interests in visual arts, music, dance, and dramatic arts. (c) Schools shall increase their students' rate of school attendance. (d) Schools shall increase their students' graduation rates and reduce their students' dropout and retention rates. (e) Schools shall reduce physical and mental health barriers to learning. (f) Schools shall be measured on the proportion of students who make a successful transition to work, postsecondary education, and the military. (2) The Kentucky Board of Education shall disseminate to local school districts and schools a model curriculum framework which is directly tied to the goals, outcomes, and assessment strategies developed pursuant to this section and KRS 158.645 and 158.6453. The framework shall provide direction to local districts and schools as they develop their curriculum. The framework shall identify teaching and assessment strategies, instructional material resources, ideas on how to incorporate the resources of the community, a directory of model teaching sites, alternative ways of using school time, and strategies to incorporate character education throughout the curriculum.

Section 2: Based on KRS 158.6451, there are curricular goals spelled out for all schools in the commonwealth. In the state of Kentucky, core learning subjects (reading, writing, math, science, and social studies) have been assessed and included in accountability scores for many years. However, certain qualities of good character (bolded 3, 4, & 5 above) are not assessed by schools and included in accountability scores. This bill will require that schools be assessed in the essential areas described in the bolded section of KRS 158.6451. This assessment will also be reported as part of schools' accountability.

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Section 3: Upon passing legislation, this bill shall be enacted on the start of the 2019 - 2020 school year.

An Act Relating To Establishing Same Day Voter Registration

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Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently, all eligible Kentucky voters register to vote at least four weeks prior to an election in order to and be eligible to vote in an upcoming election. This bill will provide an opportunity for eligible Kentucky voters to register to vote, and to cast their vote, as well as change political party at anytime before casting their official vote.

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Section 2: Through electronic same day registration, the passage of this bill will provide more opportunities for Kentucky citizens to become educated on the candidates and platforms represented on the ballot. Other states have implemented this procedure and have more successful voter turnouts. Electronic voter registration is currently already available in the state of Kentucky and will therefore be of no additional cost or require any additional manpower.

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Section 3: This bill will take effect within 30 days of passing due to voter registration procedures already being in effect.

An Act Relating To protect consumers from being exposed to medication used in beef animals and to prevent antibiotic resistance in people.

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to be able to distinguish beef animals that have been medicated with medication labeled with a slaughter withdraw when the animals are being sold at a market.

Section 2: When a veterinarian administers a beef animal with medication that has been labeled with a slaughter withdraw, they must insert a tag in the left ear of the animal listing the date of withdraws expiration. The tag may not be removed until the slaughter withdraw has expired.

Section 3: Beef producers who remove the tag before the expiration date, will be listed in the public directory of beef producers allowing buyers to be aware of the unlawful removal and slaughter withdraw beef animals being sold. This bill will go into effect within one year of being passed.

An act to create a statewide animal cruelty registry in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: According to the Humane Society of the United States, a survey was conducted and 71% of domestic violence victims reported that their abusers also abused pets. In fact, according to the Commonwealth's government website, 99% of animal abusers have other criminal offenses and 100% of criminals convicted of sexual homicide also abused animals. From the 2017 findings, the Animal Legal Defense Fund has ranked Kentucky with the weakest animal protection laws for the past eleven years.

Section 2: There is currently no database for Kentucky residents to retrieve information on animal abusers located in our state. Upon implementation of this bill, the Commonwealth of Kentucky will annex a new tab to the current sex offender registry for those who are charged for animal abuse. This would be accessible to the public so that anyone could obtain this information. The Circuit Clerk for each county will notify the Kentucky State Police Criminal ID and Records Branch of the outcome of their respective county's animal cruelty cases as the are occurred. The branch will then update the registry.

Section 3: Those who commit the following misdemeanors/felonies will be added to the animal abuse registry; cruelty towards any animal (ie. beating or shooting any animal), neglecting any animal, the abandonment of any animal, sexual assault of any animal or animal fighting (KRS 525.125). The components of the animal abuse registry include: full name, date of birth, address, county, personal description, offense(s), conviction date, picture, aliases, and status (compliant, incarcerated, noncompliant). For both a misdemeanor and a felony, the criminal will have a permanent record on the registry.

Section 4: Minimal funding will be necessary to effectuate this law. The cost is estimated at around \$500. This will append the additional registry to the Kentucky State website (https://kentucky.gov), and will be paid for using fines collected from animal cruelty cases.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on July 1st, 2019.

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 40 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) The Kentucky Department of Veteran Affairs will create a one time grant for financially unstable United States military veterans living in Kentucky. (2) For a United States military veteran living in KY to qualify for this grant, they must first be a United States Military Combat Veteran. (3) For a United States military veteran to qualify for this grant they must live in Kentucky and be classified as homeless. Homeless in defined as an individual who lacks housing –without regard to whether the individual is a member of a family–, including an individual whose primary residence during the night is a supervised public or private facility (e.g., shelters) that provides temporary living accommodations, and an individual who is a resident in transitional housing). (4) For a United States military veteran to qualify for this grant they must first have had to pass a random drug test given at any time and as many times as suspectedly needed. (5) The amount of money that comes with the grant will vary depending on the United States military veterans living conditions as of the time of the application process.

Section 1: KRS 189A.010 (5a) is amended to read as follows: 'For the first offense within a ten (10) year period, be fined not less than four hundred dollars (\$400) nor more than six hundred dollars (\$600), or be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than seven (7) days nor more than six (6) months, or both. Following sentencing, the defendant may apply to the judge for permission to enter a community labor program for not less than fifteen (15) days nor more than forty five (45) days in lieu of fine or imprisonment, or both. If any of the aggravating circumstances listed in subsection (11) of this section are present while the person was operating or in physical control of a motor vehicle, the mandatory minimum term of imprisonment shall be ten (10) days, which term shall not be suspended, probated, cond.'

Section 2: KRS 189A.010 (5b) is amended to read as follows: 'For the second offense within a ten (10) year period, be fined not less than five hundred dollars (\$500) nor more than eight hundred dollars (\$800) and shall be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than thirty (30) days nor more than nine (9) months and, in addition to fine and imprisonment, may be sentenced to community labor for not less than thirty (30) days nor more than sixty (60) days. If any of the aggravating circumstances listed in subsection (11) of this section are present, the mandatory minimum term of imprisonment shall be twenty four (24) days, which term shall not be suspended, probated, conditionally discharged, or subject to any other form of early release;'

An Act Relating To the amendment of current KRS 186.452

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: KRS 186.452 states that any persons under eighteen (18) years of age may apply for an intermediate license to operate a motor vehicle if the person has held an instruction permit for a minimum of one hundred eighty (180) days without a violation under KRS 186.450(4), (5), or (6), a conviction for a violation of KRS 189.292 or 189.294, a conviction for a moving violation under KRS Chapter 189 for which points are assessed by the cabinet, or a conviction for a violation of KRS 189A.010(1); and presented a statement to the Department of Kentucky State Police signed by a parent or guardian of the applicant attesting that the applicant has completed at least sixty (60) hours of supervised driving experience, including at least ten (10) hours at night, while accompanied by a person who has attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and holds a valid operator's license occupying the seat beside the applicant.

