## DELEGATE CODE OF CONDUCT

The purpose of this code is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the mission of the Kentucky YMCA. Students sent home for violations would be at the expense of a parent/guardian.

Violations are to be brought to the attention of Y-Staff. Delegates in violation are subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of supervising adult and Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to guardian(s); incident/behavioral report filed; sent home; school policies implemented. If state/federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify law enforcement and guardian(s) and delegates will be sent home. Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions as needed.

## EXPECTATIONS OF DELEGATES

1. Delegates shall demonstrate respectful/responsible conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA functions. This includes but is not limited to: social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected.
2. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
3. Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.
4. Delegates are legally and financially liable for removing, defacing, or willfully damaging public or private property. Vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of facilities may be a crime and will be treated as such.
5. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function without the approval of advisor, guardian, and program director. Students must be signed out of the program by an adult listed on their Authorized Pick-Up Form.
6. Food, candy, and beverages other than water are not permitted in any meeting spaces, unless medically needed. Delegates will abide by any rules put into place by Y-Staff at other locations.
7. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time. Delegates will abide by any rules put into place by Y-Staff at other locations.
8. The use of tobacco products, e-cigarettes, vaping products, illegal drugs, alcoholic beverages, legal drugs without prescription, open flame, and the burning of candles, incense or wax melts is forbidden.
9. Delegates may not enter sleeping rooms other than those assigned to them without permission from Y-Staff.
10. All delegates shall be in assigned rooms by curfew, and remain there until curfew ends.
11. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. Physical intimacy includes, but is not limited to: romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.
12. Delegates will wear their OWN Name Tags visibly around the neck at all times when not in their assigned sleeping rooms.
13. Unless there is a fire, delegates will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and offenders will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Alarms summon the Fire Dept. and require evacuations.
14. Use of personal vehicles by delegates during any Kentucky YMCA program is strictly prohibited.
15. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury/damage to participants/property are forbidden.

## DRESS CODE: KYA & KUNA

The Dress Code is designed to support our emphasis on professional development at KYA and KUNA. Anyone not in compliance with the Dress Code may be asked to change, and Delegation Adults will be notified. Y-Staff reserves the right to remove Delegation of Excellence after 3+ dress code violations. **Delegation Adults will enforce Dress Code.**

## DRESS CODE: GFI, LTC, & Y-Corps

These programs provide an active environment in which you could find yourself crawling, climbing, covered in dirt or shaving cream, wet from head to toe, etc. This dress code is designed for the spontaneous and messy nature of these programs so delegates feel comfortable at all times, without risk of unsafe or malapropos exposure of the body.

**Tops** - secure and limits exposure during physical activity

**Pants or Shorts** - comfortable during physical activity or floor sitting; Shorts practical length, Skirts not recommended

**Shoes and Sandals** with laces/straps and support. Bare feet/flip-flops not recommended (at times not allowed) for safety.

**Swim Suits** should fit appropriately and be suitable for physical activity without risk of overexposure. Y-Staff may request a non-white shirt/shorts to go over suits for practicality and safety reasons.

**Not Allowed:** Visible undergarments, inappropriate/derogatory text or imagery, attire deemed inappropriate/unsafe by Y-Staff.

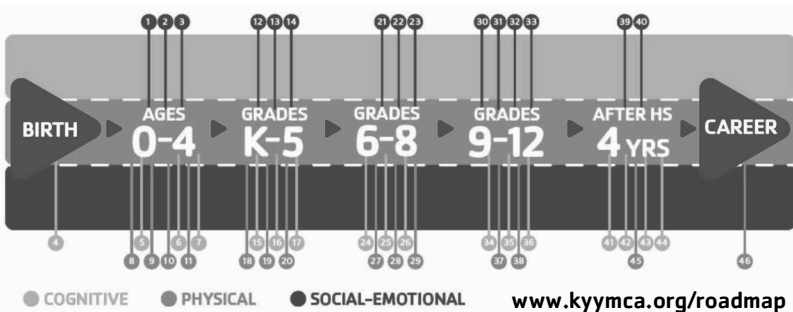

**BE A BETTER DEBATER!!!**  
**READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:**

- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
  - READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON'T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, "When will this bill go into effect?" and "How much will this bill cost?" are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
  - Don't ask questions that begin with "WHY...?" Those are almost *always* debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE**
  - Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
    - Give a speech for or against the bill
    - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
  - If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say, **"Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or 'series of questions')?"**
  - If you would like to SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION, you should also say, "And I reserve my right to speak (or 'yield my time') afterward."
  - If you would like to YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.
    - EX: "Hermione Granger, Hogwarts. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin."

