An Act relating to criminalize smoking tobacco and vaping in vehicles with a minor as a passenger.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill would prohibit smoking tobacco and vaping in vehicles with a minor as a passenger. It would fine those who endanger the lives of minors.

Section 2: This will be a Class D misdemeanor. First offense would result in a \$250 fine. Second offense would result in a \$500 fine. Third offense would be \$1,000 fine. Any further offense would result in both a suspension of license for six months and 30 days of community service.

Section 3: There would be no cost to taxpayers to enforce this bill.

Section 4: This bill would go into effect on January 1, 2022.

An Act Relating To a delay in the start time for Middle and High schools in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Studies show that 8.5 to 9.5 hours of sleep is needed for a student's mind and body to function at maximum capacity. Studies show that biological changes associated with puberty result in a change of circadian rhythms resulting in adolescents to get tired later at night. This time, for most, is around 11:00 pm at night, normally ending around 8:00 am. However, with the average school start time at 8:00 am, the recommended amount of sleep is impossible to achieve. By establishing a mandatory start time of 8:30 am, we would allow students to achieve the recommended sleep time.

Section 2: The American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Sleep Foundation both have recommendations for school start times to be no earlier than 8:30 am. Schools within the Commonwealth of Kentucky have already begun to adopt later start times such as the Fayette County School District, which holds Middle School start times at 9:00 am, and High School start times at 8:30 am. Fayette County schools have shown a reduction in tardiness, sleeping in class, and exhaustion related car crashes (High School Students). The Fayette County School District has also shown reports of an increase in attendance, test scores, and graduation rates with their later start times. Many other states have already begun adopting later school start times. Schools in Maine have reported decreases in depression suicide rates, alcohol and substance abuse, and daily caffeine consumption in students.

Section 3: The new proposed school day will provide Middle Schools with a school day of 8:00 am – 2:45 pm, with High Schools reporting from 8:30 am – 3:30 pm. The 45 minute window in between the end of the school day for Middle and High Schools will allow those students who need transport from the Middle Schools to the High Schools a generous amount of time to reach their destinations. After school activities such as Clubs or Athletics will still have plenty of time following the school day in order to operate and function as needed. The above–mentioned schools have shown reports of students and athletes having a higher rate of performance both in the classroom and in their respective sports, due to the later school times providing students with the opportunity to achieve their much needed rest.

Section 4: This act will be placed into effect 18 months after the passing of the bill, in order to allow schools proper time to complete a plan of approach for the newly proposed school start times.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This is a project to further improve bus safety in all schools in all counties of Kentucky.

Section 2: In Kentucky, 9,822 school buses carry 385,000 students every day of school ride the bus and their safety is of great importance to parents, bus drivers, and school officials.

Section 3: The purpose of this bill is to install a GPS system designed to help children on the bus. It has many different aspects like vehicle motorizing

12 This is supposed to help protect more children on public transportation.

Section 4: According to 702 KAR 5:030 section 17 states that A principal or designee shall be responsible for the organization and operation of a system of adequate supervision of the pupils as they enter and leave the school buses at the school.

 Section 5: According to 702 KAR 5:030 pupil transportation section 6 states that A superintendent shall require all drivers of school buses equipped with a crossing control arm to utilize the arm when loading or unloading students. The superintendent or designee, in consultation with the certified driver training instructor, shall have full authority over the use of crossing control arms on school grounds.

Section 6: The school systems are responsible for this enforcement as well as the parents of children who ride the bus. If a parent sees a bus not use its crossing control arm while a child is loading or unloading the bus they will report it to the school systems superintendent.

Section 7: 702 KAR 5:030 section 1 clearly states that a superintendent is responsible for the safe operation and general supervision of the district's pupil transportation program.

Section 8: This is the system that is proposed to use. It is called Wayfinder Routebuilder. Here is the information. Wayfinder's RouteBuilder feature allows you to easily pull routes into Routefinder Pro. Trips can be optimized for the shortest distance or time.

