AN ACT relating to allowing self-defense classes to be accepted as an alternative for the physical education requirement for high school graduation.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill seeks to amend KRS 156.160 section (a,2), "If a school offers the Reserve Officers Training Corps program, the course shall be accepted as meeting the physical education requirement for high school graduation notwithstanding other provisions of law," to include, "If a school offers the Reserve Officers Training Corps program OR self-defense classes, both courses shall be accepted as meeting the physical education requirement for high school graduation notwithstanding other provisions of law."

Section 2: In the Commonwealth of Kentucky, nearly 50% of women and 20% of men are sexually victimized in their lifetime.

Section 3: Students will be able to effectively recognize criminal tactics and the realistic experience in class so if it becomes necessary they have the self-defense skills to successfully fight back. Students learn techniques for verbal de-escalation and boundary-setting, along with physical strategies for dealing with standing confrontations, and practice these in simulated attack scenarios with an instructor and peers.

Section 4: School districts will be responsible for paying for the curriculum and materials required for the implementation of self-defense classes. It is estimated that \$5,000 will be allotted for materials and an additional \$1,000 will be spent on teacher self-defense certification per teacher. If a school feels as though they are unable to pay for the cost of implementation, then the state will allow fees to be mandated to students enrolling in self-defense classes at the discretion of site-based councils.

Section 5: Upon its passage, the bill will be implemented prior to the 2019-2020 school year.
