






YOUTH DEVELOPMENT AT THE YMCA

Virtual Code of Conduct

It is important that our participants and guests feel welcomed and safe in our programs. This code of conduct embodies the spirit of the Y, and is intended to help everyone feel comfortable and thrive. As a YMCA participant or guest, we ask you to agree to follow this code of conduct which is rooted in our core values.

These requirements also serve as an extension and supplement to any codes of conduct students and participants must abide by for in-person programming.

- 1. Appropriate Video Call Etiquette:
 - When registering/signing-in for any video call or meeting, please use your First & Last Name (not a random username), as well as your School in parentheses (for KUNA, please include COUNTRY instead of School).
 - **Example:** Curious George (Monkey Acad.). This helps us to ensure the privacy of our meetings.
 - Please find a quiet area and call in at the scheduled meeting time so that you can be fully present in the virtual experience. We ask that all participants have their video function on their device if possible so we can see and hear you.
 - Please do your best to keep background noise or distractions to a minimum. Mute yourself when you are not speaking.
 - Please do not take your phone or computer to the bathroom.
 - Photos and videos of others without the expressed consent is prohibited.
- 2. Creating a welcoming environment: Respect others' cultures and personal way of being. We strive to create a safe emotional and physical space. We encourage participants to honor diversity in all dimensions and respect opinions or perspectives. The Kentucky YMCA stands up against all forms of bullying, discrimination and racism.
 - Appropriate attire: Appropriate attire must be worn at all times. Inappropriate clothing may
 include, but is not limited to: vulgar language/images, obscene gestures, racial slurs, derogatory
 terms, propaganda for local/national/international extremist groups (ex.: ANTIFA, ISIS),
 Confederate flag, Don't Tread on Me flag, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or
 would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program. Appropriate tops and bottoms should be
 worn at all times.
 - Appropriate Background: Your video background during virtual programs must be appropriate at all times. Inappropriate backgrounds include, but are not limited to: vulgar language/images, obscene gestures, racial slurs, derogatory terms, propaganda for local/national/international extremist groups (ex.: ANTIFA, ISIS), Confederate flag, Don't Tread on Me flag, or anything that contributes to a hostile environment or would be considered inappropriate in a YMCA program.
 - Appropriate language: Vulgar language, including swearing, name-calling or shouting/yelling at others is prohibited. When communicating in the chat box, please do not send links or information that is not aligned with our YMCA core values.
 - Appropriate Interactions: Participants shall demonstrate respectful, responsible, caring, and honest conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA virtual interactions. No racial slurs, identity-based slurs, derogatory terms, or anything else that contributes to a hostile environment will be permitted. Types of interaction include but are not limited to: social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected. Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.
 - Appropriate conduct: Any other conduct of an inappropriate, threatening or offensive nature will be investigated/evaluated by YMCA staff. Participants that do not abide by this agreement may be

prohibited from participating in future virtual events or in-person activities.

- 3. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
- 4. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. This includes, but is not limited to: romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.
- 5. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time.
- 6. Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs: The use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs (including e-cigs/ tobacco-like products) is not permitted in or outside of ALL virtual calls. Participants that show, obtain, see in the background, make references to or use during the virtual calls will be removed from meeting and removed from future virtual and in-person events. Law enforcement may be involved if necessary.

If a participant or guest feels uncomfortable in confronting someone directly about offensive behavior or other issues that are in violation of this code of conduct, we ask that you please report the behavior or issue to Kentucky YMCA staff.

To create and maintain a space that embodies our core values, the Y is serious about being clear regarding activities that are not allowed. If you violate this code of conduct, consequences can include termination of program privileges, being removed from all virtual programming, and involving appropriate legal authority. The YMCA reserves the right to make situational decisions based on our policies, mission, and values.

