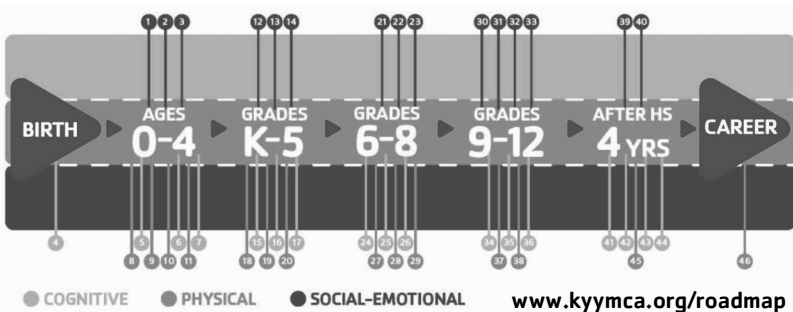

# Virtual Code of Conduct

It is important that our participants and guests feel welcomed and safe in our programs. This code of conduct embodies the spirit of the Y, and is intended to help everyone feel comfortable and thrive. As a YMCA participant or guest, we ask you to agree to follow this code of conduct which is rooted in our core values.

These requirements also serve as an extension and supplement to any codes of conduct students and participants must abide by for in-person programming.

### 1. Appropriate Video Call Etiquette:

- When registering/signing-in for any video call or meeting, please use your **First & Last Name** (not a random username), as well as your **School** in parentheses (for KUNA, please include **COUNTRY instead of School**).  
**Example:** Curious George (Monkey Acad.). This helps us to ensure the privacy of our meetings.
- Please find a quiet area and call in at the scheduled meeting time so that you can be fully present in the virtual experience. We ask that all participants have their video function on their device if possible so we can see and hear you.
- Please do your best to keep background noise or distractions to a minimum. Mute yourself when you are not speaking.
- Please do not take your phone or computer to the bathroom.
- Photos and videos of others without the expressed consent is prohibited.

### 2. Creating a welcoming environment: Respect others' cultures and personal way of being. We strive to create a safe emotional and physical space. We encourage participants to honor diversity in all dimensions and respect opinions or perspectives. The Kentucky YMCA stands up against all forms of bullying, discrimination and racism.

- **Appropriate attire:** Appropriate attire must be worn at all times. Inappropriate clothing may include, but is not limited to: vulgar language/images, obscene gestures, racial slurs, derogatory terms, propaganda for local/national/international extremist groups (ex.: ANTIFA, ISIS), Confederate flag, Don't Tread on Me flag, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program. Appropriate tops and bottoms should be worn at all times.
- **Appropriate Background:** Your video background during virtual programs must be appropriate at all times. Inappropriate backgrounds include, but are not limited to: vulgar language/images, obscene gestures, racial slurs, derogatory terms, propaganda for local/national/international extremist groups (ex.: ANTIFA, ISIS), Confederate flag, Don't Tread on Me flag, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program.
- **Appropriate language:** Vulgar language, including swearing, name-calling or shouting/yelling at others is prohibited. When communicating in the chat box, please do not send links or information that is not aligned with our YMCA core values.
- **Appropriate Interactions:** Participants shall demonstrate respectful, responsible, caring, and honest conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA virtual interactions. No racial slurs, identity-based slurs, derogatory terms, or anything else that contributes to a hostile environment will be permitted. Types of interaction include but are not limited to: social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected. *Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.*
- **Appropriate conduct:** Any other conduct of an inappropriate, threatening or offensive nature will be investigated/evaluated by YMCA staff. Participants that do not abide by this agreement may be

prohibited from participating in future virtual events or in-person activities.

3. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
4. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. This includes, but is not limited to: romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.
5. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time.
6. Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs: The use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs (including e-cigs/ tobacco-like products) is not permitted in or outside of ALL virtual calls. Participants that show, obtain, see in the background, make references to or use during the virtual calls will be removed from meeting and removed from future virtual and in-person events. Law enforcement may be involved if necessary.