An Act Relating To the Requirement of Law Enforcement in the State of Kentucky to Wear Body Cameras while on Duty.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to require all law enforcement in the Commonwealth of Kentucky to have a bodyworn camera or audio recording turned on while on duty. The body camera must be free from objects that may obstruct the video or recording taken. This is to protect all parties involved if the footage would need to be presented in the court of law.

Section 2: The KRS 61.168 will be amended to include body-worn cameras and/or recording devices that will NOT include the following: dashboard mounted cameras or recording devices used in undercover or clandestine operations; but they WILL include: any video or audio recording made by a body-worn camera during the public safety officer's official duties.

Section 3: In the event that the recording depicts an incident that is the subject of a formal, legal, and/or administrative complaint submitted against a public safety officer or the agency employing the public safety officer, the release of the recording shall be governed by the provisions of KRS 61.870 to 61.884, including all of the exceptions contained in said statues. The law and rules that may govern the discovery or the submission and display of evidence in any court proceeding, whether criminal or civil, or any administrative proceeding will be according to KRS 61.8746 and KRS 61.169.

Section 4: The cost will be \$196.98 per camera. Payments will start with larger cities with higher crime rates first.

Section 5: The Kentucky's Department of Justice will enforce this bill.

Section 6: If a complaint of non-compliance of an officer under this requirement is filed (written), the officer will be investigated under the provisions of KRS. 15. 520. They will be suspended with pay while an investigation is ongoing. If the investigation lasts for 75 days or more, the officers will be reassigned to a different area until the investigation is complete. If found guilty, the officer will be held with the following: first offense- attend a class that educates officers of the importance of officer and citizen protection, second offense- two weeks without pay, third offense- officer will be terminated.

Section 7: All law enforcement agencies and personnel in Kentucky will be required to have body cameras by December 1, 2022.

Section 1: This bill is an incentive for public schools in the state of Kentucky to participate in a plastic recycling program to help decrease the threats of climate change on our world.

Section 2: This recycling program will supply schools with recycling bins for plastic and give rules on what should and shouldn't be recycled. The schools will receive the recycling bins simply by requesting however many bins they need from garbage disposal areas.

Section 3: Under this bill, schools that participate in the program will receive a certain amount of money that could be put towards a number of things, including new technology, school field trips, etc. The incentive money would come from grants that are given out by Andy Beshear and the Energy and Environmental Cabinet Secretary, Rebecca Goodman.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2022–2023 school year.

An Act Relating To Creating a Surtax on Cigarettes

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Annually, 8,900 adults in Kentucky die due to smoking. In addition, 119,000 children (under 18) in Kentucky will prematurely die due to smoking. With the help of the Kentucky Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program, Kentucky can fight the war against tobacco. The Kentucky Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program works diligently to "reduce the number of preventable and premature deaths caused by tobacco." The program does this by "encouraging youth and others not to start using tobacco products and providing Kentuckians free resources to help them quit smoking". It is imperative that Kentucky take necessary measures to become a cigarette free society for the health, liveliness, and longevity of our commonwealth.

Section 2: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 138.140 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

(1) A surtax shall be paid in addition to the tax levied in paragraph (a) of this subsection and in addition to the surtax levied by paragraph (b) of this subsection, at a proportionate rate of two cents (\$0.02) on each twenty (20) cigarettes. The revenues from this surtax shall be given to the Kentucky Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program to effectuate their services.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 6 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

Any member of the General Assembly who is elected to office after the effective date of this statute shall be eligible to serve no more than 12 years in the Kentucky State General Assembly. Years in Legislative office need not be consecutive and years of service in both the Senate and the House of Representatives shall be added together and included in determining the total number of Legislative years in office. The years served by any member elected or appointed to serve less than a full Legislative term to fill a vacancy in office shall not be included in the 12-year limitation set forth herein; but no member who has completed 12 years in office shall thereafter be eligible to serve a partial term. Any member who is serving a Legislative term in office or who has been elected or appointed to serve a term in office on the effective date hereof shall be entitled to complete his or her term and shall be eligible to serve an additional 12 years thereafter.