UN UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

Preamble

Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and the advent of a world in which human beings shall enjoy freedom of speech and belief and freedom from fear and want has been proclaimed as the highest aspiration of the common people,

Whereas it is essential, if man is not to be compelled to have recourse, as a last resort, to rebellion against tyranny and oppression, that human rights should be protected by the rule of law,

Whereas it is essential to promote the development of friendly relations between nations,

Whereas the peoples of the United Nations have in the Charter reaffirmed their faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person and in the equal rights of men and women and have determined to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

Whereas Member States have pledged themselves to achieve, in cooperation with the United Nations, the promotion of universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms,

Whereas a common understanding of these rights and freedoms is of the greatest importance for the full realization of this pledge,

Now, therefore, The General Assembly,

Proclaims this Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations, to the end that every individual and every organ of society, keeping this Declaration constantly in mind, shall strive by teaching and education to promote respect for these rights and freedoms and by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance, both among the peoples of Member States themselves and among the peoples of territories under their jurisdiction.

Article

All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

Article 2

Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.

Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

Article 3

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 4

No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

Article 5

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

Article 6

Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law.

Article 7

All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.

Article 8

Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted by the constitution or law.

Article 9

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.

Article 10

Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him.

Article 11

- 1. Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proved guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.
- No one shall be held guilty of any penal offence on account of any act or omission which did not constitute a penal offence, under national or international law, at the time when it was committed. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one that was applicable at the time the penal offence was committed.

Article 12

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to the protection of the law against such interference or attacks.

Article 13

- 1. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each State.
- 2. Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country.

Article 14

- 1. Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution.
- This right may not be invoked in the case of prosecutions genuinely arising from non-political crimes or from acts contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

Article 15

- 1. Everyone has the right to a nationality.
- No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his nationality nor denied the right to change his nationality. 2.

Article 16

- 1. Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family. They are entitled to equal rights as to marriage, during marriage and at its dissolution.
- Marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses.
- The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

Article 17

- Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others.
- No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property.

Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion; this right includes freedom to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship and observance.

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.

Article 20

- Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association.
- No one may be compelled to belong to an association.

Article 21

- Everyone has the right to take part in the government of his country, directly or through freely chosen representatives. 1.
- 2. Everyone has the right to equal access to public service in his country.
- The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections, which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures.

Article 22

Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security and is entitled to realization, through national effort and international co-operation and in accordance with the organization and resources of each State, of the economic, social and cultural rights indispensable for his dignity and the free development of his personality.

Article 23

- Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable work conditions and to protection against unemployment. 1.
- 2. Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work.
- Everyone who works has the right to just and favourable remuneration ensuring for himself and his family an existence worthy of human dignity, and supplemented, if necessary, by other means of social protection.
- Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests.

Article 24

Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay.

Article 25

- Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food. clothing. housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.
- 2. Motherhood and childhood are entitled special care and assistance. All children, born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.

Article 26

- Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be 1. compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.
- Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.
- 3. Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

Article 27

- Everyone has the right freely to participate in cultural life of community, to enjoy the arts and share in scientific advancement and its benefits.
- Everyone has the right to the protection of the moral and material interests resulting from any scientific, literary or artistic production of which 2. he is the author.

Article 28

Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.


- 1. Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible.
- In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of 2. securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society.

 These rights and freedoms may in no case be exercised contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

Article 30

Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any of the rights and freedoms set forth herein.

Adopted by the UN General Assembly on 10 December 1948

Voting Committee

- o READ the resolution before you decide on your question.
- o DON'T ask questions that are <u>already in the resolution</u>.

EX: "When will this resolution go into effect?" and "How much will this resolution cost?" are <u>usually</u> answered in the Body of the resolution.

o DON'T ask questions that begin with "Why...?" These are almost <u>always</u> debatable.

WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO / CON DEBATE

- Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a technical question about the resolution
 - Ask the sponsor(s) a <u>debatable</u> question about the resolution
 - Give a speech for OR against the resolution
 - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
- o If you would like to <u>Ask a Question</u> (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say: "Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or 'series of questions')?"
- o If you would like to <u>Speak or Yield Your Time after Asking a Question</u>, you should say: "And I reserve my right to speak (or 'yield my time') afterward."
- If you would like to <u>Yield Your Time after Speaking</u>, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.

EX: "Ryan Simpson, KY YMCA, Denmark. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Smith from Central Middle."

