5	Section 1: In the state of Kentucky, 74% of inmates never get the chance to receive mental health services
6	within the prison system. The recidivism rate for crime in Kentucky is currently 29.17% for people who are
7	released from the prison systems. Quality mental health services are proven to deter crimes, and descend
8	the relapse rate.
9	
10	Section 2: This bill will affect every public state prison in Kentucky. It will provide help for inmates to get
11	mental health help they need. To enact this the prison system will employ independent therapists. Each
12	prison will hire five therapists who will each work two days of the week. Multiple therapists must be hired to
13	ensure that all prisoners have an equal opportunity to receive the assistance they want or need. Therapists
14	can also be more easily called for emergency sessions if there is access to more than one per location.
15	
16	Section 3: No inmate is required to go to remedial treatment, but they'll always have the option to. Having
17	this option will give inmates a sense of freedom in an environment where it feels like they have none. Having
18	a sense of freedom could help with easing their minds about attending remedial treatment.
19	
20	Section 4: The average cost to keep a prison running in Kentucky is around \$8 million per year. With this
21	budget, therapists should be paid from this budget because they are prison employees that are on call. As
22	employees of the prison, they will be paid accordingly. The typical hourly pay will be \$35, the emergency call
23	rate will be \$55.

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: Our court system is disproportionately affecting minorities; of the roughly 4 to 6 thousand juvenile cases each year 65
6	percent to 68 percent involve youths of color. Restorative Justice allows for victims to seek closure from their accuser who are
7	remorseful for their actions as well as repairs harm from criminal behavior. Allowing juveniles convicted of lesser crimes access to
8	alternate forms of justice will help end years of generational cycles as well as curses impacting minority families across the state.

13	the extent possible, have that treatment administered in the county of residence of the custodial parent or parents or in the
14	nearest available county;
15	(e) KRS Chapter 635 shall be interpreted to promote the best interests of the child through providing treatment and
16	sanctions to reduce recidivism and assist in making the child a productive citizen by involving the family, as appropriate, and
17	by advancing the principles of personal responsibility, accountability, and reformation.
18	
19	Section 3: Upon passage this bill will create a restorative justice council known as the "restorative justice coordinating council". The
20	purpose of the council is to support the development of restorative justice programs, serve as a central hub for information, assist in
21	the development and provision of related education and training, and provide technical assistance to entities engaged in or wishing to
22	develop restorative justice programs. This bill will help repair criminal behavior and decrease the number of incarcerated people of

6	This bill will require all public school teachers, new an existing to undergo mental health training before
7	entering into the classroom and every year thereafter.
8	
9	Section 2: Currently, Mental Health reports in America state that 1 in 5 school-age children have
10	diagnosable mental health issues. Over 10 million students between the ages of 13 and 18 need
11	professional help to address mental health issues. This matter in schools will provide children with the
12	chance to be helped with their specific mental health disorders. We want to help teachers in schools respond
13	appropriately and efficiently before and/or while students are dealing with any of the following mental health
14	disorders; all anxiety associated psychiatric disorders, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, Depressive

7	Kentucky schools system, in order to ensure a safe, secure, and orderly school environment, shall
8	implement surveillance cameras inside each classroom.

10	which includes principles, asst. principles, and guidance counselors, upholding the privacy of students.
11	a) The police department can also gain access to surveillance if there are any situations involving

14	The video footage provided by surveillance cameras can provide documentation that the school can
15	use to help settle a liability claim or to prosecute wrongdoers. Schools can NOT access such evidence
16	otherwise.
17	Teachers and students will be held accountable and disciplined for any misconduct that is reported
18	and proven, in a manner consistent with KRS 158.440-1.
19	Surveillance cameras will NOT be installed in bathrooms or in locker rooms, to maintain the privacy of
20	both students and teachers.
21	Surveillance cameras must be placed in a visible location, in order to make sure all people are aware
22	of the installations, as well as to make sure that all sections of the classrooms can be easily viewed.

2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: This bill will implement the Adulting 101 curriculum to be provided for every Kentucky public
6	school as a required high school credit needed to graduate.
7	
8	Section 2: This curriculum is a one-year class that must be completed in a classroom environment and can be
9	taken in any year of high school. An end-of-the-year exam must be passed with a 60% or higher in order to
10	earn the Adulting 101 credit for graduating.
11	
12	Section 3: The Adulting 101 course will include basic life skills that are not likely covered in other high school
13	courses. The curriculum will teach students how to write a resume and cover letter, apply for a job, and
14	present themselves in an interview. Basic first aid and vehicle maintenance will be included in the curriculum.
15	This course will touch on financial topics, including mortgages, taxes, car payments, insurance, budgeting,
16	and types of bills. Adulting 101 will demonstrate how to use household appliances, hand tools, and other
17	applied skills.
18	
19	Section 4: No additional teachers must be hired and no additional funds will be needed. The curriculum will be
20	provided by the Kentucky Department of Education. One or more career/technical education teacher(s) will
21	teach the course.
22	
23	Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2024–2025 school year.
24	
25	Section 6: Any school that does not efficiently implement this course in the school year of 2024–2025 will
26	be subject to review by the Kentucky Department of Education.

