An Act Relating To mandated training when purchasing aggressive dog breeds in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill applies to purchasers of aggressive dogs.

Section 2: Animals can be aggressive when they are put in unsuitable living conditions. Many people see a dog and buy it without considering the needs of the dog as they age. When the dog matures if it is not trained and socialised it can become aggressive. If not properly taken care of these dogs will become a liability to the owner and a danger to their neighbors. People who buy these animals must have the knowledge to appropriately train them how to behave with humans and other dogs. This bill will require that all who want to own a dog deemed potentially dangerous and aggressive meet a certain criteria in training and handling experience before being eligible to purchase or adopt one.

Section 3: This bill will not require any additional funding.

Section 4: This bill will take place all throughout kentucky and will require those who want to own a dog deemed aggressive to take a state mandated breed specific certification test.

Section 5: This bill will be enforced at all shelters and with breeders of aggressive dogs.

An Act Relating To providing feminine hygiene products in schools and publicly owned places through HAPPY.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require all Kentucky public schools and government-owned establishments to provide basic feminine hygiene products in all women's and family bathrooms at no cost to the women through the HAPPY (Hygiene Availability Provision Program for Youth).

Section 2: The products will come at a cost; however, the money to buy them will come from the preexisting sales tax on feminine hygiene products.

Section 3: One in five girls in the U.S. will miss school because of inadequate access to feminine hygiene supplies. This bill will allow all females access to these products at school, eliminating a potential barrier to their education and further closing the opportunity gap.

Section 4: Illinois recently passed a law similar to this. Their law states that "Feminine hygiene products are a health care necessity and not an item that can be foregone or substituted easily."

We will be mimicking this law and adding to the benefits by creating greater public access not only in schools but also other publicly owned buildings, such as libraries, government offices, and police stations.

An Act Relating To Raising the Legal Age of Marriage in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently in Kentucky, there is not a legal minimum age to get married. This means that 15 year-olds can get married before they even graduate high school. However, this bill will raise the legal age to get married to 18 years old to minimize the divorce rate for younger people.

Section 2: As of 2015, Kentuckians have divorced at a rate of 3,700 people each year. According to our research, 'In the United States today, thousands of children under 18 have recently taken marital vows- mostly girls married to adult men, often with approval from local judges.' Some of this comes from people getting married at young ages, and not wanting to end up together. One way that we can put a stop to this is by raising the legal age to get married.

Section 3: The Kentucky judicial court system will enforce this law to ensure that it is not broken. If it is broken, that would result in a \$500 fine.

Section 1: 15-year old Davey Albright, a graduate of St. Margaret Mary School, died in August 2018 in Louisville after being swept away by flash flooding into a nearby drain pipe that was not covered by a grate. Just a few weeks later, an 8-year old boy in Morehead KY died in a similar fashion.

Section 2: Currently in Kentucky, some pipes do have metal grates, but most do not. There are no laws requiring grates be placed on certain sized pipes.

Section 3: The metal grates would be placed on drain pipes that are large enough for an average size human to fit in and within 100 feet of residential areas and schools.

Section 4: The grates cost on average approximately \$1,500. The funds to cover the cost will come from a slight raise in taxes for every taxpayer in the state. The department in every city and individual neighborhood will be responsible for installing and maintaining the grates. The grounds-keeping/maintenance department in each area will also be responsible for periodically removing debris that accumulates around the grate. This will allow the water to still flow freely.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2020.

An Act Relating To The Reduction of Animal Abuse in Kentucky

3 Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: According to American Veterinarian, Kentucky is ranked number 50 as the worst state for animal abuse in the United States of America in 2018. This bill will require criminal background checks before a person can adopt a pet in the State of Kentucky and modify existing animal abuse statutes and penalties as found in KRS 525.125-135 and KRS 436.600-610.

Section 2: Shelters will complete Kentucky State background checks online. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) charges \$25 to run an online background check in Kentucky. The person adopting the animal will have to pay their own background check fee. The fees will go to the general fund to animal shelters in Kentucky.