Section 2: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

Section 3: For purposes of calculating the term limits established by this section, no person may count the time a state officer, state representative, or state senator served in a particular office before January 1, 2022.

An Act to Fund Rehabilitation Centers of America.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Addiction treatment is massively underfunded and under regulated, and Kentucky's overdose rates

are among the highest in the nation. There was a 29% increase in illegal drug usage compared to 2019. With this, addicts or their families might reach out for help, but addiction treatment is fairly costly. And because they cannot afford it, people will go untreated for many reasons. Though they may be reluctant for personal reasons, or they may not have money or insurance to cover the costs. Though some treatment centers may offer rehab scholarships, grants, or payment plans, many people can still not afford the high prices, meaning they return to drugs. Which is a primary reason people suffering put off addiction treatment.

Section 2: Poor or little to no insurance leads to higher addiction treatment costs. Addicts are often not who we think they are, and addiction could affect anyone. With treatment being unsafe or high costs for addiction treatment. With this, through government grants, we will put money into fixing our treatment centers and providing better care to those suffering from addiction.

Section 3: With no more high costs for addictions treatment, and if this problem were to be fixed, we could most likely see a decrease in drug overdose by kentuckians. The cost would be relatively around \$50,000 to \$80,000, We would put this into effect by the beginning of next year. To conclude, this bill will help struggling addicts, decrease drug related deaths, and cut down on costs so addicts do not have to pay for treatment in which they need to survive.

An Act Relating To CPR/AED Certification for all Certified Teachers of the Commonwealth

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: In 2020, sixth grader Landon Stanford was playing with his friends outside of school one day when he suddenly collapsed. The boy, who was referred to by family members as very active, was not suffering from heat exhaustion, but rather was in cardiac arrest. Luckily, Brent Doty, a sixth grade teacher at the school, was able to spring into action and use his CPR certification to administer CPR to Landon and save his life. Without Doty's certification and quick thinking, there is no guarantee that Landon would be alive today. This story is not the only of its kind either: there have been many instances where CPR has been administered to students in school by teachers. However, without certification, it is impossible for a teacher to help a student who needs it.

Section 2: This bill would require all Kentucky public schools to include CPR/AED training in the already required Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) training that takes place at the beginning of every school year.

Section 3: As of now, CPR/AED training is not required for Kentucky teachers. Only one adult in the building must be first aid certified. However, that one individual can not be everywhere at once and, depending on the size of the school building, may not be able to reach a medical emergency in time.

Section 4: Our bill would make it so all teachers receive certification during their annual training. Certification takes 2 hours and, while CPR certification must be renewed every two years as is required by the American Heart Association, teachers would renew it annually.

Section 5: The cost of certifying all public school teachers will cost \$1,480,640. The money will come from the Education budget and will be relocated from the Extended School Services budget and moved to the purpose of training.

Section 6: If any private school in the state of Kentucky elects to include CPR/AED training in their KDE training, the state will provide the funding for it. If any private school teacher in the state of Kentucky elects to take CPR/AED training, they will have the opportunity to accompany a nearby public school during their training.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect on July 1st, 2022.

An Act To legalize and regulate sex work and its subsequent promotion in Kentucky.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Section 1: Repeal the following KRS chapters: 529.020-Prostitution, 529.040-Promoting prostitution, 529.070-Permitting prostitution, A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 529 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

Section 2: Regulating the Location of Soliciting Prostitution – The solicitation of prostitution is legal on private property so long as the property owner has openly displayed a "license to distribute sexual services". This license can be obtained from the health department. The license requires that sexual service distribution centers maintain rigorous standards for cleanliness, ethicality, and health as determined by the Kentucky Department for Public Health. To obtain a licence, the property must be registered as a business for commercial use. These licences must be renewed yearly and possess a fee of \$2000. It is the requirement of the sexual service distribution center to provide contraceptives applicable for all forms of sexual interaction. It is the requirement of the sexual service distribution center to provide a waiver of liability signed by both the sex worker and client. Punishments: Failure to adhere to these guidelines will result in a three stage sequential disciplinary policy based upon the level of infringement. After the first infraction of the requirements of the sexual service distribution center license, the center will receive, from the Sheriff's Department, a one time fine of \$500. A second infraction will result in a 30 day licence suspension and a \$2000 fine. A third infraction will result in a removal of a licence and up to 2 year jail sentence for the property owner.

