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3 The General Assembly,

5 Convinced that human trafficking poses a threat to United Nations members and their people,
6
7 Recognizing the United Nations Voluntary Trust Fund on Contemporary Forms of Slavery exists to support the
8 fight against human trafficking and other forms of modern slavery,
9
10 Emphasizing that our nation of Australia is one of the highest contributors to the voluntary fund,
11
12 Having considered that the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime and the United
13 Nations Convention against Corruption are also relevant to trafficking,
14
15 Conscious of both the Charter of the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,
16
17 1. Notes the need to strengthen the identification, protection, and assistance, including refugees and
18 stateless persons, who are victims of trafficking or at risk of being trafficked;
19
20 2. Calls upon Member States to enhance the capabilities of professionals interacting with human
21 trafficked persons, including refugees, such as customs officers, border control officials and
22 international airline workers, to identify victims or persons vulnerable to trafficking, to adopt gender
23 and age sensitive assistance, and to contact adequate trained professionals in accordance to specific
24 circumstance;
25
26 3. Recommends that action on this resolution begins at the first opportunity within Member States;
27
28 4. Seeks that existing donations to the United Nations Voluntary Trust Fund on Contemporary Forms of
29 Slavery will continue to fund the protections of human trafficked persons.

A Resolution to Prevent Animal Trafficking in Brazil

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned by the fast growing rate of animal trafficking in Brazil,


Convinced that the illegal poaching and barbaric devastation of wild animals for profit is detrimental to our world,

Observing that, in today’s world, animal trafficking is a major problem in Brazil,

Fully aware around 38 million animals are lost to this inhumane and cruel trade,


Determined to reduce the rate of animals trafficked in Brazil,

1. Calls upon the UN to help set up a task force comprised of rangers and volunteers that will set up outposts and locations near animal trafficking hotspots to control the rate of poaching and trafficking;
2. Encourages donors/people to pledge money under their name to help stop animal trafficking, Further requests funding from the UN;
3. Emphasizes that funds will go into 1.6 million ranger salary, outposts cost of 2 million, food and necessities 750k, special equipment 800k, Training and Education 250k; at a total cost: 5.4 million per year;
4. Affirms that if this resolution is authorized, it will go into effect January 1st, 2022.

5 Seeking to promote the use of renewable forms of energy and promote investment in solar powered energy, so
6 that third-world and developing nations will benefit from using the Sun as a free energy source.
7
8 Observing the United Nations’s goal to sustain renewable energy by the year 2030,
9
10 Keeping in mind the fact that only 17% of the global population has access to renewable energy and that solar
11 power is better for the environment because no greenhouse gases are released when it is used,
12
13 Having adopted resolution A/73/236, which calls for “affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for
14 all,”
15
16 Conscious of the fact that 1.1 billion people live without electricity and 2.9 billion people use polluting fuels to
17 live, and that many Central African countries and South American are promoting the use of clean solar
18 renewable energy,
19
20 Deeply concerned by the lack of developed countries’ efforts to increase renewable energy like Russia (3%) and
21 Japan (7%).

23 Determined to achieve an international program that will enable nations to develop, construct, and promote the
24 use of solar power,

26 1. Calls upon the General Assembly to have its member countries to create a fund to invest in
27 converting sunshine into a clean and sustainable energy source;

29 2. Requests that by investing \$15 billion in four solar projects on the African, Asia, and South American
30 continents;

