KUNA Afghanistan Resolution

23 The General Assembly,

Having considered that Afghanistan has most recently been engulfed in warfare since 2001, this warfare has destroyed important infrastructure including schools and farms, which has lowered the quality of life for almost all of Afghanistan. Now that the war is over, Afghanistan's coffers have run dry. In Afghanistan, over 10 million youth and adults are illiterate. The people of a country must be literate to make informed decisions, or they will be dominated by the rich and educated upper classes. The Afghan government is trying to become a working government, and possibly with the construction and staffing of proper school houses, the education system could become more effective at securing a literate populace.

Deeply concerning is that this problem is paired with the emergency of basic sanitation, according to USaid.com, only 42 percent of Afghans have access to clean drinking water and only 27 percent have access to proper sanitation facilities. With the construction of wells, the Afghan people would be healthier and stronger. The water most Afghans have access to is largely unclean.

According to WorldVision.org, 133 Afghan children die every day from tainted water.

Additionally, according to britannica, only half of the arable land in Afghanistan is cultivated annually and of this land, only half of it is properly irrigated. This farming situation causes the food output of Afghanistan to drop significantly, forcing Afghanistan to import 26% of its food. The government of Afghanistan doesn't have the funds to rebuild this important infrastructure. Without outside support, the nation of Afghanistan is doomed to suffer for a war it did not declare. The UN must come to our aid or more will suffer and die.

To solve these problems, we propose to receive around 1000 foreign service officers and any volunteers from UN nations to Afghanistan to build important infrastructure, important infrastructure being as school buildings, wells, and state farms.

We suggest this effort be funded by 200 million dollars of UN money. Guided by the United Nations we can help Afghanistan become a great thriving country.

The following requests proclaim that the efforts will go a long way in improving the literacy rate in Afghanistan; our goal is to help all Afghan people by building school houses, and providing teachers to help the next generation of Afghans.

This resolutions declares accordingly that we would like to send around 700 of the 1000 foreign service officers to help build schools and any volunteers to help teach the children of Afghanistan how to read. Any fair government is based on a literate and informed population. 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Alarmed by a study conducted by the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences stating that the Great Barrier Reef has lost one third of its coral cover in the last thirty years,

1 Convention on Eliminating Import Tariffs for Fusion Technology

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The General Assembly,

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Declaring that nuclear fusion has great potential to provide a nearly inexhaustible supply of energy, it emits no pollutants or greenhouse gases, and it has no threat of a nuclear meltdown like there is with nuclear fission reactors,

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Bearing in mind that the 13th sustainable development goal of the United Nations is to "take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts,"

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Keeping in mind that the United Nations International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) joined forces with a global research to enhance studies into fusion technology in October 2008.

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Noting further, the IAEA signed an agreement in Geneva with the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor (ITER) Organization forming a greater partnership with the United States, the European Union (EU), Japan, Russia, India, among others,

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Reaffirming that big strides have been made through the collaboration of nuclear physicists, material scientists, nuclear data specialists, metallurgists, and plasma experts among others from a network of member states,

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Noting with deep concern that while research is shared freely, components and materials that enable fusion technology are subject to added costs of import tariffs, which may be limiting factors in promoting progress toward a sustainable planet,

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1. Calls upon the United Nations to encourage countries to eliminate import tariffs on fusion technology materials and components globally;

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2. Urges member states to promote fusion research and development by eliminating import tariffs on nuclear fusion technology;

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3. Requests that the IAEA and ITER develop a list of components and materials necessary for fusion technology to aid countries in acknowledging items that should be tariff-free.

Recognizing that, homelessness is a growing problem among youth in Ireland and around the world, and that it leads to crime, drug use, and school dropouts.

Deeply concerned, the UN-Habitat reported an "alarming" increase in homelessness in the past decade with young people around the world being at the highest risk of becoming homeless.

Noting that, the Convention on the Rights of the Child, General Comment No. 21 (2017), found there is an absence of data on the number of youth who are experiencing homelessness and that the lack of data has resulted in a lack of good housing solutions in Ireland and globally.

Bearing in mind that target 11.1 of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals is to ensure access for all to adequate, safe and affordable housing and to identify persons experiencing homelessness to develop successful policies to combat homelessness so that no one will be left behind.

