#### KENTUCKY YMCA YOUTH ASSOCIATION Virtual Code of Conduct

It is important that our participants and guests feel welcomed and safe in our programs. This code of conduct embodies the spirit of the Y, and is intended to help everyone feel comfortable and thrive. As a YMCA participant or guest, we ask you to agree to follow this code of conduct which is rooted in our core values.

These requirements also serve as an extension and supplement to any codes of conduct students and participants must abide by for in-person programming.

- 1. Appropriate Video Call Etiquette:
  - When registering/signing-in for any video call or meeting, please use your **First & Last Name** (not a random username), as well as your **School** in parentheses (for KUNA, please include **COUNTRY instead of School**).
    - **Example:** Curious George (Monkey Acad.). This helps us to ensure the privacy of our meetings.
  - Please find a quiet area and call in at the scheduled meeting time so that you can be fully present in the virtual experience. We ask that all participants have their video function on their device if possible so we can see and hear you.
  - Please do your best to keep background noise or distractions to a minimum. Mute yourself when you are not speaking.
  - Please do not take your phone or computer to the bathroom.
  - Photos and videos of others without the expressed consent is prohibited.
- 2. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time.
- 3. Appropriate attire: Appropriate attire must be worn at all times. Clothing with vulgar language, obscene gestures, racial slurs, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program is not allowed. Appropriate tops and bottoms should be worn.
- 4. Appropriate language: Vulgar language, including swearing, name-calling or shouting/yelling at others is prohibited. When communicating in the chat box, please do not send links or information that is not aligned with our YMCA core values.
- 5. Appropriate Interactions: Participants shall demonstrate respectful, responsible, caring, and honest conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA virtual interactions. This includes but is not limited to: social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected. *Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.*
- 6. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
- 7. Creating a welcoming environment: Respect others' cultures and personal way of being. We strive to create a safe emotional and physical space. We encourage participants to honor diversity in all dimensions and respect opinions or perspectives. The Kentucky YMCA stands up against all forms of bullying, discrimination and racism.
- 8. Appropriate conduct: Any other conduct of an inappropriate, threatening or offensive nature will be investigated/evaluated by YMCA staff. Participants that do not abide by this agreement may be prohibited from participating in future virtual events or in-person activities.
- 9. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. This includes, but is not limited to: romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.

10. Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs: The use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs (including e-cigs/ tobacco-like products) is not permitted in or outside of ALL virtual calls. Participants that show, obtain, see in the background, make references to or use during the virtual calls will be removed from meeting and removed from future virtual and in-person events. Law enforcement may be involved if necessary.

If a participant or guest feels uncomfortable in confronting someone directly about offensive behavior or other issues that are in violation of this code of conduct, we ask that you please report the behavior or issue to Kentucky YMCA staff.

To create and maintain a space that embodies our core values, the Y is serious about being clear regarding activities that are not allowed. If you violate this code of conduct, consequences can include termination of program privileges, being removed from all virtual programming, and involving appropriate legal authority. The YMCA reserves the right to make situational decisions based on our policies, mission, and values.



ADJOURN	A MOTION to close a meeting.
BILL	A proposed law presented for approval by the Assembly.
BILL TITLE	The subject of the BILL.
CAUCUS	A meeting of a group or party, generally to make a decision on behalf of their group.
CHAIR	The Chairperson or Presiding Officer.
DIVISION (OF THE ASSEMBLY)	A MOTION to force a standing vote; generally invoked when a voice vote is unclear.
DOCKET	A list of BILLS to be presented.
MAJORITY VOTE	More than half of the votes cast.
MOTION	To introduce a proposal for consideration by the CHAIR.
PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.
REPRESENTATIVE	A member of the House.
ROLL CALL	Calling the names of all members to determine their presence.
SECOND	A personal approval of a motion, generally making it subject to debate.
SENATOR	A member of the Senate.
STATE OF THE COMMONWEALTH ADDRESS	Made by the Governor and containing a review of the general condition of the state and his/her recommendations to the Assembly.
TABLE	A MOTION to defer action on a BILL.
TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY	The majority vote is at least double the minority vote.
VETO	Privilege of the Governor to reject passed legislation.
YIELD	To relinquish time to another Representative or Senator

#### BE A BETTER DEBATER!!! READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:

#### • TECHNICAL QUESTIONS

- READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON'T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, "When will this bill go into effect?" and "How much will this bill cost?" are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
- Don't ask questions that begin with "WHY...?" Those are almost *always* debatable.

#### • WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE

- $\circ$  Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
  - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
  - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
  - Give a speech for or against the bill
  - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
- o If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized,

#### say, "Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or `series of questions')?" If you would like to <u>SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION</u>, you should

- If you would like to <u>SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION</u>, you should also say, "And I reserve my right to speak (or 'yield my time') afterward."
- If you would like to <u>YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING</u>, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.