4 Drawing attention to the influence of unsupported claims being taught to Greece’s youth,
5
6 Considering the global and national impact that increased climate literacy can create,
7
8 Emphasizing the importance of educating the youth on the urgency of climate change and raising a new
9 generation of environmentally aware citizens,
10
11 Calling upon the UN’s support and Greece’s existing contribution to education funds,
12
13 1. Media has played a large role in circulating disinformation and misinformation spread by climate
14 science denialists, along with government leaders advertising false information within their campaigns.
15 This resolution will promote the teaching of supported and proven climate science and the curriculum
16 will not include any untested or unproven studies.
17 2. Climate change is taking a visible and obvious toll on Greece and other UN countries. Not only is the
18 environment deteriorating, but also one of the major pillars of Greece’s economy- tourism. The
19 unpredictable and inconsistent weather patterns have resulted in a decline in tourism revenue. This isn’t
20 only a problem along the coastlines with rising sea levels and declining fish populations, the effects are
21 equally prevalent inland due to extreme droughts. This leads to a drop in food production and resource
22 availability which will have extremely short and long-term effects on the country. Increasing climate
23 literacy will make Greek citizens aware of what is happening in their country and the support of
24 environmentally conscious laws will increase.
25 3. It is vital to educate the youth and make young minds our target demographic. It is widely accepted
26 that the most impressionable years of a child’s life are 7-14, ages 10-16 is when people are most likely
27 to change their habits. The ideal overlap of being able to comprehend the gravity of climate change,
28 willingness to change behavior, and peak self-awareness is the 12-14 age bracket. This age-based
29 curriculum can be adapted to any school system, in Greece it would be incorporated somewhere
30 between grades 1-3 of gymnasium.
31 4. There will be limited to no additional funding required because this climate-based curriculum will be
32 incorporated into existing biological and life sciences. Environmental studies are already being taught in
33 Greek schools, and the major difference would be increased focus on the effects of climatic changes and
34 steps students can take to contribute to climate-based solutions. The education board is already
35 established and set up to enforce these kinds of changes.

A Resolution to Provide Tax Incentives for Families with Children in School

Convinced that the state of the enrollment in schools of rural Peru, and other countries, can be fixed, this plan focuses on implementing tax incentives for children being enrolled in schools as well as meeting certain attendance and participation requirements,

Recalling the UN’s efforts to end child labor,


Further recalling the UN’s declaration of 2021 being the international “Year for the Elimination of Child Labor”,

Acknowledging that Peru has free public education for all children,

Noting that children are taken out of school in order to help support their family financially, tax incentives for children in school will help subsidize the financial burden on a family due to the loss of the child’s day labor,


Conscious that this issue is in other less developed countries including, Eritrea, Guatemala, Malta, Cambodia, Democratic Republic of Congo, Sudan, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Somalia, Yemen, Zimbabwe,

1. Confirms that a multitude of children in poverty are not enrolled in schools; Requests that the UN approves this movement in Peru and encourages other countries to follow in order to increase its likelihood of success and impact in the global community.
2. Expresses its hope that due to the UN’s approval; Peru’s citizens (as well as citizens of other impacted countries) will approve of this legislation, and its success will be followed in other nations that join Peru in approving this legislation.

Initiative on the Preservation of Global Peatlands

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3 The General Assembly,
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5 Taking into consideration that peatlands cover about 3 per cent of the Earth’s land area.
6
7 Observing that peatland ecosystems exist in around 180 countries.
8
9 Recognizing that peatlands in good condition can actively form peat, and therefore serve to actively remove
10 CO2 from the atmosphere as well as store Carbon in the soil.
11
12 Keeping in mind that healthy peatlands support and conserve unique biodiversity.
13
14 Bearing in mind that degraded Peatlands may emit more CO2 than they remove, becoming a net source of
15 greenhouse gases.
16
17 Bearing in mind that the U.N. recently approved the global resolution on the Conservation and Sustainable
18 Management of Peatlands. (UNEP/EA.4/Res. 16) in March 2019.
19
20 Conscious that the global resolution on the Conservation and Sustainable Management of Peatlands relies on
21 voluntary support of these ecosystems from member states.
22
23 Convinced that a stronger global initiative on the preservation of peatlands can dramatically effect the United
24 Nations Sustainable Development Goal #13 on Climate Change.
25
26 1. Notes that only 77 of 193 Member States contributed to the United Nations Environment
27 Programme (UNEP) in 2020, out of which only 32 contributed at a “fair share” level.
28
29 2. Further invites Member States to contribute to the UNEP at the “fair share” level.
30
31 3. Calls upon the UNEP to designate funds specifically for the preservation and restoration of peatlands
32 worldwide.
33
34 4. Further calls upon the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) to endorse and support
35 efforts by Member States to preserve and/or restore the ecosystems of worldwide peatlands.

