3 The General Assembly,

5 Deeply disturbed that women in Afghanistan are being persecuted for simply existing as women in the  
6 country,  
7  
8 Noting with deep concern that women are not being ensured universal access to sexual and reproductive  
9 rights, which is a violation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and  
10 Development,  
11  
12 Alarmed by the high rates of sexual assault, which affects many women and girls in Afghanistan,  
13  
14 Noting further that 1-3 girls between the age of 15-19 experience female genital mutilation,  
15  
16       1. Recommends that parents teach their children, especially males, at a young age how to respect  
17 people of all genders, especially females.  
18  
19       2. Condemns the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and  
20 Development for not ensuring the sexual and reproductive rights and universal healthcare for women  
21 in Afghanistan.  
22  
23       3. Regrets that there is currently no punishment for the perpetrator.  
24  
25       4. Requests that the UN emphasizes the severity of sexual violence against women in Afghanistan,  
26 through guest speakers at schools and public forums.

3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Alarmed by the fact that 160 million children globally are forced to work in harsh conditions every day,  
6  
7 Deeply disturbed that 19% of children ages 5-15 in Argentina enter the labor system, due to the reliance on  
8 their earnings,  
9  
10 Taking note of the United Nations target goal 8.7 to take immediate and effective measures to eradicate  
11 forced labour, end modern slavery and human trafficking and secure the prohibition and elimination of the  
12 worst forms of child labour, and by 2025 end child labour in all its forms,  
13  
14 1. Urges the International Labor Organization(ILO) to work with government representatives to  
15 remove the loopholes within governments’ laws that allow child labor to remain legal;  
16  
17 2. Further urges the International Labor Organization to work with the Argentina government to fill  
18 the wage gap between genders in Argentina and provide more sustainable jobs for adults;  
19  
20 3. Calls upon the World Food Programme to partner with organizations such as the Huerta Nino  
21 Project to teach students about growing food and nutrition and to expand the program to  
22 surrounding countries.

18                    as HeroRATs, that seek to disarm landmines;

20                    2 .Strongly condemns nations that have to sign on the Ottawa treaty;

22                    3. Has resolved that member states do everything they can to remove the risk of landmines across  
23                    the globe.

Promoting the Protection of Brazil's Rainforests

1  
2  
3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Alarmed by the reality, that nearly 78 million square miles of the Amazon Rainforest are lost per year due to  
6 the expansion in cow pastures, the ravaging forest fires, as well as a growth in carbon emissions, spanning  
7 over Peru, Colombia, Bolivia, Venezuela, Suriname, Guyana, and French Guiana,  
8  
9 Referring to the UN Secretary General, "This year marks the beginning of the United Nations Decade on  
10 Ecosystem Restoration, which calls for action to prevent, halt and reverse the degradation of forests and  
11 other ecosystems." pointing attention to the plan for 2021 - 2030,  
12  
13 Recognizing, that Carbon emissions in South America are producing 1.1 billion tons of carbon dioxide per  
14 year, which is more carbon than the Amazon Rainforest can absorb,  
15  
16 Fully aware, that the ravaging forest fires fueled by illegal deforestation pose a threat to indigenous peoples'  
17 human rights, according to the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights Articles 7 and 17,  
18  
19 Keeping in mind, the steps taken by Brazil's government to help protect further damage to the rainforest by  
20 passing its first forest code, which stated that 35 to 80 percent of the land that farmers buy must be native  
21 vegetation,  
22  
23 Determined, to reduce deforestation by introducing the high-tech eco-friendly agriculture techniques  
24 introduced by the company AppHarvest and other similar industries,  
25  
26 1. Calling upon the United Nations, to support an initiative for a minimum of 50% of land purchased  
27 by farmers must be protected vegetation,  
28  
29 2. Encourages, the United Nations to begin funding for carbon extraction technology in Brazil  
30 following the design created in Norway known as "Sleipner",  
31  
32 3. Requests the United Nations to help Brazil and other agriculturally developed nations advance in  
33 the field of eco-friendly agriculture technology and practices to produce greater food yields using  
34 less land.