If a participant or guest feels uncomfortable in confronting someone directly about offensive behavior or other issues that are in violation of this code of conduct, we ask that you please report the behavior or issue to Kentucky YMCA staff.

To create and maintain a space that embodies our core values, the Y is serious about being clear regarding activities that are not allowed. If you violate this code of conduct, consequences can include termination of program privileges, being removed from all virtual programming, and involving appropriate legal authority. The YMCA reserves the right to make situational decisions based on our policies, mission, and values.

# UN UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

## **Preamble**

Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and the advent of a world in which human beings shall enjoy freedom of speech and belief and freedom from fear and want has been proclaimed as the highest aspiration of the common people,

Whereas it is essential, if man is not to be compelled to have recourse, as a last resort, to rebellion against tyranny and oppression, that human rights should be protected by the rule of law,

Whereas it is essential to promote the development of friendly relations between nations,

Whereas the peoples of the United Nations have in the Charter reaffirmed their faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person and in the equal rights of men and women and have determined to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

Whereas Member States have pledged themselves to achieve, in cooperation with the United Nations, the promotion of universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms,

Whereas a common understanding of these rights and freedoms is of the greatest importance for the full realization of this pledge,

Now, therefore, The General Assembly,

Proclaims this Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations, to the end that every individual and every organ of society, keeping this Declaration constantly in mind, shall strive by teaching and education to promote respect for these rights and freedoms and by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance, both among the peoples of Member States themselves and among the peoples of territories under their jurisdiction.

## **Article 1**

All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

## **Article 2**

Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.

Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

## **Article 3**

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

## **Article 4**

No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

## **Article 5**

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

## **Article 6**

Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law.

## **Article 7**

All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.

## **Article 8**

Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted by the constitution or law.

## **Article 9**

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.

## **Article 10**

Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him.

## **Article 11**

1. Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proved guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.
2. No one shall be held guilty of any penal offence on account of any act or omission which did not constitute a penal offence, under national or international law, at the time when it was committed. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one that was applicable at the time the penal offence was committed.

## **Article 12**

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to the protection of the law against such interference or attacks.

## **Article 13**

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each State.
2. Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country.

## **Article 14**

1. Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution.
2. This right may not be invoked in the case of prosecutions genuinely arising from non-political crimes or from acts contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.



**Article 15**

1. Everyone has the right to a nationality.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his nationality nor denied the right to change his nationality.

**Article 16**

1. Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family. They are entitled to equal rights as to marriage, during marriage and at its dissolution.
2. Marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses.
3. The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

**Article 17**

1. Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property.

**Article 18**

Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion; this right includes freedom to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship and observance.

**Article 19**

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.

**Article 20**

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association.
2. No one may be compelled to belong to an association.

**Article 21**

1. Everyone has the right to take part in the government of his country, directly or through freely chosen representatives.
2. Everyone has the right to equal access to public service in his country.
3. The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections, which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures.

**Article 22**

Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security and is entitled to realization, through national effort and international co-operation and in accordance with the organization and resources of each State, of the economic, social and cultural rights indispensable for his dignity and the free development of his personality.

**Article 23**

1. Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable work conditions and to protection against unemployment.
2. Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work.
3. Everyone who works has the right to just and favourable remuneration ensuring for himself and his family an existence worthy of human dignity, and supplemented, if necessary, by other means of social protection.
4. Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests.

**Article 24**

Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay.

**Article 25**

1. Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.
2. Motherhood and childhood are entitled special care and assistance. All children, born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.

**Article 26**

1. Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.
2. Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.
3. Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

**Article 27**

1. Everyone has the right freely to participate in cultural life of community, to enjoy the arts and share in scientific advancement and its benefits.
2. Everyone has the right to the protection of the moral and material interests resulting from any scientific, literary or artistic production of which he is the author.