Section 2: KRS 186.452 will be amended to now read: 'Any persons under eighteen (18) years of age may apply for an intermediate license to operate a motor vehicle at a total fee of twenty-five (25) dollars if the person has held an instruction permit for a minimum of ninety (90) days without a violation under KRS 186.450(4), (5), or (6), a conviction for a violation of KRS 189.292 or 189.294, a conviction for a moving violation under KRS Chapter 189 for which points are assessed by the cabinet, or a conviction for a violation of KRS 189A.010(1); and presented a statement to the Department of Kentucky State Police signed by a parent or guardian of the applicant attesting that the applicant has completed at least sixty (60) hours of supervised driving experience, including at least ten (10) hours at night, while accompanied by a person who has attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and holds a valid operator's license occupying the seat beside the applicant. To receive the intermediate license, applicants must score a ninety-five (95) or above on the intermediate license driving exam. They will be granted two opportunities to obtain their intermediate license at the ninety (90) day period with a minimum of seven days between the two attempts. If the applicant fails to meet at least a ninety-five (95) on both exam attempts, they will be required to wait an extended period of ninety (90) more days before testing again.

Section 3: The purpose of amending the KRS 186.452 is to grant adolescents with the ability to receive their intermediate license at ninety (90) days, or three months, instead of waiting the previously established six month period and by paying an extended fee of twenty-five (25) dollars. If the applicant meets all requirements and receives a ninety-five (95) on the test, they will then be granted their intermediate license. At the three month period, applicants will be granted two chances to meet the established requirements and test score. If they apply and fail to meet all the established requirements after two attempts, they will be required to wait an additional ninety (90) days before applying and testing again.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2019. Those receiving their permit license after this date will be affected.

An Act Relating To the Amendment of the Support Education Excellence in Kentucky (SEEK) Program

Section 1: This bill will amend the SEEK program's funding formula as well as add a new statute that will provide qualifying districts with further funding. This extra funding will be in addition to the state's payment of funds per student in regular attendance at their school.

Section 2: The amount of state funds that each school will receive will be dictated by the national attendance system that has previously been established to calculate funding as well as the amended SEEK formula.

Section 3: Schools receiving SEEK funding are permitted to use the money in any way they deem necessary to best support the district. Every school receiving additional SEEK funding will have to supply the Department of Education with a yearly plan regarding the use of said funding.

Section 4: Districts must meet one or more of the following criteria to qualify for additional SEEK funding: Failing to supply tools necessary to education in classrooms and to students (updated textbooks, computers, etc.) Being unable to provide adequate teacher salaries (at least \$35,000 per year) Not being able to provide Professional Development resources to suffice the required amount of hours set by the state Districts with a student body of at least 'that are under the national poverty line School districts in an area where the property value is in the lowest 25% of the state These schools will be considered 'underfunded' and receive additional funding from the state. Other qualifications may be acted upon at the discretion of the Kentucky Department of Education.

Section 5: The funding will come from the SEEK programs allotted reserve in the General Fund as well as a .02% sales tax increase on products containing nicotine that are sold in Kentucky.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect July 1st of 2020, the beginning of the educational fiscal year for the 2020-21 school year.

An Act to require state licensing units to accept military service toward qualifications to receive a license or certification.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: While our US military is considered our shield of protection and the most highly trained military in the world, the veteran unemployment rate sits at over half a million (684,000). Due to various reasons, many of the military certifications do not cross over to the civilian, corporate, management, and trade sectors. This adds additional schooling and debt that many veterans cannot afford to pay when entering the civilian workforce. There are already a few states that have passed legislation crediting military veterans for their work experience, allowing them to get their certifications to work as a civilian. Only 13 states in our country are working to pass this law, while eight have already passed it as a law. 74% states have not worked to pass these benefits along to their veterans.

Section 2: This bill would require Kentucky's public universities to implement policies that award academic credit for military training, coursework, and education, thus reducing the time to degree as well as the cost of earning a degree or certificate. Veterans would have two years from honorable discharge to file. The university would have two months to forward the approved certification to the state Veteran's Affairs office. The state would be required to issue these certificates in a period of one month after receiving approval from the public universities

Section 3: The cost of this Act would be minimal. The veteran would pay a \$30 administration fee. Universities would place this certification process with their Admissions office for action. The Kentucky Veteran's Affairs office would issue the certificates and handle all paperwork. The remaining funding for this bill would be included under the Veteran's Affairs office budget.

Section 4: The Kentucky Department of Education and Veteran's Affair's offices would ensure all certificates are being issued in a timely manner.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on December 1st, 2019. All parts of Kentucky would be required to be compliant by this date.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: On June 20th, 2005, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services issued a law that all restaurants are required to display a poster that shows how to perform the Heimlich Maneuver in their facility.

Section 2: Our bill will require the following techniques to be included in training: Heimlich Maneuver: a first-aid procedure for dislodging an obstruction from a person's windpipe in which a sudden strong pressure is applied on the abdomen, between the navel and the rib cage. CPR: an emergency procedure that combines chest compressions often with artificial ventilation in an effort to manually preserve intact brain function until further measures are taken to restore spontaneous blood circulation and breathing in a person who is in cardiac arrest. Basic First Aid: this includes asthma emergencies, anaphylaxis, burns, choking, diabetic emergencies, external bleeding, heart attack, neck, head, and spinal injuries, stroke, and seizure. AED training: An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the life-threatening stopping of heart beat and is able to treat them through the application of electricity which allows the heart to establish an effective rhythm.

Section 3: According to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, there are numerous benefits to training employees in CPR and traditional first aid, including: Tailored to the industry: When restaurants train their employees in CPR and first aid, the individual companies are able to tailor the methods to their workplace in order to ensure the techniques are current, effective, and focused on the requirements of that specific business. Cost: Designating one or two employees per shift will cost little money, and by designating these employees it will prevent accident numbers and severity which will then save money in the long run. Employees become more safety aware, which brings down accident numbers Helps employees to remain calm and focused in the face of an emergency 'According to Injury Facts 2017, choking is the fourth leading cause of unintentional injury death, (National Safety Council).

Section 4: This two day training will be provided by the American Red Cross government. The cost for this training would be \$120 per person to be trained in adult and pediatric first aid/CPR/AED. This money will be provided by raising the tax on a restaurant permit 0.1%.

Section 5: After six months of this bill going into effect, any restaurant that does not have at least one trained personnel per shift, will be fined \$100 each month that they do not have proper training. After six more months, they will be fined \$200 each month.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2019.

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Section 2: KRS 532.260 currently allows inmates with 12 months or less left in their sentence to be eligible for home incarceration. House Bill 396 aims to offer solutions other than incarceration for parents with 12 months or less to serve on their sentence.

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Section 3: Parental inmates convicted of any class misdemeanor or Class C or D felonies will be eligible for in-home incarceration or outpatient care. Misdemeanors and felonies relating to 1) the abuse and mistreatment of a child, 2) domestic abuse of any kind, are 3) violent or sexual in any nature or 4) would pose a threat to public safety would be excluded from this legislation.

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Section 4: Parents included in this legislation, as defined under the aforementioned provisions, will be eligible for home incarceration during the period that they are awaiting trial. If the crime is drug or alcohol abuse related, inmates would have the opportunity to serve their sentence in an outpatient rehabilitation center.

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Section 5: It costs over \$20,000 to imprison someone per year while it only requires \$6,000 to home incarcerate. The saved money from home incarceration will be used to fund outpatient care.

