(1) A person is guilty of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon when he possesses,
manufactures, or transports a firearm when he has been convicted of a felony, as defined by the laws
of the jurisdiction in which he was convicted, in any state or federal court and has not:
(a) Been granted a full pardon by the Governor or by the President of the United States; or
(b) Been granted relief by the United States Secretary of the Treasury pursuant to the Federal
Gun Control Act of 1968, as amended.
(a) Possession of a firearm by a convicted felon is a Class D felony unless the firearm
possessed is a handgun in which case it is a Class C felony.
(b) If a felon is convicted of a criminal offense other than possession of a firearm by a
convicted felon, and he or she possessed a firearm in commission of that offense, then the
felon shall be penalized for violating this section one (1) class more severely if it is a second
or subsequent violation of this section.
(3) The provisions of this section shall apply to any youthful offender convicted of a felony offense
under the laws of this Commonwealth. The exceptions contained in KRS 527.100 prohibiting
possession of a handgun by a minor shall not apply to this section.

(4) The provisions of this section with respect to handguns, shall apply only to persons convicted
after January 1, 1975, and with respect to other firearms, to persons convicted after July 15, 1994.

5	Section 1: This law will prohibit all forms of declawing cats, including declawing, tendonectomy, and
6	onychectomy. Declawing is an inhumane act, and therefore shall be abolished in all forms.
7	
8	Section 2: Declawing, tendonectomy, and onychectomy are all procedures that put the cat in pain. It is also
9	the cause of many behavioral problems, including biting and not using the litter box. It also results in many
10	physical problems, including chronic pain, arthritis, lameness, nerve/tissue damage, gangrene, abscesses,
11	paw pad atrophy, bone regrowth, osteomyelitis, and back pain. In no ways is this procedure beneficial to the
12	cat, unless it is necessary for its health.
13	
14	Section 3: This bill would be enforced by the Kentucky Humane Society. If one is to violate this law the owner
15	of the cat will be fined \$500 and the person who performs the procedure or extracting of the claws will be
16	fined double the money they got from the procedure.
17	
18	Section 4: The law will be put to effect immediately and will include all people in Kentucky. This bill will be
19	disregarded if a licensed veterinarian determines a cat needs to be declawed for health issues. This is only to
20	be allowed in extreme cases, however, where it is absolutely necessary for the cat to be declawed, and there

19	obligations, then the spouse would need to make plans to begin taking the required tests immediately to

5	Section 1: In Kentucky, feminine products are a "luxury item" meaning that under the law, feminine products
6	are not reasonably necessary. These luxury items are outrageously expensive and not everyone can get their
7	hands on them. We want to take this act away. We believe that anyone with a uterus should get these
8	products for a cheaper price, as they did not choose to have their menstrual cycle.
9	
10	Section 2: We want to create a law to have cheaper feminine products in stores and public restrooms.
11	Almost every woman in this world has a menstrual cycle, feminine products, such as pads and tampons, are a
12	necessity. Not even just women, transgender men still have to struggle with not affording pads and tampons
13	because most of them can still have a uterus. In an average box, there are about 36 tampons and we use 4

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

5	Section 1: Creating more programs to help children stuck in neglectful homes. Kentucky leads first in child neglect in the
6	US with a record number of 10, 000 cases. It is difficult to prevent all cases of child abuse, but you can still aid children
7	in need with charity and volunteer work. Collecting supplies and donations through school programs. These donations
8 9	will be provided to any child in need. There will be more availability for staff so students can report any situations at
9 10	home. Along with clothing and comfort there will be more accessible food drives for children in low income families.
11	These programs will be non-profit and will be free for anyone to donate or volunteer.
12	Section 2: Provide more thorough welfare checks to identify more harmful environments. In the Kentucky government
13	system, 0.6% of government funding is used on welfare and social services. Taking funds from overly funded programs
14	will increase the amount of money spent on social services, allowing them to perform better during neglect or
15	endangered welfare situations. Sections that will be taken from will be transportation and police funding specifically in
16	areas with unneeded funding. This will bring the funding up for public assistance about 0.3%. There will be several more
17	case workers fulfilling welfare checks and will have to be checked to make sure they are completing checks and
18	identifying situations correctly.
19	
20	Section 3: Provide more school psychologists and counselors. People at school to be able support children and help
21	them in tough situations. These teachers and staff workers will help children realize all of the opportunities for help they
22	have. For every 350 kids of 7-12 grade there is one counselor but only a small number of kids (1 out of 450 kids)
23	actually use the counselors frequently. There will be more freedom given to staff members so they can easily confront
24	and aid children who are suspected to be in danger. This will come in the form of rule changes such as ensuring
25	confidence in teacher reports and shortening the decision-making process to retain the importance of the case.