**Article 28**

Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.

**Article 29**

1. Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible.
2. In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society.
3. These rights and freedoms may in no case be exercised contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

**Article 30**

Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any of the rights and freedoms set forth herein.

**Adopted by the UN General Assembly on 10 December 1948**

## BE A BETTER DEBATER!!! READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:

- **ALWAYS ADDRESS THE CHAIR!** “Ryan Simpson, representing KY YMCA, representing Denmark.”
- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
  - READ the resolution before you decide on your question.
  - DON'T ask questions that are already in the resolution.  
EX: “When will this resolution go into effect?” and “How much will this resolution cost?” are usually answered in the Body of the resolution.
  - DON'T ask questions that begin with “Why...?” These are almost always debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO / CON DEBATE**
  - Each time you are recognized, you may do **ONE** or **TWO** of the following things:
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a technical question about the resolution
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a debatable question about the resolution
    - Give a speech for OR against the resolution
    - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
  - If you would like to Ask a Question (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say: “**Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or `series of questions`)?**”
  - If you would like to Speak or Yield Your Time after Asking a Question, you should say: “**And I reserve my right to speak (or `yield my time`) afterward.**”
  - If you would like to Yield Your Time after Speaking, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.  
EX: “Ryan Simpson, KY YMCA, Denmark. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Smith from Central Middle.”

## BEING RECOGNIZED TO SPEAK

Any time you wish to speak during debate, you must do the following:

1. Raise your Placard.
2. If the Chair points at you, you are being recognized to speak.
3. Walk to the podium/microphone - you may have to wait in line to speak. When it is your turn, say the following:

\_\_\_\_\_, representing  
Your Full Name  
\_\_\_\_\_, \_\_\_\_\_  
Your Country Your School

4. What you say next depends on what you are wishing to do:

Ask a Non-Debatable Technical Question (NDTQ):

...(Ask your question).

Speak during Pro/Con Debate (1-minute speeches):

...I rise to speak in (favor/opp.) of this resolution.

Optional - before starting your speech, you can also choose ONE (1) of the following options. If you are yielding, the other Ambassador must be with you:

...I rise to speak in (favor/opposition) and reserve my right to yield to the Ambassador from (Country).

...Will the Sponsors yield to a (question/series of questions)? I also reserve my right to...

...speak afterward.

OR

...yield to the Ambassador from (Country).

5. When you are done speaking, you either yield your time to the Chair, or yield your time to the Ambassador you designated:

I yield my time to the Chair.

OR

I yield my time to the Ambassador from (Country).

## NON-DEBATABLE TECHNICAL QUESTIONS

An NDTQ is a question of fact - questions that can be answered with yes, no, or evidence such as research/stats. They are "non-debatable." You cannot respond after Sponsors answer your question.

If the Chair believes your question is debatable, it will be called out of order and the floor will move to the next question.

### Sample Technical Questions

- Where did you get your research?
- Which countries will this impact?
- How will the UN fund this?

### Sample Debatable Questions

- Isn't this bad for Europe?
- Why is this good for the UN?
- Won't this be too expensive?

## PRO / CON DEBATE

During Pro/Con Debate, in addition to (or instead of) speaking, you can also do either of the following if you reserve your right:

### Ask a Question or Series of Questions

Ambassadors may use part or all of their time to ask the Sponsors a question or series of questions, any of which can be debatable.

Answers by the Sponsors are included in your 1 minute - if you are satisfied with a response, you can pause them, thank them for their answer, and move on to another question or to speaking/yielding.

### Yielding

Ambassadors may also yield part of their 1-minute Pro/Con speech to one other Ambassador. You must reserve the right to yield before you begin speaking, and the Ambassador you yield to must be with you.

### Motions and Amendments

Though an important part of the debate process, no motions or amendments will be recognized at KUNA due to time constraints.

## PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE SCRIPT

**It is now time for resolution (#). Will the Sponsors come forward?**

Resolution Sponsors walk to podium and display placards.

**The Clerk will now read the title of the resolution.**

Clerk reads the Resolution Title.

**The Sponsors will have 3 minutes to divide between their opening and closing statements. You may begin when ready.**

Resolution Sponsors give their Opening Statement.

**Seeing that the Sponsors used (time) for their opening statement, they will have (time) for their closing. We will now have a 1-minute caucus.**

Ambassadors caucus - discuss resolution.

**It is now time for 2 minutes of Non-Debatable Technical Questions. Are there any such questions on the floor?"**

Ambassadors are recognized to ask NDTQ's

**The time for Non-Debatable Technical Questions has elapsed. We will now move on to Pro-Con debate. Are there speakers wishing to speak in opposition to this resolution?**

The Chair selects speakers in opposition from those who raise their placards. They line up in front of the room.

**Are there speakers wishing to speak in favor of this resolution?**

The Chair selects speakers in favor from those who raise their placards. They also line up in front of the room.

**Seeing as the Sponsors' opening was taken as a speech in favor, it is now time for a speech in opposition.**

The first speaker in opposition has 1 minute to speak

**Seeing as that was a speech in opposition, it is now time for a speech in favor.**

The first speaker in favor has 1 minute to speak

The Chair alternates between 1-min. speeches in opposition and favor until the final opposition speech.

**Seeing as that was our final speech in favor, it is now time for our final speech in opposition.**

The final speaker in opposition has 1 minute to speak

**Chair calls previous question. The Sponsors will now have (time) for their closing. You may begin when ready.**

Resolution Sponsors give their Closing Statement.

**It is now time to (rank/vote on) this resolution.**

During Committees, the Chair will call a 30-second caucus for countries to come to a consensus on ranking the resolution

During Summits, the Chair will call a 1-minute caucus for countries to determine how they will vote on the resolution.

**Doorkeeper, please seal the chamber.**

All countries wishing to abstain please raise your placard (*Counts*)  
All countries in favor please raise your placard and say Aye (*Counts*)  
All countries opposed please raise your placard and say Nay (*Counts*)