3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Deeply convinced, that there are many reasons that the Chilean people are facing poverty, many of them  
6 children,  
7  
8 Having examined, many of Chilean’s problems lie in the country’s high rates of income inequality, and this  
9 alone has driven over 2.7 million Chileans to live in impoverished conditions,  
10  
11 Deeply disturbed, 58% of Chile’s population believe a lack of opportunities and access to education is the  
12 leading cause of poverty in the country, affecting the present and future generations,  
13  
14 Keeping in mind, Article 26 of the Declaration of Human Rights states “...education shall be made generally  
15 available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all basis of merit.”, therefore by not providing  
16 educational programs for all Chilean citizens, their human rights are being denied,  
17  
18 Taking into consideration, that one of the United Nations’ primary global goals is to eradicate poverty  
19 across the world, Chile’s 2.7 million people living in poverty need our help,  
20  
21 Alarmed by, the 1.1 million Chilean people addicted to harmful substances and how this negatively impacts  
22 Chilean children, this sets the tone for future generations to repeat the cycle of abuse,  
23  
24       1. Calling upon the United Nations specifically the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) to partner  
25 with The Chilean Educational System to develop technical and vocational programs for teens and  
26 adults, in order to create a skilled workforce within Chile,  
27  
28       2. Requests the United Nations aid in reducing addiction within Chile, by helping establish drug  
29 rehabilitation programs to help end addiction and provide opportunities for vocational training while  
30 completing treatment.

Deeply disturbed over a According to a Global Report on Trafficking in Persons launched by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) indicating 79% of human trafficking is sexual exploitation.

Alarmed by 2/3 of victims of all human trafficking in the Americas are forced into prostitution.

Noting with deep concern that nearly 20% of all trafficking victims worldwide are children.

Realizing human sex trafficking is tied to other illicit activities, including drug trafficking and other international crimes.

1. Recommends establishing and supporting a network of international agencies that target trafficking with the intent of sharing information and resources to analyze and identify sources of trafficking.
2. Requests data to be shared with law enforcement agencies with the intent of educating those in transportation and tourism industries to identify signs of human trafficking.
3. Seeks a media campaign designed to raise awareness of trafficking and inform victims of resources available.

AN ACT TO INCREASE GENDER EQUALITY IN WORLD GOVERNMENTS

1  
2  
3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Alarmed by, 2 countries where voting rights for women are completely outlawed. 10 other countries have no law  
6 against it, but are pressured to not vote by social norms, husbands control over them, or violence from others.  
7  
8 Convinced that, Allowing women to be involved in the government, including voting and running for government  
9 positions, will improve equality for women, bring new ideas, and will improve representation for women around  
10 the world.  
11  
12 Noting further, that the UN General Assembly, Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination  
13 against Women, 18 December 1979, A/RES/34/180 states, "The Convention was the culmination of more than  
14 thirty years of work by the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, a body established in 1946 to  
15 monitor the situation of women and to promote women's rights."  
16  
17 Recalling, the United Nations Humans rights article 2 states, "Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms  
18 set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind such as [...] sex".  
19  
20 Recognizing, United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Gutteres stated, "The fallout has shown how deeply  
21 gender inequality remains embedded in the world's political, social, and economic systems. Those disparities have  
22 themselves exacerbated the damage-and we have all paid the price. Now is the time to change course. Women's  
23 equal participation is the game-changer we need" (15, March, 2021)  
24  
25       1. Urges the United Nations to take action. If the countries don't pass a law allowing women to be  
26 involved in the country's government including voting and running for certain positions they will have 5%  
27 of their GDP taken by the U.N. each year. If they break this rule the next year it will double to 10%. If they  
28 still don't pass a bill it will double to 20%. 40% next then 80%. This money will be taken from the  
29 country's income/money it makes each year.  
30  
31       2. Requests, that when the UN announces this decision the countries will have 3 years until the money  
32 starts to get sanctioned. This money that will be taken from these countries that don't follow these rules  
33 will be used for funding for women's suffrage, domestic violence, gender equality, human trafficking, and  
34 refugee camps. This money will be split evenly or, to crises that need it the most.

