Prohibition of Child Labor in Coltan Mines


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The General Assembly,

Convinced that enrolling vulnerable children in school should be incentivized to limit their recruitment by miners,

1. Reaffirming that a different approach is needed, the Congolese government should constitute and fund an independent task force with a mandate to prosecute private and corporate businesses culpable of recruiting child miners. The enrollment of vulnerable children in school should be incentivized through ring-fenced funding and awareness campaigns to limit their recruitment into mining work;
2. Bearing in mind the problem of child labor in coltan mines, the approach to mineral certification needs a fresh look. International pressure groups can advocate for the various certification schemes to be harmonized so that they can be uniformly applied in the eastern DRC's mineral-rich regions;
3. Calls upon development partners to help train and equip civil society observatory groups at the local level to monitor and submit regular incident reports covering child labor in coltan mines. Such "shadow reports" would assist in validating or invalidating the certification audits carried out by state officials;
4. Requests a separate UN body that will oversee the strategic mineral supply chain to ensure children and other vulnerable populations are not working in mining sites; Seeks that a Disarmament, Demobilization, and Reintegration Commission be established and establish by law a compulsory education age that extends to the minimum age for employment;
5. Collect and publish complete data related to criminal law enforcement efforts, including the number of investigations conducted, convictions secured, and penalties imposed for violations related to the worst forms of child labor;
6. Fund civil and criminal enforcement agencies responsible for conducting inspections or investigations, and ensure labor inspectors have adequate resources and transportation to conduct worksite inspections throughout the country;
7. Significantly increase the number of labor inspectors to meet the ILO's technical advice and ensure that inspectors receive adequate training and funding to carry out their duties;
8. Issue appropriate decrees to ensure that enacted laws are implemented, including those related to light work provisions and increase penalties for the worst forms of child labor so they are sufficiently stringent to serve as a deterrent;
9. End FARDC support for non-state armed groups that recruit children and hold perpetrators of the worst forms of child labor, including child soldiering, accountable;
10. Improve coordination among relevant criminal enforcement agencies in conducting investigations, collecting data, and providing services to victims;
11. Cease the practice of subjecting children to physical violence and detention for their alleged association with armed groups, and ensure that enforcement officials do not carry out extrajudicial killings.

4 The General Assembly,

6 Giving a higher education will best help Ghana become the more developed and wealthy country that they  
7 have been hoping to be for the longest time. The biggest way to achieve this is by increasing taxes, and by  
8 doing that, it benefits the country through funding that can help support higher education systems, such as  
9 colleges and secondary schools, and also primary schools. Something as simple as a school can help build the  
10 mind of a child, which will help develop Ghana, boosting the economy and cities. An extensive, yet simple,  
11 curriculum for the children of primary schools would be effective, as they are susceptible to the sight of a  
12 brighter world, which will impact their views on the curriculum. This would decrease the rate of dropouts in  
13 Ghana, and could make children have a brighter and better future.

15 To add, the rate of women with high education in Ghana is so miniscule. This is contributing to a vicious cycle

17 education, and set aside fundings to better train and build the knowledge of teachers, it will never grow into  
18 the society it hopes to become. In order to make Ghana flourish and prosper, it needs to realize that the  
19 future of its country relies heavily on the next generation, and by neglecting their needs, especially those of  
20 minorities, it will never truly become a functioning society. Indulging and investing in the minds of the youth  
21 is heavily important, as the future of Ghana relies on it. Women today in Ghana are exposed to all sorts of  
22 dangers, such as abuse and assault. If Ghana would provide the resources necessary to better prepare their  
23 women for the future, it would significantly help women and other various minorities in need. In order to  
24 properly create a true and working society, there must be all sorts of roles, and pushing those roles to their  
25 full potential. These people are tired of being neglected, and it is hurting the country the more the  
26 government doesn't care about them. Our bill proposes and promises to make a brighter future for everyone

Convention on the Refugee Crisis in Greece

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3 The General Assembly,  
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5 Noting that a recent review by the U.S. News and World Report ranked the refugee crisis as one of the most  
6 recurring issues on the planet for the past six decades in a row;  
7  
8 Recalling that the U.N. as dedicated an entire unit of their organization to the refugee crisis since after  
9 World War II, stating recently: There were 79.5 million people forcibly displaced worldwide at the end of  
10 2019. Among those were 26 million refugees, half under the age of 18. There were also 45.7 million  
11 internally displaced people, 4.2 million asylum seekers, and 3.6 million Venezuelans displaced abroad. There  
12 are also millions of stateless people, who have been denied nationality and access to basic rights such as  
13 education, healthcare, employment, and freedom of movement. There are diminishing prospects for refugees  
14 when it comes to hopes of any quick end to their plight. In the 1990s, on average 1.5 million refugees were  
15 able to return home each year. Over the past decade that number has fallen to around 385,000, meaning  
16 that growth in displacement is today far outstripping solutions.  
17  
18 Reminding fellow delegates that shelter and a place to belong is a necessity in your daily life for survival,  
19 hygiene, cooking, and so much more;  
20  
21 Stating no one wants to be in an unsafe environment but also seeks a place to call their own home;  
22  
23 1. Calls upon the member nations of the UN to increase their annual funding by 7% beginning in  
24 2023 and continuing that increase through 2027, meaning an increase in funds for refugees of 35%  
25 at the end of that five-year period.