• EX: "Hermione Granger, Hogwarts. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin."



4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

6	Section 1: This bill is an Amendment to KRS 186.452. This amendment would lower the age to obtain an
7	Instructional/Learner's License from age 16 (sixteen) to 15 (fifteen), and the age of obtaining an
8	Intermediate license from age 16.5 (sixteen years and 6 months) to age 16 (sixteen). The age of getting
9	Operational/Full License would change from age 17 (Seventeen) to 16.5 (sixteen years and six months). With
10	these requirements comes extra requirements to increase driving master.
11	
12	Section 2: Amending 186.452 (1) A person who is at least fifteen (15) years of age may apply for an
13	instruction permit to operate a motor vehicle. (2)A person who possesses a valid instruction/learners permit
14	and completes the KRS 186.452 requirements may apply for their intermediate license at age sixteen (16).
15	(3)(a) Allowing a person to acquire an Instructional/Learners Permit at age 15 (b) double the amount of time
16	a driver holds a Instructional/Learners Permit from 180 days to 360 days (1) double the amount of time a

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 527.040 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: 527.040
6	Possession of firearm by nonviolent convicted felon Exceptions Applicability to youthful offenders.

8	Section 2: KRS 527.040 is amended to read as follows: 527.040 Possession of firearm by nonviolent
9	convicted felon Exceptions Applicability to youthful offenders.

11 12	(1) A person is guilty of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon when he possesses, manufactures, or transports a firearm when he has been convicted of a felony, as defined by the laws
13	of the jurisdiction in which he was convicted, in any state or federal court and has not:
14	(a) Been granted a full pardon by the Governor or by the President of the United States; or
15	(b) Been granted relief by the United States Secretary of the Treasury pursuant to the Federal
16	Gun Control Act of 1968, as amended.

19	(a) Possession of a firearm by a convicted felon is a Class D felony unless the firearm
20	possessed is a handgun in which case it is a Class C felony.
21	(b) If a felon is convicted of a criminal offense other than possession of a firearm by a
22	convicted felon, and he or she possessed a firearm in commission of that offense, then the
23	felon shall be penalized for violating this section one (1) class more severely if it is a second
24	or subsequent violation of this section.
25	
26	(3) The provisions of this section shall apply to any youthful offender convicted of a felony offense
27	under the laws of this Commonwealth. The exceptions contained in KRS 527.100 prohibiting
28	possession of a handgun by a minor shall not apply to this section.

30	(4) The provisions of this section with respect to handguns, shall apply only to persons convicted
31	after January 1, 1975, and with respect to other firearms, to persons convicted after July 15, 1994.

33	(5) Violent felony offenders are not allowed to carry a firearm as classified in KRS 493.3401.

1	An Act Relating To Declawing Cats
2	
3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: This law will prohibit all forms of declawing cats, including declawing, tendonectomy, and
6	onychectomy. Declawing is an inhumane act, and therefore shall be abolished in all forms.
7	
8	Section 2: Declawing, tendonectomy, and onychectomy are all procedures that put the cat in pain. It is also
9	the cause of many behavioral problems, including biting and not using the litter box. It also results in many
10	physical problems, including chronic pain, arthritis, lameness, nerve/tissue damage, gangrene, abscesses,

10	Kentucky only provides emergency certification for those who move in and are not properly certified per the
11	state's requirements. With this, the pay of an emergency certified teacher falls into a lower category
12	comparable to that of a beginning classroom aide.
13	
14	Section 2: This could be monitored by the Kentucky Educational Professional Standards Board which
15	currently tracks the certification and qualifications of every teacher in the state. Currently the only state in
16	the United States to have a law that addresses this need is Utah, which passed in 2018.
17	
18	Section 3: If military orders extend beyond five years, or if the service member decides to end their service
19	obligations, then the spouse would need to make plans to begin taking the required tests immediately to
20	obtain their Kentucky teaching certificate and be completely certified per state requirements within a year.
21	The cost of this would fall on the educator.
22	
23	Section 4: There is no cost to implement this bill.

25	Section 5: This bill will go into effect August 1, 2022.

2 3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: Creating more programs to help children stuck in neglectful homes. Kentucky leads first in child neglect in the
6	US with a record number of 10, 000 cases. It is difficult to prevent all cases of child abuse, but you can still aid children
7	in need with charity and volunteer work. Collecting supplies and donations through school programs. These donations
8 9	will be provided to any child in need. There will be more availability for staff so students can report any situations at home. Along with clothing and comfort there will be more accessible food drives for children in low income families.
10	These programs will be non-profit and will be free for anyone to donate or volunteer.