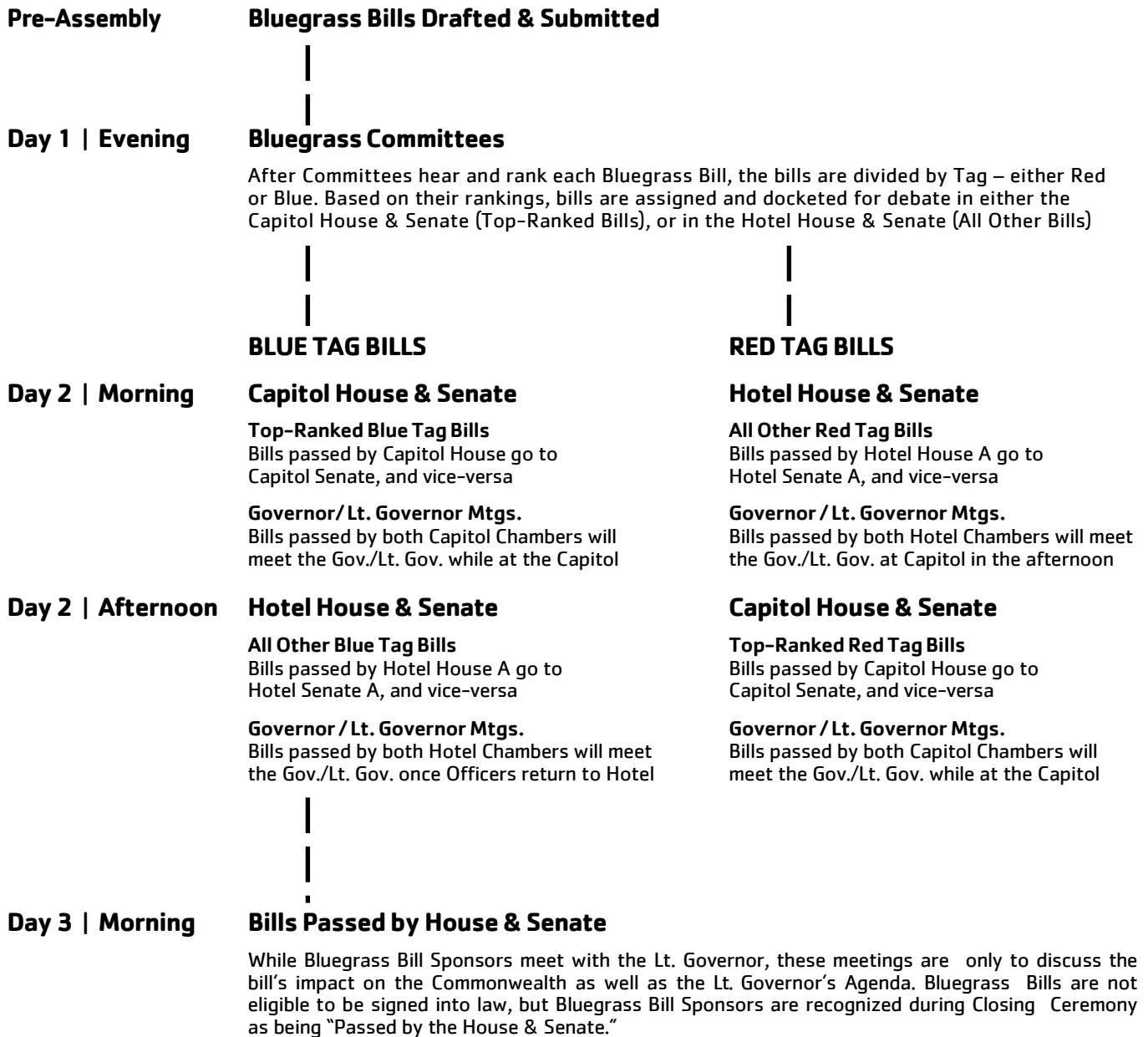

3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5    Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 212 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS About 900,000  
6    people in Kentucky have been diagnosed with an eating disorder. Eating disorders have the highest mortality  
7    rate of any mental illness and the inpatient and outpatient care for them can be extremely pricy. This act will  
8    apply to all eating disorders diagnosed by a doctor, psychiatrist, or clinical psychologist.

9  
10   Section 2: The enactment of putting these centers in place will be overseen by Kentucky’s Eating Disorder  
11   Council in the cabinet for Health and Human services. The council’s main goals include overseeing a  
12   development of eating disorders awareness and prevention programs, improving access to diagnosis and  
13   treatment services to Kentuckians, and to assist the Cabinet of Health and family Services in identifying  
14   eating disorder research centers.

An Act Relating To the Minimum Wage

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: KRS 337.275 is amended to read as follows:

Amend (1.) to read as follows, "Except as may otherwise be provided by this chapter, every employer shall pay to each of his employees wages at a rate of not less than eight dollars and zero cents (\$8.00) an hour beginning on April 16th, 2022 not less than eight dollars and seventy-five cents (\$8.75) an hour beginning April 16th, 2023 and not less than nine dollars and fifty cents (\$9.50) an hour beginning April 16th, 2024 If the federal minimum hourly wage as prescribed by 29 U.S.C. sec. 206(a)(1) is increased in excess of the minimum hourly wage in effect under this subsection, the minimum hourly wage under this subsection shall be increased to the same amount, effective on the same date as the federal minimum hourly wage rate. If the state minimum hourly wage is increased to the federal minimum hourly wage, it shall include only the federal minimum hourly rate prescribed in 29 U.S.C. sec. 206(a)(1) and shall not include other wage rates or conditions, exclusions, or exceptions to the federal minimum hourly wage rate. In addition, the increase to the federal minimum hourly wage rate does not extend or modify the scope or coverage of the minimum wage rate required under this chapter."

Section 2: This Act takes effect April 1st, 2022.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 337 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

6  
7 (1) This section entitles eligible employees of covered employers to take paid, job-protected leave for family  
8 responsibilities including: The birth and care of a child within 12 months of the birth; The placement with the  
9 employee of a child for adoption and to care for the newly placed child within one year of placement.

10 (2) Covered employers must fit this criteria:

- 11 (A) Private-sector employer, with 50 or more employees in 20 or more workweeks in the current or
- 12 preceding calendar year, including a joint employer or successor in interest to a covered employer;
- 13 (B) Public agency, including a local, state, or Federal government agency, regardless of the number of
- 14 employees it employs;
- 15 (C) Public elementary and secondary schools, despite having less than 50 employees.

16 (3) Eligible employees must fit the following criteria:

- 17 (A) Is employed by a covered employer;
- 18 (B) has worked for the employer for at least 12 months prior to the taken leave, as a part-time or full-time
- 19 worker;
- 20 (C) has physical, legal, sole, or joint custody over the child that is being taken care of during the leave.


21  
22 Section 2: Weekly benefits of paid leave will be the average weekly hours an employee has worked in the past year, times the  
23 minimum wage. Employers are required to pay 75% of these weekly benefits, while the state will subsidize the other 25% for  
24 Kentucky residents.

25  
26 Section 3: The subsidized money will be allotted by Department of Labor Employees, who will (1) Design, establish and operate  
27 a system to accurately allot money to eligible employees who are taking paid parental leave. (2) Create a system to receive and  
28 verify the requests for the state subsidized portion of paid leave.