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Section 6: If inmates break the terms of their alternative incarceration, they will be imprisoned or jailed under normal conditions.

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Section 7: This bill will go into effect 90 days after passage.

An act requiring the placement of Safe Haven Baby Boxes to be put in 24 hour emergency care staffed units.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to provide parents with a safe place to leave their babies in order to combat the amount of abandoned infants. This will be considered a last resort option for parents but is a necessary alternative for them in cases of a crisis. Currently the Safe Haven Law that's in place requires the parent to drop off an infant directly to a qualified person at various places including a hospital, fire station, or police department. Based on the Safe Haven Law, if the parents choose to change their mind, they will have 30 days to do so before they lose parental rights. They must also take a DNA test to prove their relationship.

Section 2: Establishing the Safe Haven Baby Boxes will help keep the parent's identity anonymous by taking away the face to face interaction. There will also be no cameras in the vicinity of the box and will be placed on the side of the building. All funding will be raised from donations or from private donors.

Section 3: This will be located at 24 hour emergency care staffed units.

An Act Relating To Reverting Kentucky to the Gold Standard as a Medium of Circulation

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill defines 'gold standard' as a blanket term for precious metals to be portrayed as equal to a Federal Reserve Note. The use of these coins are not to be marked as personal property or a commodity to be held liable for any form of taxes.

Section 2: Furthermore, the aspects of gold standard will be a recognized form of monetary value, for the payments of debt or taxes to the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 3: With the passing of this bill, Kentucky will nullify the following federal laws: The Nixon Shock of 1971 and the Emergency Banking Act of 1933. The Commonwealth reserves its right to do so, deeming the two laws unconstitutional according to Article 1, Section 10, Clause 1 of the United States Constitution: 'No state shall' make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payments of debt'.

An Act Relating To The Legality Of Medical Paternalism

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Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Medical paternalism is defined as follows: the act of a medical professional using their own judgement in cases where they determine that a patient's choices should not be honored, violating the patient's personal autonomy in doing so. In medical cases, doctors can choose to not perform a surgery based on their perception of what the patient's autonomy should be. Medical paternalism is fairly common in instances related to tubal ligation and similar procedures.

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Section 2: Medical paternalism is defined as follows: the act of a medical professional using their own judgement in cases where they determine that a patient's choices should not be honored, violating the patient's personal autonomy in doing so. In medical cases, doctors can choose to not perform a surgery based on their perception of what the patient's autonomy should be. Medical paternalism is fairly common in instances related to tubal ligation and similar procedures.

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Section 3: If a patient feels that they have been treated under the practice of medical paternalism by a doctor, they will have the right to pursue a lawsuit against said doctor, but not the hospital. If a doctor is found quilty of medical paternalism toward the patient, their medical license may be suspended or permanently taken way depending on the severity of the case.

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Section 4: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2019.

An Act Relating To the reduction of all nonviolent state crimes' prison sentences to 3 years or

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will reduce the prison sentences of all non-violent state crimes to 3 years or less. There is already an established means of determining what is or isn't a non-violent crime. The legal definition of a non-violent is a crime against persons or property that does not intentionally threaten, attempt, or actually inflict physical harm.

Section 2: Parole will function as usual; if a judge deems it appropriate they will provide parole for the prisoner within their sentence.

Section 3: Kentucky legislators will hold a meeting on December 1, 2018 in which the new sentence lengths will be determined based on the nature and magnitude of the crime. Lawmakers would also be allowed to include alternatives to prison time in the penalty; examples of these alternatives include: court-mandated therapy, rehabilitation, and/or community service. This meeting would be included in the legislators' predetermined annual salary.

Section 4: It has been proven that longer prison sentences have an increased likelihood of re-offense, according to a study by Washington State Institution for Public Policy. The study says that the length of a sentence for minimal chances of re-incarceration ranges from 1-3 years.

Section 5: Naturally, a judge can adjust the sentencing on a case to case basis, as long as it remains within the 3-year maximum. Although, if a judge makes a ruling that does not conform with this bill, said judge must prove that such ruling is necessary and unbias

Section 6: If enacted, the bill will take effect January 1, 2019. All court cases held before the enactment of this bill will use the unrevised sentence lengths.

An Act Relating To the Legalization of Marijuana in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky In the United States, nine states have legalized recreational marijuana, and thirty states have legalized the use if medical marijuana. Due to the legalization of marijuana, economy in the United States is expected to grow to \$24.5 billion by 2021. With the legalization of both recreational and medical marijuana in Kentucky, the state's economy will skyrocket. In 2014, two years after the Colorado legalized marijuana, Colorado received over \$76 million in revenues. In 2015, Colorado's total tax revenue increased to \$135 million. \$35 million of that revenue went towards Colorado's education system. Kentucky's economy will do the same with the legalization of marijuana.

Section 2: The Commonwealth's economy has the potential to boost with the repeal of Kentucky's controlled substance law, prohibiting the growing and selling of marijuana at no cost to the state. The Commonwealth will allow farmers and/or residents to obtain a permit at their cost of \$50-\$100 (possibly higher) to grow marijuana for sale. This could also generate revenue in the 100's if not millions of dollars for the state. Each county would be responsible for giving of permits. If a resident then wanted to sell the drug, they would also have to apply for another permit. This would only allow residents to sell up to certain grams as set forth by the Agriculture committee and this General Assembly.

Section 3: If residents do not abide by guidelines, the following will happen: 1st offense- fine of up to and not more than \$1000 2nd offense- double of fine, revocation of license of up to and not more than 6 months- 1 year 3rd offense- triple of fines, permanent revocation of license, and up to 2 years of jail time.

Section 4: This law will take effect 90 days after passage.

An Act Relating To Ensuring The Safety Of State And County Fair Attractions Within Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will ensure that fair rides are fully inspected each time before operation.

Section 2: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 247 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) All inspectors must carry a list of required safety procedures for each ride in order to ensure the safety of riders. (2) All county and state fair rides must be inspected each time they are re-assembled, to guarantee all passengers are safe.

Section 3: This bill will stop amusement attraction companies from operating any portable fair ride without the manufacturer's given inspection process performed by certified state or fair official inspectors before each session of use.

Section 4: Fair rides in Kentucky will not be eligible for operation if there are parts held together by: duct tape, glue, zip ties, or parts covered in paint to hide rust, decay, and or other harmful indents on ride.

Section 5: If the rides internal safety restraint system or computer software and hardware is tampered, disabled, or overridden the ride is not eligible to operate

Section 6: Fair attraction operators and operator assistants must be fully capable to answer any safety or attraction questions asked by state officials, riders, Kentucky Agriculture Officials, and qualified state inspectors.

Section 7: These inspections will be paid for by the ride company if they want to operate their attractions at the fairs.

An Act Relating To the state drinking age

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Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 244 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) Alcohol consumption shall be legal on private property for those over the age of 18. (2) All enforcement shall only be alerted by complaints or reports if any disturbances occur as a result. (3) All those over the age of 18 must have proper identification or enforcement may assume said people are not of legal age to consume alcoholic beverages. (4) If an alcohol level over .08 BAC is recorded, the offender is given a misdemeanor.

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Section 2: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

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Section 3: Violation of this bill will result in a misdemeanor. First time offenders shall receive a suspension of his or her driver's license for a period of up to 90 days and possibly a fine of up to \$250. On the account of multiple misdemeanors, the offender shall be required to go to alcohol counseling, in addition to the previously listed punishments.