**It is the decision of the Chair that resolution (#) has been (passed/defeated). (*Chair raps gavel once*).**

**And it has. (*Chair raps gavel twice*).**

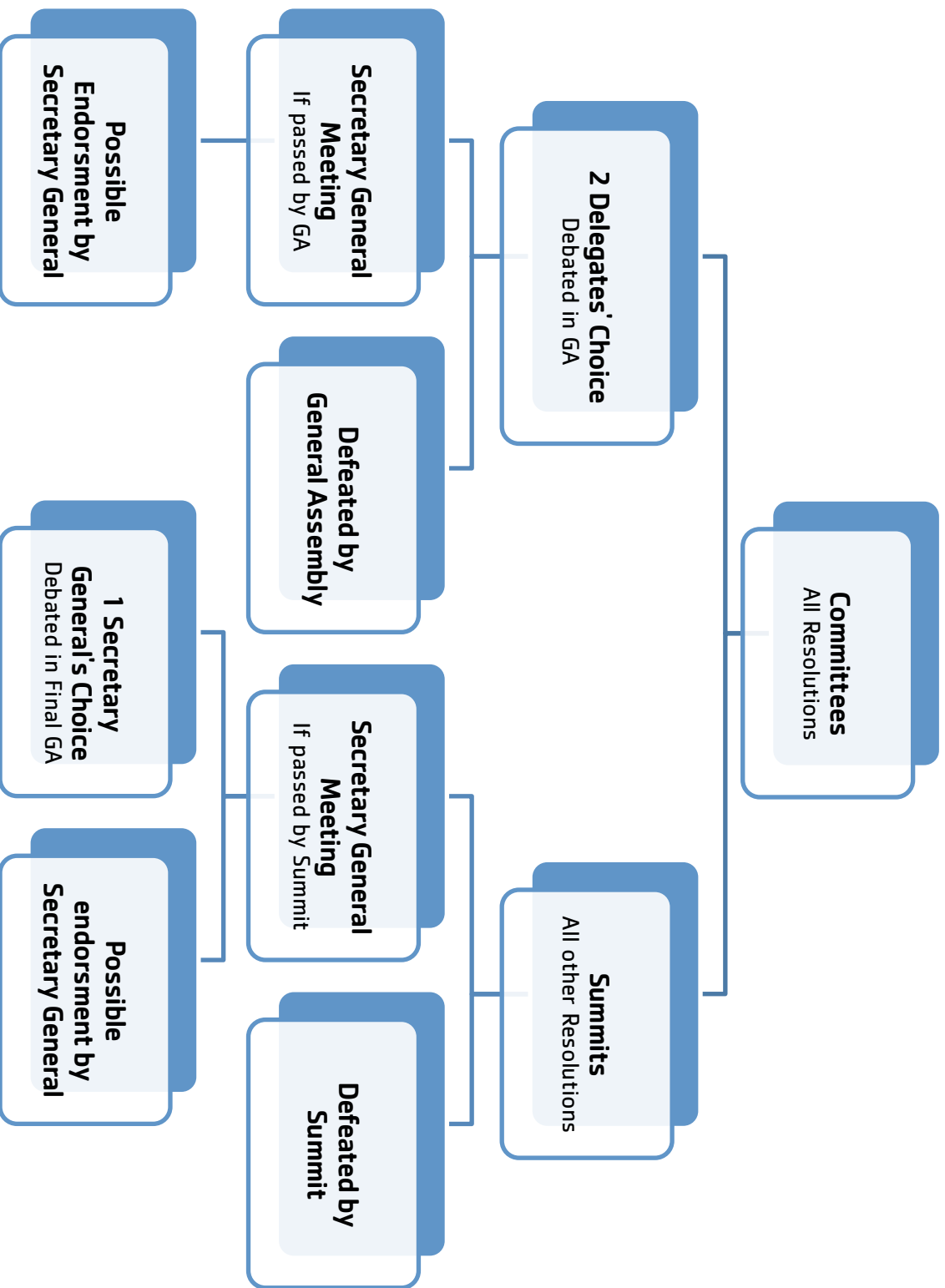

A Resolution to Prevent Animal Trafficking in Brazil

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned by the fast growing rate of animal trafficking in Brazil,


Convinced that the illegal poaching and barbaric devastation of wild animals for profit is detrimental to our world,

Observing that, in today’s world, animal trafficking is a major problem in Brazil,

Fully aware around 38 million animals are lost to this inhumane and cruel trade,

Determined to reduce the rate of animals trafficked in Brazil,

1. Calls upon the UN to help set up a task force comprised of rangers and volunteers that will set up outposts and locations near animal trafficking hotspots to control the rate of poaching and trafficking;

8 Emphasizing the importance of educating the youth on the urgency of climate change and raising a new  
9 generation of environmentally aware citizens,

