15	Section 3: Online learning has affected kids with special education needs in many ways. They can't get the

17	attention to video lectures. Extra funding for the students who need more academic support after the
18	effects of Covid-19 is not necessary, because the leftover funds that weren't used during that time that may
19	have supported sports and extra-curricular activities could be put towards helping students in ESS instead.

5	Section 1: Many stores in Kentucky only provide plastic bags, which are harmful to the environment. Many
6	streets, parking lots, and neighborhoods have been littered with these plastic bags. This is dangerous for our
7	environment, therefore dangerous to all of our living organisms.
8	
9	Section 2: If an organism consumes plastic particles from items such as plastic bags, it could face serious
10	injuries or fatal consequences. This results in a potential species extinction, which in turn negatively affects
11	the ecosystem. According to wwf.org , approximately 100,000 marine animals die every year as a result of
12	plastic pollution. With the implementation of this bill we can reduce these numbers significantly.

5	Section 1: In the state of Kentucky we place a sales tax on period products, the same tax we place on any
6	random good. We are proposing a bill to exempt period products from the Kentucky state sales tax. This
7	would exclude products such as tampons, pads, liner, menstrual cups and any other related products from
8	the Kentucky regulated sales tax.
9	
10	Section 2: Sales tax is defined as a tax imposed on the gross receipts derived from both retail sales of
11	tangible personal property, digital property, and sales of certain services in Kentucky.

13	Section 3: Women and families who are impoverished or have related to the struggle of obtaining safe period
14	products will benefit from the removal of tax on these items. Not to mention, this assembly retains the right
15	to change the sales tax according to section 171 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

17	Section 4: As of 2020, roughly 400,000 women live below the poverty line in Kentucky. Sales tax adds up
18	when you have to buy products for a bodily function that you cannot control. Sales tax on period products
19	leads to sex-based discrimination in violation of the equal protection clause, both under state and federal
20	constitutionsmaking it more than merely unfair or inequitable, but unconstitutional to an extent. In
21	Kentucky, we currently have a 2.2 billion dollar budget, with removing this tax off of specified products we
22	plan to lose around 0.403% of our annual budget.

6	Currently, 21% of children ages 0–17 experience secondhand smoking and its detrimental effects on their

8	problems, frequent ear infections, frequent and more severe asthma attacks, respiratory infections, such as

12	Section 2: Foster children living under the poverty line will be able to receive free housing and utilities paid
13	for by the Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC) until they are 21 years of age. Food vouchers will be

16	Section 3: Psychology classes will be mandatory in Academies throughout the state. Teaching on the effects

18	addition to learning about the mental health of first responders they will also be taught how to deal with the
19	general population in a mental health crisis.
20 21	Section 4: Bi yearly mandatory Mental Health checks for all firefighter and police officers will be staggered