Section 1: Kentucky is one of the highest top teen pregnancy sates in the nation. From latest data, Kentucky had around 4,000 teen pregnancies between the ages fifteen through eighteen.

Section 2: According to statistics, the states requiring Sex Education in their schools have the lowest teen pregnancy rates. At least 158,000,000.00 goes to teen pregnancy each year in this nation.

Section 3: In Kentucky over 67% of teens births are publicly funded by Kentucky taxpayers. This bill will ensure that students are taught not only about abstinence prevention of pregnancies, and sexually transmitted diseases, but also teach about different contraceptives available if a student does decide to become sexually active.

Section 4: Kentucky State Law KRS 156.501 does require a class based on "How decision-making relates to responsible sexual behavior, (abstinence, preventing pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases; but it does not require teaching about the types of contraceptives available to prevent pregnancies and diseases.

Section 1: To date in Kentucky, food stamp benefits cannot be used to buy any non-food item, such as, soaps, feminine products, diapers, and other hygienic necessities. These items help the physical well-being of the human race. Approximately fifteen percent of Kentucky's citizens rely on food stamps as a daily need.

Section 2: On average, the Kentuckian household includes a five person family. With the enactment of this bill, we would be able to provide an original amount of eight dollars per household with the addition of six dollars per each additional family member living in the house. This amount would ensure each member on food stamps at least the common human hygiene products needed for everyday life.

Section 3: Each head of household paying income tax would only be charged an additional 0.00051437 percent. For example, the average household income in Kentucky is \$46,659. With this enactment, annually only twenty-four dollars would be needed to help all our fellow citizens of Kentucky.

An Act Relating To Prohibition of Sexual Contact with Animals

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A new section of KRS chapter 258 is to read as follows: Every person found guilty of committing any act labeled 'sexual contact with an animal' (as defined in section 2) is guilty of a Class C felony.

Section 2: 'Sexual contact with an animal' is to be defined as when any person knowingly commits any of the following acts: (1) Engaging in sexual contact or sexual penetration with an animal, (2) Offering or accepting the offer of an animal for consideration with the intent that it be subject to sexual contact by a human, or (3) Photographing or filming or distributing such photographs or films, for the purpose of sexual arousal or gratification, of a person engaged in sexual contact with an animal.

Section 3: The defined 'sexual contact with an animal' will not apply to any instance of lawful and accepted practice related to veterinary medicine performed by a licensed veterinarian or a certified veterinary technician under guidance of a licensed veterinarian, any artificial insemination of animals for reproductive purposes, any accepted animal husbandry practices such as raising, breeding, or assisting with the birthing process of animals or any other practice that provides care for an animal, or to any generally accepted practices related to the judging og breed conformation.

Section 4: (1) Any authorized officer investigating a violation of this section has the right to seize an animal that has been used in the commission of an offence to protect the health or safety of the animal or the health or safety of others, and to obtain evidence of the offense. (2) Any animal seized pursuant to this subdivision shall be taken to a shelter facility or veterinary clinic to be examined by a veterinarian for evidence of sexual contact. (3) Upon conviction, any lawfully seized and impounded animals with respect to the violation shall be deemed forfeited and further transferred to the appropriate public entity for proper adoption or other disposition.

Section 5: In addition to a Class C felony, the guilty party will be required to register under the Kentucky Sex Offender Registry.

Section 6: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

Section 2: Companies creating MTR Solar Farms will henceforth be granted Tax Exempt status equivalent to that of a nonprofit organization as under KRS 141.040(1)(f) for the individual MTR Farms during their first 5 Years of operation

Section 3: Utility Companies utilizing this must register the solar farms with the state of Kentucky for purposes of monitoring for exploitation. Any registered farm found using the tax exempt status in an exploitative way will be revoked of their tax exempt status immediately and become ineligible for further operation within the Program

An Act to Ban Conversion Therapy for Minors in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This act will prohibit mental health or child care practitioners certified to counsel by the practitioner's CVC licensing or counseling board from performing conversion therapy on minors in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Conversion therapy, also termed reparative therapy, is defined by the American Psychological Association as 'counseling and psychotherapy aimed at eliminating or suppressing homosexuality,' declassified as a mental disorder since 1973.

Section 2: Approximately 20,000 LGBT youth between the ages of 13 and 17 will receive conversion therapy from a licensed practitioner before they reach 18. This bill will lower the number of LGBT youth in the United States subject to conversion therapy by prohibiting the practice in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 3: The act will be implemented by the Kentucky Department of Public Health, and any mental health or child care practitioner who engages in conversion therapy with a minor will be subject to a fine of \$500 for the first offense, will have their license suspended for six months for the second offense, and will have their license indefinitely suspended for the third offense.

Section 4: The Kentucky Department of Public Health will create specific regulations in response to this bill in order to ensure that individual licensing and certifying companies comply in suspending licenses.

Section 5: State funding for conversion therapy and for entities that allow or engage in conversion therapy will be prohibited.

Section 6: This bill will take effect on July 1, 2019.

An Act to Make Drug Testing Mandatory for KHSAA Sports

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: To negate the harmful impacts of high school athlete who use recreational or performance enhancing drugs, all KHSAA athletes must be drug tested once per season. Each school will be responsible for the enforcement of this policy.

Section 2: The State of Kentucky regional prevention centers will provide hair-sample testing kits to high schools wishing to participate in KHSAA sporting conferences and events. Schools will submit reports to the Kentucky Department of Health and Family Services verifying that testing protocols were properly implemented for each season .

Section 3: In the event that a school cannot verify that these tests were implemented, their programs will be barred from participation in KHSAA conferences, events, and matches for at least one year.

Section 4: A portion of revenue generated via ticket sales for KHSAA-sponsored events will be collected by the Kentucky Board of Education. These funds will be used to offset the cost of the hair-sample drug tests for high schools. In the event that an athlete tests positive for any of the prohibited substances, that athlete will be required to repay the KHSAA for the full cost of their test.

Section 5: If any athlete's drug test returns positive, KHSAA requires that the athlete not be allowed to compete in their sport until they can prove sobriety, and any further disciplinary action is in the jurisdiction of each specific school. This law will be enacted at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.

Section 1: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed

Section 2: All opioids are to be only distributed from pharmacies in strip packaging. This will allow those who were prescribed the drug to more easily notice if someone else is taking their pills and more easily show the recommended amount to prevent overdose. This will also give pharmacies the opportunity to provide a cash back incentive to return the pills, which may be redistributed.

Section 3: All opioids will be distributed from the pharmacy in strip packaging instead of pill bottles. The prescription information for the patient will be labeled on the box.

Section 4: This bill should cost little to nothing to implement, given that it only requires pharmacies to switch a portion of their prescription packaging to strip packaging.

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF THE KRS CHAPTER 186 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: There shall be a specialized driving program for citizens of the age of 65 years and older. An Act Relating To The Improvement of Kentucky Teacher Pensions

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Be enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky Throughout Kentucky, teachers have rallied for the newly-enacted teacher pension reforms to be stopped. The system enacted by the passing of Senate Bill 151 is generally not liked by the teacher community and by the community surrounding teachers. It is felt that benefits regarding pay and retirement have been cut short in and tensing up the relationship even more. Already, teachers have to give it their all in providing education to children while serving other roles like coaches, mentors, and even plain friends. Teachers are important, to say the least, and reverting back to the previous pension program, but with a few more added on parts to try and address the debt problem from the pension plan, is the way to go.

