3                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5                    Section 1: The current college system in the United States is broken! Students who leave 4 year universities  
6                    average nearly \$30,000 in debt. The high cost of secondary education discourages many students from even  
7                    attempting to further their education, thus encouraging low income jobs, and high poverty rates. The exorbitant  
8                    cost of education has also led to an increased demand for jobs requiring more than a high school diploma.

9  
10                    Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to provide all qualified students with a free education at local  
11                    community and technical colleges. This bill will encourage students to pursue further education and  
12                    succeed knowing that will not have the debt or any other financial setbacks to stop them.

13  
14                    Section 3: Students who qualify for free tuition must be no more than two years removed from high school  
15                    and must come from a home with an annual income of \$50,000 per year or less. Students must also take a  
16                    minimum of 3 classes per semester and maintain at least a 2.5 GPA.

17  
18                    Section 4: Payment for this bill will be provided through an increase in local property taxes of the  
19                    communities where the colleges are located. Increasing the local property taxes will lower overall student  
20                    debt, increase the number of educated citizens, and lead to higher paying jobs for the citizens of the  
21                    commonwealth; thus building financial wealth across the board.

22  
23                    Section 5: This bill would go into effect starting with the 2020-2021 enrollment class.

1                   An Act Relating To the removal of the sales tax on feminine hygiene products.

2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: This bill will repeal the 6% tax on menstrual hygiene products. This includes sanitary napkins, tampons,  
6   and menstrual cups.


7  
8   Section 2: This bill will not cost any money to implement but will cost the state government due to the lack  
9   of taxation. In order to fund for the removal of the 6% tax on menstrual hygiene products, this bill will  
10   increase the taxes on alcohol from 6% to 10%, the 10% tax on gun pistols and on revolvers to 12%, and  
11   the 11% tax on shotguns and ammunition to 13%.

12  
13   Section 3: KRS 139.472 provides a list of medical items that are exempt from sales tax.

14  
15   Section 4: KRS 139.472 is amended to read as follows: Insert (1)(j). to read "Menstrual hygiene products,  
16   including sanitary napkins, tampons, and menstrual cups."

17  
18   Section 5: The purpose of this bill is to allow citizens of Kentucky the ability to access affordable feminine  
19   hygiene products. Women spend an average of 17.3% of their lives on their menstrual cycle. This bill would  
20   help the commonwealth of Kentucky by removing the tax on menstrual hygiene products that cause women  
21   to be charged up to an average of \$1,351 extra every year in taxes.

22  
23   Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2021.

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5   Section 1: According to KRS 61.592(1)(a), the definition of a “Hazardous Position” is: any position whose principal

6   duties involve active law enforcement, including the positions of probation and parole officer and Commonwealth

7   detective, active fire suppression or prevention, or other positions with duties that require frequent exposure to a

8   high degree of danger or peril and also require a high degree of physical conditioning; and positions in the

9   Department of Corrections in state correctional institutions and the Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center with

10   duties that regularly and routinely require face-to-face contact with inmates. KRS 61.592(1)(b) expands upon this

11   to include Police Officers and Firefighters as defined in KRS 61.315(1), paramedics, correctional officers with duties

12   that routinely and regularly require face-to-face contact with inmates, and emergency medical technicians if: the

13   employee’s duties require frequent exposure to a high degree of danger or peril and a high degree of physical

14   conditioning; and the employee’s duties are not primarily clerical or administrative.

15

16   Section 2: Social Work is defined by dictionary.com as “organized work directed toward the betterment of

17   social conditions in the community, as by seeking to improve the condition of the poor, to promote the

18   welfare of children, etc.” Social Workers are responsible for helping to remove children from parents who

19   are abusive in some way. Social Workers also care for the elderly by removing them from dangerous

20   environments where they are neglected, whether that be a residence with a family member or a nursing

21   home/institution. Social Workers also deal with adults who are low functioning and may not have the

22   mental capacity to understand their situations and must sometimes decide the best place for these adults

23   to live, even if it isn’t with their family.


24

25   Section 3: When reading this definition, it is obvious that all the above-mentioned positions deserve

26   hazardous duty coverage as these people put their lives on the line for us to make our society a better

27   place. But you know who is missing from this list? Social Workers. Therefore, Social workers should be a

28   hazardous duty job.

Section 1: The Kentucky public schools’ grading scale has commonly been known to be established on a local level, but noticing the confusion among student transcripts in Kentucky’s schools, it is necessary that we provide a statewide, ten-point uniform grading scale. It will be as follows: A: 100-90 B: 89-80 C: 79-70 D: 69-60 F: 59-0

Section 2: This system will be beneficial in transferring students and will provide equal opportunities to all public school students in the state of Kentucky. This includes equal opportunities in college admission, athletic and academic scholarships, and many national awards. States with uniform grading scales include Arkansas, Florida, South Carolina, West Virginia, and Tennessee.

Section 3: This bill will be implemented at the start of the 2021-2022 school year. All public schools in Kentucky will make a note of the change of grading scale in the student’s transcript. An email will also be sent out to vested parties in Kentucky on behalf of the change.

11 Section 3: This information will be added to state mandated drivers education programs already in place in  
12 Kentucky, including but not limited to, "Alive at 25" and drivers education courses being offered in public  
13 schools.

14  
15 Section 4: It will be enforced by the department of motor vehicles.

16  
17 Section 5: Citizens who pursue his/her drivers license and have not received the required education will not  
18 be eligible to receive their full license until after doing so.

11                                      Section 3: This will be overseen by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet or the National Highway Traffic  
12 Safety Administration, and implemented by the Kentucky State Police as well as county police.