Section 3: Requirements for Sex Workers When Participating in Sexual Conduct – The person receiving the payment for engaging in sexual conduct must have proof of a "license to engage in sexual conduct". This license can be obtained from the health department. The license requires that individual sex workers are at least the age of 21 and provide accurate background information including but not limited to criminal, health, and residency history. Workers shall maintain a proof of a negative STD test within seven days of the service provision. There is a one time licence fee of \$25 and the licence must be renewed every 12 months. Punishments: Failure to adhere to these guidelines will result in a three stage sequential disciplinary policy based upon the level of infringement. After the first infraction of the requirements of the sexual service distribution center license, the center will receive, from the Sheriff's Department, a one time fine of \$100. A second infraction will result in a 30 day licence suspension and a \$200 fine. A third infraction will result in a removal of a licence and up to 90 day jail sentence.

Section 4: Requirements to Participate in Exchange of Sexual Interaction as the Client – Any client purchasing sexual interaction from a sex worker is required to be at least 21 years of age. The client must also provide proof of a negative STD test taken within the last 14 days.

Section 5: Taxation – The sex workers will be taxed as an independent contractor as defined by the IRS. The Kentucky Revenue Cabinet is tasked with reinforcing that all forms of payment involved in the transactions regarding sexual conduct are correctly reported by the sex worker. Further, it is the responsibility of the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet to ensure that all payment is declared as revenue and totaled towards the sex worker's income. The sexual service distribution center will receive the subsequent property tax as defined by the county.

Section 6: Enforcement of Regulations – The local Sheriff's Department is obligated to regulate the aforementioned Kentucky Department for Public Health created regulations. Sheriff's Departments are further required to continue to enforce KRS statues 529.100–529.170 regarding human trafficking along with local law enforcement agencies. Funds previously designated to the prevention of prostitution will be left to the discretion of local authorities so long as 50% are related to the prevention and enforcement of human trafficking and there laws.

Section 7: Illegal Prostitution – Distribution of sexual services involving payment that doesn't abide by the aforementioned regulations is a Class B misdemeanor, punishable by up to 90 days in jail and a fine of up to \$250.

Section 8: Further Action From Government Agencies – The authorization of all government agencies to make further regulations not inconsistent with this statute so long as there are not unduly burdensome requirements placed on SSDC similar to other entertainment-based businesses. It is the power of local agencies to create zoning regulations regarding the location of SSDC?s and the subsequent advertisement. These regulations include but are not limited to: proximity to schools, places of worship, and residential housing.

Section 9: This bill we go into effect July 1, 2022.

An Act Relating To Mandatory Psych Evaluations for Law Enforcement

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to require mental screenings of all Law Enforcement Officers (LEO's) every five years to make sure they are emotionally healthy enough to continue to be on active duty.

Section 2: KRS 15.440 would be amended to include mental health screening every five years.

Section 3: One in every four officers have contemplated suicide, and more officers die to suicide than in the line of duty. According to a 2017 study, there were an estimated 140 officer suicides which was higher than the officers who had been killed on duty and the majority of officers who reported having suicidal thoughts also report depression, anxiety, burnout, PTSD, and other anxiety based mental illnesses.

Section 4: The costs for mental screenings are between \$25 - \$100 (depending on the location), and considering insurance plans these departments have, each department will be able to cover the amount for each officer.

Section 5: Kentucky Law Enforcement Council will enforce this bill.

An Act Relating To require the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet to use Geo Melt coated rock salt on all public roads to treat snow, ice, and hard packed roads.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to decrease the side effects of rock salt on roads, communities, economy, and the environment by utilizing Geo Melt rather than traditional rock salt.

Section 2: KRS 177.025 would be amended to include the use of Geomelt prior to the winter weather event.