Section 3: The Animal Abuse Advisory Board will conduct yearly audits of animal shelters in Kentucky to make sure background checks are completed.

Section 4: Failure to comply with the law from the shelters will result in fines of up to \$1,000 per occurrence. Modification of KRS 525.125 - 135; KRS 436.600 - 610 would change any violation to be a Class D Felony in Kentucky. First Offence - \$1,000-\$10,000 dollar fine Second Offence - \$10,000 dollar fine Third Offence - 1-5 years in jail

Section 5: There is no cost to the state of Kentucky as the costs for criminal background checks will be paid by the individuals adopting an animal.

An Act Relating To Drug Testing Individuals Who Are Unemployed To Receive Public Welfare

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE ANNUAL YOUTH LEGISLATURE OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 205 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) Drug tests shall be administered to all public welfare recipients three times a year at a random time. (2) If a public welfare recipient tests positive for an illegal substance, they will continue to receive welfare benefits until they become a level three offender.

Section 2: If a public welfare recipient tests positive for an illegal substance, they will be assigned a caseworker in a behavior modification program. The caseworker will evaluate the offender, the offender will be placed in one of three categories. A level one offender will be ordered to submit to a follow up drug test thirty days after the initial drug test. If they pass the drug test, benefits will continue. If they do not pass the drug test, they will be reclassified as a level two offender. Level two offenders will be tested every month for a period of six months. If they have a positive result during this time, they will be reclassified as a level three offender. Level three offenders that are deemed to have a serious drug problem will be required to attend a drug rehabilitation program

Section 3: The costs for these drug tests is estimated to be nearly \$8,000,000. The savings will come from welfare money that will not be supplied to people who test positive

Section 4: Any statue contrary to this act shall be amended or repealed.

Section 1: Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky KRS 525.130 is amended to read as follows: 525.130 Cruelty to animals in the second degree A person is guilty of cruelty to animals in the second degree when except as authorized by law he intentionally or wantonly: (a) overdrives, overloads, drives when overloaded, overworks, tortures, torments, deprives of necessary sustenance, cruelly beats, mutilates or kills an animal, or causes or procures an animal to be overdriven, overloaded, driven when overloaded, overworked, tortured, tormented, deprived of necessary sustenance, cruelly beaten, mutilated or killed; and whoever uses in a cruel or inhuman manner in a race, game, or contest, or in training therefor, as lure or bait a live animal, except an animal if used as lure or bait in fishing; and whoever, having the charge or custody of an animal, either as owner or otherwise, inflicts unnecessary cruelty upon it, or unnecessarily fails to provide it with proper food, drink, shelter, sanitary environment, or protection from the weather, and whoever, as owner, possessor, or person having the charge or custody of an animal, cruelly drives or works it when unfit for labor, or willfully abandons it, or carries it or causes it to be carried in an unnecessarily cruel or inhuman manner or in a way and manner which might endanger the animal carried thereon, or knowingly and willfully authorizes or permits it to be subjected to unnecessary torture, suffering or cruelty of any kind.

Section 2: Nothing in this section shall apply to the killing of animals: (a) Pursuant to a license to hunt, fish, or trap; (b) Incident to the processing as food or for other commercial purposes; (c) For humane purposes; (d) For veterinary, agricultural, spaying or neutering purposes; (e) For bona fide animal research activities of institutions of higher education; or a business entity registered with the United States Department of Agriculture under the Animal Welfare Act or subject to other federal laws governing animal research; (f) In defense of self of another person against an aggressive or diseased animal; (g) In defense of a domestic animal against an aggressive or diseased animal; (h) For animal or pest control; or (i) For any other purpose authorized by law.

Section 3: Activities of animals engaged in hunting, field trials, dog training other than training a dog to fight for pleasure or profit, and other activities authorized either by a hunting license or by the Department of Fish and Wildlife shall not constitute a violation of this section.