14                                      Section 4: 1st offense- a written warning of non-compliance issued by a law enforcement officer. 2nd  
15 offense- minimum \$25 fine and/or traffic school 3rd offense- \$250 fine, traffic school, and point  
16 deduction from license. 4th offense- \$500 fine, six month license suspension.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: As of today, there is no tax free weekend in the state of Kentucky. If one were to be instated, families  
6   across the state would be given the chance to acquire many needed goods.

7  
8   Section 2: The tax free weekend would bring in more revenue to Kentucky. Surrounding states such as  
9   Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee, and Virginia are pulling Kentucky’s shoppers to their tax free weekend sales,  
10   causing our state to lose revenue.

11  
12   Section 3: Price restrictions include: - \$15 per school supply item, - \$60 per clothing item, - \$80 per pair  
13   of shoes, - \$1000 towards electronic devices (Calculator, computer, tablets, educational software, and  
14   computer accessories exclusively), and - \$1000 towards emergency supplies (generators, lanterns,  
15   batteries, flashlights, propane and kerosene heaters, and propane canisters.)


16  
17   Section 4: In the case that the buyer exceeds the price limits stated in section three on a specific item,  
18   they must pay the taxes on the item’s total cost.

19  
20   Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Revenue will provide a registry for businesses that would like to  
21   participate in the tax free weekend. The company will fill out the registry stating that they will participate  
22   in the tax free weekend.

23  
24   Section 6: North Carolina lost 13.6 million dollars in revenue during South Carolina’s Tax Free Weekend.  
25   When Kentucky’s shoppers travel to Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee, and Virginia, it has the same effect.  
26   Implementing a Tax Free Weekend in Kentucky would give Kentucky a major revenue boost.

27  
28   Section 7: This bill will be enacted July 1, 2020 and the tax free weekend will occur on July 27-29, 2020.

29  
30   Section 8: This bill will require no additional funds to enact.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill will require that all children who attend public schools in Kentucky will have to get all their  
6 vaccinations prior to their first day of school. This bill will affect all children who attend public schools in Kentucky.  
7 This requirement will be mandated regardless of religious and/or personal beliefs.


8  
9 Section 2: There will be no financial obligation to parents to vaccinate their children due to the fact that  
10 these vaccinations will be mandated. This bill will be funded by proceeds from the Kentucky Lottery  
11 Association and the Kentucky Department of Education.

12  
13 Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Education with assistance from  
14 individual school districts.

15  
16 Section 4: Parents who are in non-compliance of this bill will have the choice to homeschool or send their  
17 child/children to private school. This bill will exempt children who are diagnosed by a licensed medical  
18 professional as being immunocompromised.

19  
20 Section 5: This bill will go into effect in the beginning of 2022-2023 school year.

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5    Section 1: This act will amend KRS 164.7879 to create an incentive for students who have an exceptional amount  
6    of community service hours attained by the date of their graduation from high school.

7  
8    Section 2: The incentive shall be of monetary value. The amount of the award shall be the value of \$1.25  
9    for achieving an hour of community service.

10  
11   Section 3: Beginning with the 2021-2022 academic school year, high school students can submit a  
12   maximum of 100 hours of community service per high school year. A KEES- eligible student who has  
13   achieved 100 hours of community service each academic year of high school can earn an additional amount  
14   of \$125 for each year in college. The high school graduate will receive a maximum number of \$500 for a  
15   maximum of four years in college.

16  
17   Section 4: The deadline to submit hours is April 1 every year. Students will report service hours to the  
18   Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority.

19  
20   Section 5: If enacted, this act will go into effect on July 31, 2021.

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1           An Act Relating To Legalizing Physician Assisted Dying (PAD) in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

2  
3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: Currently in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Physician Assisted Dying (PAD) or the voluntary termination  
6 of one's own life by administration of appropriate medications with the assistance of a physician is illegal. Under  
7 this act, PAD would be legalized in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

8  
9   Section 2: This bill proposes that patients who are terminally ill to voluntarily apply to a panel for PAD;

10  
11   Section 3: The panel for PAD would consist of three or more medical professionals and three or more  
12 attorneys, in which they would review the applications and records of the patient who has applied. If the  
13 panel approves the case, they would notify the patient's physician to prescribe the appropriate medication.


14  
15   Section 4: To be eligible for PAD, the patient must be 18 years of age or older, a resident of the  
16 Commonwealth of Kentucky, and be competent. This patient must have a terminal illness as well as a  
17 prognosis of six months or less to be valid to apply.

18  
19   Section 5: The patient's private insurance, state insurance, or federal insurance will pay for PAD.

20  
21   Section 6: The patient must submit two verbal and one written request to get the medication. Between the  
22 times they have submitted, there must be a waiting period of 3-4 weeks to make sure the patient has truly  
23 decided it is the right option for them.

24  
25   Section 7: States that have already legalized PAD are: California, Colorado, Hawaii, Maine, New Jersey,  
26 Oregon, Vermont, and Washington. The District of Columbia also has PAD legalized. If this bill is passed,  
27 Kentucky will be the first state that has the voluntary patients go through a panel.

28  
29   Section 8: This bill will go into effect approximately 2 weeks after passing, allowing patients to get their  
30 voluntary care and time to apply to their panels.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (N.A.S) is defined as a group of problems that occur in a newborn who  
7 was exposed to drugs in the mother’s womb, and continue to harm the individual throughout his/her life.


8  
9 Section 2: First class child abuse is classified as intentionally harming a child that is either (a) under the  
10 age of 12, or (b) physically or mentally helpless, or (c) allowing others to do so. An infant meets the criteria  
11 for both categories of description.