Section 3: Presently the Kentucky transportation cabinet uses the harmful rock salt on snow, ice, and hard packed roads. Harmful rock salt corrodes concrete, bridge deck pavement, concrete parking garages, and asphalt. This can lead to potholes in the road, contamination of our water systems, and harmful effects to vehicles. This will require that Geo Melt be used by public winter service vehicles.

Section 4: Geo Melt is a mixture of natural salt brine, sugar beets juice, and other natural ingredients.

Section 5: Presently the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet spends \$68 million on snow, ice, and hard pack removal a year. The price of Geo Melt is \$36 million annually.

Section 6: The punishment for violation of this law first offense is a warning. Second offense \$10000 and third offense \$15000. Any further violation of this law will be a temporary hold on state allocated funds for the repeat offenders department.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect December 1, 2022.

An Act Relating To Providing Nurses in All Public Schools

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: All public Kentucky schools must have a minimum of 1 school nurse per building.

Section 2: Funding for these nurses can come from multiple sources. First, schools will have the ability to apply for state level grants. These grants will be based on the percentage of each school's enrollment that is on free/reduced lunch. (i.e. If the school has 50% of its students on free/reduced lunch, 50% of the cost for the school nurse will be covered through grants). Grants will be awarded to the most underprivileged schools first. Grant applications will be overseen by the Kentucky Senate and House standing committees for Education. If a school does not receive a grant, nurses will bill the student's insurance company. If the student does not have insurance, schools will be allowed to bill medicaid for "medically necessary" students.

Section 3: This bill will go into effect at the start of the 2023–2024 school year.

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Section 9: This will go into effect in January 2023.

An Act Relating To require the School Board in each school district of Kentucky to provide student representation for grades 9–12

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will provide student representation for grades 9–12 by requiring each school district to elect two particular individuals, that meet certain requirements, from their school body to be the student voice on their school board.

Section 2: The two individuals mentioned in Section 1 will be elected through a student body election. The nominees will be appointed by administrators throughout the high school. Once chosen, the candidates will be voted on in a school wide election. Soon after the student representative is chosen, they will undertake the responsibilities of a school board member.

Section 3: Only the first year after this bill is enacted will there be two elections. One election to choose one senior representative that will carry out the main duties of a school board member. The second election will select one junior representative to aid the senior candidate by attending board meetings that the senior representative cannot take part in. If the senior representative fails to attend five board meetings, then an impeachment process will take place and the junior representative will assume the role of the main student representative.

Section 4: The junior appointed in the second election of the first year will assume the main role of the student body representative. An election will be held each school year to replace the junior candidate. If a candidate refuses to accept a role or there are n

An Act Relating To Funding for Foster Youth Aftercare Services

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: KRS 605.120 is amended to read as follows:

Amend (2) "The cabinet shall establish a reimbursement system, within existing appropriation amounts, for foster parents that comes as close as possible to meeting the actual cost of caring for foster children. The cabinet shall consider providing additional reimbursement for foster parents who obtain additional training, and foster parents who have served for an extended period of time. In establishing a reimbursement system, the cabinet shall, to the extent possible within existing appropriation amounts, address the additional cost associated with providing care to children with exceptional needs." Insert (2) to read "The cabinet shall establish a reimbursement system, within existing appropriation amounts, for foster parents and foster youth aftercare services that comes as close as possible to meeting the actual cost of caring for foster children. The cabinet shall consider providing additional reimbursement for foster parents/foster youth aftercare services who obtain additional training, and foster parents/foster youth aftercare services who have served for an extended period of time. In establishing a reimbursement system, the cabinet shall, to the extent possible within existing appropriation amounts, address the additional cost associated with providing care to children with exceptional needs."

Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to distribute funding to the foster youth aftercare services from the \$560,030,302 (SFY 2016) federal expenditures for the overall child welfare agency. There are currently no records of aid.

Section 3: If this bill is enacted there will be funding for programs helping foster children that are aging out of the foster care system in Kentucky. There will be grants/reimbursements given out each year by the Kentucky government to the aftercare programs in Kentucky. These grants /reimbursements will help expand aftercare programs all around Kentucky, allow more opportunity for these youth, and give them a sense of belonging.