29  
30 Section 4: There is appropriated to the Department of Labor employees in Section 3 from the Kentucky Department of Labor  
31 Fund \$10,000,000 in the fiscal year 2022-2023 for the purposes of enacting this bill. Notwithstanding KRS 45.229, any  
32 appropriation unexpended at the end of fiscal year 2021-2022 shall not lapse but be carried forward into the next fiscal  
33 year.

34  
35 Section 5: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

36  
37 Section 6: This Act takes effect July 1, 2022.

An Act Relating to Creating Access to Safe Abortions

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: In the United States, nearly 1 in 4 women (23.7%) will have an abortion by age 45. Each year, between 4.7-13.2% of maternal deaths can be attributed to unsafe abortions. Knowing this, Kentucky still restricts access to safe, legal abortions.


Section 2: This bill will create a new section of KRS 18A.225 K requiring public and private insurance coverage of abortion should be considered essential healthcare services.

Section 3: Kentucky will no longer require a patient seeking an abortion to receive state-directed counseling and ultrasounds, and repeal forced delay before obtaining care.

Section 4: Telemedicine bans on abortion will be lifted and use of telemedicine as an option to complete the consent process for medication and procedural abortion care.

Section 5: This bill will require local law enforcement to enforce the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act to protect patients and clinic staff from anti-abortion protestors.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect 90 days after passage.

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5   Section 1: In the United States, 30.1% of high school students reported having had sexual intercourse. As a result,  
6   75% of pregnancies among 15-19 year olds in the United States are listed as unplanned.

7  
8   Section 2: According to the CDC an estimation of appromixity 20 million new STD infections occur annually and  
9   almost half are young people aged 15-24 are affected by this; however, only 38.6% of Kentucky secondary  
10   schools provided students with curricula or supplementary materials that included HIV, STD, or pregnancy  
11   prevention information relevant to youth.

12  
13   Section 3: KRS 158.1415 is repealed and reenacted to read as follows: “If a school council or, if none exists, the  
14   principal adopts a curriculum for human sexuality or sexually transmitted diseases, instruction shall include but  
15   not be limited to the following content:

- 16           (1) Abstinence from sexual activity is the desirable goal for all school-age children who are under the legal  
17           age of consent for the Commonwealth of Kentucky;
- 18           (2) Recognizing that Abstinence is effective when practiced fully, but is not the only attainable method,  
19           and that other methods such as contraceptive measures and informed decisions can be more effective  
20           and promotes better understanding and a better chance of being practiced fully.
- 21           (3) The state requirements for sex education within public schools will include the following components:  
22           Kindergarten grade requirements are: A course on general consent, one’s personal boundaries, and  
23           respect for oneself and others, along with informing students about the idea of safe spaces and adults.  
24           Fourth grade requirements are: A course on the anatomy of the male and female reproductive systems,  
25           including the changes that occur during puberty. A course on the concepts of different sexualities and  
26           gender identities. Seventh grade requirements are: A course over the general concept of sexual  
27           interactions, including the application of contraceptive methods. A course over the general transmission  
28           and dangers of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs). Ninth grade requirements are: A course on  
29           mechanics pertaining to different types of sexual interactions, which provides an in-depth view of the  
30           transmission, dangers, and different types of sexually transmitted diseases. Eleventh grade requirements  
31           are: A course to review ideas from previous courses, namely sexually transmitted diseases, the mechanics  
32           of different sexual interactions, contraceptive measures, consent, and safe and informed sex.”

33  
34   Section 4: This bill will be enacted starting in the 2023–2024 school year.

An Act Relating To Suicide Prevention Classes


**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: The US in general has a very high suicide rate of 13.42 per 100,000 people. Suicide in the US is a very big issue, being the 10th leading cause in death in the US. Teens especially are heavy hit with suicide, suicide being the 3rd leading cause of death in teenagers.

Section 2: Kentucky is above the average with an average of 16.5 per 100,000 people according to the CDC. This rate is way too high, and we think we need to do something to help change that. We propose that classes should be taught to middle and high schoolers to teach them about suicide prevention. These classes would be taught over whatever class the school individually decides it will be taught over, for example, one school might want it to be taught over health classes while a different school.

Section 3: The curriculum of these classes would consist of teaching the children about the warning signs of suicide, what causes suicide and mental health issues, how to recognize those warning signs, how to properly approach someone with questions about their mental health, and how to warn those around you of these warning signs. These classes would be taught biweekly to give proper time to teach the curriculum.

1                                    An Act Relating To Food Deserts In The Commonwealth Of Kentucky.


2  
3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5    Section 1: A food desert is a geographic area where access to affordable, healthy food options, such as  
6    fruits and vegetables, is limited or nonexistent because grocery stores are not within close proximity. This  
7    proximity is defined as  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile to  $\frac{4}{5}$  of a mile of travel to the nearest grocery for any specific population. For  
8    this reason, food deserts are commonly located in low-income and rural areas. The term “grocery store” is a  
9    blanket term that can be used to refer to grocery retail stores such as a supermarket, multi-department  
10   store, price-impact warehouse store, and/or marketplace store, assuming it adheres to the certification  
11   standard in section 2.

12  
13   Section 2: (1) This law will give a one-time 20 percent tax credit to certified stores that open in areas  
14   considered as food deserts. Stores would apply to receive tax credits to open in areas considered a food  
15   desert. To be certified to receive these credits, the applicant must have at least 35% of their products be  
16   fresh produce, poultry, dairy, and deli items. This would ensure that those of any class or zip code will have  
17   access to nutritionally adequate foods. (2) According to the Office of the State Budget Director in the 2022  
18   budget for Kentucky, a total of \$161,500,000 has been allocated from the “General Fund” of the Fiscal year  
19   2022 for the purpose of “Tax Expenditures.” Quoting from the budget, “Tax expenditure” as used in this  
20   section means an exemption, exclusion, or deduction from the base of a tax, a credit against the tax, a  
21   deferral of a tax, or a preferential tax rate. The one-time credit outlined in Section 2 (1) will be funded  
22   through the resources dedicated to such credit from the allocated \$161,500,000.