12  
13 Section 3: If a baby is suspected to have (N.A.S) at birth, the mother would be subjected to take a hair  
14 follicle drug test. If she test positive for drugs, the mother will be charged for first degree child abuse.

15  
16 Section 4: This bill will require no additional funding by the state.

17  
18 Section 5: This law will go into effect January 1, 2020.

3            **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5            Section 1: KRS 156.502 Section 2(E) is created to read as follows: Mental health counselors will be made available  
6            to all high school students through unpaid internships in districts who don't provide or have mental health services  
7            in schools in similar forms of student teaching. The intern will gain experience and services as an extension of Grad  
8            School program for five months out of the ten months of school. In a span of a year, there will be two interns.

9  
10           Section 2: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 156 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (2) As used in this  
11           section: (e) An intern is to be delegated responsibility to perform the mental health service under the  
12           supervision of a school nurse with the following requirements 1. Has college education in Mental Health  
13           counseling and majored in the category 2. Has been approved by the United States Department of Health  
14           and Human Services 3. Has been approved by the School District needing mental health service In a case of  
15           an intern who is approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services but not the

An Act Relating To Mental Health In Kentucky Schools

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: According to the National Alliance of Mental Illness 50% of mental issues start at the age of 14.


Section 2: In the 2017 school year, 41% of female students reported feeling hopeless and depressed, and 21% of male students reported the same. Resulting in low grades, decreasing student involvement, and the overall atmosphere of school.

Section 3: This bill proposes mental health checks through the school year. Taken a total of twice, at the beginning of the year and at the end of the year. The check will consist of a 20 question survey. Covering topics as followed; anxiety, depression, ADHD, sexual assault, and substance abuse.

Section 4: An amendment to this bill is in the case that a students' survey results are alarming then parents will be notified and a psychiatrist will be called into the school to speak to said students. The students' rights will be protected against HIPAA.

Section 5: The survey is mandatory for the teachers to pass out to their students, however it is not mandatory for the students to take it, if they feel uncomfortable, but it is highly encouraged.

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5    Section 1: Kentucky’s current pension debt is \$43 billion. A pension is a fund into which a sum of money is added  
6 during an employee’s employment years and from which payments are drawn to support the person’s retirement  
7 from work in the form of periodic payments. The pension system in Kentucky is terribly underfunded which is  
8 creating a problem in retirement and health care programs.

9  
10   Section 2: This bill proposes that all bids made on a race at a Kentucky Horse Track will have an 8% sales  
11 tax. Horse racing is extremely popular in Kentucky. Churchill Downs, a horse track in Louisville, Kentucky,  
12 alone made \$11 billion in income last year. All tax collected from racing bids will go towards paying off our  
13 current pension debt and maintaining our current pension system. Any statute contrary to this Act shall be  
14 amended or repealed.

15  
16   Section 3: As of now, there is no current tax on racing bids. Last year there was \$227.5 million bet on  
17 horses during the Kentucky Derby. Adding the 8% sales tax, in a year we would make approximately \$182  
18 million towards our pension debt from the kentucky derby alone, not including all the other race tracks.  
19 About 500,000 people are in Kentucky’s pension system. The money collected from the tax on racing bids  
20 would help these people be able to retire.

21  
22   Section 4: This Bill will go into effect 90 days after passing.

1 An Act relating to establishing a “red flag” law pertaining to all public middle and high schools in Kentucky.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill will allow faculty members of Kentucky public middle and high schools to petition for the search and seizure  
6 of dangerous substances or objects from the home of a student who may pose a threat to themselves or others.


7  
8 Section 2: In order for faculty to identify a student as enough of a danger to themselves and/or others, they must  
9 report a concern to the school’s administration. Following this report, the administration should interview at least  
10 three other faculty members who frequently interact with the student (i.e. a teacher, counselor, etc.) in order to  
11 gather a consensus on the threat of the student. If the faculty members and administration conclude that a student  
12 poses a significant threat to themselves and/or others, they will proceed to petition the court to search the student’s  
13 house and potentially seize any dangerous objects or substances.

14  
15 Section 3: The Kentucky 2009 Search & Seizure Casebook only allows for law enforcement to search someone’s home  
16 if there are “reliable facts, information or circumstances” sufficient enough to conclude that the person has  
17 committed a crime and that evidence of the crime may be obtained by way of the search. This bill will allow for law  
18 enforcement to search a home if there are reliable facts, information or circumstances sufficient enough to conclude  
19 that a student poses a threat to themselves or others, but has not committed a crime. Additionally, the process  
20 conducted by the school’s administration will serve as probable cause for law enforcement to obtain a search warrant.


21  
22 Section 4: Any dangerous objects or substances may include, but are not limited to: illegal firearms or explosives and  
23 Schedule 1 and 2 Drugs, not including marijuana.

24  
25 Section 5: The only cost of this bill will be to fund the implicit bias training, which will be determined after a  
26 government contract bid between private industries to determine which firm can offer the least cost to the state.

27  
28 Section 6: This bill will go into effect August 1, 2021.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: In Kentucky alone there were 98,785 students with disabilities as of 2011. As of right now the funding  
6 for special education programs in Kentucky schools are mostly supplied by parents of the students in the programs  
7 or out of the educators pocket. One of Kentucky’s largest university, University of Kentucky, only offers five special  
8 education degree programs to students. Only 0.009% of teachers in Kentucky are special education educators.

9  
10 Section 2: As of March, 2019 only \$120,158 was going toward special education students in Kentucky out  
11 of the \$409,486,436 going toward all education in Kentucky. That’s 0.0003% of total costs going to  
12 special education programs in Kentucky. We want to change that.