Section 4: Cruelty to animals in the second degree is a Class A misdemeanor.

Section 5: If a person is convicted of or pleads guilty to an offense under subsection (1) of this section arising from the person's treatment of an equine, the court may impose one (1) or both of the following penalties against the person, in addition to fines and

An Act Relating To Carbon Dioxide fire extinguishers in every classroom in Kentucky's public schools

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require every classroom in Kentucky to have a Carbon Dioxide fire extinguisher in the room.

Section 2: Kentucky has had four mass shootings, resulting in nineteen (19) deaths and twenty-five (25) injured, not including other shootings such as the one in Sandy Hook. With this bill, teachers will have a form of defense rather than a gun, which many disagree with, or a knife and bat which requires the teacher to get close to the shooter. The teacher can stand up to thirty feet away from the shooter, spraying them with the fire extinguisher, causing oxygen to be removed from the lungs and ice burns on the face and in the mouth, nose, and eyes. The shooter will go into panic, gripping their neck trying to access air and drop their weapon.

Section 3: To pay for Carbon Dioxide Fire Extinguishers, at the end of the 2018–2019 school year, (Option A) all families will pay a required three dollars (\$3). If every family pays, we will have over \$1,650,000 which will cover the needed payment for the fire extinguishers, which will be bought from Home Depot every twenty years. If we use this form of payment, families are required to pay by the end of the 2018–2019 school year. However, another form of payment is federal grants. (Option B) We can ask the government for money to pay for the fire extinguishers after school districts submit their total amount of classrooms by the end of the 2018–2019 school year. Things will not be rushed, but the fire extinguishers must be in every classroom before the 2021–2022 school year. Since the fire extinguishers last roughly twenty years, families and the government won't be paying for fire extinguishers every year.

Section 4: Teachers will be trained the summer before the 2019-2020 school year if we use payment Option A which will be the first year that the fire extinguishers are present in the classroom. If payment Option B is used, the teachers will be trained the summer before the fire extinguishers are present in the classrooms. Teachers will be trained in Frankfort, the total cost only being around \$4,000. They will be trained how to operate the fire extinguisher correctly under stressful circumstances.

Section 5: If this were to become a law, over 685,167 students and 42,769 teachers will be safe.

An Act Relating To More Extensive Background Checks for the Purchase of Firearms

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently, there is a federal requirement for those who sell guns to obtain a permit and go through a background check, but one is not required to issue his/her own background check to those purchasing a firearm. This allows drug abusers and those with mental illnesses to transfer a firearm without question. We propose that Kentucky legislators issue an extensive background check to prevent those who are unsuited to own or operate firearms from doing so.

Section 2: In this background check, a drug test and medical history of drug abuse will be an important factor. There are several reported homicide cases of those who were under the influence of an illegal substance while using a gun. Drugs have the ability to give someone excessive confidence that can lead one to do something s/he wouldn't normally do. Innocent people are shot and killed simply because someone was acting irresponsibly. By including a drug test, it can prevent unsuitable people from being able to purchase firearms.

Section 3: Another aspect to this background check would be an investigation of current or past mental disease. According to research in the Law and Public Behavior publication, at least 59% of the 185 public mass shootings that occurred in the United States from 1900 through 2017 were carried out by people who had either been diagnosed with a mental disorder or demonstrated signs of serious mental illness prior to the attack. Our public needs to know and recognize that mental illnesses are no one's fault, and this should not be considered a punishment. However, it would ensure safety to both potential victims and shooters if firearms were not available to those suffering from a mental illness.

Section 4: The average cost for a statewide criminal test is about \$15.00, but deeper, nationwide criminal tests are about \$35.00. To ensure the best safety of Kentucky citizens, the more extensive criminal test will be required. The standard drug test costs \$30.00 or less per customer, per test. Therefore, each of these tests will cost around \$65.00. Consumers planning on purchasing a gun must be prepared to pay for the background check, as it will be required for the purchase of the firearm.