Resolution to Reduce Commercial Plastic Waste

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The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the 20,000% increase in the production of plastics worldwide since 1950,

Concerned by the damaging effects of gasses such as carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide, ammonia released through the incineration of plastics yearly.

Further noting that plastics take up 16% of all non-biodegradable waste in the world, with about 60% being sent to landfills or ocean sites.

1. Calls upon governments to impose restrictions on the use of plastics for economic use and reduce by 50% by 2030.

A Resolution to Increase Geothermal Energy Use

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The General Assembly,

Affirming, Iceland and other countries spend millions of dollars on exports. Just this year Iceland spent 93.3 million dollars on food imports from other countries.

Convinced, if we build a greenhouse harnessing geothermal energy it could put a dent in the greenhouse gases emitted from the boats, planes, trains, and cars that need to ship the food over from other countries.

Recalling, the climate environment summit on September 24, 2021. The first meeting of its kind in 40 years. "These are bold commitments, I invite you all to make them a reality," said Liu Zhenmin.

Guided by, statements from United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Affairs, Wu Hongbo, "That is why that Secretary-General decided to launch the 'Sustainable Energy for All' initiative at the opening of the UN General Assembly in September 2011."

1. Calls upon, The UN should create a foundation that builds greenhouses across the world. These greenhouses would use geothermal energy to grow food. This would cut down on the imports that countries need to pay for and the greenhouse gasses that are used for cars, boats, and planes.

**A Call to Provide Necessary Funding for Medical Resources in India**

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned by the inadequate supplement of medical resources, with only 86 physicians and 50 hospital beds for every 100,000 people,

Alarmed by the increase in transmissible bacterial disease, mainly due to only 61.1% of the rural population in India obtaining access to customary sanitation facilities,


Emphasizing that the leading and most common causes of death are in large part due to contagious bacterial illness, specifically citing the fourth and sixth most present sources as diarrheal and lower respiratory infections,

Fully aware that India accounts for 11% of the 374,764,317 worldwide COVID-19 cases and 8.7% of the 5,663,363 deaths,

Bearing in mind that only 51% of India's population has been fully vaccinated against COVID-19,

Recalling the United Nations' Declaration of Human Rights Article 25. The declaration states, "Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing, and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control." The Indian government, being unable to provide sufficient medical resources for the well-being of its citizens, requires assistance according to the Declaration of Human Rights. By neglecting this request, the United Nations is disregarding one of the basic Human Rights outlined by its declaration.

1. Calls upon the UN to provide funding for supplying medical resources for the citizens of India,
2. Requests the UN send funding to improve access to sanitation facilities, especially in rural areas,
3. Seeks to improve the awareness of citizens regarding infectious disease, including viral and bacterial illness through a UN funded awareness campaign,
4. Recommends the UN provides skilled doctors and nurses to not only treat the citizens of India, but also to provide medical education to its citizens.

Convention on Addressing Homelessness of Families and Youth

The General Assembly,

Noting with deep concern that there were approximately 9,000 people across Ireland that were homeless in November of 2021 which is an increase from 3,000 homeless people including 2,584 children,

Alarmed by the fact that in the last three years, there has been a rapid increase in the number of families becoming homeless, and in December 2019, there were 1,548 families accessing emergency accommodation. This includes 3,422 children,

Noting with further concern that youth have been identified as the population group most at risk of becoming homeless and are vulnerable to the intergenerational transfer of poverty,


Guided by the UN sustainable development goal to reduce inequalities so that policies are universal and pay attention to the needs of the disadvantaged and marginalized populations,

Noting that homelessness is such a global issue that the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations has declared that the priority of the Commission for Social Development in 2020 is "Affordable housing and social protection systems for all to address homelessness,"

1. Requests that each member state closely examines the work of the Economic and Social Council in 2020;

2. Strongly encourages each member state to examine how to meet the needs of those who cannot afford to rent or buy their own home but do not qualify for social assistance programs as this greatly impacts families with children;

3. Urges Ireland and other member states to address the homelessness of its youth by creating a long-term strategic plan that includes a job training school internship program for teenagers to prevent a continuing cycle of poverty, lack of education, and marginalization in hopes that the dignity of each person and their individual human rights are recognized.