13  
14 Section 3: If this bill is enacted there will be an increase of funding for all special education programs in  
15 Kentucky schools. There will be grants given out each year by the Kentucky government to these special  
16 education programs. These grants will be used to help purchase new equipment for the special needs  
17 students, create more programs in schools, and increase these special education educator’s salary in the  
18 state of Kentucky.

19  
20 Section 4: The grant will be worth 10,000 dollars and will be received by every school district in Kentucky  
21 each new school year.


22  
23 Section 5: This bill will go into effect by May 2020.

5 Section 1: BE IT HEREBY ENACTED BY THE ANNUAL YOUTH LEGISLATURE OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF  
6 KENTUCKY  
7  
8 Section 2: According to the National Institute of Drug Abuse, in the year 2016, Kentucky lost over 1,000  
9 citizens to opioid-related ailments. This number has been on an incline before, and up until this point.  
10  
11 Section 3: Furthermore, the Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center reported 1,582 visits to the  
12 ER due to opioid-related injury in 2016. In the same year this source reported that Kentucky witnessed  
13 13,190 visits to the ER due to drug overdose.  
14  
15 Section 4: This bill would require patients who receive treatment from the ER for opioid overdose to attend  
16 at least 2 weeks of an outpatient rehab program.  
17

5    Section 1: This bill is to address the gun violence in Louisville, KY. Kentucky’s gun violence rate is twice as high as  
6    New York’s. Deaths per 100,000 people is 13.7. There is currently no permit required to purchase a firearm.  
7    Kentucky is currently ranked 17th in the United States for gun violence. My bill will expand gun laws to include  
8    background checks and registration for all gun ownership transfers.

10   Section 2: All firearms will be registered in the state of Kentucky. All transfers of ownership must also be  
11   registered. In order to register a gun, a background check must be completed on the new owner prior to  
12   possession.

13  
14   Section 3: Background checks must be submitted to the FBI and the Kentucky State Police for approval.  
15   Once approved, the new owner may register their firearm.

16  
17   Section 4: Noncompliance Any gun found not registered is subject to confiscation and fees. Anyone found  
18   in possession of a gun without an approved background check is subject to seizure of the weapon and fees.  
19   Any crime committed while in the possession of an unregistered firearm will incur additional penalties in a  
20   court of law. Multiple offenses will result in the seizure of all weapons and suspension of registration

6 V of the Constitution of the United States, for the calling of a convention of the states limited to proposing  
7 amendments to the Constitution of the United States that will amend the power and scope of the federal  
8 government and bureaucracy.

10 Section 2: The Kentucky Secretary of State is directed to transmit copies of this application to the  
11 President and Secretary of the United States Senate and to the Speaker and Clerk of the United States  
12 House of Representatives; also to the elected representatives from Kentucky in the Senate and House of  
13 Representatives, as well as to the presiding officers of each of the legislative houses in each state,  
14 requesting their cooperation.  
15  
16 Section 3: When electing Kentucky’s single representative delegate to an Article V Convention of States,  
17 two-thirds of both houses of the legislature of the State of Kentucky must vote to approve a proposed  
18 delegate. The governor of the State of Kentucky does not have the power to veto this delegate. This  
19 delegate must meet the same requirements for a citizen of Kentucky to serve in the Senate of the State of  
20 Kentucky, and must not be an elected representative of the State of Kentucky to Congress, or official  
21 serving for the Kentucky State Government in the White House or Supreme Court of the United States.

23 Section 4: This application constitutes a continuing application, taking effect immediately after passage by

An Act Relating To the Use of Motorcycle Helmets


**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: KRS 186A.040 is amended to read as follows, "Any person operating a motorcycle shall be required to wear protective headgear, in the manner prescribed by the secretary of the Transportation Cabinet, at all times while operating a motorcycle."

Section 2: It shall be seen as if the operator is committing the offense, he or she will be served with a fine of no more than \$150 on the first offense. The second offense will consist of a fine of up to \$250 and a requirement of 4 hours of Traffic School to be completed. The third offense will consist of a fine up to \$500 and the license will be revoked indefinitely.

Section 3: This Act takes effect July 1, 2020.

1 An Act Relating To require forfeiture of any and all related property, including vehicles, when an uninsured  
2 motorist is involved in an automobile accident.

3  
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: Currently, Per KRS 186A.042 and KRS 304.39-117, your vehicle must have a current, active  
7 registration and you must maintain insurance on that vehicle. Consequences include revocation of vehicle  
8 registration revoked according to statute, fines for repeated offenses beginning at \$500.00 and up to \$1,000.00,  
9 up to 90 days in jail, or both. Because the majority of drivers without insurance have limited means of restitution, in  
10 the case of an "at fault" accident, most victims are left to pursue compensation through their own insurance.


11  
12 Section 2: As per the Insurance Research Council, an estimated 15.8 percent of all drivers in Kentucky  
13 ignore the law and drive without any insurance at all. That's about one out of every 6.3 drivers.

14  
15 Section 3: This bill will allow state and local law enforcement agencies to seize vehicles, and other items,  
16 from uninsured drivers involved in "at fault" accidents and unable to personally make restitution. Vehicle  
17 forfeiture would be in the same manner as Kentucky law that allows law enforcement agencies to take and  
18 keep cash or property when they suspect it's related to drug trafficking.

19  
20 Section 4: Income generated from the sale of vehicles would be distributed by the collecting agency on a  
21 set split: 30% to the state or local law enforcement agency, 65% to a fund to provide for victim needs on  
22 an application basis, 5% to an overseeing agency.