1	An Act Relating To The Reformation of Animal Cruelty Laws in Kentucky
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: This bill is meant to address statues 125-135 of KRS chapter 525 in KY state law. It is meant to
6	change what defines animal cruelty and the punishment of those convicted of animal cruelty. Our state was
7	ranked as the worst state in the country for 13 years until 2020, when sexual assault of animal became a
8	felony, and we became 45th worst in the country
9	
10	Section 2: This bill would prevent those convicted of animal cruelty from owning a domesticated animal for a
11	minimum of 2 years and to go through a psychological evaluation before being able to legally own another
12	animal.
13	
14	Section 3: This bill would further define animal cruelty to encompass abuse of any type of animal. This would
15	include beating, tormenting, starving, or overworking any domestic or wild animal. Abandoning an animal
16	where it could become injured or hungry, suffer from exposure, or end up under the charge of animal control.
17	Poisoning animals on purpose and leaving animals for a long period of time under conditions that expose
18	them to extreme heat or cold that results in death, injury, hypothermia, hyperthermia, or frostbite.
19	
20	Section 4: This bill furthers punishment for those convicted of animal cruelty. Animal cruelty is typically a
21	misdemeanor; however, it bumps up to either a class 3 or 4 felony and a \$2,500 fine and depending on the
22	circumstances a judge may order the person convicted to undergo a psychiatric evaluation and treatment.
23	The punishment would bump up if the person had a previous conviction for the same crime or they were
24	convicted of multiple counts of the same crime, the cruelty was intentional and led to the animal's serious
25	injury or death, the animal was tortured, and if the animal was killed.
26	
27	Section 5: This bill would require no additional funding to be enacted.
28	
29	Section 6: This bill would begin immediately upon being enacted into state law as to protect animals as soon
30	as possible.

14	(c) Conduct an investigation and compile the necessary information to ensure that all restitution has been paid and that there
15	are no outstanding warrants, charges, or indictments;
16	(d) Provide notice to the Commonwealth's attorney in the county of commitment and to the Commonwealth's attorney in the
17	offender's county of residence, setting out in the notification the criminal case number and charges for which the offender was
18	convicted; and
19	(e) Forward information on a monthly basis of eligible felony offenders who have requested restoration of rights to the Office
20	of the Governor for consideration of a partial pardon.

22	Section 2: As used in this section, "eligible felony offender" means a person convicted of or (1) or more felonies who:
23	(a) Has reached the maximum expiration of his or her sentence or has received final discharge from the Parole Board;

25	(c) Had paid full restitution as ordered by the court or the Parole Board.

1	An Act to Legalize Marijuana and Cannabis Products for Medical Use
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: According to a Kentucky State Survey done in February Of 2021, 43.6% of adults in Kentucky
6	reported symptoms of anxiety or depression. Furthermore, 40,000 Kentuckians ages 12–17 were diagnosed
7	with depression.
8	
9	Section 2: 38 out of 50 states have legalized medical marijuana and cannabis products, with positive results
10	including increased state tax revenue, and improved conditions for those who were prescribed the
11	medication.
12	Section 3: KRS 218A.1424 is added to read as follows:
13	
14 15	"A person may be exempt from laws and restrictions regarding the use of marijuana and cannabis products provided that they:
15	Obtain a prescription for the drug through a licensed medical professional.
17	Obtain the drug through a licensed distribution center or pharmacy.
18	This exemption stands for, but is not limited to, persons diagnosed with: Epilepsy (or other seizure
19	causing conditions), Tourette's Syndrome, Tic Disorders, Parkinson's Disease, Depression, Crohn's
20	Disease, Panic Disorder, Anxiety Disorders, Cancer-related Cachexia, and HIV/AIDS related nausea or
21	weight loss.
22	This exemption stands for medical marijuana and cannabis products that are used through smoking,
23	vaporizing, and taking as a liquid extract, provided that it:
24	Is kept in a clearly marked prescription container.