23  
24   Section 3: Persons living in a food desert have a more difficult time getting to their nearest grocery store but  
25   may be near local gas stations or fast-food restaurants. With limited options within a radius of most homes,  
26   many turn to unhealthy foods that are close at hand. This reduced access to nutritious foods is related to  
27   higher rates of illnesses and shorter life spans, along with obesity, which is one of the most prominent rising  
28   health issues.

29  
30   Section 4: This law will be enacted by January 1, 2022

1 An Act Requiring Successful Completion of Parenting Course to Prevent Child Abuse for High School Graduation

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Whereas the Commonwealth of Kentucky tragically leads the nation in child abuse and neglect. In 2020,  
6 Kentucky children suffered abuse from their parent/guardian at a rate of 23.5/1,000. At the time of drafting this bill,  
7 over 10,000 children are currently in foster care due to child abuse. Over 50 children died in the past year at the hands  
8 of their abusive parents/guardians.

9  
10 Section 2: Whereas research in family and human development demonstrates that parenting classes designed to  
11 prevent child abuse have proven effective in preventing the commission of child abuse even when completed prior to  
12 having children.


13  
14 Section 3: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

- 15 (1) Beginning with the entering ninth grade class of the 2022-2023 school year and each year thereafter,  
16 successful completion of one (1) or more courses or programs that meet the parenting to prevent child abuse  
17 literacy standards shall be a Kentucky public high school graduation requirement. The graduation requirement  
18 shall also apply to a student pursuing an early graduation program, as established in KRS 158.142.  
19 (2) In accordance with KRS 156.160, the Kentucky Board of Education shall promulgate administrative  
20 regulations establishing academic standards and a graduation requirement for parenting to prevent child abuse  
21 literacy.  
22 (3) The local school-based decision making council, or principal if no council exists, of each high school shall  
23 determine curricula for course offerings, programs, or a combination of course offerings and programs that are  
24 aligned with the parenting to prevent child abuse literacy academic standards promulgated by the Kentucky  
25 Board of Education.  
26 (4) The Department of Education shall develop parenting to prevent child abuse literacy guidelines that provide  
27 direction to local schools in developing and implementing the parenting to prevent child abuse literacy  
28 standards.

29  
30 Section 4: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

31  
32 Section 5: There is appropriated to the Kentucky Department of Education \$250,000 annually for curriculum and  
33 instructional material development and distribution.

34  
35 Section 6: This Act takes effect January 1, 2023.

1                                    An Act Relating To The Legalizing Recreational Gambling in Kentucky

2  
3                                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5    Section 1: The act of recreational Gambling within the State of Kentucky is illegal within its entirety. This  
6 includes; the operated one casinos, the operation of slot machines, the playing of sanctioned table game  
7 events, and various other forms with the exception of horse betting and charity events.

8  
9    Section 2: Punishments vary from up to a 12 month jail sentence if found in possession of a slot machine, a  
10 Class A Misdemeanor, to a fine of upwards of \$20,000 in the case of felony gambling charges. The  
11 elimination of such charges will allow the freeing of resources within the State judicial systems.

12  
13    Section 3: This bill will authorize the legalization of recreational gambling and gambling institutions within  
14 the State of Kentucky. Operations including casinos, slot machines, gambling tournaments, sports betting,  
15 etc. are to be legalized.

16  
17    Section 4: State taxes will be levied on gambling winnings of a flat 24% tax rate. Winnings over \$5000 will  
18 also be subject to an income tax.


19  
20    Section 5: State revenue brought in from taxation on Kentucky gambling operations will be used to facilitate  
21 further development of infrastructure and fund state programs.

22  
23    Section 6: The act of gambling promotion is to be legalized as well so long as it is specifically targeted at  
24 adults over the age of 21.

25  
26    Section 7: This bill will relate to both on the ground as well as online gambling, also including sports betting  
27 of both varieties.

28  
29    Section 8: This bill is to go into effect 30 days after passing.

1                   An Act Relating To Implementing A "Pay As You Throw" Collection Service in the State of Kentucky  
2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: Pay as you throw (PAYT) is a different way of paying for waste collection and disposal services. Residents are  
6 asked to pay for waste collection directly based on the amount of garbage they actually generate. PAYT breaks with  
7 tradition by treating trash services just like electricity, gas, and other utilities. This program will be implemented by the  
8 Energy and Environment Cabinet of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, which is the official planning, implementation, and  
9 enforcement of waste management. This program will work on a per-container basis. Households will be charged for  
10 each can of waste they generate or based on the weight of their trash. Either way, this system motivates people to  
11 recycle more and to generate ideas to have less waste in the first place.  
12  
13 Section 2: "Pay-as-you-Throw" programs have been implemented in nearly 6,000 communities across the country. This  
14 was put into acting in areas such as Dover, NH, Falmouth, ME, Fort Collins, CO, Gainesville, FL, Mount Vernon, IA,  
15 Poquoson, VA, and San Jose, CA.  
16  
17 Section 3: This bill provides an initiative for recycling and buying items with less packaging. When the cost of managing  
18 trash is hidden in taxes or charged at a flat rate, residents who recycle and prevent waste subsidize their neighbors'  
19 wastefulness. Under PAYT, residents pay only for what they throw away. Each household under this program is self-  
20 sufficient. Trying to generate less waste for lower costs ties directly to recycling more. Valuable landfill space is  
21 conserved as well, reducing the need to site new facilities. 1994 in Gainesville, FL, PAYT was implemented and the  
22 results of the first year of the program were effective. The amount of solid waste collected decreased 18 percent, and  
23 the recyclables recovered increased 25 percent. The total disposal tonnage decreased from 22,120 to 18,116. This  
24 resulted in a savings of \$186,200 to the residential sector or \$7.95 per home.  
25  
26 Section 4: One important cost of solid waste, in addition to its other environmental effects, is climate change.  
27 Community PAYT programs—which spur residents to prevent and recycle more waste—can reduce greenhouse gas  
28 emissions significantly.  
29  
30 Section 5: Average trash collection services in KY cost from \$25-\$100 a month. Whereas in places that have  
31 implemented PAYT, such as Gainesville, Florida, costs are dependent on each household's waste output. Residents are  
32 offered 32-, 64-, 96-, and 128-g  
33  
34 Section 6: This bill will go into effect on April 6, 2022, 4 months after the bill's passing.