23  
24 Section 5: The only local cost connected to the law will be for storage and costs related to the public sale  
25 of vehicles. Expenses will be paid for through the county's percentage of income related to sale. State  
26 Victim Restitution agency funded through sale proceeds resulting in no budget increase to the state.  
27 (Counties already hold surplus sales for surplus items and forfeited items through drug related arrests.)

28  
29 Section 6: This bill will go into effect 3 months after passage to provide time for public notice, and for  
30 drivers to acquire required insurance.

An Act Relating To Legalizing Prostitution in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: This bill shall legalize the act of prostitution, repealing KRS 529.020.

Section 2: Prostitutes shall be defined as adults (18 years and above) who consensually exchange sex and sexual activity for profit as members of a state-supervised business organization.


Section 3: Prostitution shall be subject to monthly, random state health and safety regulations from the health department.

Section 4: All funds previously designated to the prosecution and prevention of prostitution in state and local police budgets shall be redistributed into the prosecution and prevention of human trafficking, as well as into maintaining monthly random regulation of prostitution.

Section 5: Failure to meet the requirements of the state including the health department and police will result in the loss of a license to practice prostitution and a fine of \$500.

Section 6: A tax of 15% will be placed upon these businesses' yearly income, with 50% of prostitution-generated state revenue funding the prevention of human trafficking.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2020.

1                                    An Act Relating To Redefining all Non Violent Possession Class Drug Charges

2  
3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5    Section 1: As of 2019, the penalty for a Class D drug charge is between a minimum of (1) year and a maximum of  
6 (5) years in prison. The felony sentences for Class C drug charges are no less than five (5) years and no more than  
7 ten (10) years in prison according to KRS 532.060. Anyone found to be in possession of any quantity of schedule I  
8 and II narcotics, Methamphetamine, LSD, PCP, GHB, Flunitrazepam, and/or any controlled substance analogue would  
9 be charged with drug possession in the first degree under KRS 218A.1415.


10  
11    Section 2: Upon passage of this bill, nonviolent possession of less than 3.5 ounces of a controlled  
12 substance (not including controlled substance analogues) will be classified as a Class B misdemeanor. First  
13 offenders would be sentenced to up to 50 hours of community service. Second-time offenders would be  
14 sentenced to up to 100 hours of community service. Third-time offenders will be charged with a Class C  
15 felony. Possession of any amount over 3.5 ounces will be considered trafficking and charged as such.

16  
17    Section 3: Every current prisoner penalized based on applicable charges will have their sentences  
18 commuted upon the date of this law’s ratification. All ex-felons with past applicable charges will have these  
19 charges pardoned.

20  
21    Section 4: Kentucky Court of Justice will enforce this bill.

22  
23    Section 5: This bill will be enacted on January 1, 2021.

Section 4: This bill is predicted to decrease the amount of citizens on welfare who are not employed nor seeking employment, as it would ensure they do not have to stay home with their children.

Section 5: This bill would likely cut down on rates of child negligence and allow for a swifter detection of abuse.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect on November 1st, 2021.

5 Section 1: This bill is to require foster parents to present receipts and/or documented proof showing the  
6 reimbursement being used towards any and all living expenses of the foster child.

8 Section 2: As of now, no documentation has been needed to show proof of the expenses toward the  
9 financial well being of the child to be reimbursed. This can allow the foster parents to use the  
10 reimbursement for themselves, or other things, not towards the well being of the foster child.

An Act Relating To Labor while Imprisoned

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: Under KRS 197.070 the department of corrections is responsible for employment of all prisoners, But not all correctional officers allow inmates to participate in employment, leading to a waste of money on prisoners.

Section 2: Amend KRS 197.070 to make the state of Kentucky requires all able body inmates who have been convicted of a crime for the duration of the given sentence to be compelled for physical labor as a way to pay debts to the society and state as well as to rehabilitate the inmates and better prepare them for release into society. And widen the manufacturing jobs to add more jobs.

Section 3: KRS 197.070 Amended to read as follows: Employment of prisoners -- Public Manufacturing Jobs -- Industrial training. (1) The Department of Corrections shall require employment for all prisoners in the penitentiaries and it shall exhaust every resource at its command to provide employment for all prisoners in its custody. (2) The correctional center shall acquire the necessary equipment, machinery, and materials to produce a desired product (e.g. furniture for state prisons) as required by public correctional centers across the state, except those privately furnished, that is needed for the usual and suitable use of all state prisoners, and of all inmates in all state institutions, who are required to be tended to by the state. The correctional center shall acquire equipment for the manufacturing and production of all other state supplies, that in the reasonable discretion of the correctional center, is deemed practicable, and shall have the products manufactured, sold, and distributed as provided in this chapter. (3) The department shall establish industrial training in the penitentiaries and shall classify state prisoners according to the uses for prison labor and ability and talent of the prisoners, utilizing the best available local talent and other talent that may be obtained at an economical and practical cost, and shall select a suitable number of guards with the qualifications, when possible, and thereby avoid duplicate expense.

Section 4: This bill strives to help inmates repay their debts to the state and society while also helping the inmate’s money recover and giving the inmate a goal to work towards.

Section 5: Funding for this bill will be obtained in reference to KRS 197.240, and taken from the designated “Trust and Agency Account”, while continuing to carry out KRS 197.200 to KRS 197.250.


Section 6: The purpose of this act is to rehabilitate prisoners and boost the economy of the state, by teaching prisoners the valuable work skills and ready them for life outside of prison.

Section 7: This bill will be regulated and enforced through inspections outlined in KRS Chapter 197.070.