Section 4: The grants/reimbursements will be worth \$15,000. They will be given out once a year at the beginning of a new year to approve foster youth aftercare services.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect March of 2022.

An Act Relating To self-consent of minors to vaccinate and declaring an emergency and making an appropriation therefore.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A new section of KRS Chapter 214 to be numbered 6, with appropriate renumbering of the current sections 6–9, is created to read as follows:

(1) A minor, 12 years of age or older, may consent to receive a vaccine if the minor is capable of meeting the informed consent standard, and the vaccine is recommended by the United States Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices.

(2) The Department of Public Health shall produce an age-appropriate vaccine information sheet, which shall be made available to providers in order to support the informed consent process of minors.

Section 2: KRS 214.032 (Definition for KRS 158.035, 214.010, 214.020, and 214.032 to 214.036) is amended to read as follows:

Insert (2)(a) to read "For the purposes of this subsection, a minor shall be deemed to meet the informed consent standard if the minor is able to comprehend the need for, the nature of, and any significant risks ordinarily inherent in the medical care."

Section 3: There is appropriated to the Department of Public Health from the General Fund \$10,000 in fiscal year 2021–2022 for the purposes of the alternative vaccine information sheets.

An Act Relating To call upon the Kentucky Department of Homeland Security to establish a Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation and declaring an emergency and making an appropriation therefore

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1:

(a)This bill will call for the creation of a task force whose goal is to formulate and recommend an infrastructure plan for both mitigation and recovery from flood and flood-related natural disasters, particularly in rural areas.

(b) The Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation is expected to craft a report with findings from ground audits, research, and experiments from a variety of fields represented by members of the task force. This report must include recommendations of draft legislation. The task force will present its first report to the Kentucky House Natural Resources and Energy Committee no later than November 1, 2022.

Section 2:

- (a) The Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation will be formed of 10–15 relevant experts such as rural community leaders, ecologists and geologists who have specialised in flood damage, environmental/structural engineers, preventative medicine experts, and legislative/legal advisors.
- (b) Members of the Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation will be appointed by consultants at the Kentucky Department of Homeland Security and will be confirmed by the Kentucky House Natural Resources and Energy Committee. The confirmation process will begin no later than January 1, 2022.

Section 3: The Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation will begin meeting no later than one month following the conclusion of the confirmation process.

Section 4: The Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation will be set to be reevaluated and renewed if necessary six months after the initial report is submitted to the Kentucky House Natural Resources and Energy Committee.

Section 5: There is appropriated to the Kentucky Department of Homeland Security from the General Fund \$150,000 in the fiscal year 2021–2022 for the purposes of funding the Task Force for Flood Disaster Relief and Mitigation. Notwithstanding KRS 45.229, any appropriation unexpended at the end of fiscal year 2021–2022 shall not lapse but be carried forward into the next fiscal year.

Section 6: Whereas the task force member appointment and confirmation process is expected to be long, and the issue at hand is urgent, an emergency is declared to exist, and this Act takes effect upon its passage and approval by the Governor or upon its otherwise becoming law.

An Act Relating to Vulnerable Road User Protections

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER XV IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

As used here in, the term "vulnerable road user" includes:

- (a) a pedestrian, including those persons actually engaged in work up on a highway, or in work upon utility
- facilities along a highway, or engaged in the provision of emergency services within the right-of-way; or
- (b) a person riding or leading an animal; or
- (c) a person lawfully operating or riding any of the following on a public right-of-way, crosswalk, or shoulder of the highway:
 - bicycle, tricycle, or other pedal-powered vehicles;
 - A farm tractor or similar vehicle designed primarily for farm use;
 - A skateboard:
 - Roller skates:
 - In-line skates;
 - A scooter;
 - -A moped;
 - A motorcycle;
 - -An animal-drawn wheeled vehicle, or farm equipment, or sled;
 - -An electric personal assistive mobility device; or
 - -A wheelchair

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Section 2: A person who operates a motor vehicle in a careless or distracted manner or fails to yield and causes serious physical injury or death to a vulnerable road user shall be guilty of infliction of serious physical injury or death to a vulnerable road user.