1	An Act Relating To the investment in hydropower utilizing the rivers in the Commonwealth of Kentucky
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky that the Kentucky
6	Revenue Code be amended to provide a 20% state tax incentive that can be applied each year for the
7	investment of hydropower plants in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. This 20% state tax incentive would be
8	in addition to any federal tax incentives and would support efforts by both private and non-profit
9	organizations to have a financial incentive to invest in the creation of hydropower. Hydroelectricity
10	accounted for over 7% of all U.S. electricity generation in 2020 and is already generating large quantities of
11	power in states like Alaska and Washington. It is a form of clean energy that will help reduce communities'
12	reliance on coal and diesel in Kentucky. This bill will create thousands of construction and other jobs in rural
13	communities, as well as allow Kentucky to upgrade dams already in existence, promote flood control,
14	irrigation, and be sustainable for the environment. The U.S. Department of Energy's 2016 Vision Study noted
15	that U.S. hydropower would grow from 101 gigawatts of capacity to nearly 150 gigawatts by 2050. This
16	would save an estimated \$209 billion from the avoided greenhouse gas emissions, of which \$185 billion
17	would be attributable to operation of these hydropower facilities. Given the dams and locks that exist in
18	Kentucky thanks to the Ohio River and other rivers to be turned into power generators.
19	
20	Section 2: One example of such an investment is the Rye Development Company's investment in an aging
21	Coal facility, and turning it into a hydro energy storage center. "The basic idea behind a pumped hydro-water
22	battery" is to use renewable energy to pump water uphill to a reservoir during periods of low electricity
23	demand." During periods of high demand, the water is released downhill to run turbines for generating
24	electricity, so gravity does all the heavy lifting. Rye notes that the existing coal site is unique and features
25	beneficial topography and proximity to transmission infrastructure.
26	
27	Section 3: The end result of this tax incentive is to convert coal sites that are not being utilized or are
28	unprofitable, but have access to transportation and are already connected to Kentucky's power grid to
29	hydropower generators. This will revitalize and spur economic development in the Commonwealth that will
30	create affordable and reliable energy to our state's communities.

5	Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS 36.140 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
6	[1] The Kentucky Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) will allocate \$2,820,000 per year (2.9% of
7	Kentucky's VA budget) to make three 50 unit apartment buildings over the span of 5 years. This is
8	derived from the \$500 million granted from the National Department of Veteran Affairs and the
9	American Rescue Plan of 2021 (ARP) to the construction and maintenance of homes for veterans in
10	the 50 states.
11	
12	Section 2:
13	[1] After this initial five-year period, an advisory committee appointed by the Kentucky Department
14	of Veteran Affairs will determine if additional apartments should be built and advise the Kentucky
15	legislature if further legislation is warranted. A review board will be established to decide which areas
16	of Kentucky would benefit the most.
10	[2] The committee will be modeled and adapted from the US Department of Housing and Urban
18	Development- Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing Program (HUD-VASH) in regards to the selection
19	and monitoring of the recipients of this temporary housing benefit. This includes conducting financial
20	reviews and background checks.

22	Section 3:
23	[1] This bill will go into effect 2 years after its passing to allow time for urban planning and fund

1	An Act Relating To Adding Drivers Education To The Public High School Curriculum
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: This bill will make it mandatory for all public high schools to offer a driver education program in
6	addition to a physical driving school aspect. This program will be optional for students to take and will
7	include information on rules of the road, safety in emergency situations, such as severe weather or accidents;
8	basic maintenance and how often it should be done; what to do when pulled over, and, if chosen by the
9	student and parents, road skills. This program will be taught by a teacher with a driving instructor
10	certification.
11	
12	Section 2: All public schools in Kentucky would be required to offer a semester-long driver education course
13	for their students.
14	
15	Section 3: It will be mandatory for all public high schools in Kentucky to provide a driver education course
16	which must include a physical driving and lecture curriculum. This bill will be enforced by the Department of
17	Education. The Department of Education would take care of financial costs (for example, paying the teachers)
18	and the physical driving school. The districts will partner with driving schools already existent in their area at
19	a lower rate.
20	
21	Section 4: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the school year of August 2023 or the next closest

22 school year upon its passage.

1	An Act Relating To The Promotion Of Hydroelectric Power Plants
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: Kentucky has historically filled its energy needs with coal power, but this is an increasingly
6	unsustainable source of power, both in terms of the planet and the economy. In order to promote a
7	sustainable and suitable energy replacement such as hydroelectric power, we seek to lessen the economic
8	burden of increasing our hydroelectric capabilities by providing economic aid to companies willing to build
9	and finance hydroelectric plants.
10	
11	Section 2: Companies will be refunded \$500/kwh in construction costs for hydroelectric facilities (with
12	average construction cost being \$5312/kwh).
13	
14	Section 3: Companies will be rewarded for switching to hydroelectric energy, but there will be no penalty for
15	using coal.
16	
17	Section 4: The money will come from the energy and environmental cabinet of Kentucky.
18	
19	Section 5: Funding will begin once companies meet the requirements, starting in 90 days of the passing of
20	this bill.
21	
22	Section 6: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