Free College Tuition Program for EU Nations

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned about educational opportunities for the impoverished and economically disadvantaged population in different parts of the world,


Observing that verified statistics have proven free, or inexpensive higher education to be an effective addition to the economic and cultural growth of a nation,

Seeing that the young educated population of countries native to the EU are leaving their homeland to go to other countries outside the EU, we call upon the UN to encourage members of the EU to have at least one free college,

Seeing as this benefits everyone, participants are getting paid to go to college and the government is getting the benefits of the individual living in that country, such as taxes and cultural diversity being brought to these countries and helping keep their population sustained,

Inspired by Germany's exemplary educational systems and free tuition program with a minimal living fee of € 10,000 in a blocked bank account that is spread out over month,

1. Calls upon the UN to advise countries in the EU to adopt the free college tuition model,
2. Each participant in this program is required to work for 2 years per each degree earned in that specific country,
3. Those countries who are in the EU are advised to have 1 free college preferably the largest and most populated,
4. If the participants are, in any way, made to go elsewhere before the program is finished, they will have a one-year grace period before they are told to come back or they will have to repay the tuition. If the participants fail, or do not meet the requirements of the two-year work period they are required to pay full tuition. If the student does not pass the course, they MUST pay the full tuition. If the participants pass, the tuition will require a two-year work period in the area of the degree,
5. Host schools are NOT required to accept everyone that applies, but are advised to try and accept as many as possible if feasible,
6. This will act as a scholarship until the degree is earned or failed,
7. The payment over Two-Years shall be taken out in 5 percent of each paycheck of the participant, all money shall be dispersed among the college,
8. The UN will create a Database of all participants who use this program and they will apply through the UN, so as to ensure they take part in one of the required regulations,
9. This will be enacted on January 1, 2023 to allow preparation for the changes.

Combating Human Trafficking and Supporting Trafficking Victims

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The General Assembly,

Fully aware of the threat that Human trafficking poses to United Nations members and their people,

Taking into consideration that the COVID-19 pandemic has worsened the challenge of human-trafficking and provoked even more vulnerability among global citizens,

Recalling that human trafficking is currently being combated as declared in resolutions 55/25, 53/11,

Bearing in mind that there are still many countries seriously lacking the necessary legal instruments or political will to implement the United Nations Protocol against Trafficking in Persons,


Recognizing that, according to the International Organization for Migration, the IOM has implemented nearly 500 counter-trafficking projects in 85 countries since 1994, and has provided assistance to over 15,000 trafficked persons,

Considering that Italy is classified as a Tier 2 country in regards to the efforts made to fight human trafficking,


Deeply disturbed by the increase in the rate of child trafficking occurring globally,

1. Further convinces United Nations Member States to enhance the effectiveness of airline and train security measures and border control authorities, to better identify vulnerable people of human trafficking, and to implement adequate prosecution of active human traffickers;
2. Requests that the United Nations Global Initiative to Fight Human Trafficking continue to promote and prioritize countering human trafficking worldwide;
3. Expresses the hope that countries will provide the victims of human trafficking adequate resources to aid in the transition back into life as a global citizen;
4. Recommends that all Member States implement the counter projects initiated by the IOM;
5. Further requests that UN Member States provide support physically, mentally, and emotionally to individuals and families who have suffered from human trafficking;
6. Urges Member States to contribute to the United Nations Voluntary Trust Fund for Victims of Trafficking in Persons and support the entirety of its efforts;
7. Encourages United Nations Member States that have previously implemented laws against human trafficking to amplify your efforts in preventing human trafficking and supporting the known victims of human trafficking

1     An Act to Reduce Child Labor and Increase Educational Opportunities to Lessen Extreme Poverty Worldwide  
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3     The General Assembly,  
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5     Deeply concerned that 160 million children ages 5 to 17 around the world are engaged in child labor,  
6     working in jobs that deprive them of their childhood, interfere with schooling, and harm their mental,  
7     physical, or social development.  
8  
9     Acknowledging the fact that due to child labor, some children are missing out on educational opportunities,  
10    which in turn reduces their opportunities to gain meaningful employment upon reaching adulthood and can  
11    lead them to a life of extreme poverty.  
12  
13    Recalling that UN Resolution 71/177 acknowledges the rights of the child as spelled out in The Universal  
14    Declaration of Human Rights and also UN Resolution 70/137, 69/158, and 69/187.  
15  
16    Reaffirming that The Universal Declaration of Human Rights grants all human beings the right to be born free  
17    and equal in dignity and rights and that everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set out therein.  
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19    Recognizing that still today, nearly one in four countries worldwide do not currently have established the  
20    minimum age for light work at age 13 or older, and that 11% of these countries have no minimum age for  
21    such work.