BEING RECOGNIZED TO SPEAK

Any time you wish to speak during debate, you must do the following:

- 1. Raise your Placard.
- 2. If the Chair points at you, you are being recognized to speak.
- Walk to the podium/microphone you may have to wait in line to speak. When it is your turn, say the following:

Your Full Name
Your Country
Your School

What you say next depends on what you are wishing to do:
 Ask a Non-Debatable Technical Question (NDTO):

...(Ask your question).

Speak during Pro/Con Debate (1-minute speeches):

... I rise to speak in (favor/opp.) of this resolution.

Optional – before starting your speech, you can also choose <u>ONE</u> (1) of the following options. If you are yielding, the other Ambassador must be with you:

...I rise to speak in (favor/opposition) <u>and</u> reserve my right to yield to the Ambassador from (Country).

...Will the Sponsors yield to a (question/series of questions)? <u>I also</u> reserve my right to...

...speak afterward.

OR

...yield to the Ambassador from (Country).

When you are done speaking, you either yield your time to the Chair, or yield your time to the Ambassador you designated:

I yield my time to the Chair.

OR

I yield my time to the Ambassador from (Country).

NON-DEBATABLE TECHNICAL QUESTIONS

An NDTQ is a question of fact - questions that can be answered with yes, no, or evidence such as research/stats. They are "non-debatable." You <u>cannot</u> respond after Sponsors answer your question.

If the Chair believes your question is debatable, it will be called out of order and the floor will move to the next question.

Sample Technical Questions

- Where did you get your research?
- Which countries will this impact?
- How will the UN fund this?

Sample Debatable Questions

- Isn't this bad for Europe?
- Why is this good for the UN?
- Won't this be too expensive?

PRO / CON DEBATE

During Pro/Con Debate, in addition to (or instead of) speaking, you can also do either of the following if you reserve your right:

Ask a Question or Series of Questions

Ambassadors may use part or all of their time to ask the Sponsors a question or series of questions, any of which can be debatable.

Answers by the Sponsors are included in your 1 minute – if you are satisfied with a response, you can pause them, thank them for their answer, and move on to another question or to speaking/yielding.

Yielding

Ambassadors may also yield part of their 1-minute Pro/Con speech to one other Ambassador. You must reserve the right to yield before you begin speaking, and the Ambassador you yield to must be with you.

Motions and Amendments

Though an important part of the debate process, no motions or amendments will be recognized at KUNA due to time constraints.

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE SCRIPT

It is now time for resolution (#). Will the Sponsors come forward?

Resolution Sponsors walk to podium and display placards.

The Clerk will now read the title of the resolution.

Clerk reads the Resolution Title.

The Sponsors will have 3 minutes to divide between their opening and closing statements. You may begin when ready.

Resolution Sponsors give their Opening Statement.

Seeing that the Sponsors used (time) for their opening statement, they will have (time) for their closing. We will now have a 1-minute caucus.

Ambassadors caucus - discuss resolution.

It is now time for 2 minutes of Non-Debatable Technical Questions. Are there any such questions on the floor?"

Ambassadors are recognized to ask NDTO's

The time for Non-Debatable Technical Questions has elapsed. We will now move on to Pro-Con debate. Are there speakers wishing to speak in opposition to this resolution?

The Chair selects speakers in opposition from those who raise their placards. They line up in front of the room.

Are there speakers wishing to speak in favor of this resolution?

The Chair selects speakers in favor from those who raise their placards. They also line up in front of the room.

Seeing as the Sponsors' opening was taken as a speech in favor, it is now time for a speech in opposition.

The first speaker in opposition has 1 minute to speak

Seeing as that was a speech in opposition, it is now time for a speech in favor.

The first speaker in favor has 1 minute to speak

The Chair alternates between 1-min. speeches in opposition and favor until the final opposition speech.

Seeing as that was our final speech in favor, it is now time for our final speech in opposition.

The final speaker in opposition has 1 minute to speak

Chair calls previous question. The Sponsors will now have (time) for their closing. You may begin when ready.

Resolution Sponsors give their Closing Statement.

It is now time to (rank/vote on) this resolution.