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Section 3: A person issued a citation under this section shall be required to attend a nearing before a court of appropriate jurisdiction.

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Section 4: A person found to have committed an offense under this statue shall be required to either:

- a) have their driving privileged suspended for a period of no less than 6 months; and one or more of the following:
 - 1) pay a monetary penalty of not more than two thousand dollars; and/or
 - 2) serve a period of incarceration which may not exceed thirty days; and/or
 - 3) Fulfill an order of restitution for out-of-pocket losses resulting from the offense; and/or
 - 4) participate in a motor vehicle crash prevention course; and/or
 - 5) perform community service for a number of hours to be determined by the court, which may not exceed two hundred hours.
- b) serve a period of incarceration of up to five years; and/or pay a monetary penalty of up to ten thousand dollars.

An Act Relating To Modifying Good Samaritan Law Regarding Liability in Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will allow for the protection of anyone with good intentions acting upon emergency medical situations from liability. Any person performing immediate care with gross negligence or the intent to harm will remain liable for their actions.

Section 2: KRS 311.668 is amended to read as follows:

Amend (3) "The immunity from civil liability under subsection (1) of this section does not apply if the personal injury results from the gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct of the person rendering the emergency care" to read as follows: "The immunity from civil liability under subsection (1) of this section does not apply if the personal injury results from the gross negligence or dire harm of the person rendering the emergency care."

Section 3: As it stands, Subsection 3 of KRS 311.668 prevents the protection of emergency respondents from civil liability if personal injury arises including those who intentionally act on the situation but accidentally commit more harm. In passing this amendment, any person who performs emergency care with good faith will not be held responsible for damages and punished with civil liability if such person acts on the scene and/or provides or arranges further care. Such persons will be held accountable under law if their actions reflect gross negligence.

Section 4: Civilians acting upon medical emergencies will not be held responsible for any consequences that are not directly caused by their care or minor injuries to people who live.

Section 5: Civilians who commit gross negligence or purposeful, unnecessary harm as mentioned in Section 3 will still be subject to liability. Furthermore, those who take the responsibility of acting on an emergency but fail to do so for extraneous or personal reasons will also still remain liable.

Section 6: This amendment will take effect January 1, 2023.

An Act Relating To Promoting Organ Donation

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 311 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

(1) The organ donation consent system will now assume consent to donation of internal organs of all legal adult Kentucky citizens in the state of Kentucky upon their death.

 (2) If a Kentucky citizen would like to consent to donating an internal organ(s), then they can register to do so under our current opt-in system at participating organ donation registration sites.

 (3) All adults that are mentally challenged will not be assumed to consent to organ donation. However, they still may opt in to the system at a participating organ donation registration site.

 (4) Citizens may choose to opt out of the organ donation system instead of opting in at their local DMV or other currently participating organ donation registration sites. Citizens may object to donating specific organs, but consent to donating others. They must register this specific objection at a participating organ donation registration site.

(5) If the deceased citizen's family wishes to prohibit donation of all organs or just a specific organ, they have the right to. A citizen's family will be notified of the organ donation.

 (6) Organs will be donated upon the death of a citizen. Organs will continue to be evaluated before donation in accordance with federal law. If organs are deemed unhealthy or unsafe to donate upon evaluation, then they will not be donated.

Section 2: Any statute contrary to this Act shall be amended or repealed.

Section 3: This bill would go into effect January 1st, 2023 upon being passed.