11 Calling upon the UN’s support and Greece’s existing contribution to education funds,  
12  
13 1. Media has played a large role in circulating disinformation and misinformation spread by climate  
14 science denialists, along with government leaders advertising false information within their campaigns.  
15 This resolution will promote the teaching of supported and proven climate science and the curriculum  
16 will not include any untested or unproven studies.  
17 2. Climate change is taking a visible and obvious toll on Greece and other UN countries. Not only is the  
18 environment deteriorating, but also one of the major pillars of Greece’s economy- tourism. The  
19 unpredictable and inconsistent weather patterns have resulted in a decline in tourism revenue. This isn’t  
20 only a problem along the coastlines with rising sea levels and declining fish populations, the effects are  
21 equally prevalent inland due to extreme droughts. This leads to a drop in food production and resource  
22 availability which will have extremely short and long-term effects on the country. Increasing climate  
23 literacy will make Greek citizens aware of what is happening in their country and the support of  
24 environmentally conscious laws will increase.  
25 3. It is vital to educate the youth and make young minds our target demographic. It is widely accepted  
26 that the most impressionable years of a child’s life are 7-14, ages 10-16 is when people are most likely  
27 to change their habits. The ideal overlap of being able to comprehend the gravity of climate change,  
28 willingness to change behavior, and peak self-awareness is the 12-14 age bracket. This age-based  
29 curriculum can be adapted to any school system, in Greece it would be incorporated somewhere  
30 between grades 1-3 of gymnasium.  
31 4. There will be limited to no additional funding required because this climate-based curriculum will be  
32 incorporated into existing biological and life sciences. Environmental studies are already being taught in  
33 Greek schools, and the major difference would be increased focus on the effects of climatic changes and  
34 steps students can take to contribute to climate-based solutions. The education board is already  
35 established and set up to enforce these kinds of changes.

11 Recalling that the mistreatment of refugees is a direct attack on the rights of humanity as declared in its  
12 resolutions 74/130 of 18 December, 2019, 74/322 of 21 August, 2019, and 73/12 of 2018,

14 Conscious of the fact that by implementing a suggestion for a reformed refugee registration system that  
15 involves the inclusion of a grace-period, basic necessities, and freedom, we will be improving the lives of  
16 millions,

18 Recognizing that the steps previously taken by the UN to improve the lives of refugees have served as the  
19 foundation, we must build upon it to truly make a difference in the quality of living and treatment of our  
20 refugees,  
21  
22 1. Encourages the UN to commence globally inclusive conferences, suggesting the reform of refugee  
23 registration on a national level, one by which refugees are granted grace-periods for registration,  
24 translators, basic necessities (the inclusion of water, food, shelter, and clothing), and medical treatment

13 Fully aware that the global COVID-19 pandemic has forced schools around the world to adjust to a virtual  
14 instruction model or close.  
15  
16 Troubled by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization’s statistics that COVID-19 has  
17 effected over 990 million learners in 130 countries across the world.  
18  
19 Convinced that a global approach with the cooperation of the UN to free WI-FI access anywhere on earth is  
20 necessary to prevent private companies and nation-states with a history of espionage and censorship from  
21 unilaterally controlling the mighty power of information and communication.  
22  
23 1. Requests that the United Nations General Assembly in cooperation with the Security Council and  
24 member nations with space programs creates a global WI-FI system with the help of satellites that can  
25 be accessed for free anywhere on the planet like the Global Positioning System (GPS) created and

5 Deeply concerned about health issues and the destruction of the environment that result from pesticides.  
6 Recognizing that 30-35% of all cancers in the world are caused by diet.  
7 Emphasizing pesticide contamination in water and the consumption of pesticides within wildlife.  
8 Noting the Pesticide Action Network (PAN) International is a network of over 600 participating  
9 nongovernmental organizations, institutions and individuals in over 90 countries working to replace the use of  
10 hazardous pesticides with ecologically sound and socially just alternatives.

- 11  
12 1. Calls upon PAN to establish two sets of standards to be met when reviewing pesticides. One being  
13 whether the pesticide should be banned and the other being whether the product should be approved.  
14  
15 2. Requires pesticide creators to apply for pesticide approval before selling products commercially.  
16  
17 3. Designates national agricultural departments (USDA, The Ministry of Agriculture, The Ministry of  
18 Agriculture and Rural Development, etc.) to review PAN standards when creators apply for a national  
19 pesticide approval.  
20  
21 4. Emphasizes it'll be the country's agricultural department's decision whether the product will be  
22 banned in the country or approved in the country, along the lines of PAN's standards.  
23  
24 5. Emphasizes it's the country's agricultural department's decision on whether to limit pesticide supply  
25 to PAN approved products.  
26  
27 6. Requests the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) to further review the pesticide as globally  
28 approved.  
29  
30 7. Further notes the pesticides that have been approved to be labeled "PAN approved" visibly on the  
31 packaging and added to PAN's list of approved pesticides according to country, that can be accessed  
32 online.  
33  
34 8. Recognizes that pesticides currently banned in a country will remain banned.  
35  
36 9. Notes the selling of non-approved pesticides labeled "PAN approved" will be taken off shelves and  
37 owners and the market selling the product will be fined (amount according to the country).