Section 8: This bill would go into effect on January 1st, 2020.

Section 9: Any stature contrary to this act shall be amended or repealed.

1 An Act Relating To require all hospitals in the state of Kentucky to offer umbilical cord blood storage.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill requires hospitals to give the option of removing and storing stem cells. Doctors will give  
6 mothers the option of storing their baby’s umbilical cord for future use of its blood and stem cells, as well as the  
7 option to transport donated cord blood to a nearby public cord blood bank.


8  
9 Section 2: Stem cells are specialized cells that can renew and multiply themselves throughout life and can  
10 be used to treat a variety of blood and bone marrow deficiencies/diseases, blood cancer, repair tissues,  
11 leukemia, lymphoma, sickle cell anemia, inherited immune system disorders, damage from chemotherapy  
12 and metabolic disorders. Stem cells can be found in abundance in umbilical cord blood, which is what would  
13 be stored and used later on.

14  
15 Section 3: Stem cells are removed from the umbilical cord by drawing blood from the cord and storing it in  
16 cryogenic storage or in a public cord blood bank. Cryogenic storage is predicted to enable stem cells to  
17 have no expiration date for usage.

18  
19 Section 4: There will be two options for parents, private and public banking. Through private banking,  
20 families will be able to store the umbilical cord blood in a private bank or through a private organization,  
21 such as Cyrocell or Cordblood registry. This process will cost the family around \$2,000 upfront and about  
22 \$125 annually. This cord blood will only be for the child and the family of the child whose umbilical cord  
23 blood was stored. Through public banking, families will inform the nurses at the hospital that they will be  
24 donating cord blood. This blood will be sent to a public cord blood bank and can be used to save anyone’s  
25 life, as it is not specific to patients. Public cord blood donation is free, safe, and confidential. Some public  
26 cord bank organizations are Be the Match and ViaCord.

27  
28 Section 5: This process, albeit extremely low in procedural costs, will be fiscally covered by excess funds  
29 provided by the monetary reserve resulting from KY Lottery profits. These profits will cover transportation  
30 of the umbilical cords and stem cells to a nearby public bank or cryogenic storage facility

31  
32 Section 6: This will take effect March 1st of 2021.

1                                   An Act Relating To Solitary Confinement in Kentucky Juvenile Detention Centers

2  
3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: Kentucky is currently 1 of 18 states where it is legal for juvenile detention centers to use the practice of  
6   solitary confinement according to the Kentucky Law Journal. Currently, a child can be kept in solitary confinement  
7   for up to 120 hours, or an equivalent of 5 days.

8  
9   Section 2: Solitary confinement is defined by Merriam Webster as “a punishment in which some is kept  
10   alone in a room alone, usually in a prison.”

11  
12   Section 3: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 15A.210 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1)The use of  
13   solitary confinement as punishment in juvenile detention centers shall be prohibited in the state of  
14   Kentucky.


15  
16   Section 4: The purpose of this act is to reduce costs in prisons and promote positive mental health for  
17   juvenile prisoners.

18  
19   Section 5: This bill will be regulated and enforced through inspections outlined in KRS Chapters 15A.210  
20   and 15A.220.

21  
22   Section 6: This Act will not require any additional funding, however, additional funding for this Act can be  
23   derived from the Kentucky Department of Corrections if necessary.

24  
25   Section 7: This bill will take effect on September 1st, 2020.

26  
27   Section 8: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

An Act Implementing A 3 Step Program to A Greener KY

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: This is a three phase bill that works towards creating a more sustainable Kentucky.


Section 2: Phase One: Recycle. The first goal is to increase the states recycling participation to 80% statewide. We will work towards this goal being achieved by the April of 2035. Putting a deposit on plastic materials and creating a 2% tax break for people who meet the recycling standards.

Section 3: Phase Two: Reduce. Reducing the amount of petroleum based plastic in the Commonwealth is another goal of this bill. 20-30% plant based plastics are beginning to flood markets. Kentucky is a major growler of hemp. Hemp derivatives can be used to create biodegradable, cost effective plastics. Beginning in 2027 plastics manufactured in the state must be at least 20% plant based. Hoping that eventually all plastics used in Kentucky and nation wide will be have a percentage of plant base.

Section 4: Phase Three: Reuse. The last goal of this bill is to reuse the plastic within the state that is not currently being recycled. The state can achieve this be harvesting the plastics found in landfills. Inmates with training and the help of sanitation workers and specialists can do this low cost. Plastics from landfills would be recycled or sent to clothing companies who use plastics in clothes. This program would begin in the June of 2023.

Section 5: Money: The funding for this bill would come from deposits made on plastic products bought by consumers, prison budgets for training inmates, and a .5% allotment of funds from the federal budget allotment to Kentucky.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect one and a half years after it is passed.

9 six months, and the precinct in which he offers to vote sixty days next preceding the election, shall be a voter in  
10 said precinct and not elsewhere but the following persons are excepted and shall not have the right to vote. 1.  
11 Persons convicted in any court of competent jurisdiction of treason, Class A or B felony, or bribery in an election as  
12 the General Assembly may declare shall operate as an exclusion from the right of suffrage, but persons hereby  
13 excluded may be restored to their civil rights by executive pardon. 2. Persons who, at the time of the election, are in

9   learn actual driving techniques from a parent or guardian. Training from unlicensed individuals may be  
10   insufficient and dangerous in helping the student drive safely. Likewise, for those whose guardians cannot  
11   teach them, costly driving lessons is one of their only options.

12  
13   Section 3: This bill would provide students with access to education that allows them to drive safely,  
14   regardless of family background or socioeconomic condition.