An Act Relating to requiring persons driving under a learner's permit or intermediate license to obtain a permit in order to pull a commercial trailer longer than 15 feet with a vehicle

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: In the Commonwealth of Kentucky, there is currently no law prohibiting the trailering of a commercial trailer by persons driving with a learners' permit or intermediate license. Due to the inexperience of this group of drivers, and the increased likelihood of an accident occurring while towing a trailer, we propose the creation of a permit program, requiring those individuals driving with a learners' permit or intermediate license to take a road test while pulling a trailer measuring 15 feet in length or greater. This will be a requirement for any trailer greater than 15 feet in length, which will include aquatic vessels, campers, flatbed trailers, gooseneck trailers, and trailers transporting livestock. Individuals wishing to take the road test will be required to pay a one-time \$20 fee, and will need to provide their own trailer of length 15 feet or greater. This permit will not require renewal unless the person does not obtain a full, unrestricted driver's license within one year. If this requirement is not met, individuals will pay a \$7.50 renewal fee, but will not be required to retest.

Section 2: The aforementioned permit road test will be taken at the person's local CDL testing facility, in order to accommodate the appropriate amount of space needed to complete the necessary movements of the vehicle and trailer. Participants must schedule an appointment by calling the Kentucky State Police Driver Testing Branch. Payment of fees can be made online after appointment has been scheduled. All revenue generated from this testing program will be accrued by the Kentucky Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), which processes the fees for regular CDL testing.

Section 3: While completing the road-test, participants will be required to maneuver the trailer through a series of turns, to ensure that they are able to adequately control the vehicle and trailer. They must also be able to back the trailer in a straight line for at least 20 feet, as well as back the trailer through a series of cones measuring 20 feet or greater.

An Act Relating to Requiring All Kentucky Public High Schools to have a Sign Language Class that Counts as a Foreign Language Credit

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: 700,000 people who live in Kentucky have reported that they are either deaf or hard of hearing in the most recent census. This number has continued to increase since then. Around 4.5 million people live in Kentucky making the percentage of deaf and hard of hearing people in Kentucky about 17%, meaning 1 of 6 people in Kentucky are deaf or hard of hearing.

Section 2: 94.35% of Kentuckians speak English fluently, which means about 6% of Kentuckians speak a language other than English, compared to the 17% who are deaf or hard of hearing, which shows that learning sign language instead of a language such as Spanish or French can be up to 3 times more helpful. This shows our need for sign language classes for students.

Section 3: This bill will force each school to have a sign language class available for students and will require every public high school to have a sign language teacher. The sign language class would count as a foreign language credit. The school will have to hire a sign language teacher or require a teacher who already works there who is certified in teaching sign language to teach multiple classes of sign language. The money required to hire the teacher comes from the government as that is where their money they pay teachers comes from. If the government cannot afford another teacher, then the school will take a poll on classes they would like to take and the class with the least votes gets cut, and replaced with a sign language class. If sign language is the least voted for at the school who can't afford it, then the class will not be added.

Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Education.

Section 5: This bill will take place at the start of the 2022–2023 school year for all public high schools in Kentucky.

An Act Relating to Signage Promoting Mental Health in Public Middle and High Schools

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 158 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: (1) All public middle and high schools must display the following mental health information in a prominent location:

- --National Suicide Prevention Lifeline phone number: 800-273-8255
- --Crisis Text Line: Text "HOME" to 741741

Section 2: According to the World Health Organization, half of all mental health conditions begin before age 15, but most cases go unacknowledged, undiagnosed, and untreated. The same organization also predicts that up to 20% of adolescents worldwide experience mental health conditions, including depression, anxiety, bipolar disorder, eating disorders, and addictive behavior (such as substance abuse). Furthermore, Mental Health America confirms that at least two thirds of adolescents in Kentucky who express symptoms of major depression receive no substantial treatment. Finally, a recent survey conducted by the Kentucky Student Voice Team reported that 23.4% of middle schoolers and 41.9% of 11th and 12th graders felt more anxious because of the COVID-19 crisis, signalling the urgency of promoting mental health in adolescents. Allowing mental illness to fester can compromise lifelong physical and mental health and hinder potential to lead a successful, satisfying adult life.

Section 3: To increase accessibility for schools, a simple template for a sticker version of the required signage will be made available on the Kentucky Department of Education's website. Costs for producing and displaying the signage are not significant.

Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Education. District school boards failing to follow the bill's regulations as of 2022 will be charged a \$500 fee each month until the signage is posted. Collected fees will go towards the Department of Education.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2022 school year.