- 1. Seeking, consensus among member nations to conduct a nationaal count of children who are homeless.
- 2. Calls upon, member nations to adopt Housing First policies that would place youth (and if applicable their parents) who are homeless into long-term social housing (also known as subsidized housing) rather than temporary housing solutions and provide them with support resources needed.

A resolution to require randomized bi-annual prison inspections to improve quality of living conditions in Southeast Asian Countries.

The General Assembly,

Recalling that the Laos 2020 Human Rights Report from the US Embassy, "Prison cells were crowded with no beds wider than 20 inches. Some prisons reported holding juveniles with adults." Due to the high numbers of occupants in prisons, including those of juvenile age, the prison living conditions is a major issue in Southeastern Asian Countries.

Convinced that the max occupancies in prisons across Southeast Asia are exceeding their intended capacities by nearly 40%, causing many of the issues within prisons. There have also been many accounts of torture, cruel, inhuman, or degrading treatment and punishment.

Observing that here will be no additional funding needed due to the fact that the Third Committee is responsible for social, humanitarian, and cultural issues, including but not limited to: the advancement of women, the protection of children, indigenous issues, the treatment of refugees, the promotion of fundamental freedoms through the elimination of racism and racial discrimination, and the right to self-determination. As this falls under these duties of the Third Committee, this will only be an additional responsibility.

- 1. This resolution calls upon the United Nations General Assembly: Third Committee to take on the responsibility of monitoring prison systems in the Southeast Asian Countries;
- 2. Recommends The Third Committee will create a set of regulations that will be inspected biannually, at random dates. Prisons will be required to meet 80% satisfactory to pass inspection;
- 3. Proclaiming this resolution passes, it will go into effect a year after it has passed;
- 4. Notes, failure to comply with the regulations set forth by this proposal will result in a probationary period with monthly random regulation checks, as well as the prison being fined. 1st offense: 2 month probationary period and \$2,000 fine. For every offense thereafter the probationary period will be increased by 2 months and the fine increased by \$2,000 each time.

- 3. Promote the use of conservation buffers which are small strips of land with vegetation to control pollutants from entering water systems and other environmental concerns.

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Convention of the Legal Protection For Persons Displaced By Climate Change

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned about the displacement of persons of Member States due to the impacts of climate change, especially small countries such as Tuvalu, only three meters above sea level,

Recalling that rising sea levels result in flooding, rising saltwater tables, the destruction of deep-rooted food crops, increased illness/disease, the loss of income, as declared in the Intergovernmental Panel of Climate Change,

Bearing in mind that there is a growing number of people being displaced due to the 1.5 Celsius rise in temperature resulting in numerous environmental negative impacts, in fact, the number has doubled in the past four decades,

Recognizing the outcomes of the World Humanitarian Summit held in Turkey in May 2016,

Noting the positive contribution that the Sustainable Development Goals can make and the efforts made to improve the economic growth of affected populations,

Reaffirming that all persons who are displaced and economically impacted by the effects of climate change have the right to freedom of movement and residence,

Having considered that the States have the responsibility to provide the protection of human rights, focusing especially on those negatively affected by disease, displacement, and loss of livelihood,

Appreciating the adoption of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration, the Warsaw International Mechanism on Loss and Damage, and the Status of Refugees and 1967 Protocol,

Yet noting with concern that persons displaced and affected by climate change are not afforded the same protection under international law as refugees,

Encouraging Member States to address the humanitarian needs that arise due to displacement from climate change, by developing national laws and policies in line with the Guiding Principles on Internal Displacement and the Framework on Durable Solutions for Internally Displaced Persons of the Inter-Agency Standing Committee,

- 1. Calls upon the International Donor Community to provide materials and financial assistance for the implementation of programs that benefit displaced persons and communities,
- 2. Requests the development of a legally binding document to protect those impacted by climate change,
- 3. Recommends that the Secretary–General submits a comprehensive report on progress made to the General Assembly.

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that many Venezuelans are leaving the country, which is affecting the United Nations because when natives leave Venezuela, many are fleeing to Columbia, Peru, Bolivia, Chile, and the United States,
