1. Calling upon the World Food Program to assist in implementing a school feeding program	
2. Seeks assistance from organizations such as Action Against Hunger to educate communities on	
topics such as nutrition and health, water, and sanitation, so individuals will learn how to provide for	
themselves.	
3. Further recommends the organization of an educational program to teach individuals how to grow	
food and offer agricultural training on how to improve harvests and safely store food.