Section 2: Improving teacher pensions would require the system to revert back to its old state. Passing this bill would revert the overall teacher pension program back to its previous state, before the passing of Senate Bill 151, the pension reform bill. There has been a general consensus that the teachers deserve their benefits and a good retirement plan. After the passing of Senate Bill 151, most believe that it is not for the better.

Section 3: Raising the income tax would compensate for the cost of reverting back to the previous system. Raising the income tax from 5% to 7% would compensate for the costs of the pension program and even begin to cut into the amount of debt that has been accumulated from the pension program before this.

Section 4: An incentive system could potentially be added to reward teachers. This incentive system would consist of two different options recurring every 8 years for the entirety of their teaching career. At the conclusion of each of these 8 year intervals, teachers would be given a choice between an 'instant incentive' or a percentage pay raise based on their individual needs. Exact formulas for pay will be provided in our visual representation.

Section 5: The expenses of this bill would be a basic 401k and incentive program stated in section IV. The income of money comes from the certain situations of not using specific parts of the incentive program and the raw increase of taxes in order to dig into the d

An Act Relating To Repealing the Pink Tax

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Prohibition on Gender-Based Pricing of Consumer Products and Services. (a) Consumer Products 'It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale in Kentucky commerce any two consumer products from the same manufacturer that are substantially similar if such products are priced differently based on the gender of the individuals for whose use the products are intended or marketed. (b) Services 'It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any services that are substantially similar if such services are priced differently based on the gender of the individuals for which the services are performed, offered, or marketed.

Section 2: Unfair And Deceptive Act Or Practice. Violation of Section (1) shall be treated as a violation of a rule prescribed under the Kentucky Consumer Protection Act (KCPA), which protects Kentucky's citizens from "unfair, false, misleading or deceptive acts or practices in trade or commerce."

Section 3: Enforcement. (a) Civil Action `In any case in which the state attorney general has reason to believe that an interest of the residents of the Commonwealth of Kentucky have been or are adversely affected by a violation of Section (1), the attorney general may bring a civil action on behalf of the residents of the Commonwealth in an appropriate circuit court of the Commonwealth of Kentucky `(i) to enjoin further violation of this Act by the defendant; (ii) to compel compliance with this Act; or (iii) obtain damages, restitution, or other compensation on behalf of residents of the Commonwealth.

Section 4: Rules Of Construction. (a) Substantially Similar Products. `For purposes of this Act, two consumer products are substantially similar if there are no substantial differences in the materials used in the product, the intended uses of the product, and the functional design and features of the product. A difference in coloring among any consumer products shall not be construed as a substantial difference for purposes of this paragraph. (b) Substantially Similar Services. `For purposes of this Act, two services are substantially similar if there is no substantial difference in the amount of time to provide the services, the difficulty in providing the services, or the cost of providing the services. (c) Definition Of Consumer Product. The term `consumer product' has the meaning given such term in section 3 of the Consumer Product Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2052) and includes a device or cosmetics, as such terms are defined in section 201 of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C. 321).

An Act Relating To Abolishing Corporal Punishment In All Schools

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: In the 2015-2016 school year, 517 incidents of corporal punishment were reported in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. 334 incidents were reported in the 2016-2017 school year.

Section 2: In the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 17 school districts in the 2016-2017 school year used corporal punishment as a means of discipline.

Section 3: This bill seeks to overturn KRS 161.180, 503.110, which states that corporal punishment is justifiable to 'maintain reasonable discipline in a school [or] class,' but is deemed unjustifiable if there is 'substantial risk of causing death, serious physical injury, disfigurement, extreme pain, or extreme mental distress.'

Section 4: By overturning KSR 161.180, 503.110, this bill will require the Kentucky Board of Education to devise regulations preventing corporal punishment. The regulations would be enforced in every school district in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 5: Once the regulations have been drafted, the Kentucky Board of Education must assist each local board with implementation.

Section 6: In the circumstance that corporal punishment continues, students are granted the right to a personal injury lawsuit, including battery and assault.

Section 7: Upon its passage, this bill will be implemented prior to the 2019-2020 school year.

Section 1: Railroad inspectors shall assess railroad crossings for the presence of any major visual impairments. If an inspector deems a railroad crossing to contain such impairments, an active warning sign must be installed by the railroad company. Regardless whether or not passive signals are already in place, if the crossing is considered unsafe, active signs are now mandatory.

Section 2: If the railroad is not in compliance with this regulation after two years, the railroad company will be fined \$1,000. (1) Beginning on July 1, 2018, to graduate from a Kentucky public high school with a regular diploma, a student shall pass a civics test composed of one hundred (100) questions are drawn from those that are set forth within the civics test administered by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services to persons seeking to become naturalized citizens. (2) A local board of education shall prepare or approve a test composed of the questions described in subsection (3) of this section and shall disseminate the test to all public high schools of the district. The test shall be administered by the public high schools in each district. (4) A public high school shall provide each student with the opportunity to take the test as many times as necessary for the student to pass the test. A student shall not receive a regular high school diploma until the student passes the test. (5) A student passes the test if at least sixty percent (60%) of the questions are answered correctly. (6) A student who has passed a similar test within the previous five (5) years shall not be required to take the test under this section. (7) Provisions of this section shall be subject to the requirements and accommodations of a student's individualized education program as defined in KRS 158.281 or a Section 504 Plan as defined in KRS 156.027.

An act to designate the first weekend in August as tax-free on all school supplies

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A new section of KRS Chapter 139 shall be created to read as follows: A tax-free weekend is a tax holiday sale directed by the Department of Revenue. The tax-free weekend will be instated for the first weekend in August, starting Friday at 12:00 am and ending Sunday at 11:59 pm.

Section 2: This bill will eliminate a tax on school supplies. School supplies are items commonly used by a student for educational purposes. Tax-free items include purchases of computers and computer accessories under \$2,500 and school and art supplies under \$200. Articles of clothing shall be considered incidental to education because it is an extra cost for families at the start of the school year. Therefore, clothing under \$300 shall be purchased tax-free during this weekend.

Section 3: During the tax-free weekend, any customers wishing to place an order for any out-of-stock item may do so and purchase the item tax-free. However, an item placed on lay-a-way must be purchased with tax during this weekend.

Section 4: This bill will be enacted for the Commonwealth of Kentucky by July of 2019.

AN ACT to require each city police department in the Commonwealth of Kentucky to have a special unit dedicated to cyber crime investigation for both minors and adults.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A new section of KRS Chapter 95 shall be created to read as follows: All police departments in the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall be required to have a special unit dedicated to cybercrime investigation for both minors and adults. Police officer training will consist of the following: how to complete a mobile device examination, how to complete a laptop examination, and how to use cyber examination equipment, hardware, and software. The training will instruct police officers on conducting cyber investigations and examining digital evidence. Each police station will be equipped with a Cyber Crime Unit lab, with appropriate hardware and software. Police departments are required to perform ongoing hardware and software maintenance and support, as well as upgrades. The cost of hardware and software updates will be included in the initial expenditure contract with costs to be determined.