During Committees, the Chair will call a 30-second caucus for countries to come to a consensus on ranking the resolution

During Summits, the Chair will call a 1-minute caucus for countries to determine how they will vote on the resolution.

Doorkeeper, please seal the chamber.

All countries <u>wishing to abstain</u> please raise your placard (*Counts*)
All countries <u>in favor</u> please raise your placard and say <u>Aye</u> (*Counts*)
All countries <u>opposed</u> please raise your placard and say <u>Nay</u> (*Counts*)



Rohingya Refugee Relocation in Bangladesh

The General Assembly,

Alarmed by Myanmar's discriminatory laws and military campaigns against the stateless Rohingya Muslim ethnic group, of which have forced members of the ethnic group to flee to neighboring Bangladesh from the Rakhine state of Myanmar,

Recognizing that being stateless and forced relocation of approximately 1800 Rohingya Muslims to the island of Bhasan Char in Bangladesh is a violation of articles 13 and 15 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,

Recalling relevant resolutions of the General Assembly 75/238 of 31 December 2020, 73/296 of 28 May 2019 discussing the basic human right that all are endowed to practice any religion they so choose without hindrance by government and how the Rohingya are being denied this right,

1. Recommends that the United Nations allocate approximately \$15 million (USD) to Bangladesh to expand their refugee camps and/or urban areas to prevent the relocation of Rohingya Muslims to Bhasan Char;

2. Requests that the United Nations Humanitarian Response Depot (UNHRD) sends emergency first-aid kits, food, and equipment to both Bangladesh and Myanmar to aid in the refugee crisis;

3. Calls upon the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to work with the UNHRD to ensure that these refugees are given basic human necessities to survive and to work towards giving them citizenship in either Bangladesh or Myanmar;

4. Further requests that the UNHRD distribute emergency supplies by 31 May, 2021 and the UNHCR resolve the statelessness of the refugees by 1 January 2024;

5. Urges Bangladesh to work with the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat) to establish urban areas for the Rohingya refugees to provide better sanitation among the Rohingya rather than keeping them in run-down refugee camps.

Convention on the Cessation of Protectionism on a Global Scale

The General Assembly,

Recalling the 2005 World Summit Outcome, the United Nations Millennium Declaration, the outcome of the World Summit on Sustainable Development, the International Conference on Financing for Development outcome, and the Doha Programme of the United Nations,

Recalling also the Fourth United Nations Conference on the Least Developed Countries and its outcome,

Recalling also the Conference on the World Financial and Economic Crisis and Its Impact on Development,

Reaffirming the value of multilateralism to the global trading system and our devotion to constructing a globally open, non-discriminatory, safe, and equitable multilateral trading system in order to contribute to growth, sustainable development and employment generation.

Reiterating that developmental concerns that form a fundamental part of the Doha Development Agenda, which places the needs and interests of the lesser developed countries as the central focus of the Doha Programme at the World Trade Organization,

Deeply concerned for the future prosperity of modern Least Developed Nations, with the average GDP growth rate of LDCS going from 4.9% between 2002 and 2007 down to 4.4% in 2008, and down again to 2.3% in 2009 according to the World Trade Institute,

Reaffirming agriculture as a key component for developing countries,

Acknowledging the rise in protectionist policies around the world, with the world's top 60 economies adopting a combined 7,000 protectionist measures as of November 2017 according to the World Bank,

Recognizing the importance of competition policy in order to enhance the international competitiveness and economy between developing countries, Acknowledging that free flowing international trade is an essential and powerful concept that will bring sustained economic growth, as framed in the

Monterrey Consensus, which provides framework for post-2015 development agenda, with poverty eradication as its overreaching goal,

Noting the importance of exterminating all forms of protectionism and comprehensive negotiations aimed at substantial improvement in market access, substantial reduction in trade-distorting policy, and all equivalent policy and method of exportation denoted in the mandate from the Doha Work Programme adopted by the General Council of the World Trade Organization,

Confident that with the reduction of protectionism and protectionist policies, world trade and the economies of least developed countries will be stimulated, as more nations and corporations will be able to buy and sell products without as large of a fee and nations will be able to acquire necessary products such as water and renewable energy products,