An Act Relating To Regulating Older Drivers

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: This Act establishes that:

- a. Drivers renewing their driver’s license over the age of 70 must require proof of ability to safely drive on the road.
- b. When renewing their license, they must present proof from a primary care physician that they are safe to drive on the road.
- c. The primary care physician must indicate the following factors:
  - i. Proof of adequate vision.
  - ii. Proof of adequate reflexes.
  - iii. Proof of adequate hearing.
  - iv. Confirmation of general competence to drive.
- d. If their primary care physician does not believe that the individual is fit to drive they must immediately turn in their license and withdraw from driving.

Section 2: All drivers over the age of 70 must renew their driver’s license every 4 years and always in person.

An Act Relating To to gifted education in secondary schools.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS 157 IS CREATED TO BE READ AS FOLLOWS:

(1) Local school districts shall provide a minimum of one hour per week of self contained gifted instruction for those students identified as "gifted and talented".

Section 2: This course can be taught by a gifted and talented specialist or a regular secondary classroom teacher that has received professional development on gifted education.

Section 3: This course should be offered in addition to honors, advanced placement, and dual credit classes.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect on August 1, 2022.

**Governor's Bill Signing Announcement**

After meeting with the Sponsors of all Commonwealth Bills that passed the House & Senate, as well as consulting with the Cabinet and the Budget Committee, the Governor will announce (after Fun Time on second night) which Commonwealth Bills are being signed into law.

If your bill passed the House and Senate but was not announced, then has been vetoed by the Governor (Note: there are NO vetoes at MS KYA – all Commonwealth Bills passed by the House and Senate are signed into law). A full list of vetoes will be posted by the Y-Desk. Bill Sponsors wishing to challenge a veto can sign-up for the Veto Override Session at the Y-Desk.



**Day 3 | Morning**


**Veto Override Session | HS KYA Only**

At HS KYA, prior to the start of Closing Ceremony, any Bill Sponsors who wish to challenge the Governor's veto will be given the opportunity to do so during the Veto Override Session.

Bills on the Override Session docket required a 2/3-majority vote of the Assembly to be heard. If the vote is successful, the Governor and Bill Sponsors each get 1 min. to speak. Bill Sponsors can yield part of their time to Lobbyists, and the Governor can yield to a Cabinet Member or the Attorney General. A final simple majority vote is required to override the veto and enact the bill into law.

2  
3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: Within the medical world, minority patients are not provided the proper treatment due to  
6   misconceptions or bias maintained by the caregiver. Black patients receive inadequate care, meaning death  
7   or suffering, in comparison to their white counterparts. Those with a high BMI are also likely to receive unfair  
8   treatment in medical situations.

9  
10   Section 2: Currently, every Medicaid/Medicare patient must fill out an HCAHPS survey after surgery  
11   discharge due to the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005. Up to 80% of many hospital's pay comes from the  
12   Medicaid. Medicare payment. If the HCAHPS is scoring low, it affects their payment.

13  
14   Section 3: The payment does not cover inadequate quality care caused by a hospital. Our bill corrects this,  
15   ensuring that if a patient reports mistreatment believed to be on the bases of race, gender, sexuality, or  
16   weight and that claim be proven that the hospital will be fined, the caregiver will be suspended until courses  
17   correcting racial bias and others on caregiving are completed, and, should the rate of claims not go down,  
18   state funding is reduced by 5% each year until there is a decline in the trend.

19  
20   Section 4: If passed this bill will go into effect February 2022.

6 Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 152 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Kentucky will use the  
7 Abandoned Mine Lands as open area to create a large scale solar farm as a method to improve Kentucky’s  
8 participation in the transition to renewable energy as a more prominent source of Kentucky’s generated  
9 energy.

10  
11 Section 2: As the coal industry continues to decline, introducing a renewable energy industry, such as solar,  
12 to Kentucky increases the available jobs in regions that are seeing rising unemployment.

14 Section 3: There is appropriated \$500,000 from the Energy and Environment Environmental Support Budget  
15 for the purposes of this legislation in the fiscal year 2022-2023 and for the next ten years following to fund

An Act Relating To Eliminate Food Deserts

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 205 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) Establishing food co-ops in food deserts.

Section 2: Food deserts are defined as areas that have limited access to affordable and nutritious food, in contrast with areas with higher access to supermarkets or vegetable shops with fresh foods, which is called a food oasis. This bill will provide residents of typically impoverished areas food co-ops to support the establishment and operation of grocery stores in underserved communities.

Section 3: The implementation of a surplus of food co-op-like grocery stores will occur. Co-ops typically have a lower overhead than most grocery stores and offer the capacity to buy in bulk, which can actually lead to lower prices.

Section 4: We will be giving grants out to counties riddled with food deserts every 6 years to help build government food co-ops. These co-ops will be funded by the SNAP EBT program and the 13% tax money that is targeted to the food assistance part of Income Security.

Section 5: This bill will be enacted 90 days after passing.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 154.27 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

6           (1) All current and upcoming green energy plant owners shall be awarded with tax benefits in  
7           addition to the tax deductions as stated in KRS Section 139.517.

8           (2) All third-party technicians responsible for providing and servicing the said green energy plants  
9           shall also receive similar benefits.