Section 2: Funding for training and equipment will come from an annual \$1000 licensing fee imposed on adult stores/establishment in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 3: For the purposes of this Bill, an adult store/establishment shall be defined as: (1) Any commercial establishment which has a significant or substantial portion of its stock-in-trade or derives a significant or substantial portion of its revenue or devotes a significant or substantial portion of its interior business or advertising, or maintains a substantial section of its sales or display space, for the sale or rental, for any form of consideration, of any one or more of the following: Books, magazines, periodicals, or any other printed matter, photographs, films, motion pictures, video cassettes, compact discs, or slides, or other visual representations which are characterized by their emphasis on the exhibition of or description of the sexual activity or specified anatomical areas. Instruments, devices or paraphernalia which are designed for use or marketed for specifically the stimulation of specified anatomical areas or for other sexual activity. (2) Any commercial establishment that provides performers who take off their clothes.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect by July of 2019 and Police Departments should be in compliance by December 2019.

An Act to provide all School Resource Officers with body cameras.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: There are approximately 230 SROs (School Resource Officers) in the state of Kentucky. This figure is of the just over half of the counties in Kentucky. The rest have either an unknown number, or have none at all. However, for the ones with SROs, body cameras will be provided. The reason body cameras should be used on school resource officers is, they are the main people to stop fights, and any outside threats to the students and staff. If an incident occurs, they respond. If a student involved in a fight uses the claim of excessive force, the body camera will be able to capture the incident before and during the ceasing of the violence. That video will provide useful evidence for or against the claim. This will ensure justice is served properly as well.

Section 2: The total estimated purchase price for all 230 body cameras is \$34,500 (estimated cost is per unit at \$150). This will be funded by the local law enforcement agency. This is because, if the SRO were to be reassigned to a new position within the agency, they would keep the camera along with the rest of their gear they carry.

Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the KCSS (Kentucky Center for School Safety) and go into effect at the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year.

An Act Relating To Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarships (KEES)

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This act will amend KRS 164.7879 to create a supplemental award for community service hours attained by the date of graduation from high school.

Section 2: The amount of the supplemental award shall be determined by assigning the value of \$10 for achieving an hour of community service.

Section 3: Beginning with the 2020-2021 academic year, high school students can submit a maximum of 10 hours of community service per semester. A KEES-eligible student who has achieved 20 hours of community service each academic year of high school would earn an additional \$200 for each year of college. A high school graduate would receive a maximum service scholarship of \$800 for each year of college to be used for a maximum of four years.

Section 4: The community service hours for the fall semester should be submitted by December 30. The community service hours for the spring semester should be submitted by May 30 for each year of high school. Students will report service hours to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority.

Section 5: If enacted, this act will go into effect on July 1, 2020.

An Act Relating To Allow Kentucky Teens with a Single Parent to Apply for a Driver's License Six Month Early

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will allow for all children of a single parent or of a single legal guardian to take their driver's test and receive their learner's permit six months before they turn 16. Any person who receives their license six months early will be required to have their learner's permit for six months and be required to meet the 60 hours of driving before they can take their road test. This bill will help single parents and their children, who may have school activities or work that they must drive to. The recipient will be able to apply for their full license after having their restricted for one year. The legal guardian must provide proof that they are the only legal guardian of the child. The legal guardian must also sign a form that gives their child permission to take their test early. The recipient's license will have a special mark on it to signify that it is legal for them to have their permit early. They will receive the same sticker when they receive their restricted license as a person who receives their license at the usual age. They will have the same restrictions as usual when they have their restricted license.

Section 2: This bill will have no cost.

Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Highway Safety. All laws or parts of laws that are in conflict with this bill are hereby repealed.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect six months after passage and signature of the Governor.

An Act Relating To Allowing Open Primary Elections

Section 1: According to KRS 118.015 a voter may only vote if they are registered as what is defined as a political party. KRS 118.015 defines a political party as "an affiliation or organization of electors representing a political policy and having a constituted authority for its government and regulation, and whose candidate received at least twenty percent (20%) of the total vote cast at the last preceding election at which presidential electors were voted for." Under this definition, independent voters are uneligible to cast a vote in primary elections.

Section 2: This bill requires that all citizens eligible to vote in the general election be granted the right to vote as well in the primary election. This includes those not registered as democrat or republican.

Section 3: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2019.

An Act Relating To The Abolition of Dry Counties

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The Twenty First Amendment of the United States Constitution repealed the Eighteenth Amendment which outlawed alcohol. This amendment was ratified in 1933 (85 Years Ago), and ever since then, purchase of alcohol has been legalized nationally.

 Section 2: Despite the Twenty-first amendment, 20 counties in the state of Kentucky still prohibit the sale of alcohol outright. These are called 'Dry Counties'. In these countries, criminal brewing, smuggling, possession of, and distribution of alcohol has become a significant issue. This issue has resulted in organized crime, and illegal smuggling through private places such as colleges, fraternities, VFWs (Veterans of Foreign Wars), and much more.

Section 3: Most dry counties in Kentucky are connected to wet counties, making the existence of these dry countries expensive (due to the legal prosecution of these 'criminals'), dangerous and frankly useless. Legalization of Alcohol has economic benefits and reduces stigma against alcoholics. That all smuggled alcohol is non taxable, and secret brewing of alcohol (Such as Beer or Moonshine) can be dangerous. This abolition makes alcohol non-regulated in dry counties and hurts the government and distributors economically.

Section 4: Dry Counties are hereby abolished in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Alcohol is hereby legalized in every county in Kentucky and is now legal for all persons above the age of 21.

Section 5: Possession of Alcohol in any increments is also legal above the age of 21. Police enforced alcohol raids are no-longer needed. Moonshine laws shall remain though. This bill also now allowed alcoholics to seek help in time of addiction. This bill will no taffect short-term bans, collegiate dry campuses, and the prohibition of alcohol in government buildings. This will also not affect rules enacted by employers or schools.

An Act Relating To the screening of student athletes for Cardiac Anomalies

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: All student athletes that participate in KHSAA sanctioned sports must be required to receive basic ECG testing in addition to their already mandatory sports physical. An ECG (electrocardiogram) records the electrical activity of your heart at rest. ECG tests are important to identify electrical abnormalities as well as structural anomalies that may be present in an unsuspecting athlete. Underlying issues that may be present such as hypertension or cardiac chest pain/ pressure could possibly cause major issues or be lethal with high intensive exercise. Physicians around the state of Kentucky are willing to take part in this movement by providing this service at no cost to the athlete. If physician based support cannot be consistently secured for ECG screening, a \$10 fee will be proposed in addition to the student required insurance fee to cover the screening for the electrocardiogram (ECG) .

Section 2: If the athlete does not take the required ECG, they will not be able to participate in any KHSAA sanctioned sport. If the athlete does not pass the ECG, then further testing will be completed to determine the cause of the abnormality.

Section 3: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2019.

An Act Relating to overturning Kentucky Revised Statute 510.100

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Kentucky Revised Statute 510.10 reads, `[a] person is guilty of sodomy in the fourth degree when he engages in deviate sexual intercourse with another person of the same sex.' It later goes onto declare that the typical exemption due to consent given by Kentucky Revised Statute 510.020 is of none effect here and classifies this activity as a Class A Misdemeanor punishable by incarceration. Effectively, the law restricts the activities of mutually consenting adults from having a sexual relationship.