The Protection of Stateless Nations

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The General Assembly,


Bearing in mind that Article 15 of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights protects the right to a nationality for all human beings.

Viewing with appreciation, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) efforts to end the crisis of stateless individuals by 2024.

Deeply concerned by the millions of individuals whose nationalities are not given the right of self-government and whose nationalities and cultures are attacked by the states in which they reside.


Taking into account that a stateless nation is an ethnic group or nation that does not possess its own state such as Scotland, Wales, Catalonia, the Kurds of Turkey and Iraq, and the Uighurs of China amongst dozens of others.

1. Urges the General Assembly to create and fund the United Nations Council of Stateless Nations (UNCSN).
2. Designates the UNCSN as a council dedicated to the protection of stateless nations, their people, their cultures and languages, their heritage, and their future.
3. Authorizes the UNCSN to declare stateless nations and provide them special protections and monitoring from aggressive nation-states.
4. Approves the membership of diplomats from stateless nations into the UNCSN to provide true representation of the issues stateless nations face across the globe.
5. Further invites the General Assembly to Amend Article 15 of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights to include a third clause that emphasizes the right of stateless nations to exist and be protected by the community of all nations.

5 Deeply concerned by the detention of children affected by armed conflict along with, in some cases, the  
6 detainment of these children in inhumane conditions by security forces,

8 Having considered that in at least 15 countries, children have not only suffered at the hands of armed groups,  
9 but have been harmed once more when imprisoned for suspected involvement with these divisions.  
10  
11 Conscious that a number of governments have signed handover protocols, which are agreements between  
12 government agencies or between the UN and governments, that allow children in custody of security forces to  
13 be transferred to civilization child protection agencies for much-needed reintegration support,

15 Bearing in mind Yemen’s stance by observing the ratification of the International Labour Organization  
16 Convention Concerning the Prohibition and Immediate Action for the Elimination of the Worst Forms of Child  
17 Labour,

19 Determined to safely transfer these boys and girls to civilian agencies in order to reintegrate them into their  
20 communities,

22 1. Requests that the United Nations Human Rights Council begin negotiation with all parties of the  
23 conflict in Yemen with the goal of setting up and expanding Handover Protocols in order to protect the  
24 Children of Yemen.

26 2. Recommends that all member states of the United Nations agree that in the case of armed conflict  
27 their armed forces will hand over children to aid organizations, in cases where those children would  
28 otherwise be placed in the custody of the military.

30 3. Affirms that these negotiations be attempted by January 1, 2022.

A Resolution to Showcase Ski Culture Across The World

The General Assembly,

Acknowledging the culture of skiing within Switzerland and across the world. We are proposing the creation of a UNESCO world heritage site to honor the tradition of skiing and its importance to cultures across the world. The site would be named the World Ski Culture Center (WSCC). Skiing is not only important to Switzerland, but also Japan, the United States, France, Finland, and more. It was one of the first forms of transportation in the winter, one of the most intense Olympic sports, and the world’s leading winter pastime.

Funded by Switzerland, the WSCC will contain a plethora of artifacts pertaining to the cultural history of skiing provided by participating countries. They would donate items of historical importance and would be financially compensated as a result of their generosity. These items would be cared for and kept in pristine condition. To be considered a world heritage site you must meet 1 of the 10 requirements listed on the UNESCO website. The WSCC meets at least 2 requirements.