10  
11   Section 2: A green energy plant is a power plant that utilizes renewable natural resources for the production  
12   of energy. For this specific legislation, a green energy plant is characterized by energy production using: [1]  
13   Solar, [2] Wind, [3] Geothermal, [4] Hydroelectric, or [5] Biomatter sources. Green refers to the utilization of  
14   natural resources to combat environment or energy-related issues.

15  
16   Section 3: Commercial business owners are eligible for tax bonuses followed by cuts in property tax for the  
17   deed the plant resides on. Current owners will receive a bonus merited by the size, the kilowatt-hours  
18   produced, and the cost to construct the plant, all of which are to be determined from official inspection. The  
19   starting rate for discounts for the first year is two percent. The discount rate appreciates half a percent  
20   every subsequent full year. The discount rate will reach a leveling point at the beginning of the eleventh year  
21   and will remain at seven percent for the duration of the plant’s existence. Upcoming plant owners are eligible  
22   for the same tax benefits but not the bonus.

23  
24   Section 4: This act will also enact a discount rate suspension for owners whose green energy plants have:


25           [1] Transference of ownership.

26           [2] Loss of green status through the usage of non-renewable natural resources.

27           [3] The plant does not pertain to official code.

28  
29   Section 5: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

30  
31   Section 6: This Act takes effect May 18, 2022.

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An Act to Legalize Medical and Recreational Marijuana

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


Section 1: In the United States, only 19 of the twenty states have legalized marijuana for recreational and medical usage. The legalization of marijuana (recreational and medical) is said to boost the US economy by over \$24 billion in revenue by 2025.

Section 2: People buying marijuana illegally off the street have no idea what has gone into or come into contact with the drug, whether that is mold and or pesticides. For example, according to the Washington Law any THC that is sold has to have warning labels for health, quantity labels, and quality assurance.


Section 3: Police time and energy that used to be focused on marijuana deals can now be put forth more important matters.

Section 4: KRS 218 is to be repealed and replaced to read as follows:

- 1) Decriminalize all marijuana use. Decriminalizing marijuana can increase public safety and opens up job opportunities to those who lost their jobs during the pandemic.

5   Section 1: A NEW CHAPTER OF KRS IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) No motorcyclists may cross  
6   between adjacent lines of lanes of traffic or moving vehicles. The operator may not operate a motorcycle  
7   between lanes of traffic.

9   Section 2: Kentucky is one of several states for Lane Splitting and Lane Filtering not to be explicitly defined  
10 as "legal or illegal." Motorcycle operators may be pulled over for reckless driving violations, but it isn't  
11 necessarily against the law.  
12  
13 Section 3: Under KRS 534.040, no violation fines may surpass \$250. A first offense of the law will be the  
14 violation and \$100 fine. A second offense is a six-month suspension of license and \$250 violation fine. Third  
15 offense is a twelve-month suspension of license and driver's safety course. After the third offense the  
16 operator will have a lifetime revocation of a motorcycle license.

5 Section 1: KRS 218A.350 states all substances, machinery, or devices used for the manufacture, packaging,

7 distributor for the manufacture, distribution, sale, or transfer of substances in violation of KRS 218A.350  
8 shall be seized and forfeited to the state. Substances manufactured, held, or distributed in violation of KRS  
9 218A.350 shall be deemed contraband.

10  
11 Section 2: KRS 218A.350 is amended to read as follows: If the defendant is proven guilty, any contraband  
12 seized through KRS 218a.350 shall be given to the Affordable Housing Trust Fund instead of the state. If  
13 they are proven not guilty, then the assets will be given back to the defendant.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: The Kentucky county prisons are overcrowded and heavily understaffed. The shift of some  
6 inmates to privately owned prisons in Kentucky will reduce the number of overcrowded prisons, as well as  
7 offering new employment opportunities to other regions in Kentucky. Privately owned prisons have a  
8 significantly lower financial burden on the State Government due to the financial support from private  
9 businesses. With the implementation of more private prisons, there is more opportunity to provide  
10 rehabilitation programs in the prisons.

11  
12 Section 2: In order to eradicate the high populations of Kentucky prisons, this bill would implement the  
13 transition of inmates from public county prisons to private prisons (refer to Section 1).

14  
15 Section 3: Seeing as it takes \$45,000 annually to fund a private prison, the legislature will create a budget to  
16 support the cost for private prisoners. These prisons will be funded by private businesses as well, but the  
17 Kentucky Government will also provide financial assistance alongside private businesses. The funds provided  
18 by the government will be based on the number of inmates and the length of time to be served.

19  
20 Section 4: Upon the passage of this bill, it will go into effect on June 1, 2022.

An Act Relating To the Redistricting of Kentucky Ambulances

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: The current average response time for the Louisville Metro EMS is eight minutes and fifty-one seconds. The national average is seven minutes- including outliers from rural areas with a low population density. After hospital closures due to Covid-19 and considering the sparse population density in some rural areas of Kentucky, response time in some areas is more than twenty-six minutes. This can mean the difference between life and death.

Section 2: This bill will require the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services to oversee the redistricting of ambulances with regard to distance from the nearest emergency medical station, rather than county lines.