- 1. Recognizes the particular challenges that may be faced by small, vulnerable economies to fully benefit from the multilateral trading system in a manner commensurate with their special circumstances, and in this regard encourages progress in the implementation of the World Trade Organization work programme on small economies, as mandated in the 2001 Doha Ministerial Declaration and the 2005 Hong Kong Ministerial Declaration, which supports their efforts towards sustainable development, and of the outcome document of the third International Conference on Small Island Developing States, held from 1 to 4 September 2014 in Apia;
- 2. Stresses nations to not tax (tariff) transnational imports more than 20%.
- 3. Stresses nations to not put a maximum number (cap) on the amount of imports it may have on a specific product or good.
- 4. Stresses the need to remove food export restrictions and extraordinary taxes on food purchased for non-commercial, humanitarian purposes by the World Food Programme and to not impose them in the future;
- 5. Also stresses the need to increase investment from all sources in agriculture and rural development, including through the provision of technical and financial assistance, as appropriate, to the least developed and net food-importing developing countries, with a view to increasing their agricultural productivity and infrastructure;
- 6. Urges the need to identify and develop strategies to expand trade opportunities for women producers and facilitate the active participation of women in national, regional and global trade decision-making structures and processes, thereby ensuring that women- and men-owned businesses and farms have equal opportunities in markets;
- 7. Strongly condemns nations may imposing ANY taxes or tariffs on goods to combat designated major crises such as global warming, lack of water in Africa, etc. These designated crises will be voted on by the United Nations general assembly as a whole immediately following the passing of this resolution;
- 8. Strongly affirms the only way a nation may legally violate section 3 is if a resolution is made to the United Nations Conference on Trade And Development (UNCTAD);
- 9. Further requests that when the resolution is proposed and voted on, a supermajority of two- thirds (2/3) or sixty-seven percent (67%) of nations or representatives present must vote 'yea' in order for the resolution to pass;

An Act to Enhance Healthcare

The General Assembly,

Fully aware that the Republic of the Congo has 5.261 million people living in the country, their physician to resident ratio is 20 to 100,000 people. The capital, Brazzaville itself, has a population of 1.8 million. In Brazzaville, there are 20 hospitals, and only 7 of the facilities are above a 3.0 star rating. The Republic of the Congo faces many death-causing illnesses. Such as Malaria, Tuberculosis, Intestinal Parasites, Yellow Fever, Leprosy, and most importantly HIV/AIDS. Many of the hospitals in the Republic of the Congo require direct payment, which is a serious issue due to the vast amount of poverty.

1. Calls upon the UN to provide assistance to improve the healthcare facilities throughout the country;

2. Authorizes funding to implement better strategies to provide proper sanitation, hoping to lower the amount of people who are affected by the stated diseases;

3. Endorses the purchase of additional beds for the hospitals to allow more people to be treated;

4. Affirms that with these changes, the health of the population should gradually become better.

Monthly Inspections in Cuba's Prisons

The General Assembly,

Deeply disturbed by the reported unethical treatment and living conditions of imprisoned persons in Cuba's prisons,

 Noting that one of the only groups allowed in a Cuban Prison for inspection was a group of New Yorkers working in the field of criminal justice reform and Soffiyah Elijah (executive director of the Correctional Association (CA) of New York), in 2016,

Reaffirming that all prisons must comply with the United Nations Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners (the Nelson Mandela Rules),

Taking note that prisons all around the world have had reports of human rights violations but have little to no reports of any inspections taking place in these prisons,

Convinced that if alleged violations of human rights in Cuba's prisons go unchecked they will lead to much more disturbing consequences,

1. Calls upon the World Health Organization (WHO), with the help of the Joint Inspection Unit (JIU), to send 1–2 trained inspectors to inspect the sanitation and safety of prisons in Cuba that are owned by the Cuban government. The inspector(s) are already trained in sanitation and safety inspection. This is volunteer work so any payments;

2. Requests that 9 adult prisons be inspected annually. All inspected prisons will be Cuban owned and within Cuba. This resolution will exclude labor camps, detention camps, and other detention facilities on Cuba's land but not Cuban owned. For example: Guantanamo bay will not be included in this resolution as it is US owned;

3. Requests that finalized reports gathered from these inspections get sent and discussed with Cuba's Judicial branch of government and Cuba's Health Department;

4. Requests \$100,000 from the UN's total 2021 budget, to cover traveling and hotel expenses. If this resolution is passed, we are asking for 3.33% of the UN's total budget each year to continue covering expenses for the hotel stays and traveling expenses of the inspector(s).