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- 23       1. Calls upon each country to agree to clearly established age limits for different levels of work.
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- 25       2. Recommends setting an age limit on hazardous jobs to no younger than 18 years of age
- 26       worldwide.
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- 28       3. Requests that the UN set aside \$1 billion dollars annually to create more accessible schools and
- 29       increase educational opportunities to raise the standard of living for people in currently developing

The Spanish Reconstruction Project

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The General Assembly,

We are deeply concerned about the housing and unemployment rates in Spain. In 2021 Spain kept a consistent 15.3% unemployment rate.

We also are fully aware of the housing crisis as well, and may have a solution to both.


We have decided to industrialize Spain by constructing living projects to solve the housing problem and the unemployment issue at the same time. The unemployment caused many people to lose their homes and become financially unstable, leading to a drop in the country's GDP (Gross Domestic Product). The mildest projection for GDP loss in Spain in the next year is 10%.

1. The intention is to start several large housing projects and engineering schools in impoverished places in Spain.
2. We encourage unemployed Spanish citizens to apply for these positions such as engineering, carpentry, metalworking, and more. These people will be required to attend basic trade schools to acquire the basic skills required to build these housing complexes.
3. Recognizing the fact that there are trade schools in Spain, it would be feasible to supply scholarships to aspiring trade workers.
4. Bearing in mind that Spain is already in debt, we believe that the impact of the plan would be able to bring Spain closer to economic freedom by asking for money from NATO.
5. Having examined the New Deal, created by U.S President Franklin D. Roosevelt in the 1930s, this project will raise the economy and reduce poverty in Spain.

A Resolution to Formally Recognize the Sovereignty of Nations

The General Assembly,

Deeply disturbed by the current state of crisis in eastern Europe caused by the movements of Russian force, both in the present and in 2014, which has left tens of thousands of Ukrainians dead,


Recognizing Russia's fear of international military centers in close proximity to their capital, as a result of Ukrainian entrance into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO),

Deeply conscious of Russia's intention to employ Ukraine as a buffer zone against international influence,

1. Calls upon the United Nations to recognize sovereign boundaries as put forth in August 1991 and confirmed by 193 member States represented in the UN.

2. Reaffirm the duty of member states as set forth in Article 2 of the UN charter, passed in 1945, to "settle international disputes by peaceful means in such a manner that international peace and security, and justice are not endangered" and that all members "shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force".

3. Further reminds that if a state chooses to ignore or neglect this duty, an emergency special session of the General Assembly shall be called, which may "make appropriate recommendations to members for collective measures, including in the case of a breach of the peace or act of aggression, the use of armed force when necessary to maintain or restore international peace and security" as passed by Resolution 377A(V), Adopted by the General Assembly on November 3, 1950.

Convention on the Management of Water Filtration

3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Alarmed by the drastic rate of 9,000 people dying annually from water pollution in Vietnam, with 80% of the  
6 diseases in Vietnam caused by water pollution, and 200,000 people in Vietnam have cancer associated with  
7 water pollution,  
8  
9 Affirming that resolution 64/292 said that all humans should have the right to water and sanitation. This  
10 clean drinking water and sanitation are essential to the lives of humans,  
11  
12 Emphasizing that the Declaration of Human Rights grants the right to water which states that "The human  
13 right to water is indispensable for leading a life in human dignity. It is a prerequisite for the realization of  
14 other human rights" and that water should be "sufficient, safe, acceptable, physically accessible and  
15 affordable,"  
16  
17 Fully aware that the Hanoi Water Initiative and other projects are being issued to improve access to clean  
18 water and act diplomatically,  
19  
20 Keeping in mind that UNICEF states that "Unsafe water causes 4 billion cases of diarrhea each year, and  
21 results in 2.2 million deaths, mostly of children under five. This means that 15% of child deaths each year are  
22 attributable to diarrhea - a child dying every 15 seconds. In India alone, the single largest cause of ill health  
23 and death among children is diarrhea, which kills nearly half a million children each year,"  
24  
25       1. Calling upon the UN to install reverse osmosis systems in the Red River, Mekong River, Thai Binh  
26 and Dong Nai, the major water basins in Vietnam;  
27  
28       2. Requesting that the UN monitor the amount of waste in the river;  
29  
30       3. Urging the UN to help other places that could benefit from reverse osmosis.  
31