Section 2: This statute is inconsistent with the Kentucky Constitution sections 1 and 2, namely the guarantee of an individual's right to, `...seek[] and pursu[e] their happiness...' in section 1 and the denial of, `Absolute and arbitrary power over the lives, liberty and property of freemen" in section 2. This law, and others like it, have already been found inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States of America and declared unconstitutional by Lawrence v. Texas on the grounds of the 14th amendment.

Section 3: This statute and others like it have historically been used to discriminate against LGBT persons. Despite the actions of Lawrence v. Texas rendering this statue and others like it unenforceable, these statutes continue to be used in that fashion today as seen with an arrest due to similar laws in Louisiana. So long as the law remains on the books, it poses a danger to the liberties of every citizen and engrains discrimination in our government. Given this precedent, it is imperative that this statute be overturned to the ends of limiting governmental abuse, protecting the rights of the citizen as enshrined in our founding documents, and protecting a vulnerable class of people from unjustifiable abuse.

Section 4: There will be no funds resulting from the passing of this bill.

Section 5: This bill will become law July 1st, 2019.

An Act Relating To the Implementation of Open Carry of Deadly Weapons (OCDW) Permits in the State of Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Open carry is defined as the carrying of a firearm in public without concealment of any kind. Open Carry of Deadly Weapon (OCDW) permits will allow the individual to carry a firearm as specified within areas that allow carriage of firearms. Open carry will be prohibited in the same areas that concealed carry is prohibited.

Section 2: Individuals who are eligible to submit an OCDW permit will be the same as those who qualify for a Concealed Carry of Deadly Weapons (CCDW) license. To submit an application for open carrying, one will need to send proof of completion of a concealed carry instructions class of their choice, a background check completed by their local sheriff's office, a proof of residency, and submit a letter stating the reasoning for wanting an open carry permit.

Section 3: The applications will be reviewed by the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet. OCDW permits will be awarded to Kentucky citizens with a clean background check, a comprehensive concealed class education, and a letter of fair reasoning. Fair reasoning will be decided by the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet.

- Section 4: OCDW permits will cost \$75 in addition to the costs of background check and concealed carry class.
- Section 5: An open carry permit will only allow open carry of handguns.
- Section 6: An open carry permit will only allow open carry of handguns.
- Section 7: The gun can be loaded during carry with a maximum of five rounds in the firearm.

Section 8: OCDW permits must be renewed annually. Renewals will be completed through the local sheriff's office. A fine of \$40 will be issued to the individual for not renewing the permit prior to or on the expiration date when found open carrying a firearm. Each su

Section 9: Those who already own firearms and wish to open carry will also go through the OCDW permit process. If an individual is found using open carry without a permit, a fine of \$100 will be issued. Those utilizing open carry for the purpose of hunting/sport wil

Section 2: Adults (persons of or above 18 years of age) who desire to end their life must go through a 3 day review process administered and formulated by a licensed psychiatrist to determine if they are suffering from mental illness. If it is determined that the patient is certain of their decision and not suffering from mental illness, the patient may be assigned a physician (unless the patient has selected a willing preferred physician) by whatever institution they are being treated by with the purpose of ending the patients' life.

Section 3: Adults (persons of or above 18 years of age) who desire to end their life must go through a 3 day review process administered and formulated by a licensed psychiatrist to determine if they are suffering from mental illness. If it is determined that the patient is certain of their decision and not suffering from mental illness, the patient may be assigned a physician (unless the patient has selected a willing preferred physician) by whatever institution they are being treated by with the purpose of ending the patients' life.

Section 4: All medical fees shall be paid by the patient as would any other medical fee.

An Act Relating To Requiring All Kentucky Stores To Include Recycling Bin For Plastic Bags

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Every year, 8 million metric tons of plastic end up in oceans, and over 100 million marine animals suffer deaths as a result. This bill will enact a law that will require all Kentucky stores to offer containers for customers to put their excess plastic bags in, which must then be recycled by the store. If the business fails to do so they will not receive their business permit for the year.

Section 2: This bill will be enforced by the government jurisdiction that enables businesses to receive their permit to operate. The penalties for a store not following this law will be as follows: 1st offense- warning and 2 weeks to place a container in their store. 2nd offense- \$250 fine and 1 week to place a container in their store. 3rd offense- The business will not receive their business permit for the year.

Section 3: This bill, if enacted, will go into effect 6 months after passage. The business owner will have six months to install/provide recycling bins/containers/storage for returned plastic bags. The business owner will be required to show proof of implementation by the end of the next six month period.

An Act Relating To the Prevention of Animal Abuse in Kentucky

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Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to improve and amend current Kentucky laws regarding animal abuse and the punishments involved for breaking the new laws.

Section 2: Veterinarians who suspect animal abuse will be allowed to report this to their local animal control agency for them to investigate.

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Section 3: People convicted of animal abuse will be fined a minimum of \$1,000 and the charge of animal abuse will be raised from a Class A Misdemeanor to a Class D Felony, prompting at least one year of mandatory imprisonment. The abused animal(s) in question will also be surrendered through a legal written statement to ensure that the animal(s) do not return to the abusive situation and owner when the criminal case is over.

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Section 4: When adopting or purchasing animals in the future, people will go through a background check to see if they have any past history of animal abuse. If they were charged for animal abuse in the past 5 years, including the mandatory one year spent in prison, they're restricted from adopting/purchasing an animal.

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Section 5: This bill won't cost anything as the new legislation and adjusted punishments that doesn't require funding can be easily put into place.

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Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2019.

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Section 7: All Kentucky laws and acts that conflict with this law are hereby void if this law passes due to the importance of protecting animals because they're unable to protect themselves.

An Act Relating To Establish Open Primaries in Kentucky

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 118 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS (1) All primary elections in Kentucky shall be open to people of all political parties.

An Act Relating To Sexual Education in Public Schools

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: All public high schools would be required to teach methods of safe-sex, rather than teaching abstinence-only based classes. This includes discussions about consent and how to use protection. Parents would not be able to get their child out of sex education classes.

Section 2: All public schools would be required to include information specific to same-sex couples. The proctors need to use factual information from Planned Parenthood and cannot include personal comments based off their political and/or religious beliefs. At the end of the course every student would take an anonymous online survey and would be asked a series of questions on how the proctor taught the information. Each school would hold the class in the way they had previously done, usually in health class. Not every teacher would be required to teach, but every student would be taught.

Section 3: All public school teachers would be required to go to to an informational seminar every two years and given all the facts regarding STI's, safe sex, same-sex intercourse, and consent. Teachers would be compensated for the seminar. The funds would come from tobacco taxes.

Section 4: This bill would be in effect by in the beginning of the 2020 school year.

An Act Relating To Eradicate the Chains of Welfare and Institute a Most Glorious Negative Income Tax System

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Recognizing the need for urgent welfare reform under a flawed system, this bill proposes to replace the state income tax with a negative income tax (NIT). The revenue generated by this NIT would replace our current welfare state (excluding healthcare). In essence, this system of taxation grants more monetary freedom to the lower classes while still receiving what is necessary for daily life and also lifts economic burdens on the upper class. The NIT is a system where all citizens pay a minimum of \$1000 in taxes to the government. Every time the annual income of a household doubles, the tax will increase by \$1000. For example a family with an income of \$100,000 would pay \$3,000. Those below the federal poverty line of \$25,000 will receive half of the difference between their income and the poverty line in addition to the \$1200. For example a family with an annual income of \$10,000 would receive \$5,000 from the government making their new annual income \$15,000. Also anyone making less than \$2,000 above the poverty line will be refunded half the difference. For example, a family with an income of \$27,000 would pay the \$1,000, but then be refunded \$500 to ensure those earning a higher wage will still make more. With 4.4 million citizens adhering to a NIT, the 290,000 on welfare currently will be easily provided for.