The Addition Of A Globally Suggested Refugee Registration System

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The General Assembly,

Having considered the rising number of refugees within Turkey with regard to its resolutions 52/273 of 7 August, 1997, 3/35 of 17 November, 1980, 35/255 of 20 May, 1980, and 54/285 of 30 August, 1998,


Expecting the imminent increase in refugees to continue as violence, attacks, and acts of terrorism continue in the Middle East,

Recalling that the mistreatment of refugees is a direct attack on the rights of humanity as declared in its resolutions 74/130 of 18 December, 2019, 74/322 of 21 August, 2019, and 73/12 of 2018,

Conscious of the fact that by implementing a suggestion for a reformed refugee registration system that involves the inclusion of a grace-period, basic necessities, and freedom, we will be improving the lives of millions,


Recognizing that the steps previously taken by the UN to improve the lives of refugees have served as the foundation, we must build upon it to truly make a difference in the quality of living and treatment of our refugees,

1. Encourages the UN to commence globally inclusive conferences, suggesting the reform of refugee registration on a national level, one by which refugees are granted grace-periods for registration, translators, basic necessities (the inclusion of water, food, shelter, and clothing), and medical treatment (includes prescription medication, physician exams, necessary treatment for any life-threatening injuries, diseases/disorders, or conditions),
2. Requests that the UN considers national budgets, border security operations, financial feasibility, and different populations of refugees within different countries when commencing these conferences,
3. Draws the attention to the rights of man as proclaimed in the aforementioned resolutions, and demands that these rights are respected, obliged, and viewed as necessary in all refugee policies,
4. Trusts the UN to take part in actively fighting against the mistreatment and neglect of refugees, and to hold those perpetrators accountable.

6 lack of coverage and cost.
7
8 Deeply conscious that technology and especially the internet are crucial to a complete and modern education.
9
10 Bearing in mind that Article 26 of the UN Declaration of Human Rights states, “(1) Everyone has the right to
11 education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages.”
12
13 Fully aware that the global COVID-19 pandemic has forced schools around the world to adjust to a virtual
14 instruction model or close.
15
16 Troubled by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization’s statistics that COVID-19 has
17 effected over 990 million learners in 130 countries across the world.
18
19 Convinced that a global approach with the cooperation of the UN to free WI-FI access anywhere on earth is
20 necessary to prevent private companies and nation-states with a history of espionage and censorship from
21 unilaterally controlling the mighty power of information and communication.
22
23 1. Requests that the United Nations General Assembly in cooperation with the Security Council and
24 member nations with space programs creates a global WI-FI system with the help of satellites that can
25 be accessed for free anywhere on the planet like the Global Positioning System (GPS) created and
26 maintained by the United States of America.
27
28 2. Calls upon member nations to work cooperatively to achieve the greatest technological boost to the
29 global community since the initial invention of the world wide web.
30
31 3. Recommends that the General Assembly creates a regulatory agency under the umbrella of both the
32 Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space (COPUOS) and the United Nations Educational,
33 Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The agency will oversee the project and provide reports
34 to member nations.
35
36 4. Encourages the global WI-FI project to set a completion goal of 2025.

Convention on Establishing a Process for an Approval on Pesticides

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned about health issues and the destruction of the environment that result from pesticides.
 Recognizing that 30-35% of all cancers in the world are caused by diet.
 Emphasizing pesticide contamination in water and the consumption of pesticides within wildlife.
 Noting the Pesticide Action Network (PAN) International is a network of over 600 participating nongovernmental organizations, institutions and individuals in over 90 countries working to replace the use of hazardous pesticides with ecologically sound and socially just alternatives.