Section 3: An exception can be made in the event that travel time is greater than suggested by distance from the nearest emergency medical station. In these cases, a district with a more easily accessible EMS will assume the route.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect in stages to allow for easy adjustment to the redistricting. Stage one will be manipulating current district lines to slowly complete the redistricting. This will have an adjustment period of six months. Stage two will consist of the same elements as stage one, slowly continuing to move borders in order to prevent a large shock. This will have an adjustment period of six months. Stage three will complete the redistricting. This will have an adjustment period of six months. After this period of 18 months, there will be a three-month time to make adjustment to districts depending on currently unforeseen issues. The final date for this bill to be in effect will be December 31, 2023.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: Amending KRS 210.005 by adding the following new section:

6 The term "sexual orientation" shall mean having an attraction or being perceived as having an  
7 attraction towards persons of the opposite sex or gender, the same sex or gender, or more than one  
8 sex or gender. The term "gender identity" shall mean a person's gender-related identity, appearance  
9 or behavior that is different from what is traditionally associated with a person's sex at birth.  
10 Gender-related identity may be shown by providing evidence such as medical history, care or  
11 treatment of the gender related identity, consistent and uniform assertion of the identity, or any  
12 other evidence that the gender-related identity is sincerely held as part of a person's core identity.  
13 The term "sexual orientation or gender identity change efforts" shall mean any practice or treatment  
14 by a licenced professional that seeks to change an individual's sexual orientation or gender identity.  
15 This includes efforts to change behaviors or gender expressions and efforts to eliminate or reduce  
16 romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of the same sex. The term "sexual orientation or  
17 gender identity change efforts" does not include practices that provide assistance to a person  
18 undergoing gender transition, provide acceptance, support, and understanding of a person's sexual  
19 orientation or gender identity; facilitate coping, social support, and identity exploration and  
20 development; provide sexual orientation-neutral and gender identity-neutral interventions to prevent  
21 or address unlawful or unsafe conduct, as long as such practices do not seek to change an  
22 individual's sexual orientation or gender identity.

23  
24 Section 2: A new section of KRS 210 is created to read as follows Under no circumstances shall a qualified  
25 mental health provider as defined in KRS 202A.011 advertise for, encourage, or engage in sexual orientation  
26 or gender identity change efforts with a patient less than 18 years of age, an adult as defined in KRS  
27 209.020, or a ward as defined in KRS 387.510. Any report of violation of subsection 2 shall be filed into the  
28 appropriate professional certification or licencing board for review. The mental health professional will be  
29 subject to discipline, including suspension or removal of license/certification, as the appropriate board sees  
30 fit.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


Section 1: SECTION 1. KRS 158.1415 IS REPEALED AND REENACTED TO READ AS FOLLOWS

Section 2: The Kentucky Board of Education should adopt a curriculum for human sexuality or sexually transmitted diseases, instructions shall include but not be limited to the following content: Resources regarding sexually transmitted diseases and safe sex, birth control methods, local health department information, and pregnancy and reproduction. Inclusion of LGBTQIA+ dynamics Providing a strong understanding of consent why the concept is important to having a safe and healthy relationship. Understanding of diverse cultures and different cultural interpretations of intimacy and sexual health.

Section 3: The qualified instructor of the course will provide high quality, scientifically accurate information with knowledge, experience, and awareness of a community's unique challenges and will be an important resource for the sexual education program.

Section 4: The sexual education course will be a required course for graduation.

Section 5: This Act takes effect at the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year.

AN ACT Proposing an Amendment to section 33 of the constitution of Kentucky relating to redistricting

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: Section 33 of the constitution of the state of Kentucky is amended to read as follows: An independent redistricting commission for state house, state senate and congressional districts (hereinafter referred to as the "commission") is to be established as a commission within the General Assembly. The commission shall create and adopt a redistricting plan, following a census, for each of the following types of districts: state house districts, state senate districts, and congressional districts. Each commissioner shall

- a. Be registered and eligible to vote in the Commonwealth of Kentucky;
- b. Be above the age of twenty one;
- c. Not currently be or have been in the past 8 years any of the following:
  - i. A candidate for partisan federal, state, or local office;
  - ii. An elected or appointed official to federal, state, or local office;
  - iii. An officer or member of the governing body of any national, state, or elected political party;
  - iv. An employee of the General Assembly;
  - v. An employee of a federal, state, or local elected official, or political candidate, of a federal, state or local political candidates campaign, or of a political action committee.
  - vi. Not be a parent, stepparent, child, stepchild, or spouse of any individual disqualified under part c.
- d. Not be otherwise disqualified for appointed or elected office by this constitution.
- e. For eight years after the date of appointment, a commissioner is ineligible to hold a partisan elective office at the state, county, or city level.

Section 2: Nine Commissioners are selected through the following process:

- a. The General Assembly shall make applications for commissioner available to the general public before the end of the legislative session of the year of the federal decennial census.
- b. Those who have applied will be vetted by the secretary of state for the prior disqualifications from section 1.
- c. Those who have advanced will be selected at random from the following pools:
  - i. 3 of the commissioners will be selected from the voter rolls of the party in the commonwealth of Kentucky with the greatest number of registered voters.
  - ii. 3 of the commissioners will be selected from the voter rolls of the party in the commonwealth of Kentucky with the second greatest number of registered voters.
  - iii. 3 of the commissioners will be selected from registered independent voters. Applicants will receive notice as to whether they have or have not been appointed to the commission by the first of May of the year following the decennial census.

Section 3: A software is developed by the legislative research commission and approved by the General Assembly and Governor. This software is to become open source and of free access to the general population of the commonwealth Kentucky one week after being introduced to the commission. This software is to be reexamined and updated every ten years. In addition, The General Assembly and Governor shall do all of the following:

- a. Assist commissioners in making maps that are accurate to the geography of Kentucky.
- b. Assist commissioners in making maps accurate to precinct or county borders.
- c. Assist commissioners in making maps that represent the correct amount of people.
- d. Assist Commissioners in making free and fair maps.


Section 4: The Commission is to first meet as a group on August the second, unless it is a Sunday, in which case they will meet the following Monday. The commission will then meet once again every two weeks until they have adopted a plan. At least half of the meetings are to be open to the public for viewing or input. Each commissioner may submit one redistricting plan at a time to be voted on by the commission for each meeting. A plan is adopted when;

- a. 5 of the nine commissioners have agreed on a map and;
  - i. At Least one commissioner from the largest and one commissioner second largest parties of the Commonwealth of Kentucky by party registration have agreed on said map.
  - ii. If the commission is unable to adopt a map by October 30th then one map will be chosen from the group of the most recent redistricting plan submitted by each commission member. No commissioner may have more than one redistricting plan present in a random selection.
- b. Barring a ruling of unconstitutionality by the Kentucky Supreme Court, this map is to be used until after the Commonwealth of Kentucky receives data from the next decennial census.
- c. Redistricting commissioners are to be compensated with \$200 per full day of their work. This money is to be taken from the general fund.