12	Section 2: Provide more thorough welfare checks to identify more harmful environments. In the Kentucky government
13	system, 0.6% of government funding is used on welfare and social services. Taking funds from overly funded programs

13	times. Under no circumstances may it be turned off while at any crime scene.

5	Section 1: This bill will require the state to place a charging station, within its state line, for every 1,000 cars
6	owned by the citizens. The stations will be required to have at least 2 chargers.

8	Section 2: Each station will cost approximately 1,000 dollars and the pay will be divided between the
9	government, whoever owns the station, and non-profit organizations. The cost of charging your car will be
10	up to the owner of the station. Each station is required to pay taxes but the price will be up to the



3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: A food desert is defined as a geographic area where access to affordable, healthy food options,
6	such as fruits and vegetables, is limited or nonexistent, because grocery stores are not within close
7	proximity. They are most commonly located in low-income areas, as well as rural areas. This is due to the
8	fact that this specific population has such a long distance to travel to the nearest store.
9	
10	Section 2: This law will give a one time 15 percent tax credit to certified stores that open in areas
11	considered as food deserts. Stores would be able to apply to receive tax credits to open in a food desert.
12	This would ensure that those of any class or zip code have access to nutritionally adequate foods.
13	
14	Section 3: Food deserts are most commonly located in low-income areas, as well as rural areas. This is due
15	to the fact that this specific population has such a long distance to travel to the nearest store. With limited
16	options within a mile radius of most homes many turn to unhealthy foods that are close at hand. This little
17	access to nutritious foods is also related to higher rates of illnesses and shorter life spans, along with
18	obesity, which is one of the largest rising health issues. Other contributing factors to this problem are

15	Section 3: This bill will help Kentuckians who live where there is little access to fresh foods, a term called a
16	food desert. In recent years there has been a big push in addressing food deserts by growing vegetable
17	gardens. However many cities restrict owning chickens in city limits but this bill will override that restriction
18	and allow residents to raise chickens which provides a daily protein source in eggs.
19	
20	Section 4: Many states already allow chickens in city limits for example California, Colorado, Florida, Iowa,
21	and Illinois. In some states only certain cities are allowed to have chickens in city limits, like Nevada which
22	has only two cities which are allowed to have chickens in city limits.

24	Section 5: If this bill is passed any home that gets reports of rooster crows in their chicken pens will be

5	Section 1: The COVID Crisis has exposed an issue with our employment systems that are currently in place.
6	44% of the labor force earns low wages. This puts millions at risk of unemployment when the economy is in
7	crisis given they are the first to be laid-off. With additional training and education, low-skilled workers could
8	increase their chances of moderate-income level jobs with stability.
9	
10	Section 2: This bill proposes a program adopted by the Commonwealth that would provide education and
11	skills training that would allow workers options when they become unemployed.

13	Section 3: Private businesses, with incentives, and the Commonwealth would structure the program similar
14	to the pay-in of unemployment. The tiered system would provide training that would boost job opportunities

2	of Kentucky to provide Buprenorphine Naloxone (Suboxone) treatment

4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
5	
6	Section 1: 23.4 out of 100,000 people in Kentucky overdosed on opioids in 2018. With this being one of
7	the biggest problems in the state, there needs to be a solution. Which brings us to what we want to
8	accomplish with our bill. Our bill will require all drug rehabilitation centers to provide Buprenorphine
9	Suboxone treatment to opioid addicts willing to receive the treatment.
10	
11	Section 2: Considering only 9 out of 227 drug rehabilitation centers in Kentucky provide this service, it is
12	very limited and hard to get. If this treatment is more accessible it will provide an easier way to get more
13	successful treatment to opioid addicts looking to have a better quality of life. This will decrease the relapse
14	rate and give them a greater chance of a full recovery.
15	
16	Section 3: With a yearly rate of 10,000 opioid addicts who check in to drug rehabilitation centers in
17	Kentucky and 14 doses required for recovery, this will cost approximately \$700,000 a year. This act will be funded by the Kentucky Opicial Decrements of Sentember
18 19	funded by the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE). This will be easily funded because as of September
	2020 (KORE) received a grant for \$35.4 million dollars to make an effort to decrease the overdose rate on
20 21	opioids each year.
21 22	Section 4: With the money from the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort we will be able to get with Suboxone
23	the company and buy large amounts of Buprenorphine Naloxone directly from Suboxone themselves. After
24	we collect the Suboxone we will distribute it monthly to all of the drug rehabilitation centers across the
25	state. Considering this will be at no cost to the individual facilities, there will be no reason for them to not
26	provide this service. So there will be no need for a punishment