1. Calls upon PAN to establish two sets of standards to be met when reviewing pesticides. One being whether the pesticide should be banned and the other being whether the product should be approved.
2. Requires pesticide creators to apply for pesticide approval before selling products commercially.
3. Designates national agricultural departments (USDA, The Ministry of Agriculture, The Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development, etc.) to review PAN standards when creators apply for a national pesticide approval.
4. Emphasizes it'll be the country's agricultural department's decision whether the product will be banned in the country or approved in the country, along the lines of PAN's standards.
5. Emphasizes it's the country's agricultural department's decision on whether to limit pesticide supply to PAN approved products.
6. Requests the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) to further review the pesticide as globally approved.
7. Further notes the pesticides that have been approved to be labeled "PAN approved" visibly on the packaging and added to PAN's list of approved pesticides according to country, that can be accessed online.
8. Recognizes that pesticides currently banned in a country will remain banned.
9. Notes the selling of non-approved pesticides labeled "PAN approved" will be taken off shelves and owners and the market selling the product will be fined (amount according to the country).

The Protection of Stateless Nations

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The General Assembly,


Bearing in mind that Article 15 of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights protects the right to a nationality for all human beings.

Viewing with appreciation, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) efforts to end the crisis of stateless individuals by 2024.

Deeply concerned by the millions of individuals whose nationalities are not given the right of self-government and whose nationalities and cultures are attacked by the states in which they reside.

Taking into account that a stateless nation is an ethnic group or nation that does not possess its own state such as Scotland, Wales, Catalonia, the Kurds of Turkey and Iraq, and the Uighurs of China amongst dozens of others.

1. Urges the General Assembly to create and fund the United Nations Council of Stateless Nations (UNCSN).
2. Designates the UNCSN as a council dedicated to the protection of stateless nations, their people, their cultures and languages, their heritage, and their future.
3. Authorizes the UNCSN to declare stateless nations and provide them special protections and monitoring from aggressive nation-states.
4. Approves the membership of diplomats from stateless nations into the UNCSN to provide true representation of the issues stateless nations face across the globe.
5. Further invites the General Assembly to Amend Article 15 of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights to include a third clause that emphasizes the right of stateless nations to exist and be protected by the community of all nations.

Having considered that in at least 15 countries, children have not only suffered at the hands of armed groups,
but have been harmed once more when imprisoned for suspected involvement with these divisions.

Conscious that a number of governments have signed handover protocols, which are agreements between
government agencies or between the UN and governments, that allow children in custody of security forces to
be transferred to civilization child protection agencies for much-needed reintegration support,

Bearing in mind Yemen’s stance by observing the ratification of the International Labour Organization
Convention Concerning the Prohibition and Immediate Action for the Elimination of the Worst Forms of Child
Labour,

Determined to safely transfer these boys and girls to civilian agencies in order to reintegrate them into their
communities,

1. Requests that the United Nations Human Rights Council begin negotiation with all parties of the
conflict in Yemen with the goal of setting up and expanding Handover Protocols in order to protect the
Children of Yemen.
2. Recommends that all member states of the United Nations agree that in the case of armed conflict
their armed forces will hand over children to aid organizations, in cases where those children would
otherwise be placed in the custody of the military.
3. Affirms that these negotiations be attempted by January 1, 2022.

Addressing Plastic Pollution

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The General Assembly,
 Alarmed by the disposal of thirteen million tons of plastic in the ocean each year,
 Deeply concerned that more than 800 species of marine life are directly impacted by marine debris,
 Emphasizing the global impact oceans have on ecosystems, food sources, transportation, and economies
 Reaffirming the 12th, 13th, and 14th Sustainable Development Goals adopted in 2015 by all United Nations Member States,
 Observing the economic obstacles that prevent more sustainable environmental practices,
 Calls upon the United Nations to develop a sector within the United Nation Environment Program that would devote itself to the repurposing of plastic production factories;

1. Further requests each member nation create its own sustainability goal to be kept on the United Nations Environment Program website;
2. Encourages UN ambassadors to create a platform for sustainability to be shared within the member nation;
3. Urges member nations to incentivize citizens to purchase more environmentally friendly products and recycle;
4. Expresses this resolution become effective within one year of passing General Assembly.