Section 5: While someone could already own a gun or purchase one and then acquire problems with drugs and psychological behavior, this is a solution to assure safety more frequently and consistently. Every three years, owners of firearms will be required to update h

Section 6: By implementing this background check, Kentuckians will be able to safely transfer firearms to responsible adults who are capable of acquiring a gun. Due to past incidents, it is time for citizens of Kentuckians to recognize how serious of a problem this is.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Each year in the state of Kentucky, thousands of animals are born because of uncontrolled breeding and irresponsible pet owners. This results in many animals being abandoned, without a home, or in putrid living conditions where basic needs such as food, immunizations, and necessary medical treatments are not met. Thankfully, animal shelters exist around our state that look out for the well being of some of these needy animals.

Section 2: Out of the 90 Kentucky animal shelters only 12% are able to provide acceptable care to animals due to a lack of funding. Because of this alarming statistic, it is crucial for us to act immediately to ensure animal shelters have necessary funding to improve facilities, provide the basic needs of animals, and funds to spay and neuter the animals. Many shelters are overcrowded, do not have room to bath the animals, or isolate sick ones. The Kentucky Humane Shelter Act, which was passed in 2004, requires these needs to be met. However, money is needed to ensure this occurs. This \$0.01 tax per dollar would go directly towards correcting these issues.

Section 3: The tax on pet food will be collected from pet distribution companies through the Kentucky Department of Revenue, and will be transferred to the General Fund. Funds from the General Fund will be transferred to the Kentucky Humane Society, and the Department of Revenue will oversee proper use of funds.

Section 4: The cost for this bill would only be the \$0.01 tax per dollar on pet food. There would be no additional costs and would only impact folks who buy pet food.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on July 1st, 2019.

An Act Relating To fentanyl protection gear to be available to first responders

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require fentanyl protection gear to be readily available to first responders at their department building. This bill will save the lives of first responders who come in contact with the deadly opioid.

Section 2: Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid pain reliever for treating severe pain, it typically is used for cancer patients. Fentanyl is illegally bought and abused for its heroine-like effect. Less than two (2) milligrams of this potent substance can kill you in the span of mere minutes. This law is needed in Kentucky because Kentucky is among the top ten (10) states with the highest opioidrelated overdose deaths. Also, in 2017 ten (10) people out of nineteen (19) died of fentanyl in Nelson County, Kentucky.

Section 3: The average cost of one set of protection gear is approximately fifty (50) dollars. The department that receives the gear will pay for the cost. Departments will be required to have one set of protection per every ten (10) active first responders.

Section 4: Department inspectors will make sure the protection gear is available. The department itself is also responsible for ensuring the safety of their first responders.

Section 5: There are no penalties because it is a requirement for the departments to have these available for all first responders. If they don't have it, it will be the departments responsibility to get this gear.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect one hundred twenty (120) days after passage.

An Act Relating To mental health doctor visits without the consent of a parent of legal quardian

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: To amend statute KRS 214.185 section two to read 'Any physician may provide outpatient mental health counseling to any minor upon request of such minor without the consent of a parent, parents, or quardian of such minor' instead of 'outpatient mental health counseling to any child age sixteen (16)' This law will essentially eliminate the age to get mental health help. Kentuckians need this bill because it can save a child's life who may not be able to get help otherwise.

Section 2: Physicians can currently diagnose and treat minors regarding venereal disease, alcohol or other drug abuse or addiction, contraception, pregnancy and childbirth without consent of a parent. However, for outpatient mental health, the child must be sixteen (16) years or older. Our bill will change this, eliminating that sixteen (16) year requirement. Suicide is the second leading cause of death in Kentucky in ages 10-34. According to the Department of Behavioral Health, Development and Intellectual Disabilities (DHDID) 776 people committed suicide in 2017.

Section 3: This bill does not require funding.