27	Section 4: Create more programs to inform children about what it's really like for a child in an abusive situation. More

10	Section 2: In section 95.015 rights and duties of police officers in the kentucky state laws, we propose a
11	new law to be added. We propose an enactment to force all members of the police, while on duty, to wear a
12	body camera while partaking in law enforcement of any kind. This body camera must be on and filming at all
13	times. Under no circumstances may it be turned off while at any crime scene.

8	individual(s) being mentally and economically stable, to be able to provide a safe environment for the
9	child/children, and not have a past record.

11 12	Section 2: This bill needs to be abided by all occupants of the state of Kentucky.
13	Section 3: Each individual living in the household that the child will be staying in will be required to have a
14	background check. This background check will include: talking to their pre- existing children, their other
15	family members, neighbors, and of course checking their health, record, credit, and mental state. Not only will
16	there be background checks for the families, but also for the social workers! If we have more certified and
17	qualified workers, it will make the foster care system 10x easier.

19	Section 4: The money funding Foster care systems in Kentucky is provided by the Federal government. There
20	are two types of Foster care systems, which are both being funded by two different organizations.
21	"Privatized Foster Care is funded by a 3rd party private agency" Privatized Foster Care systems risk not
22	having that money to pay from that 3rd party agency. We would need to make sure to have that money to
23	pay for the Foster care system. This will include taking a portion of tax from regular taxes along with taking
24	a small grant of money from diapers and other nesisties that children need in order to give more money for
25	foster care systems.
26	
27	Section 5: Once a week each foster child should be checked in on *unless already adopted* (by their CPS
28	worker). Connection with family, feeling safe, and background checks will be taken into consideration along
29	with any other information proven helpful. If a child is struggling in their new home, actions will be made to
30	ensure that the child will be in a safe, fitting family. (ie. re-training parents and anything else agreed on)

32	Section 6: This bill will go into effect the first of January, 2021 and proceed to be carried out until voted out

6	such as fruits and vegetables, is limited or nonexistent, because grocery stores are not within close
7	proximity. They are most commonly located in low-income areas, as well as rural areas. This is due to the
8	fact that this specific population has such a long distance to travel to the nearest store.
9	
10	Section 2: This law will give a one time 15 percent tax credit to certified stores that open in areas
11	considered as food deserts. Stores would be able to apply to receive tax credits to open in a food desert.
12	This would ensure that those of any class or zip code have access to nutritionally adequate foods.
13	
14	Section 3: Food deserts are most commonly located in low-income areas, as well as rural areas. This is due
15	to the fact that this specific population has such a long distance to travel to the nearest store. With limited
16	options within a mile radius of most homes many turn to unhealthy foods that are close at hand. This little
17	access to nutritious foods is also related to higher rates of illnesses and shorter life spans, along with
18	obesity, which is one of the largest rising health issues. Other contributing factors to this problem are
19	inactive lifestyles and diets.

5	Section 1: This bill will allow homeowners to have no more than 10 chickens per home and no roosters
6	allowed. Apartment and home renters will not be allowed to raise their own chickens. Large amounts of
7	manure must be disposed of to where the smell is not noticeable. Composting is the preferred method of
8	disposal but bagging and disposing with the garbage, just like pet waste, is acceptable. Chickens on private
9	property must be housed out of sight of the public view. Adequate chicken coops are required and must be
10	enclosed at all times.
11	
12	Section 2: Currently several cities in Kentucky allow chickens to be kept as pets with varied restrictions.
13	Because each city has different ordinances, this bill proposes one law to be adopted state wide.
14	
15	Section 3: This bill will help Kentuckians who live where there is little access to fresh foods, a term called a
16	food desert. In recent years there has been a big push in addressing food deserts by growing vegetable
17	gardens. However many cities restrict owning chickens in city limits but this bill will override that restriction
18	and allow residents to raise chickens which provides a daily protein source in eggs.
19	
20	Section 4: Many states already allow chickens in city limits for example California, Colorado, Florida, Iowa,
21	and Illinois. In some states only certain cities are allowed to have chickens in city limits, like Nevada which
22	has only two cities which are allowed to have chickens in city limits.
23	
24	Section 5: If this bill is passed any home that gets reports of rooster crows in their chicken pens will be
25	investigated. If there is a rooster the first offense will be \$150 and for every other offense will be another
26	\$50.
27	
28	Section 6: This bill will not require any funding from the State of Kentucky. Chicken owners may have
29	additional expenses in order to meet the requirements of the new law. This bill will go into effect January 1,