An Act to Reform the UN Human Rights Council

The General Assembly,

Expressing utmost solicitude that the United Nations Human Rights Council is a corrupt body with biased views,


Noticing that the abuses executed by council members are immoral and illegal,

Taking into account the countless violations of human rights committed by some members of the council,

Recalling that the Human Rights Council states in Article 3, "Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person." There are other transgressions against numerous other articles from the United Nation's own Declaration of Human Rights. This includes Article 1, all humans have equal, unalienable rights and should act well towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood; 2, there is absolutely no discrimination among the people because of who you are, what you believe, etc.; 4, no one shall be enslaved or held in servitude; 5, no one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman, or degrading treatment or punishment; 9, no one shall be subject to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile; 24, everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay; 28, everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which rights and freedoms can be fully realized; 29, in the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject to only such limitations as are determined by law for the purpose of respecting the rights and freedoms of others; and finally, 30, nothing in this declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group, or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any rights and freedoms set forth in the UN Declaration of Human Rights,


Further recalling the words of the former United States Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, "The Human Rights Council has become an exercise in shameless hypocrisy - with many of the world's worst human rights abuses going ignored, and some of the world's most serious offenders sitting on the council itself.",

1. Calls upon the United Nations to remove the human rights offenders from the Human Rights Council,
2. Encourages the UN to create a new system that scores the countries on their background on human rights before they are allowed onto the council, and only if they maintain a specific score. Countries that have severe human rights violations, or they have a lower score than what is condoned, will be excluded from the UNHRC,
3. Requests that the implementation of this resolution occurs on January 1, 2023,
4. Draws the attention of the UN to remove the abusers from the council immediately, since one cannot fix the problem if one is the problem.

9 additional 120,000 hectares of forest land are destroyed each year as a result of fires. Both of which are  
10 directly contributing to the Greenhouse Effect by creating conditions for fires which are destroying even  
11 more land in Spain and making it infertile,

13 Taking note of the already infertile lands becoming even more depleted by chemicals and erosion,

16 motion a strategic plan for forests 2017-2030.

18 Also noting that the United Nations Forum on Forests (UNIFF) stated that the protection of forests is  
19 "fundamental to security of humanity's place on this planet."

21 Recognizing that as of Feb. 2021, Land Life Company has planted 980,200 trees, bringing their overall total  
22 of trees in Spain to just over 1.6 million on 1,750 hectares - that is the size of about 2,451 soccer fields,

24 Resolves to produce fertile soil and increase forest and plant growth,  
25  
26 1. Proclaims undeveloped lands to be set aside as protected green space;

28 2. Further invites Land Life Company to continue its works to mitigate future forest fire risk by

An Act to Help Doctor Shortages Around the World

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The General Assembly,


Observing, in Swedish ICU 40 percent of staff are infected by covid 19. One out of every three patients has to wait more than 90 days to get surgery according to government figures.

Noting, even before covid in 2013 the United Nations World Health Organization, “warned of the serious implications for billions worldwide due to the shortage of healthcare workers, which is estimated to grow to 12.9 million by 2035 from the current deficit of 7.2 million.”

Fully aware, that Doctor David Rhew, VP and Chief Medical Officer at Microsoft Corp, stated, “In the fight against COVID-19, healthcare workers are on the front lines there could be more problems finding general practitioners in the future, as fewer doctors choose to specialize in general medicine due to the stress and workload in clinics.”