Section 4: Kentucky Cabinet of Health and Family Services will enforce this bill.

Section 1: Section 1. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 258 IS TO READ AS FOLLOWS: It is illegal to leave or confine any animal in an unattended vehicle where physical injury to or death of the animal is likely to result due to heat, cold, starvation, or lack of adequate ventilation.

Section 2: Section 2. This will not incur any additional costs to the state of Kentucky.

Section 3: Section 3. Any offenses will be deemed a Class A misdemeanor and will be punishable by a fine of no less than \$100 and up to, but no greater than \$500.

An Act Relating To Veterinarians Reporting Animal Abuse

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: KRS 321.185 (3)(a) A veterinarian shall not violate the confidential relationship between the veterinarian and the veterinarian's client. (3)(b) A veterinarian shall not release information concerning a client or care of a client's animal, except on the veterinarian's receipt of: (3)(b)(1) A written authorization or other form of waiver executed by the client; or (3)(b)(2) An appropriate court order or subpoena

Section 2: KRS 321.185 is amended to add the following: (3)(b)(3) Reporting to local humane society or law enforcement for reasonable cause that the patient has been abused, tortured, or neglected as stated in KRS 525.125, KRS 525.130, and KRS 525.135. (3)(c)(1) Penalty: For a first offense, if the veterinarian fails to report suspected abuse, torture, or neglect of a patient, the veterinarian will be required to pay a fine of \$500.00. For a second and subsequent offense, the veterinarian will be required to pay a \$1000.00 fine and will be reported to the Kentucky Board of Veterinary Examiners.

An Act Relating To Handicapped Accessible Playgrounds at 25% of Kentucky Public Elementary Schools.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Elementary school students with a mental or physical impairment that have substantial and long-term negative effects on their ability to do normal everyday activities, cannot currently enjoy the use of elementary school playgrounds like other children. This bill requires 25% of public elementary schools in Kentucky to have handicapped accessible playgrounds and equipment, so all students can enjoy outdoor activities. This bill will add requirements to KRS 157 relating to Special Educational Programs.

Section 2: County School Boards throughout Kentucky will enforce compliance. Audits by the Kentucky Board of Education will further demonstrate compliance.

Section 3: Failure for a school to comply the first academic year after bill passage will result in a warning and listing of non-compliant schools. Failure for a school to comply a second academic year will result in reduction of funding for other areas. A third academic year of non-compliance would result in an audit by the Department of Education. Special Education teachers would be tasked with reporting and documenting their school's compliance.

Section 4: The cost ranges from \$1,000 to \$50,000 for every playground depending on the quantity of children that will be using the equipment. Funds will also be set aside for ongoing maintenance costs. The costs will be covered with public school funding and grants.

Section 5: This bill should be effective immediately upon passage with enforced compliance by the 2020 -2021 academic school year, in order to give the schools time to allocate money to be able to modify the playgrounds. By having this law, it will make it possible.

An Act Relating To Installing Metal Detectors in All Kentucky Public High Schools.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require metal detectors to be installed into every public high school throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This will create a safer environment for the students and for the staff by increasing requirements of KRS 158.445, relating to school safety and discipline.

Section 2: This bill would be enforced by the Kentucky Center for School Safety. They would make checks on the metal detectors annually. School safety officer(s) will monitor the machine for additional checks.

Section 3: If not followed three months after the 2021 academic school year, the overall funding will be cut by one fourth and the school district will have cover the cost. If not followed in six months, all funding will be cut and the school district will have to cover the cost.

Section 4: Throughout Kentucky, this bill will cost approximately \$1.6 million dollars. This allows for 1 metal detector in each of the 260 public high schools in Kentucky. The metal detectors cost approximately \$6,000 dollars. The Garrett PD 6500i is the metal sector model we should use. This would be paid for by a short term .05% increase on property taxes that would decrease over a 5 year period.

Section 5: If passed the bill would go into effect at the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year.