1 An Act Relating To Reduce The Amount Of Newborns Dependent On Illegal Substances. 2 3 Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky 4 5 Section 1: In an effort to reduce the amount of infants who unwillingly come out of the womb dependent on 6 illegal substances, the Commonwealth of Kentucky must address the issue of illegal substance use during 7 pregnancy. The number of newborns dependent on illegal substances in the state of Kentucky has climbed 8 from 46 in 2001 to 1,115 in 2016. 9 10 Section 2: With expectant mothers already drug tested if suspected of illegal substance abuse within their 11 pregnancy, our bill would mandate that all mothers be subject to drug tests during their pregnancies. If a 12 mother tests positive for substance abuse, she will be required by law to undergo steps to ensure the health 13 of her unborn child and her own health. 14 15 Section 3: The healthcare provider caring for women suspected of substance abuse are required by law to 16 report any positive drug tests to the Kentucky Perinatal Quality Initiative Collaboration (KPOIC), which is a 17 program that is already within our Commonwealth's healthcare system that receives generous state and 18 federal funding through grants and private benefactors. 19 20 Section 4: The KQPIC will put these rules into effect after receiving word on a positive illegal substance case : 21 1st offense: If a woman tests positive for illegal substance abuse during their pregnancy, they will receive a 22 warning from their healthcare provider, informing them of the danger it can cause to both mother and 23 unborn child. The mother will then be required to perform mandatory drug tests frequently to ensure she is 24 not abusing substances. 2nd offense: After a second positive test, mothers will go through a mandatory 25 rehabilitation program exclusively focused on the well-being of the unborn child and the mother under the 26 professional care of the KQPIC. 27 28 Section 5: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2022 upon passage and signature of the Governor.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
Section 1: The following KRS section is repealed: 63.030 – Petition for Impeachment.
Section 2: A NEW OF SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 63 is created to read as follows:
[1] All impeachment resolutions must originate in the Kentucky House of Representatives. The House
shall refer the resolution to a committee, with power to send for persons and papers, to report
thereon.
[2] The impeachment committee shall be composed of an equal number of members from any major
political party represented in the House with at least ten (10) members. An alternate from each party
should be named in the case a conflict of interest or resignation arises. Proceedings of the
committee may be made public upon a majority vote of the committee.
[3] Upon the recommendation of impeachment by a majority vote of the committee, impeachments
shall be conducted by managers elected by the House of Representatives, who must prepare articles
of impeachment, present them at the bar of the Senate and prosecute the same, and the trial must
be held before the Senate sitting as a court of impeachment.

1	An Act Relating To Requiring State Universities To Have Natural Gas Detectors Installed In All Student
2	Residential Buildings
3	
4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
5	
6	Section 1: This bill will require state-funded universities to install working natural gas detectors in all student
7	residential buildings. Natural gases, such as radon and carbon monoxide, are clear and odorless, meaning
8	they generally go undetected. However, exposure to these gases often leads to severe illnesses, primarily
9	manifesting as a form of cancer that impacts the lungs or brain. Kentucky has the largest number of lung
10	cancer cases and deaths in the nation, and exposure to naturally occurring gases accounts for 10 to 15
11	percent of those cases.
12	
13	Section 2: Each state-funded university will include some variation of the following in their student housing
14	handbook: "Effective radon and carbon monoxide detectors will be located on every floor of student housing
15	based on university utilities." The specific number and spacing of natural gas detectors will vary between
16	universities and their student residential buildings.
17	
18	Section 3: Each university will be responsible for funding this Act. They will pay for the natural gas detectors
19	used in their housing, so the exact cost will vary between institutions. However, an average cost is
20	approximately \$400,000 per university.
21	
22	Section 4: State-funded universities will be responsible for implementing this Act.
23	
24	Section 5: This Act will go into effect three years following its passing.

1	An Act Relating To Riparian Corridors
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: Non-point source pollution is water pollution caused by rainfall or snowmelt that moves through
6	the ground into waterways, carrying pollutants into the water. Non-point sources pollute about three and a
7	half times as many miles of water as point sources. Riparian corridors, indigenous vegetation planted around
8	bodies of water, are found to be most effective when buffering non-point pollution. These corridors buffer
9	sixty to ninety percent of pollutants from going into waterways.
10	
11	Section 2: River Basins that collectively lack these buffers include The Trade and Green Water Basin, and The
12	Licking River Basin. Corridors will be constructed around various waterways in these basins. The
13	implementation of the corridors will be mandated through the Kentucky Environmental and Energy Cabinet
14	(EEC). Corridors will be constructed by the Army Corps. Of Engineers alongside individuals with court-ordered
15	community service. Annual reports will be carried out by the EEC to ensure the non-point pollutants meet or
16	exceed the "B" rating set by the EEC within a year of planting.
17	
18	Section 3: Corridor construction will be funded by the EEC's division of water budget. The projected cost is
19	\$1.3M.
20	
21	Section 4: This bill will be taken into effect on April 22, 2022.
22