6	Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 205 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
7	(1) Government employees dealing directly with the public will be expected to receive training on
8	handling those formally diagnosed or suspected of having a mental illness.
9	
10	Section 2: Any statute contrary to this bill shall be amended or repealed.
11	
12	Section 3: There is appropriated to the Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual

5	Section 1: This bill will prevent defense attorneys from using sexual orientation and gender orientation as a
6	defense in court.
7	
8	Section 2: This bill will amend the language used in KRS 507.030
9	
10	Section 3: The bill will amend the language used in KRS 507.030 to read as follows:
11	"For purposes of determining sudden quarrel or heat of passion pursuant to subdivision, the
12	provocation was not objectively reasonable if it resulted from the discovery of, knowledge about, or
13	potential disclosure of the victim's actual or perceived gender, gender identity, gender expression, or
14	sexual orientation, including under circumstances in which the victim made an unwanted nonforcible
15	romantic or sexual advance towards the defendant, or if the defendant and victim dated or had a
16	romantic or sexual relationship. Nothing in this section shall preclude the jury from considering all
17	relevant facts to determine whether the defendant was in fact provoked for purposes of establishing
18	subjective provocation."

20	Section 4: This bill will take effect after 90 day after the closing session.

5	Section 1: State tax funding collected for educational purposes shall be required to distribute funds equally
6	among public school districts in the state of Kentucky based on guidelines stated in the following sections
7	
8	Section 2: Funding shall be distributed in accordance with each district's student population by dividing the
9	total amount of school funding equally with the student population.
10	
11	Section 3: Surplus or other outside sources of funding such as donations or allocations made by state
12	employees or members of government as well as other organizations shall follow these guidelines and be
13	distributed as stated before.

15	Section 4: Funding for education may be adjusted accordingly with the student population in Kentucky as

2	likelihood of reoffense in addition to the already instituted pre-sentence evaluation
3	
4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
5	
6	Section 1: KRS 17.554 is amended to read as follows:
7	Amend [1] to read: "A Sex Offender Risk Assessment Advisory Board is hereby created. The board shall
8	approve providers who shall conduct comprehensive sex offender pre-sentence and post-sentence
9	evaluations and treatment."
10	Amend 17.554 [2] to read as follows: "The board shall develop a comprehensive sex offender pre-sentence
11	and post-sentence evaluation that shall be used by approved providers in assessing the risk of recommitting
12	a sex crime by a sex offender, the threat posed to public safety, amenability to sex offender treatment, the
13	nature of the required sex offender treatment, and The evaluation shall be based upon, but not limited to the
14	following factors:
15	(a) Criminal history;
16	(b) Nature of the offense;
17	(c) Conditions of release that minimize risk;
18	(d) Physical conditions that minimize risk;
19	(e) Psychological or psychiatric profiles;
20	(f) Recent behavior that indicates an increased risk of recommitting a sex crime;
21	(g) Recent threats or gestures against persons or expressions of an intent to commit additional
22	offenses; and
23	(h) Review of the victim impact statement."
24	
25	Section 2: Under the current law, sex offenders are required to undergo a comprehensive sex offender pre-
26	sentence evaluation by the Sex Offender Risk Assessment Advisory Board. This amendment to KRS 17.550
27	would add an additional post-sentence evaluation that the offender must undergo before being eligible for
28	release.

30	Section 3: This act will go into affect January 1, 2024.

1	An Act Relating To the Codification of Contraception Access in the State of Kentucky
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 216B IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
6	(1) The State will not deny or prohibit the usage, prescription, or selling of birth control or other
7	contraceptives.
8	(2) CONTRACEPTIVE The term "Contraceptive", as used in this bill, refers to any drug, device, or
9	biological product intended for use in the prevention of pregnancy, whether specifically intended to
10	prevent pregnancy or for other health needs, that is legally marketed under the Federal Food, Drug,
11	and Cosmetic Act, such as oral contraceptives, long-acting reversible contraceptives, emergency
12	contraceptives, internal and external condoms, injectables, vaginal barrier methods, transdermal
13	patches, vaginal rings, and other clinical prescriptions or methods for birth control. This term does
14	not include any modes of pregnancy termination, whether they be surgical or drug-based.
15	
16	Section 2: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.
17	
18	Section 3: Any action that so violates this Act upon its implementation by denying individuals birth control or
19	other contraceptives as defined in Section 2, will face monetary fines, of which will be determined by a court
20	of law on a case-by-case or suit-by-suit basis.
21	
22	Section 4: This Act will take effect on July 1st of 2023.