Section 2: The current welfare system provides its recipients with what are called 'in-kind benefits.' Instead of straight monetary transfers, the government hands out food stamps, housing vouchers, etc. This type of system assumes the government knows what these recipients need to buy and restricts their freedom and autonomy to do so. If welfare recipients were able to choose to buy what they need most with the money generated by the NIT, more would be lifted out of poverty.

Section 3: The NIT would bring about many positive changes for Kentucky. First would be income for all citizens of at least \$12,500. However, it also encourages workers to climb the economic ladder seeing as the higher wage earner will always end up with a higher income. The current welfare system does not provide as much incentive to shed welfare benefits, so hard work is better rewarded under this system.

Section 4: This bill grants much more economic freedom to the upper classes as taxes would be lowered across the board. According the Department of Revenue's 2016 report, the individual income tax generated 4.28 billion dollars of revenue. With federal aid, the NIT from citizens, and other taxes currently in place, Kentucky could pay for this new welfare system with funds to spare.

- Section 5: This bill would also eliminate unnecessary government spending on an extremely complicated tax system.
- Section 6: The passing of this would see economic growth as people move to Kentucky for the low NIT rate. This also leaves the upper class more money to spend, also spurring economic growth.
- Section 7: The only cost of this bill would be what it takes to replace the state income tax with a negative one

An Act Relating To Reducing the Income Tax of Laborers Under the Age of Eighteen

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Income tax is the percentage of any laborers wage payed by firm that is removed as a tax payment to the state government.

Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to limit the amount of money removed from the wage of workers under the age of eighteen. This will be accomplished by reducing the current income tax of Kentucky from 5% to 2% income. This will aid in supporting the young workers of the economy of Kentucky and account for lack of voice in government.

Section 3: The national legal voting age is eighteen while the legal age to begin working in firms comes two years earlier at sixteen. This means that you must go two years working before you are able to have representation in government. The current assumption made is youth under the age of eighteen are represented in government by their guardians. While some youth may have the same political views as their guardians, this does not apply to all and leads to millions not having a voice.

Section 4: A base salary of \$10,000 a year has an income tax of \$500 dollars a year. With this new bill in place that amount removed from salary will be reduced by more than half, now being \$200. The change in income taken allows for young students to have more flexibility and support for college funds and the purchase of a car or other fundamental expenses.

Section 5: This bill will have minimal effect on the economy of Kentucky seeing that most laborers making larger wages exceed the age of eighteen. This bill will greatly aid the young workers of Kentucky and decrease the chances of poverty going into adulthood.

Section 1: Presently, the only time a person in Kentucky is asked to become an organ donor is when they obtain a Kentucky Driver's license or have their driver's license renewed, which is every 4 years. This bill proposes that an option to become an organ donor be provided on the applications for purchasing or renewing a Hunting and or Fishing license.

Section 2: Hunting, fishing, boating and wildlife watching generate an estimated \$5.9 billion to Kentucky's economy each year. This includes hunting licenses, fishing licenses, combination hunting/fishing licenses, senior and disabled sportsman's licenses and joint fishing licenses for spouses.

Section 3: This bill pertains to all Kentuckians over the age of 18 purchasing a Kentucky Hunting and Fishing License.

Section 4: During the application process, the question "Would you like to become an organ donor" will be asked. The applicant can choose 'Yes' or 'No' to the question. If an applicant chooses 'Yes' to the answer, their information will be entered into the Organ Donor Registry.

Section 5: This bill is cost free to our state and taxpayers. The purpose is also not to increase our revenue, it's purpose is to help save a life or lives.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect in March 2019.

An Act Relating To the legalization of physician-assisted death (PAD), or euthanasia, in the state of Kentucky.

Section 1: This bill will establish a law to aid those who are in a constant state of physical pain and suffering to choose to end their own lives with dignity and respect with medical assistance.

Section 2: The patient must meet qualifications listed below and his or her choice must be approved by the his or her physician.

Section 3: he patient must meet these guidelines: Must be determined terminally ill and in a state of constant pain, both physical and psychological. Must be considered legally insane and aware of their actions by a psychiatrist/psychologist. Must be over the age of 21. Must maintain a 4 week waiting period after being cleared by medical professionals.

An Act Relating To Requiring All Public Schools to Improve Safety Precautions

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: An act to require all schools in the state of Kentucky to improve safety precautions in order to attempt to lessen school violence and ensure that schools are considered a safe place. With this bill, teachers and administrators will be required to scan students and their belongings before entering the school building.

Section 2: Each school will be required to have at least one scanner per 200 students. The cost of the scanners will come from the General Fund Account in each public school district.

Section 3: This bill will go into effect by December of the following school year. Public school districts that fail to obtain one scanner per 200 students by the December deadline will be given a warning and be required to to rectify the situation within one month. If after the one month the school district fails to meet the requirements, the Kentucky Department of Education will be notified and collaborate with the school district to development a plan in order to ensure the law is being followed.

An Act Relating To amend KRS 17.545 to prohibit a convicted sex offender from residing near their victim

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: According to the CDC, 1 in 3 females (36.3%) and 1 in 6 males (17.1%) in the United States have experienced some kind of sexual violence; while 19.1% of females and 1.5% of males have been a victim of attempted rape and/or rape. (2017) Currently, the state of Kentucky lacks rights for the victim, we propose an amendment to KRS 17.545 to prohibit convicted sex offenders from living within one thousand (1,000) feet of their victim(s). As the law reads now, a convicted sex offender can live right next door to the person(s) that they victimized. On January 10, 2018, our Senate passed Marsy's Law with the hope that victims' rights could be gained in the state of Kentucky; our amendment would be an additional piece of legislation that would support a victim of sexual violence.

Section 2: KRS 17.545 currently states 'No registrant, as defined in KRS 17.500, shall reside within one thousand (1,000) feet of a high school, middle school, elementary school, preschool, publicly owned playground, or licensed day care facility. The measurement shall be taken in a straight line from the nearest property line of the school to the nearest property line of the registrant's place of residence.' We propose this law to be amended to say 'No registrant, as defined in KRS 17.500, shall reside within one thousand (1,000) feet of a high school, middle school, elementary school, preschool, publicly owned playground, licensed day care facility, or victims residence. The measurement shall be taken in a straight line from the nearest property line of the school to the nearest property line of the registrant's place of residence.'

Section 3: KRS 17.545 'Any registrant residing within one thousand (1,000) feet of a high school, middle school, elementary school, preschool, publicly owned playground, licensed day care facility, [or victims residence] on July 12, 2006, shall move and comply with this section within ninety(90) days of July 12, 2006, and thereafter, shall be subject to the penalties set forth under subsection of this section.' (5) Any person who violates subsection (1) of this section shall be guilty of: (a) A Class A misdemeanor for a first offense; and (b) A Class D felony for the second and each subsequent offense.

Section 4: Amending KRS 17.545 will not cost anything to the state of Kentucky.

Section 5: This law will take affect 90 Days after passage, so that current sex offenders will have ample time to move if necessary and to stay in compliance.