Having considered, Carissa Etienne, WHO Regional Director for the Americas comments, “One of the challenges for achieving universal health coverage is ensuring that everyone - especially people in vulnerable communities and remote areas - has access to well-trained, culturally-sensitive and competent health staff. The best strategy for achieving this is by strengthening multidisciplinary teams at the primary health care level.”

Perpetuation of Antiquities Worldwide

3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Recognizing that numerous countries are becoming dissatisfied with the safekeeping of foreign antiquities  
6 throughout museums worldwide,  
7  
8 Fully informed that many artifacts and global treasures are being disfigured and used in illicit trade affairs in  
9 times of recession or economic decline,  
10  
11 Acknowledging that the conservation of antiquities is crucial to preserving history and the heritage of the  
12 people, from Article 27 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948) "everyone has the right to the  
13 protection of moral and material interests resulting from any scientific, literary, or artistic production of  
14 which he is the author,"  
15  
16 Strongly affirms, that the United Nations previously adopted a resolution that assisted in the prevention of  
17 looting and destruction of antiquities, however, this method has proved inadequate and unresolved,  
18  
19 Bearing in mind that the United Nations Secretary-General bulletin in 1999 states, "Theft, pillage,  
20 misappropriation and any act of vandalism directed against cultural property is strictly prohibited,"  
21  
22       1. Calls upon the United Nations, specifically UNESCO, to condemn actions taken by industry peoples  
23       or states to destroy or illegally trade cultural heritage items,  
24  
25       2. Requests, the designation of an authorized zone for antiquities in the Vatican City to be  
26       supported by the United Nations so countries unable to protect or manage antiquities can send them  
27       to Vatican museums for safekeeping, to allow for stabilization and proper infrastructure in their  
28       home countries.

Resolution to Prevent Hyperinflation in Venezuela

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3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Recognizing the Central Bank of Venezuela’s announcement that inflation has risen to 684.4% in 2021 as a  
6 deep concern to the economic stability of the region.  
7  
8 Observing the role hyperinflation has in the reduction of goods available to the public, including medicines  
9 and basic necessities which further creates both an economic and humanitarian crisis as detailed by the  
10 Central Bank and the Pharmaceutical Federation of Venezuela.  
11  
12 Further acknowledging the relationship between hyperinflation and unemployment and its effect on  
13 stabilizing the safety and economy of the region. The unemployment rate in Venezuela rose by 50% in 2021  
14  
15 1. Requests for the UN International Bank for Reconstruction to become involved as a risk-  
16 management advisor to certain industries that provide basic needs items susceptible to inflation  
17 such as bread, milk, rice, medicine, and other necessary items.  
18  
19 2. Supports local and supporting governments to employ a contractionary monetary policy by  
20 reducing the money supply with increased interest rates and decreased bond prices.  
21  
22 3. The monetary policy will take effect by August 2023 - February 2024.  
23  
24 4. Limit intergovernmental lending to Venezuela, therefore requiring Venezuela’s Central Bank to hold  
25 40% or higher of currency to lower prices in stores by January 2024.

Disease Ridden Water Endangers Citizens of the World

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The General Assembly,

Deeply disturbed by the fact that more than 2 million people in Zimbabwe, and 2 billion people globally, are being continually denied the essential human right to clean water and sanitation promised in UN resolution 64/292,

Noting with deep concern that 829,000 people die of diarrhea each year as a result of unsafe drinking water and sanitation,

Alarmed by the fact that every 60 seconds, a child dies from a preventable waterborne disease,

1. Calls upon the UN High Commissioner For Human Rights to work with non profit organizations such as The Halo Trust to drill bore holes for clean, easy to access water;
2. Urges the United Nations Environment Assembly to work with the Zimbabwe government to implement simple but needed waste disposal solutions in collaboration with organizations such as EkoLakay by SOIL, ithrone, and Poo Powder;
3. Requests the UN Water Division work with Water for Africa to help provide LifeStraws to citizens in Africa to solve the immediate threat of unclean drinking water.