Section 5: Commissioners are not to draw maps based upon a population's race, sex, age, residency of incumbents, or party affiliation.

Section 6: This statute goes into effect January 2nd 2023.

Section 7: This amendment shall be submitted to the voters of the Commonwealth for their ratification or rejection at the time and in the manner provided for under Sections 256 and 257 of the Constitution and under KRS 118.415

An Act Requiring Sex Education In Kentucky Schools

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: A new section of KRS 158 Subchapter 991 is created to read as followed:

1. Basic sex education will be taught in a grade-appropriate manner to all students grades 5-12.
2. This curriculum will be medically accurate and decided by Kentucky Department of Education, required under Kentucky Academic Standards
3. If schools fail to reach these requirements, action will be taken by the Department of Education as established in Clause 3 of Statute 158 Subchapter 6455 which reads as followed:
  1. After receiving the advice of the Office of Education Accountability; the School Curriculum, Assessment, and Accountability Council; and the National Technical Advisory Panel on Assessment and Accountability, the Kentucky Board of Education shall promulgate an administrative regulation in conformity with KRS 158.6471 and 158.6472 and KRS Chapter 13A to establish more rigorous action, intervention, and appropriate consequences for schools that fail to exit comprehensive support and improvement status described in KRS 160.346. The consequences shall be designed to improve the academic performance and learning environment of identified schools and may include but not be limited to:
    - (a) A review and audit process to determine the appropriateness of a school's or district's classification and to recommend needed assistance;
    - (b) School and district improvement plans;
    - (c) Eligibility to receive Commonwealth school improvement funds under KRS 158.805;
    - (d) Education assistance from highly skilled certified staff; and
    - (e) Observation of school personnel.

Section 2: This bill will be enacted for the 2024-2025 school year.

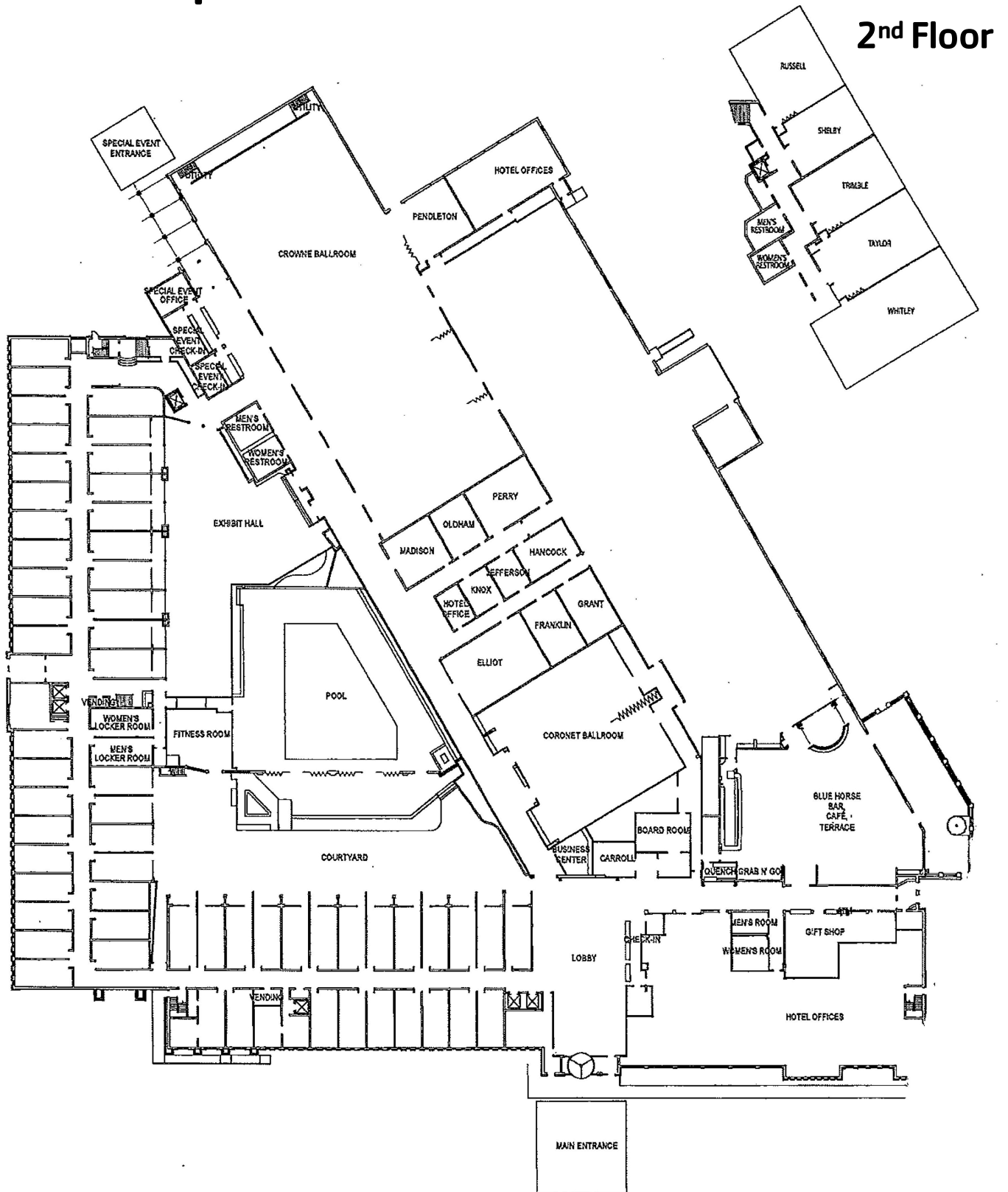