5. Confirms that this resolution will be implemented upon passage.

Currently, Haitian law prohibits rape of men and women but does not recognize spousal rape as a crime. The penalty for rape is a minimum of 10 years of forced labor.

1. All forms of violent crimes including abuse, neglect, stalking, and exploitation against spouses will be held punishable under the law. The first domestic violence offense depending on the degree of violence will be considered a misdemeanor punishable by a minimum of 2 years and/or a \$600 fine. Any repeat defense no matter the degree will be considered a felony punishable by a minimum of 10 years with a fine of 1,000+ dollars.

2. Any statue to this act shall be amended or repealed.

3. Domestic Violence offenses and punishments will be based upon the following degrees: first degree assault, second degree assault, third degree assault, and misdemeanors.

4. This act takes effect on January 1, 2022.

With the Global Initiatives Fund, the Kentucky YMCA is constantly growing, developing, and supporting new International relationships and fellow YMCAs.

Global Initiatives Fund

Each year, The Kentucky YMCA raises money for the Global Initiatives Fund to support internationally— focused activities. The Kentucky YMCA uses these funds to support international programming and needs, newcomer/immigrant students, non-profits worldwide, and the YMCA Global Movement. This year, we will be dedicating the Global Initiatives Fund to the San Juan and Ponce YMCAs in Puerto Rico.

International Experiences

The Kentucky YMCA supports various International Experiences for Participants, Volunteers, Alumni, and Staff. These experiences not only provide a learning opportunity, but also professional development and personal growth. Through local conferences, international exchanges, participation in the YMCA World Alliance, and International Leadership Opportunities, the Kentucky YMCA connects its community with the wider global network.

KUNA

The Virtual Kentucky United Nations Assembly (KUNA) provides students from across the Commonwealth with the opportunity to travel the world in just two days. Annually, over 6,000 students research other countries, write and debate UN resolutions, and resolve global as ambassadors of represented countries. This authentic learning experience underscores the importance of global citizenship, connecting Kentucky teens to the broader world.



YMCAs of Puerto Rico

Puerto Rico has two YMCAs—the San Juan YMCA is a wellness center/gymnasium, and the Ponce YMCA is a pool and general facility. The YMCA of Ponce is stepping up its services—as a school, child care center, and critical community center. They have **tripled** their normal offerings and resources. Because that's what the Y does: it supports its community, no matter what.

The Ponce Y has been damaged by the hurricane and earthquakes. Its staff members have faced multiple hardships and trauma. But they know the way forward is to heal together, and the Kentucky YMCA will be there with them. We are dedicating our 2021 KUNA Global Initiative Fund to support the Ponce YMCA- so it can serve and feed the region's children when no one else can -- and continue helping their community get back on its feet after several devastating blows.

Need-Based Scholarships for Newcomer/Immigrant Students

The Kentucky YMCA does everything it can to ensure all students can attend programs. We offer need-based scholarships to students. Often our newcomer/immigrant students need additional assistance as their families are still settling in the U.S. We use our Global Initiatives Fund to support students new to the United States, offering a safe, welcoming, and educational environment.

International Partnerships

The Kentucky YMCA continues to develop partnerships across the globe. In addition to local organizations like the World Affairs Council of KY & Southern IN and WaterStep, the Kentucky YMCA also has International Partnerships with the YMCA of Denmark and the Cape Town YMCAs in South Africa.

The Cape Flats YMCA in Cape Town has been growing and improving over the past few years. As our largest partner, we help to fund their progress with hopes of providing a space for children to go and grow. Sports, afterschool clubs, volunteer opportunities, and more are offered to children in an effort to keep them safe.