5	Section 1: The current law in Kentucky states that A number of federal and state laws and regulations
6	involve health care, such as Medicare, and Medicaid, the privacy rights of patients, the legality of physician-
7	assisted suicide, the right to choose your own end-of-life care, and more.
8	
9	Section 2: There is no additional cost to enforce this bill. This bill will be implemented by the Louisville Metro
10	public health department, which is already existing, therefore it will come at no cost, with an exception to
11	the already existing salary medical staff. The salary is paid by taxesand can range from \$30,000 to \$60,000
12	each year per medical assistant, depending on their jobs
13	
14	Section 3: In Kentucky, there must be a law to remove the chargemaster, and have fair and set prices for
15	medical equipment (tools, exams, etc). There should also be a law to tax high income people, and put more
16	into providing effective and reasonable healthcare, and hospital bills and healthcare should be free for
17	people below average income (\$48,000).
18	
19	Section 4: This bill will help citizens of the United States of America. In many ways this includes preventing
20	citizens from going bankrupt. As stated by the Washington post over 500,000 people go bankrupt every

4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
5	
6	Section 1: A NEW STATUE OF KRS CHAPTER 186 IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: This bill will allow
7	teenagers at the age of 15 $^{\prime\!\!/}_2$ to get a driving permit that will be active for a total of 365 days. This will
8	include any motor vehicle and motorcycle.
9	
10	Section 2: This bill will need no extra funding by taxpayers of Kentucky and any costs implemented by this
11	bill will be paid for by the general funds of Kentucky Division of Driver Licensing.
12	
13	Section 3: If an individual were to not successfully complete the driver's permit test, they may retake it the
14	next day when they feel more confident. If an individual were to fail the driver's permit test 3 times, or wait
15	longer than 90 days to retake it, their application will be withdrawn and they will have to repeat the process.
16	
17	Section 4: If an individual were to successfully pass the driver's permit test they are eligible to drive with an
18	adult over 21 years of age or any trained professional. After the passage of 365 days of driving under
19	permit, the individual is to take the driver's license test in order to drive on their own. If the individual is to
20	fail their driver's license test they may retake the test after 7 days. If they fail 6 times, they will have to wait
21	6 months to retake again.
22	
23	Section 5: Any individuals who is found driving a vehicle or motorcycle without first successfully completing a
24	permit and driver's license test, will be fined \$500 upon first violation, and \$5,000 for every other repeated
25	offense
26	
27	Section 6: This bill will go into effect 6 months after the date of passage.

3	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
4	
5	Section 1: The COVID Crisis has exposed an issue with our employment systems that are currently in place.
6	44% of the labor force earns low wages. This puts millions at risk of unemployment when the economy is in
7	crisis given they are the first to be laid-off. With additional training and education, low-skilled workers could
8	increase their chances of moderate-income level jobs with stability.
9	
10	Section 2: This bill proposes a program adopted by the Commonwealth that would provide education and
11	skills training that would allow workers options when they become unemployed.
12	
13	Section 3: Private businesses, with incentives, and the Commonwealth would structure the program similar
14	to the pay-in of unemployment. The tiered system would provide training that would boost job opportunities
15	and then job security. The Commonwealth would use the current amount budgeted for unemployment while

1	An act to require all Drug Rehabilitation centers in the state
2	of Kentucky to provide Buprenorphine Naloxone (Suboxone) treatment
3	
4	Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky
5	
6	Section 1: 23.4 out of 100,000 people in Kentucky overdosed on opioids in 2018. With this being one of
7	the biggest problems in the state, there needs to be a solution. Which brings us to what we want to
8	accomplish with our bill. Our bill will require all drug rehabilitation centers to provide Buprenorphine
9	Suboxone treatment to opioid addicts willing to receive the treatment.
10	
11 12	Section 2: Considering only 9 out of 227 drug rehabilitation centers in Kentucky provide this service, it is
13	very limited and hard to get. If this treatment is more accessible it will provide an easier way to get more
14	successful treatment to opioid addicts looking to have a better quality of life. This will decrease the relapse rate and give them a greater chance of a full recovery.
15	Tate and give them a greater chance of a full fecovery.
16	Section 3: With a yearly rate of 10,000 opioid addicts who check in to drug rehabilitation centers in
17	Kentucky and 14 doses required for recovery, this will cost approximately \$700,000 a year. This act will be
18	funded by the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE). This will be easily funded because as of September
19	2020 (KORE) received a grant for \$35.4 million dollars to make an effort to decrease the overdose rate on
20	opioids each year.
21	
22	Section 4: With the money from the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort we will be able to get with Suboxone
23	the company and buy large amounts of Buprenorphine Naloxone directly from Suboxone themselves. After
24	we collect the Suboxone we will distribute it monthly to all of the drug rehabilitation centers across the
25	state. Considering this will be at no cost to the individual facilities, there will be no reason for them to not
26	provide this service. So there will be no need for a punishment
27