15  
16   Section 4: This bill would bear very little, fiscal responsibility. The costs of teacher training will be covered  
17   by the Board of Education, while the cars will come from donations from local dealers. Experts attest that  
18   car dealerships will be more than willing to offer these, as there is a clear advertising advantage.

19  
20   Section 5: This bill will be implemented in each school district at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school  
21   year.

1 An Act Relating To Requirng Students to Receive an Annual Flu Shot as well as DTaP Booster Shot Before  
2 Middle and High School.

3  
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: Kentucky public school students will be required to receive annual flu shots alongside normal  
7 immunization shots. Kentucky public school students will also be subject to a pertussis booster shot before middle  
8 and high school in addition to the already required DTaP vaccination before kindergarten.


9  
10 Section 2: As of now, Kentucky mandates every student to have a current Commonwealth of Kentucky  
11 Immunization Certificate to attend school. Kentucky law states that all children attending public schools at  
12 five years of age must receive five doses of DTaP immunization. This proposal will require students  
13 entering middle and high school to receive a follow up dose of the booster. The flu shot is not currently  
14 required; this bill will mandate an annual flu shot to receive the immunization certificate.

15  
16 Section 3: With this bill we are giving every child in Kentucky an equal opportunity to decrease illness  
17 caused by vaccine-preventable diseases. Any student who does not have the financial means to cover the  
18 cost for said vaccinations will be provided with the vaccinations free of charge at their local health  
19 department.

20  
21 Section 4: The Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) administers the Immunization Program in  
22 Kentucky schools. Schools are easily able to regulate this bill without any additional funding or training.The  
23 CHFS also provides strict exemptions from these immunizations for both medical reasons and religious  
24 beliefs. A current immunization certificate should be on file at the school within two weeks of the child's  
25 enrollment.

26  
27 Section 5: This bill will be implemented in each district at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.

An Act Relating To taxing one cent on opioid drugs.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: One of Kentucky’s most detrimental societal problems is opioid addiction. This issue is unfortunately prevalent in the Commonwealth and seemingly only getting worse. This bill could cause a decrease in this horrendous problem facing Kentuckians today. The purpose of this bill is to put a one cent tax on each opioid pill in a container sold to a citizen of Kentucky, so that the government can aid in setting up more addiction programs at recovery centers funded by these very taxes. These programs would be for citizens of Kentucky that are addicted to drugs so they can recover and get back into the workforce and, more importantly, get back to being a thriving member of his/her community. The rehab facilities and programs will be scattered throughout Kentucky.

Section 2: With the extra tax on the prescription pills we would be able to create more programs in rehab facilities that helps opioid addicts recover and go back into the workforce. When we have people in the workforce, we have more money to benefit the state and community.

Section 3: First, we would start by placing the tax on each scheduled drug in the state of Kentucky. Each pill will have a tax receipt for 1 cent. The money that is gathered by the government would go to an earmarked grant, applied for by local municipalities and county governments for obtaining the rehab programs.

Section 4: There will only be a tax of one cent per pill, which would be paid for by the purchaser. There would be no cost otherwise to the citizens of Kentucky. For many citizens, their insurance will cover these costs, but as for people without insurance they will have to pay the small tax fee.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on December 1st, 2020.

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5    Section 1: This bill would require students to be trained to be certified in CPR in their health or physical education  
6    class.


7  
8    Section 2: All Physical Education teachers would need to be certified to train the students. This training is  
9    already required and free of charge.

10  
11    Section 3: This would make CPR certification training a graduation requirement.

12  
13    Section 4: This would cost approximately \$2000 per school and \$500 annually for replacement equipment.  
14    For every certification card the student will pay \$2, or would be granted by the 1% tax.

15  
16    Section 5: Since the state already mandates that teachers are certified this wouldn't cost anything for  
17    initial training.

18  
19    Section 6: The money for equipment and dummies would come from a 1% tax on hotel and motel rooms.

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5   Section 1: Currently 1 in 5 young people are suffering from mental illness. This leads to a youth suicide rate of

6   14.6%. Allowing students to take a break to rest would help combat and reduce these alarming numbers.

7

8   Section 2: This act would amend KAS 159.050 (1), by adding a new section regarding students mental

9   health days.

10

11   Section 3: This act would allow public school students to miss 5 days per semester, without repercussions,

12   for mental health reasons.

13


14   Section 4: All schools must establish a way to combat the students’ mental illness and ensure the days are

15   being used properly (ex. talk to a school counselor, teacher, etc.; have a note from a doctor or therapist).

16

17   Section 5: This bill will go into effect the beginning of the next school year, after being passed.

1 An Act Relating To AN ACT relating to establishing mandatory sexual education courses in all Kentucky  
2 public high schools.

3  
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: Kentucky currently has the fifth highest teen pregnancy rate with 4,373 teens giving birth in 2016. Teen  
7 pregnancy is an issue that affects everyone in the young mother's life and can put a damper on their future, increasing  
8 the dropout rate. Teen pregnancies cost the state of Kentucky about 150 million dollars every year.

9  
10 Section 2: KRS Chapter 158.1415 is the only chapter containing guidance for schools on sexual education, but  
11 this chapter encourages only the teaching of abstinence. This bill creates a new chapter of KRS 158 to require  
12 all public Kentucky high schools to implement a mandatory sexual education course during the already required  
13 Health and Physical Education course. This will transition Kentucky from an abstinence only approach to a  
14 comprehensive, inclusive sexual education. This program will be enforced by each school district as well as the  
15 Kentucky Department of Education to ensure every student is getting the sexual education course they need.