1. Calls upon UN member states to consider and support the creation of the WSCC.
2. Calls upon the General Assembly to ratify the creation of a new world heritage site.
3. Understanding that the site would meet UNESCO guidelines for becoming a World Heritage Site.
  - a. Section ii: to exhibit an important interchange of human values, over a span of time or within a cultural area of the world, on developments in architecture or technology, monumental arts, town-planning or landscape design;
  - b. Section iii: to bear a unique or at least exceptional testimony to a cultural tradition or to a civilization which is living or which has disappeared;
4. Emphasizing that Switzerland would cover construction and maintenance costs for the site.

# Kentucky YMCA Youth Association

## Global Initiatives Fund

As a Diversity, Inclusion, and Global (DIG) Innovation Network Y, the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association has worked to improve YMCA global impact since 2012. Alongside YMCAs across the U.S., the Kentucky YMCA is helping to lead the YMCA Global Movement for Change. With the Global Initiatives Fund, the Kentucky YMCA is constantly growing, developing, and supporting new International relationships and fellow YMCAs.

### Global Initiatives Fund

Each year, The Kentucky YMCA raises money for the Global Initiatives Fund to support internationally—focused activities. The Kentucky YMCA uses these funds to support international programming and needs, newcomer/immigrant students, non-profits worldwide, and the YMCA Global Movement. This year, we will be dedicating the Global Initiatives Fund to the San Juan and Ponce YMCAs in Puerto Rico.

### International Experiences

The Kentucky YMCA supports various International Experiences for Participants, Volunteers, Alumni, and Staff. These experiences not only provide a learning opportunity, but also professional development and personal growth. Through local conferences, international exchanges, participation in the YMCA World Alliance, and International Leadership Opportunities, the Kentucky YMCA connects its community with the wider global network.

### KUNA

The Virtual Kentucky United Nations Assembly (KUNA) provides students from across the Commonwealth with the opportunity to travel the world in just two days. Annually, over 6,000 students research other countries, write and debate UN resolutions, and resolve global as ambassadors of represented countries. This authentic learning experience underscores the importance of global citizenship, connecting Kentucky teens to the broader world.



### YMCAs of Puerto Rico

Puerto Rico has two YMCAs—the San Juan YMCA is a wellness center/gymnasium, and the Ponce YMCA is a pool and general facility. The YMCA of Ponce is stepping up its services—as a school, child care center, and critical community center. They have **tripled** their normal offerings and resources. Because that's what the Y does: it supports its community, no matter what.

The Ponce Y has been damaged by the hurricane and earthquakes. Its staff members have faced multiple hardships and trauma. But they know the way forward is to heal together, and the Kentucky YMCA will be there with them. We are dedicating our 2021 KUNA Global Initiative Fund to support the Ponce YMCA- so it can serve and feed the region's children when no one else can -- and continue helping their community get back on its feet after several devastating blows.

### Need-Based Scholarships for Newcomer/Immigrant Students

The Kentucky YMCA does everything it can to ensure all students can attend programs. We offer need-based scholarships to students. Often our newcomer/immigrant students need additional assistance as their families are still settling in the U.S. We use our Global Initiatives Fund to support students new to the United States, offering a safe, welcoming, and educational environment.

### International Partnerships

The Kentucky YMCA continues to develop partnerships across the globe. In addition to local organizations like the World Affairs Council of KY & Southern IN and WaterStep, the Kentucky YMCA also has International Partnerships with the YMCA of Denmark and the Cape Town YMCAs in South Africa.

The Cape Flats YMCA in Cape Town has been growing and improving over the past few years. As our largest partner, we help to fund their progress with hopes of providing a space for children to go and grow. Sports, afterschool clubs, volunteer opportunities, and more are offered to children in an effort to keep them safe.