16  
17 Section 3: Mandatory topics that will be discussed in this class include the study of puberty, sexual orientation  
18 and gender identity as well as relationships, consent, and sexual behavior. It will also include a unit on sexual  
19 health such as contraceptives, sexually transmitted diseases, and pregnancy. We define contraceptives as a  
20 method or device used to prevent pregnancy including but not limited to birth control pills, IUDs, birth control  
21 injection, ring, patch, condoms, or abstinence.


22  
23 Section 4: This bill will be taught by physical education teachers that will go through an online training by the  
24 American Sexual Health Association. This training is free of charge to school districts. All curriculum will also be  
25 provided by the same organization. If school districts fail to comply they will be subject to a fine of \$500 per  
26 week until they show compliance with this law. Compliance shall be shown by submitting quarterly grades of  
27 students taking the sexual education course to the Kentucky Department of Education. Teachers or school  
28 districts must also submit the scores of the end of unit exam to the Kentucky Department of Education.

29  
30 Section 5: There may be no non-compliant students. Failure to complete this course will bar students from  
31 graduation until a satisfactory score of 65% in the class and end of unit exam has been received.

32  
33 Section 6: This bill requires no increase in taxes for additional funding since all training and curriculum will be  
34 provided free of charge.

35  
36 Section 7: This bill will be enacted in the 2021-2022 school year.

1 An Act Relating To Removing Discriminatory Workplace Codes on Natural Hairstyles for People of Color

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: This bill acknowledges that in our nation: a) Laws have been used to subject people of color to separate  
6 and unequal treatment in the workplace based on physical traits associated with "blackness," such as dark skin and  
7 natural hairstyles (afros, braids, twists, and locks). b) Professionalism is still heavily tied to European features (...)  
8 which compels those who don't naturally fit into these norms to greatly alter their appearance to reflect these  
9 standards in order to be accepted within workplace environments. c) Due to the fact that "black" and  
10 "unprofessional" have become synonymous in American culture, it's exponentially more difficult for black individuals  
11 to gain the respect and economic benefits that are products of moving up the corporate ladder. d) Although  
12 America has worked tirelessly to eradicate the racist ideology that black attributes are socially unacceptable,  
13 natural hair styles still give rise to racial discrimination resulting in adverse repercussions that affect all spheres of  
14 an individual's life.

15  
16 Section 2: This bill makes an unlawful dress code and grooming policy one that prohibits natural hair styles  
17 (including afros, braids, twists, and locks) and thus deters Black applicants, inhibits Black employees from  
18 working without altering their appearance and natural features, or punishes them disproportionately due to  
19 their hairstyle. This excludes codes based on a legitimate occupational qualification or applicable security  
20 regulations.

21  
22 Section 3: Any organization or corporation found to have a code in violation of these regulations and  
23 determined to undermine the constitutional values of fairness, equity, and opportunity for all will be  
24 subject to the following penalties with a one month grace period thereafter to allow revision of the  
25 violating code: 1st offense: \$1,000 fine 2nd offense: \$5,000 fine 3rd offense: \$10,000 4th offense and or  
26 any offense occurring there after: \$20,000

27  
28 Section 4: This bill will go into affect 3 months after passage to allow businesses time to revise codes to  
29 be in compliance with the law.

30  
31 Section 5: Any and all parts of laws in conflict with this bill will be repealed upon passage.

1 An act relating to the amending of the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship [KEES] program

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: All students who receive a passing score on an Advanced Placement [AP] Exam, International  
6 Baccalaureate [IB] Exam, or Cambridge Advanced International [CAI] Exam will be entitled to a KEES bonus directly  
7 correlating to the score received.

8  
9 Section 2: Currently, KRS 164.7879 only refers to high school students whose families were eligible for  
10 free or reduced-price lunch for any year during high school enrollment to be accredited an AP Exam, IB  
11 Exam, or CAI Exam score bonus. The bonuses for the AP Exam are: \$200 for a score of 3, \$250 for a score  
12 of 4, and \$300 for a score of 5. The bonuses for the IB Exam are: \$200 for a score of 5, \$250 for a score  
13 of 6, and \$300 for a score of 7. The CAI Exam bonuses are as follows: \$200 for a score of e, \$250 for a  
14 score of c or d, and \$300 for a score of an a or b.

15  
16 Section 3: KRS 164.7879 3 [c][d] should be amended to read: Beginning with the 2008-2009 academic  
17 year, the authority shall commit to provide a supplemental award for achievement on examinations for  
18 Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, and/or Cambridge Advanced International as defined in  
19 KRS 164.002 to any eligible high school student who received a score listed below.

20  
21 Section 4: This amendment to the KEES program will be enforced just as the original KEES program would  
22 be.

23  
24 Section 5: This amendment will go into effect in the 2020-2021 school year.

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1        An Act Relating To Providing Free Bottled Water to All Public Primary and Secondary Students in Kentucky

3                                **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5        Section 1: This bill will require that all public primary and secondary schools in Kentucky provide each student with  
6        at least one free bottle of water during lunchtime. These bottles of water would not replace milk that is typically  
7        offered with school lunch, but they would be given out for free to any students, not just ones wishing to purchase  
8        lunch.  
9  
10       Section 2: This will be funded by the Kentucky Department of Education, specifically the National School  
11       Lunch Program.  
12  
13       Section 3: To prevent unnecessary plastic waste from the water bottles, recycling bins will be implemented  
14       in all public schools as a way to combat the growing issue of too much waste. The schools will be required  
15       to send all recyclable waste from the bottles to local recycling centers.  
16  
17       Section 4: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.
